

# Mariner Closeup Pictures Of Mars 'Fascinating'

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Mariner 7, the first of the two Mars orbiters, today, its cameras snapping closeups that would be "fascinating."  
What the pictures contain was not immediately known but scientists were sure the quality was excellent that they ordered them displayed on monitors for newsmen as soon as they are received at Jet Propulsion Laboratory starting at 8:26 EDT tonight.  
They earlier had planned to study the pictures for 24 hours and then release selected prints.  
"We don't know exactly what we will see," a spokesman said, "and some of it may be confusing, but we are sure that much of the pictures will have fascinating details never seen before."  
Mariner 7, and a sister spacecraft, Mariner 9, was into the

Twenty-four pictures were snapped and stored on tape for transmission earthward tonight.  
The spacecraft's trouble was not failure of a device designed to sense the chemistry of the thin Martian atmosphere. The extent of Mariner 7's difficulty was not immediately determined. It went silent for several hours but technicians later picked up a weak signal from the spacecraft.  
The spacecraft's also appeared to be rolling.  
"We don't know what the trouble is or whether it will affect Mariner 9's ability to send pictures when it comes within camera range Friday," a spokesman said.  
Mariner 6, after television late Wednesday night, a series of approach photographs showing that Mars may be as cratered as the moon, made a 15-minute camera run above the Martian equator shortly after midnight.  
Its path was over a band of dark areas thought to be some form of vegetation.

In the field of view of the cameras were vast desert-like areas which earth telescopes show are traversed by thin lines long called canyons, and dark areas with curving boundaries which seem to grow green in the spring and fade in summer.  
Mariner 6 was not designed to determine whether any form of life presently exists on Mars, only whether life could survive in its apparently hospitable climate.  
The pictures to be displayed tonight might well show, how temple ruins or other structures, any large geometrical or of an ancient civilization — if structures—such as pyramids, each exist.

## Apollo 11 Moonmen Free Of Space Dust

HOUSTON (AP) — The Apollo 11 moonmen, free so far of any discernible effects from lunar dust, discuss their great adventure to the moon with fellow members of the astronaut corps—some of whom hope to make moon trips themselves.  
Neil A. Armstrong, Edwin E. Aldrin Jr. and Michael Collins, scheduled a day-long seminar on their experience talking from behind the walls of their quarantine chamber.  
Dr. Ross Taylor of the Australian National University said measurements showed about 10 chemical elements in pinches of dust he tested.  
He added that the soil was not heavily mixed with meteoric matter.  
This description lent strength to the theory that many craters on the moon were formed by volcanic rather than meteoric activity.  
Another scientist, Dr. Gary Latham of California University, said the moon has picked up the remains of what he believes were meteorites.

The scientists planned to put their own material into a solution and inject it into germ-free white mice. If there are any microorganisms in the dust, the mice are expected to respond rapidly.  
Sterilized bits of the moon soil will also be injected into the animals to see if they can be detected.  
Armstrong, Aldrin and Collins will spend part of the early evening reviewing Columbia, the space ship that carried them on the lunar round trip.  
The cone-shaped craft was brought to its quarantine in the crew area today. An engineer isolated with the crew, Jim Hartsuff, will complete the re-ventilation of the spacecraft's thrusters and other equipment.

## Longwood's Loan

Tide may have turned in the effort of the Longwood city government to gain short-term financing with South Seminole Bank for water improvements.  
In an hour and one-half long discussion last night the finance committee of Council, in a 5-4 vote, approved the loan.  
The city has some \$21,000 in reserve water revenues which could be used in part to secure the loan.  
Further with attorney Larry Carroll and a bank employee representing the banking house, the governing body left no doubt that it has no intention of pledging all revenues of the municipality or in fact any money, a case of those of the water department for the proposed \$25,000 short seven-year loan at 5 per cent interest.  
Payments on the loan would be some \$1,285.71 per quarter year with interest computed on the unpaid balance in addition. Council agreed that it would be willing to place \$10,000 of its excess water money in certificates of deposit as a back-up for the loan or to pledge in addition to direct water revenues the water utility tax.  
Carroll told the Council that the bank cannot request or allow pledge of all the city revenues for the loan and that he would carry back to the bank directors the city's offer.

## Court Litigation In Offing

Court litigation may be in the offing as the result of a leasing agreement by the Sanford Industrial Commission of a 20-acre orange grove located on Sanford Airport property.  
Cause of the action hinges on whether the grove had been legally leased a month ago to G. A. Anthony Inc., an out of town grover, for \$1,500 a year, and then renewed later by an SIC action after an issue was raised that grove should have been leased to the highest bidder.  
Today, the SIC approved what they called the "best of three bids" and leased the grove to William Garrison White of Sanford for high \$2,011 bid for each of the first four years and \$2,500 fifth year.  
Other bidders included Edward Pelt, who offered \$500 first year and \$1,000 per year remaining four years to a five year lease.  
Anthony also submitted a \$2 per year bid on the property he offered \$1,500 for each year.  
City Manager W. E. Kincaid quipped "for the \$2 bid, we can lease him (Anthony) the first tree in the northeast corner of the grove."  
Kincaid also informed the SIC that S. Joseph Davis, Anthony's attorney, had indicated he had about the city's decision to rescind the sale and intimating a suit might be filed against the city because of the rescinding.  
The vote to lease the grove was unanimous and came after the board had been asked to accept White's offer.

The clerk said the decision would most likely be made sometime after the judges' return Sept. 8. Earlier indication had been given to The Herald that a decision would be forthcoming before the recess.  
With the court to adjourn at 3 p.m. today, decision at this time is unlikely, the clerk said.

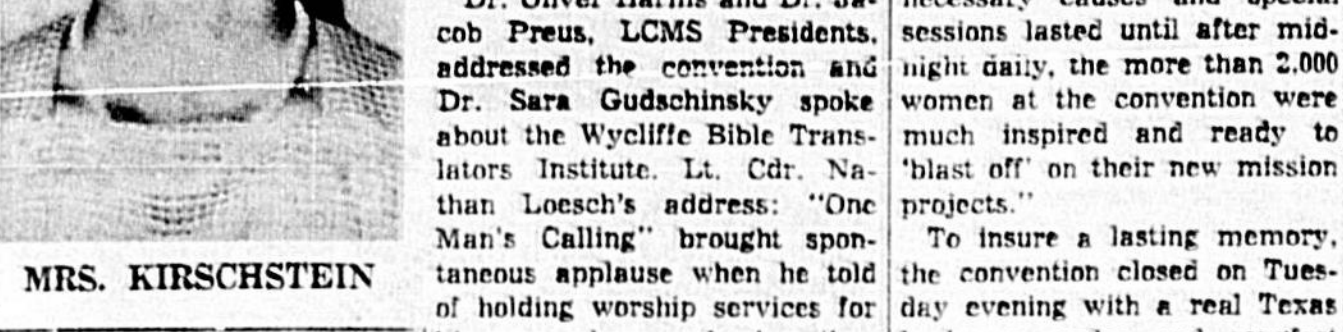

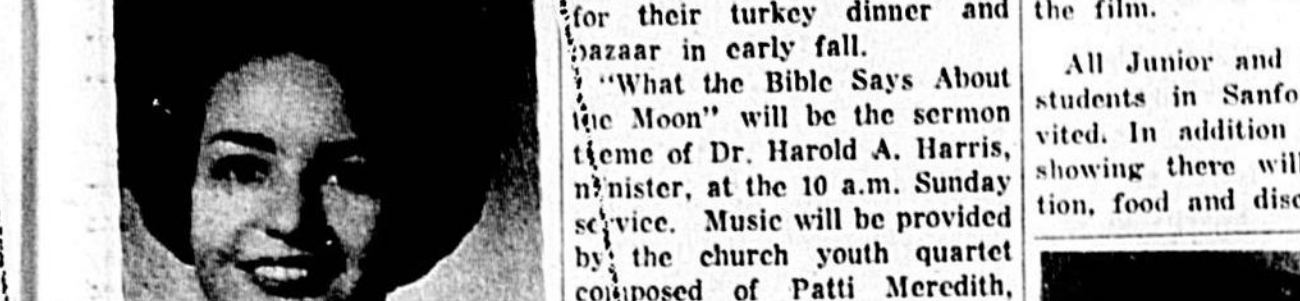

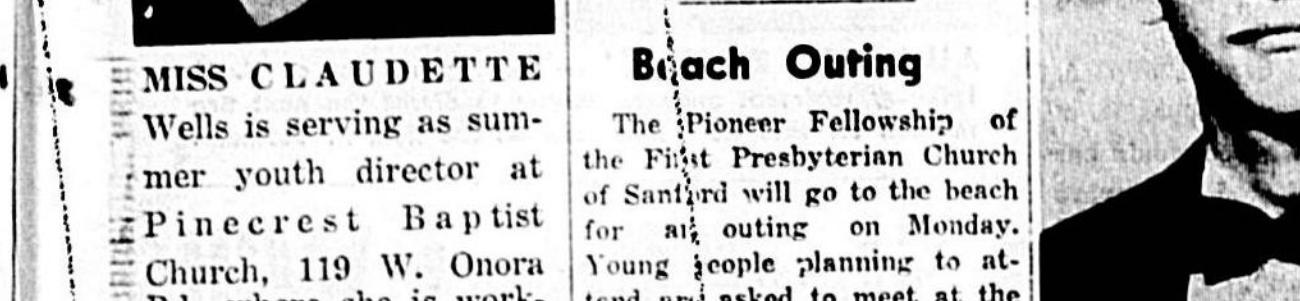

# President Promises Warmer Relations With Asians

LAHORE, Pakistan (AP) — President Nixon arrived in Pakistan today and began talks with President A. M. Yahya Khan which Nixon hoped would bolster relations with the longtime ally of the United States. Bringing the Asian portion of their "around-the-world tour" to a close, Nixon and his wife arrived from India in 100-degree heat. The pattern of our relations has changed somewhat since then, but there is no

diminution in our mutual regard nor, I am happy to say, in your country's interest in Pakistan's well-being." Nixon is replying to "some strains in our relations" over the years and said: "What we want to do on this visit is to restore a friendship based on the mutual trust and respect between two countries."

As Nixon and Yahya began their talks, the visiting chief of state said in a statement that he looked forward to "our sharing in and/or our respective assessments of our national interests and informing each other of our views." Nixon said he wanted to reaffirm a basic feeling of friendship and respect between the United States and Pakistan that he said has survived both good times and difficult ones. He pledged that the United States will continue to give strong encouragement to Asian development but he said, "Asian hands must shape the Asian future." Economic aid, he said, must "encourage self-reliance, and dependence," and must be related to "the total pattern of nation's life."

# Government Says Bad Guys Are Wheat Wheeler-Dealers

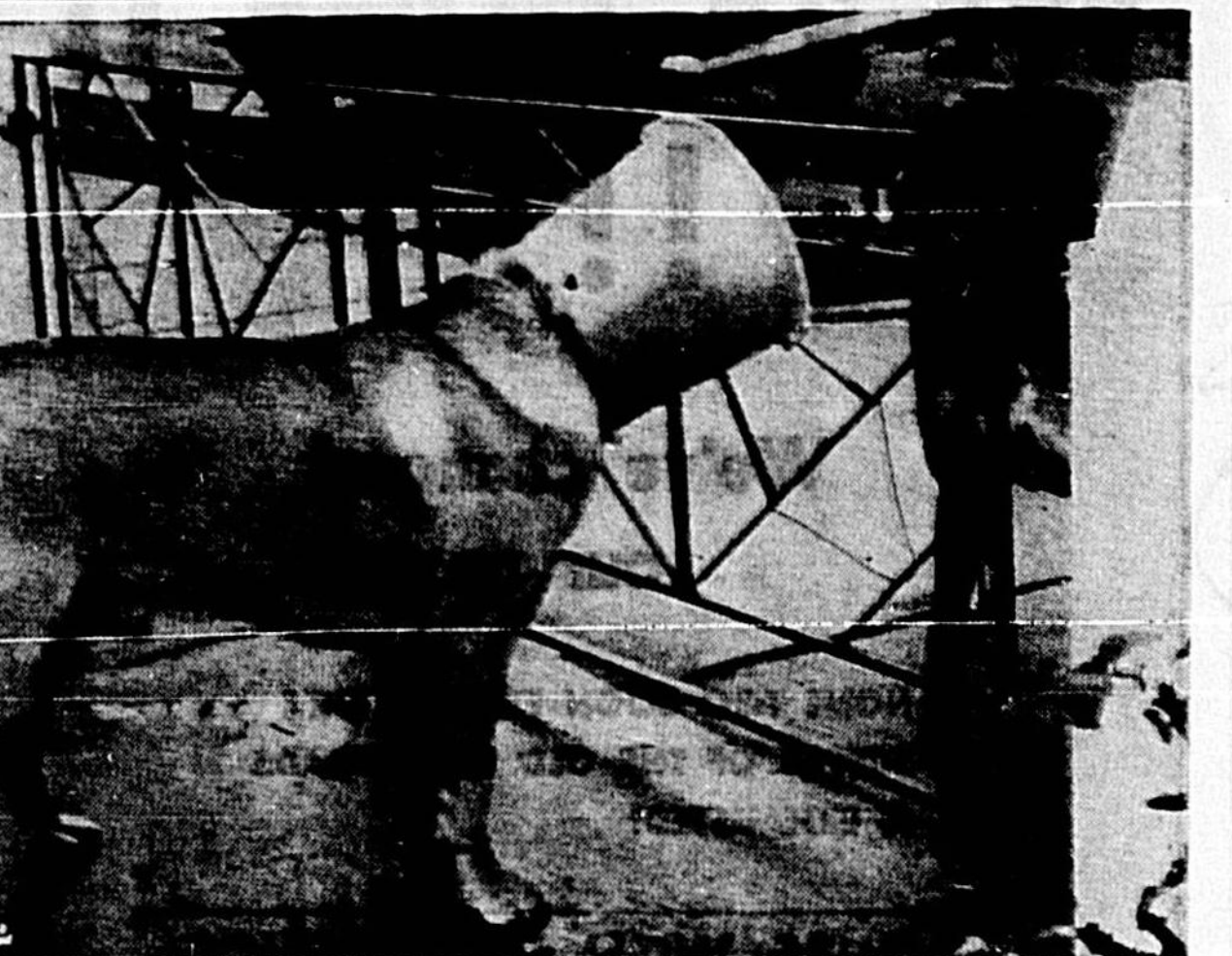

WASHINGTON (AP) — As far as Nixon administration farm officials are concerned the bad guys in the barnyard these days are the wheat wheeler-dealers in the European Common Market who peddle surplus grain at cut-rate prices at the expense of the American farmer and taxpayer.

But the Common Market — with France as the main power — is not alone in the fray. Skirmishes have been fought for months involving the United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina, and an all-out price war could break out momentarily.

All in all, the world has far more wheat than it can use of itself, and this has meant cut-throat competition for the major export nations. In addition, some of the historically big markets — India and Pakistan, for example — have started to produce more wheat of their own.

The U. S. wheat situation is particularly strained, officials say. Exports for the fiscal year that ended June 30 were only 542 million bushels — a third of 1968 farm production compared with 761 million bushels the year before, or about half the output.

Another big crop — estimated at more than 1.4 billion bushels — is being harvested now. On the average, the United States consumes less than half the wheat it produces annually. The rest must be exported or stored — sometimes for years — at taxpayer expense.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edward M. Kennedy, his face red, his hair matted, his eyes puffed, walked back into the Senate chamber to reclaim his front row desk on the Democratic side of the aisle.

Thursday slipped quietly back into the routine of his position as Senate whip, his party's assistant leader. He had not been seen on Capitol Hill since a July 18 auto accident in which a young woman riding in his car was killed. Throughout the day, dozens of his colleagues — one after the other — reached down to shake his hand, draped an arm around his shoulder, whisper an encouraging word in his ear.

Before hand, on the Senate's marble steps, Kennedy, clutching his way through clucking newsmen and tourists, had answered the question everyone had tried to ask: "How do you feel?"

"No, he would not under any circumstances seek the presidency in 1972 and, yes, his decision was irrevocable. And yes, he was glad to be back."

# 128 Cong Killed In Battle Action

SAIGON (AP) — The allied commands today reported scattered small clashes in various parts of Vietnam and a total of 128 enemy troops killed as the battlefield toll continued in its seventh week.

The U.S. Command said its forces killed 18 enemy, including six killed in a U.S. Marine ambush of a patrol near the demilitarized zone, seven killed by a helicopter gunship after they fired on the helicopter 30 miles northwest of Saigon, and five killed by 8th Infantry Division troops about 30 miles southwest of Saigon.

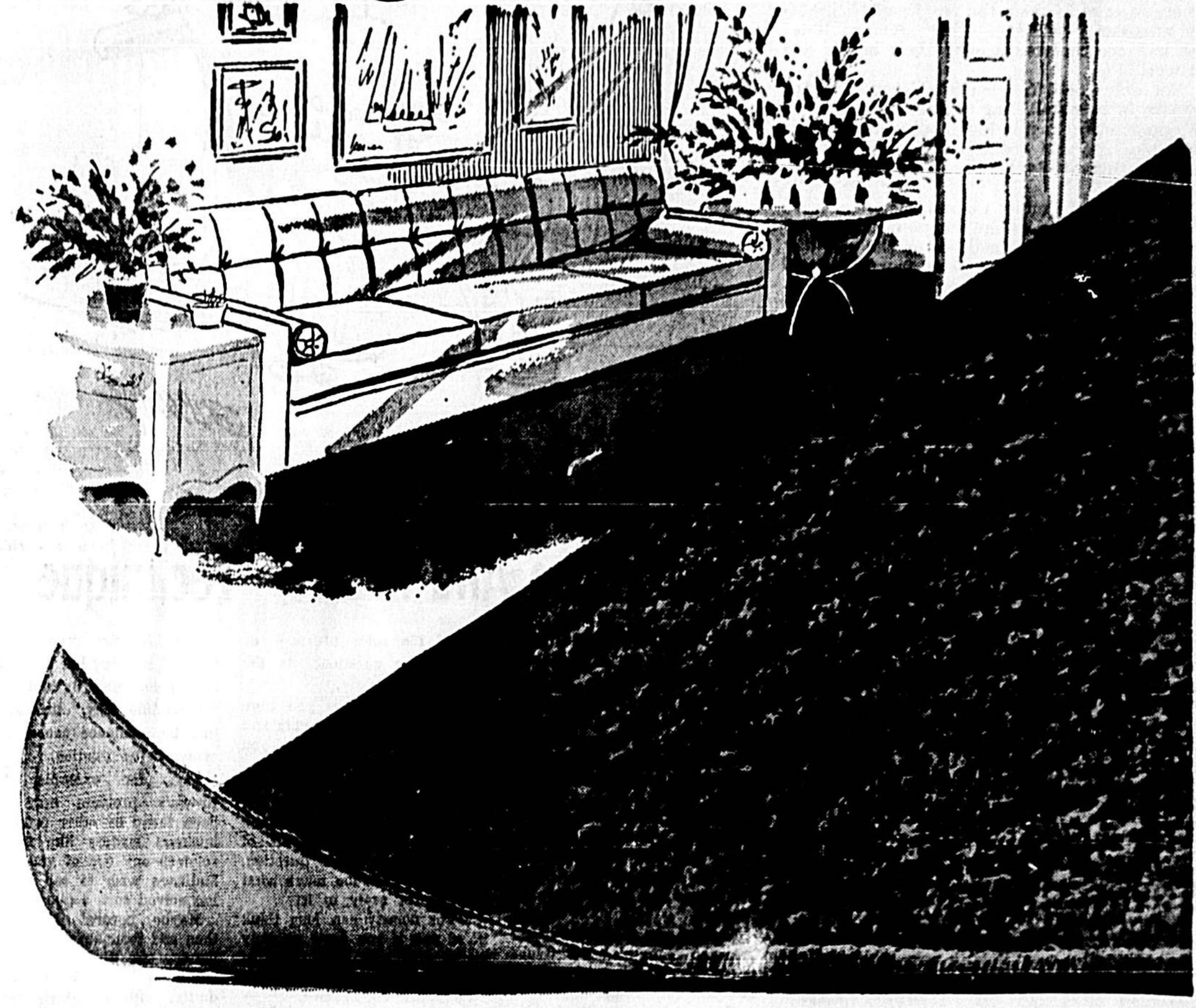

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## Chambers Will Seek Allotments County Facing Marathon Session

In what will probably be a marathon session, the Seminole County Commission will hold public hearing on 19 subjects tomorrow in addition to its regular business meeting which gets underway at 9 a. m.  
At 11 a. m. the commissioners will be approached by the Seminole Chamber of Commerce along with Sanford, Seminole Jaycees, and the South Seminole Jaycees, during the commission's budget hearings.  
These organizations are coming before the commission in an effort to have their county appropriations restored after the commissioners voted two weeks ago to stop budgeting the Chamber and both the Sanford-Seminole and South Seminole Jaycees.  
The Chamber has received some \$25,000 per year while the Sanford Jaycees were allotted \$2,000 annually.  
The organizations are expected to appear en masse in their efforts to impress on the commission the value of the services they render each year.  
The commission cut the moneys after it was suggested that the county could save the finances in a much better way by forming its own advertising and publicity committee made up of men from the community who have had experience in that particular area.  
In other action tomorrow the commission will hear a report on operating all county landfills on Sunday. Obituary landfills are presently open on Sunday and this system is on a rotating pattern between the four county dumps. The commission could take action that would open all the dumps.
