**County Business On Upswing**

The business barometer in Seminole County showed a continued upward swing in the first quarter of 1966 with the exception of construction.

There was a sharp decline in the issuance of building permits both in Sanford and Seminole County.

Bank deposits in the county were up 11 per cent over the first quarter of 1966. Bank resources were up equally over the same period last year.

Figures released by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce revealed today that bank deposits in the county have climbed to \$64.3 million over \$58.7 a year ago.

Bank deposits in Sanford were up almost 18 per cent over the same quarter of last year. In the city the banks reported deposits of \$51.8 million compared to \$42.5 million in 1965.

Postal receipts in Sanford also showed a healthy climb, up 13 per cent for the first quarter from \$48,999 a year ago to \$55,875 this year.

Electric meter installations and telephones were up also. Telephones in the Sanford exchange now total 19,155 a rise of six per cent over last year. Telephone in the county now number 37,406, an increase of 11 per cent.

Below freezing temperatures were reported for the third straight day at Bradford, Pa.

The weather bureau reported that an average temperature of 32.2 degrees at Dubuque, Iowa, during the month of May was the lowest in 30 years.

Portions of eastern Kansas had the driest May on record.

More thundershowers were expected this weekend across the Rockies and Great Plains.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. officials acknowledged today pressure is mounting on President Johnson to find a honorable way out of the war in Vietnam despite recent military victories.

The officials said three factors have combined to step up the pressure following a period of slackened demands for a settlement caused by Johnson's "peace offensive" at the beginning of the year.

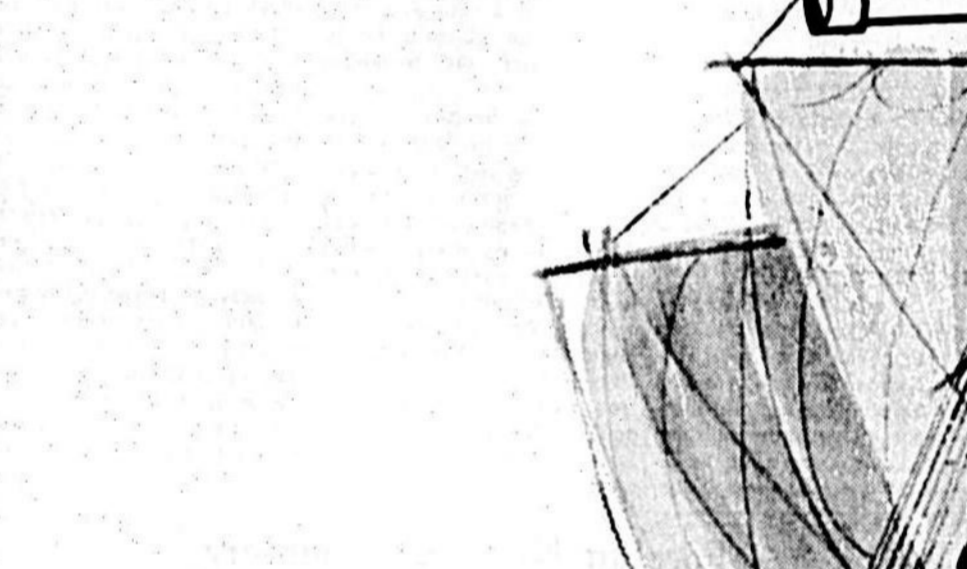

# Negroes Sweep Demo Primary In Alabama Area

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—Negroes defeated white opponents for sheriff, tax collector and county commission Tuesday in an historic Democratic primary runoff in a rural Alabama county with a background of racial strife.

Negroes failed in their effort to enter the state legislature for the first time since Reconstruction. Only five of 26 Negro candidates in the runoff were victorious.

Lucius D. Amerson, a 32-year-old Korean War veteran, won the Democratic nomination for sheriff of predominantly Negro Macon County (Tuskegee) over a white incumbent appointed two years ago by Gov. George C. Wallace.

Amerson does not expect Republican opposition in November and, therefore, would become the only Negro sheriff in the nation.

Negroes outnumber whites 25,725 to 4,394 in Macon County, where racial unrest was sparked last year by the slaying of a Negro civil rights leader at Tuskegee Institute by a white service station attendant.

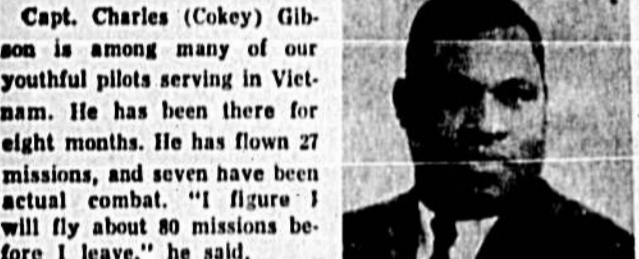

In addition to his valuable collection of china, Beaufort tapestries, 18th century paintings, Hepburn is noted for his collection of Duane pistols, made in the Scottish village of Duane and said to be among the finest pistols in the world. Hepburn has arranged that after his death his collection of armor will go to the National Gallery in Edinburgh, while his books and paintings will go to Glasgow University. Meanwhile, he's still interested in Scottish relics from soup to nuts—provided there is a story attached.

# 'Water War' Wages In The Southwest

WASHINGTON (NSA) — Under the guise of protecting one of the country's best known scenic attractions, a group of "conservationists" may be on the verge of disrupting an ambitious water development plan for the Southwest.

Though this campaign would immediately affect only the Pacific Southwest Water Plan, the stakes are much higher. For should the campaign succeed, water plans in all parts of the country might have to be altered.

The center of this controversy is a proposed power dam at Marble Gorge on the Colorado River, some 125 miles above the boundary of Grand Canyon National Park. The dam is a key part of the \$1.8 billion Central Arizona Project, which in turn is a key part of the multibillion dollar Pacific Southwest Water Plan, devised in 1964 by Interior Secretary Stewart Udall to meet future water needs in the driest, yet fastest-growing part of the United States.

Of the seven states included in the plan (California, Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada, Utah, Colorado and Wyoming), Arizona has most pressing water needs. The Grand Canyon State literally has been living on borrowed time — and water — for several years. From its underground reservoirs, the state is mining some 2.8 million acre-feet more than it considered safe annual withdrawal.

Non southern California water needs will be nearly as desperate. Within five to 15 years, estimated water needs in the other states will outstrip available supply. Located in this area are Los Angeles, San Diego, Phoenix, Tucson, Denver and Las Vegas — six of the fastest-growing cities in the United States.

That the water situation in the Southwest would someday become critical has been a recognized fact for more than 50 years. Yet long-range solutions have not been possible simply because nobody could agree on a fair plan for dividing the water.

The past half century in the Southwest seemingly has been one constant water war — city against city, state against state and Lower Colorado Basin against Upper Colorado Basin.

Udall's plan apparently ends a full stretch of Colorado River gorges which actually should be considered part of Grand Canyon National Park.

It would help the water shortage, since it is a power dam.

Although Rep. John Saylor, R-Pa., has introduced a bill in the House of Representatives which would extend Grand Canyon's boundaries to include the proposed Marble Gorge site, the dam site currently is outside park limits.

Should the dam become a reality, it would flood a gorge which — according to the Interior Department — has been visited by a total of 900 people in the last 80 years. The area is inaccessibly except by boat.

The lake made by the dam would provide recreational benefits for an estimated 850,000 persons a year.

Though Marble Gorge is only a power dam, it's nevertheless a very necessary part of future water development in the area, says the Interior Department's Bureau of Reclamation.

The sale of hydroelectric power constitutes the principal source of revenue to finance the entire project.

Should the dam project be killed, it would probably take at least two years to come up with a feasible alternative.

But, opponents of the dam say, why not steam, thermal or atomic power?

Generators run by water power, answers the Bureau of Reclamation, can be readily regulated to meet fluctuation in demand — a million horsepower, for example, simultaneously turning on their lights at sunset. Steam plants are best suited for constant, "base-load" operations.

Through thermal and atomic power plants will certainly improve in efficiency in the years ahead, they cannot approach the flexibility — and price — of hydro power.

Time and water are commodities the Southwest can least afford to waste.

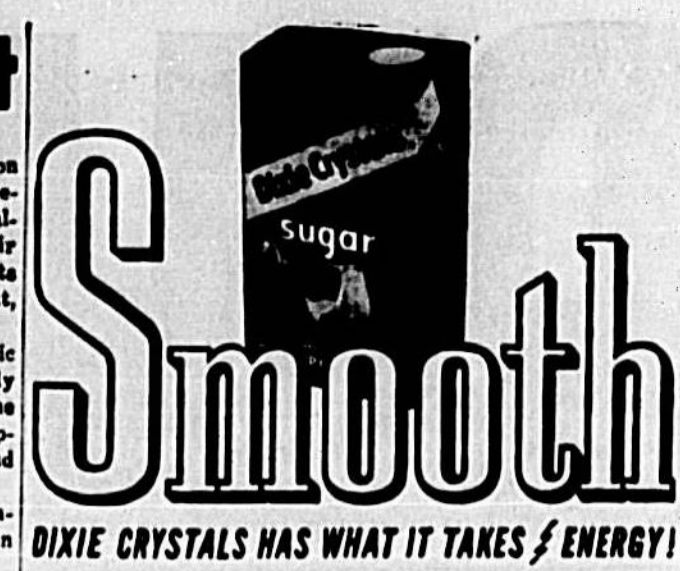

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Courses in physical hygiene are offered at Purdue University, and according to Dr. Lynn W. Combs, director of student health, no stand on birth control is advocated in the class. He did say, though, that the university code which requests premarital counseling and birth control information are encouraged to begin formal contraceptives before marriage. He explains that the pills are hormones, and are used by physicians for other purposes than birth control.

"This dual nature of the drug deceives that an individual judgment in each case must be followed," Dr. Combs said.

At the University of California at Santa Barbara, the health service refers all interested students to the local Planned Parenthood chapter. The Rev. Julius S. Scott, Jr., Acting University Chaplain, Brown, gets at the heart of most campus concern about the pill when he says:

"This situation, as it is documented the moral ambiguity of the contemporary university student, the insufficiency of shibboleths, and the necessity for a long-mind conversation about the nature of moral life in our times."

**Cabbage Heads Are Rolling Into Market**

Cabbage heads are rolling into the market! Let them add their thrifty punch to a resuscitation to use seasonal foods and help save money on the food budget.

An old-fashioned favorite goes modern, cabbage rolls now take both tomato sauce and cheese soup.

If you want to come out just right on the cabbage leaves, select a large head, cook 7 to 10 minutes in boiling water and drain them. It's important to measure the filling and thereby assure equal size servings, points out Reba Stager, meat authority.

**Beef Cabbage Rolls**  
1 1/2 pounds ground beef  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 cup cooked rice  
1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce  
8 tablespoons instant minced onion  
1 tablespoon parsley flakes  
1 large head cabbage (14 large leaves)  
1/4 cup water  
1 can (11 ounces) condensed cheese soup

Cook ground beef until lightly browned. Pour off drippings. Add salt, pepper, rice, tomato sauce, onion and parsley flakes. Mix well. Cover and cook slowly 10 minutes. Separate 14 cabbage leaves, cover with boiling water and boil 7 to 10 minutes. Drain. Place 1/4 to 1/2 cup of meat mixture in center of each cabbage leaf. Roll and fasten with a wooden pick. Place in a quart oblong baking dish or a 13 x 9-inch baking pan. Add water. Cover tightly and bake in moderate oven (350 F.) 30 minutes. Remove cover. Combine cheese soup and milk and pour over cabbage rolls. Bake, uncovered, an additional 15 minutes. 6 to 8 servings.
