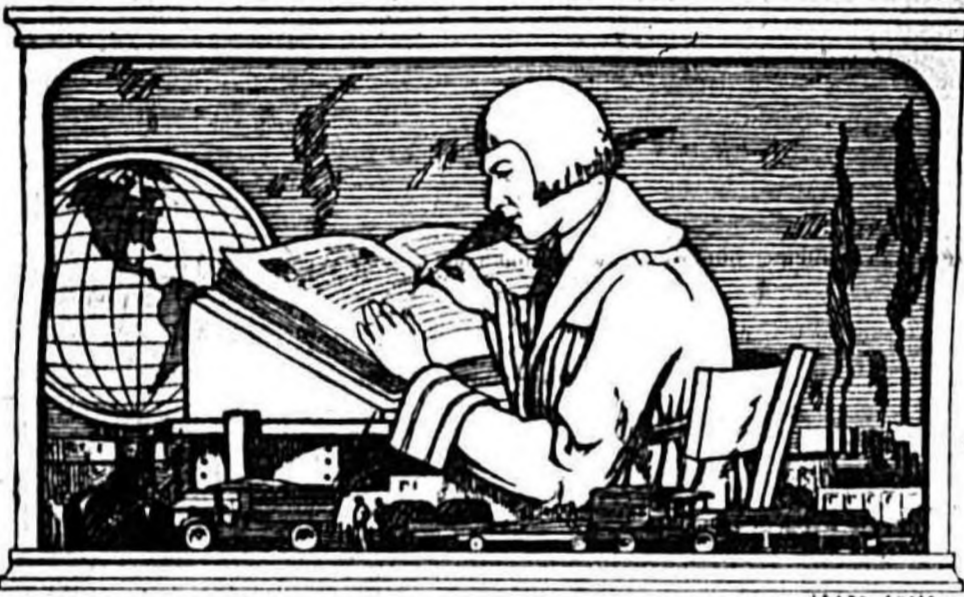

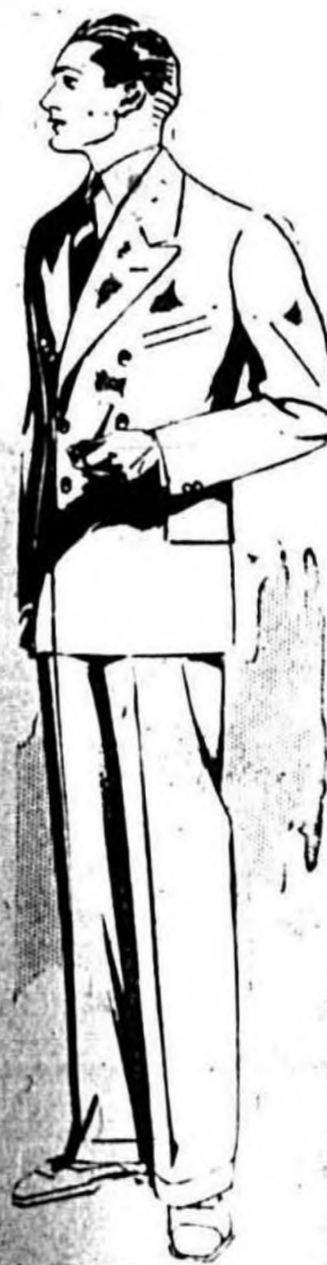

HISTORY reserves a separate niche for John Calvin Coolidge, for to him came the thrill, experienced as yet by no other man, of inaugurating his own son president of the United States.

Two men as they stood together in the small hours of that New England morning will never be known for father and son alike placed a great value on silence.

He was born at Plymouth, Vt., March 31, 1815, the son of Calvin Galucha Coolidge and Sarah Almedia Bruer Coolidge. He went to the public school of Plymouth and later attended the Black River Academy at Ludlow, 12 miles from his home.

Illness caused his withdrawal, but he re-entered the following fall, and was graduated in 1835. Calvin asked his father's advice concerning taking up the law, and the elder Coolidge told him to go ahead, and so the father saw him admitted to the bar in 1837 and elected mayor of Northampton.

Various minor political posts came Calvin's way, and in 1905 he married Grace Goodhue. There followed a term in the Massachusetts assembly, and in 1910 he was elected mayor of Northampton.

The elder Coolidge probably never dreamed that his son would go any higher. He told a "reporter" once that he hadn't raised his boy to be president. It was very likely beyond his wildest dreams; nevertheless, when an automobile dashed up to his door shortly after midnight on Aug. 3, 1923, Colonel Coolidge, poking his head out of the window, learned that Warren Harding had died, and proceeded quietly to the bedroom of his 69th year to assume the presidential mantle.

To The Ladies

Much of Sanford's moral and material welfare is directly attributable to the progressive spirit of its women, and the functioning of its Woman's Club which has, in recent years, extended its field of operations to share matters political, educational and civic with bridge luncheons, receptions and the usual social frivolities which constitute in many cities the full program of similar organizations.

The drawing of each day brings a greater realization of the many really worthwhile things that Sanford women are bringing to their city. The Woman's Club is an active community asset, its members are women with a vision crystallized into an objective, women with brains and foresight who are eminently worthy to stand side by side with the stronger sex in the building of this city.

The value of women in certain phases of public life is unquestionable. Female proponents of improvement measures are often more successful in the passage of beneficial legislation than their masculine contemporaries, because to women politics are something new, something to be taken seriously. When a woman wants something, be it a dress or an ordinance, she wants it, and the chances are she is going to get it. The essentially feminine quality that led some harassed scribe to write "persistence, thy name is women" is what is needed in civic life today. Too often masculine legislators are content to have some really worthwhile bill tabled or lost amid a sea of red tape. Not so with the woman in public life. With the relentlessness and fearlessness that characterizes the sex, she pushes through to a successful conclusion any measure that she deems worthy and advisable.

The good influence of women is felt in every department of Sanford's civic administration. There are women on our playground committee, beautification committee, city planning commission, in fact on nearly every committee responsible for real constructive work.

Sanford owes a debt to its women that cannot be easily paid, for it is a debt contracted for benefits not measurable in dollars and cents. The city's freedom from crime, our excellent sanitary conditions, the absence of slums and disorderly houses, the beautification program that is making our streets comparable with those of any Florida city, our advanced educational conditions, our well appointed playgrounds; these are only a few of the material things that women have given to Sanford.

Solid Central Florida

The inevitable period of readjustment which has set in on the East Coast intensifies rather than diminishes the solid, substantial values and assured future of central Florida. Conditions in this rich agricultural belt hitherto submerged in the general frozen speculation that over ran the state are now being elevated by contrast to their rightful position of pre-eminence, and it is becoming more and more apparent that the future prosperity of the state hinges directly on the enduring resources of its geographical and financial heart.

While many coastal communities are contracting financially, Florida's central section is expanding; while other districts are experiencing the disadvantages of building on unstable foundations, central Florida is secure on its solid, substantial basis. While other less fortunate communities boasting no intensely developed back country are curtailing their civic expenditures, central Florida cities are expanding, taking on bigger programs, spending more money than ever before for the development of those resources that guarantee the continuance of existing prosperity.

In the first few days of a campaign to raise \$800,000 for a new Y. M. C. A. building that will be a credit to the city and to the state, Orlando has passed the \$400,000 mark. Lakeland has oversubscribed a \$200,000 budget for Southern College. Sanford has just raised \$18,000 for a supplementary advertisement campaign, augmenting its \$105,000 public program, and is now assured of the passage of a \$2,600,000 city bond issue for necessary improvements.

Apartment buildings, hotels, blocks of stores and private residences are springing up in all sections of central Florida with record speed as the embargo lifts and this district's greatest building era opens.

There are some who believe that Florida is facing business depression, but these unlightened ones are not the carpenters, the brickmasons, the plasterers or the joiners, that great army of builders who know by intimate contact that building activity in Florida today is more advanced than at any previous time in the state's history.

Not only are old building projects, delayed by the embargo, progressing, but new permits issued exceed the amount of those given out in other years, and all indications are that 1926 will be the greatest building year in Florida's history.

Some indication of the tremendous demand for builders may be gathered from the report of Fred Meek, local official of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America. Among other encouraging information, Mr. Meek states that the membership of the local union has increased from forty-three nine months ago to one hundred and three at the present time, with many applications for membership pending. This condition is typical of the building activity existing in all cities of central Florida.

With almost half a million dollars coming in from celery shipments every week during the long season, Sanford and the region around it clearly illustrates the cause for this building activity, and mid-Florida's position in the limelight of prosperity.

One hundred per cent Americanism can perhaps as nearly be found in Florida today as at any spot in the United States. So that those who are engaged in the futile and rather silly propaganda against Florida must accept classification with those who do not approve of this particular manifestation of Americanism. For one who has never visited the state this mental attitude may be explicable; but those who have visited all parts of Florida and have failed to become its devoted admirers and friends would do well to make a careful examination of the quality of their Americanism.—Elmer H. Youngman in Bankers Magazine.

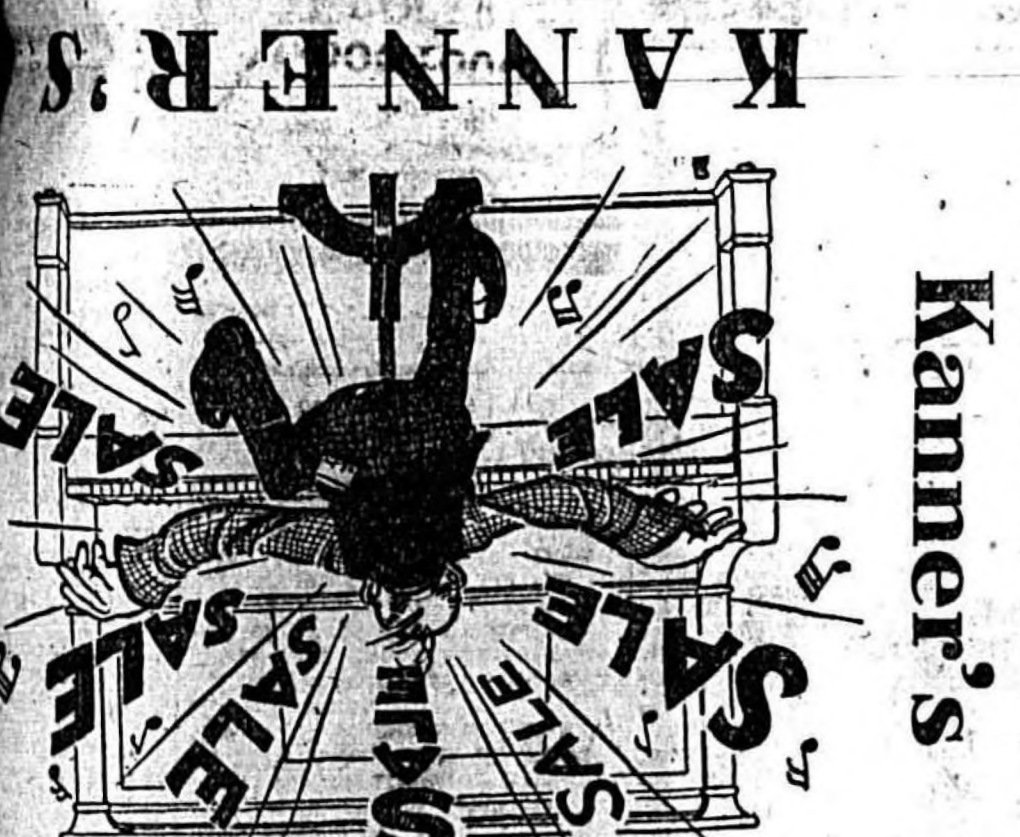

SEMINOLA TRACK TO OPEN SATURDAY

OFFICIALS ARE WORKING CREW DAY AND NIGHT

Efforts To Get Track In Shape Meeting With Success And Clubhouse Is Ready

Many Horses In Training At Oval

Bugle To Sound For First Race At 2:15; Inaugural Features

With the opening of the Seminole Race Track marked for Saturday afternoon, contractors in charge of the work of preparing the grounds and putting finishing touches on the track, are working night and day in order to have the roads and stands ready to accommodate the thousands of racing enthusiasts who are expected to attend the initial meeting of the club, according to a statement made yesterday by S. S. Steinmetz, secretary of the organization.

Mr. Steinmetz is personally supervising the final grading of the track and the work on the approach to the grounds. Wednesday the deep sand in the immediate vicinity of the spot where the permanent stands are to be erected was a hindrance to visitors, but officials of the track have ordered a large force of men and teams to work both day and night putting down a clay surface.

By Saturday morning Mr. Steinmetz said, a wide clay road would lead up to the entrance and parking spaces would be arranged to care for the thousands of automobiles expected.

Stucco workers were engaged yesterday in putting the last finish on the new clubhouse and all that remains to be done is the erection of the press box, which is to be completed before the week end, Mr. Steinmetz said.

Friends of the association are congratulating the officials on the progress made on the construction of the project. Work was started last November and the amount of money expended in the development is said to total over \$1,000,000.

Track In Good Shape
The track itself is in good shape for the first race. A solid base of clay and sand has been combined to make the footing the best possible for a distance of 30 feet from the inside rail. On the outside rail, clay is being added this week.

The stables now contain about 150 horses, according to racing secretary Ed Knebelkamp, and approximately 250 more are said to be enroute, among them being the good colt, Boon Companion.

The meeting is to actually get underway with the running of the Inaugural Handicap, for three year olds and up, for a purse of \$1,500. Some of the best horses in the south are expected to be entered in this event.

The purses for the 19 day meet are to total at least \$75,000, according to the officials. There are to be seven races each day and the lowest purse for any race is \$1,000.

Mondays and Fridays are to be officially known as "Ladies Days," when all women are to be admitted free of charge.

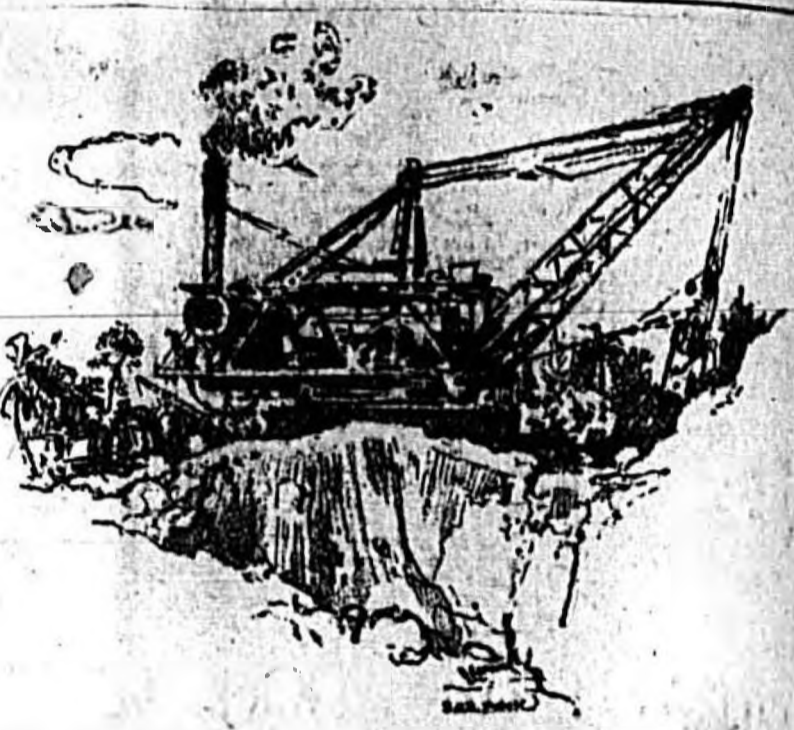
Rixey and Bressler will start intensive training next week and should be in good condition by the time the club gets home on April 9.

Ward Beecher's Historical Church Holds Spiritual Atmosphere

Cooper Union the speech on "What the Fathers Thought About Slavery." On that occasion the Rev. Dr. Beecher was with the book tilted between them the two joined in singing "The Shining Shore."

It was from the church platform on a Sunday in February 1860, that Rev. Dr. Beecher sold at auction to his congregation, the nine-year-old mulatto slave girl Sally Maria Diggs. His hearers were told that the little girl had been brought from Washington with the understanding that if the church failed to purchase her price of \$900 she was to be returned to her owner in that city. When finished his appeal for the freedom of 3,000 persons showed the church baskets with contributions. Women pulled rings from their fingers to aid in the cause. When the collection of more than \$2,000 in money was over, the jewelry was returned to 25 persons giving it.

Jenny Lind Gives
In another effort by the church to win liberty for two other young negro women, Jenny Lind the concert star, contributed \$25.

In April, 1861, a few days after the siege of Fort Sumpter, Dr. Beecher preached the sermon that perhaps was most widely quoted of the Civil War period. In that address he said that there were evils greater than war and that yielding of the one right after another by an individual or a nation was more to be condemned than the taking up of arms. Later the people of Plymouth helped to equip the Beecher Rifles, a Union regiment that fought in the war.

The church annals include events of peace as well as war. In 1861, the late Senator Jonathan J. Dol-

iver of Iowa made an address in the church. In 1907 the late Senator Robert La Follette spoke for three and one half hours on one of his favorite topics, "Representative Government." Roman Catholic priests and Jewish rabbis and ministers from many Protestant denominations joined in 1914 in the dedication of the Arbuckle memorial building, an educational structure adjoining the church.

Damaged By Fire
In 1920, Plymouth suffered an irreparable loss when fire destroyed many of its historical treasures. Among the objects lost or damaged were Dr. Beecher's sword and uniform, part of the original manuscript of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," written by Harriet Beecher Stowe, the pastor's sister, and the pulpit used by Lyman Beecher, father of the founding minister during his pastorate at Litchfield, Conn., in 1760.

The remains of the historical collection have since been restored as nearly as possible to its original condition.

RIVER CHANGES OKEYED

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19.—(AP)—Modification of the Apalachicola river along the line recommended by the board of engineers for rivers and harbors, to provide a 10-foot channel, was approved today by the House Rivers and Harbors Committee. A portion of the channel under the original project would be 18 feet deep.

IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Mar. 19.—Scattered notes from an afternoon's ramble about New York:

Past the Delmonico's "that was." And what, I wonder has become of John Karges, "the veteran of veterans" in cafedom? He must be 84 if he is a day, and it was said of him that there was no person worth knowing he didn't know. And there was Barney the Oysterman, whose claim chowder was to him an art. Not even the head chef was allowed to make the slightest suggestions. Have the days of "artistic eating" indeed gone forever?

Firemen rushing to a blaze on Fifth Avenue. Two of them look most strange, as though they were false faces. People laugh. The answer is simple. The alarm caught them in the act of shaving. They ran out, lather and all. The windy winds froze the lather to their faces.

Albert Crockett, of the Waldorf, Astoria, tells me this one: A man, stepping up to the desk to register, was handed a pen. "Since when did you start handing out fountain pens?" he asked, playfully putting the pen in his vest pocket.

"Say, look out!" warned the clerk. "Look at your pocket."

A large black spot had appeared. It seems that the hotel has installed a trick, self-filling pen. It seems, also, that a large percentage of guests who dip desk pens in the ink wells leave a blot on the register. The new trick pen makes no blot. But unless encased in a special receptacle it leaks. Anyone who attempts to "lift" the pen finds his vest pocket badly soiled.

Recruiting sergeants pacing up and down before alluring signs carefully placed at strategic points—the Pennsylvania Station, Grand Central Station, Sixth Avenue at 42nd Street, where a dozen and one catchpenny street merchants hold forth.

One sergeant told me that the railroad stations are particularly good stands.

"You see there's a lot of kids have come to New York to knock the world over," he explained. "You know how it is. Lots of 'em come down to the depot, kiddy wishing they could go home. Some of 'em are broke and just stand

there watching the trains go out—you know, goin' out to the town they came from. An' some of 'em are ashamed to go home and have the people think they're strangers. "And a helluva lot of 'em are sick of the city. Hate it. They don't want to be clerks and things like that any more. They don't want to be shut up in offices and live from hand to mouth at odd jobs. There's something about a railroad station that draws the discontents of even the small towns they used to go down to the depot and watch the trains go out and wish they could escape."

"Well, they come by and read the posters, and they aren't thinking of joining the army then. If I didn't start talking to 'em they probably wouldn't think of it seriously. To a lot of 'em it seems a way out. Oh, this town's full of 'em."

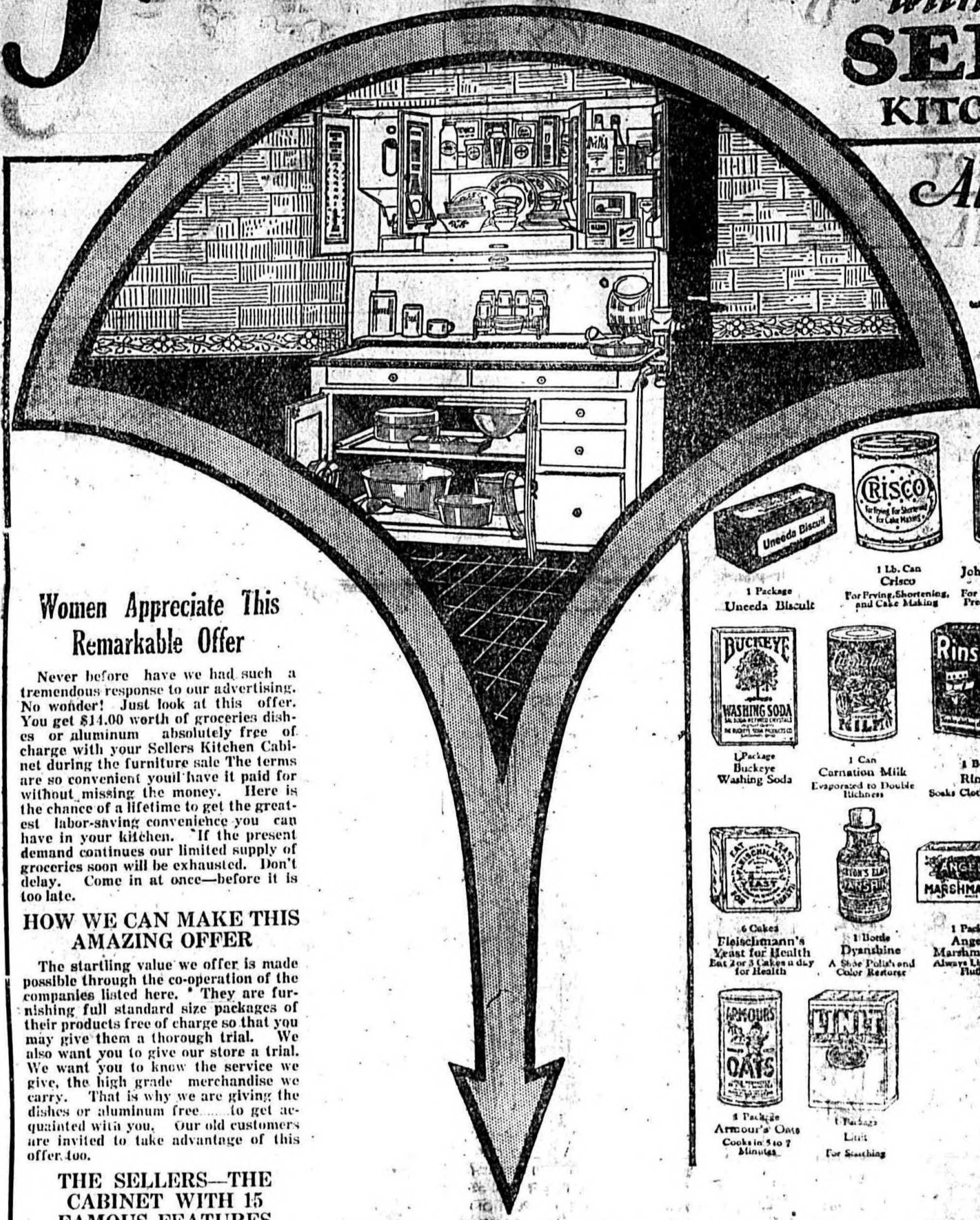

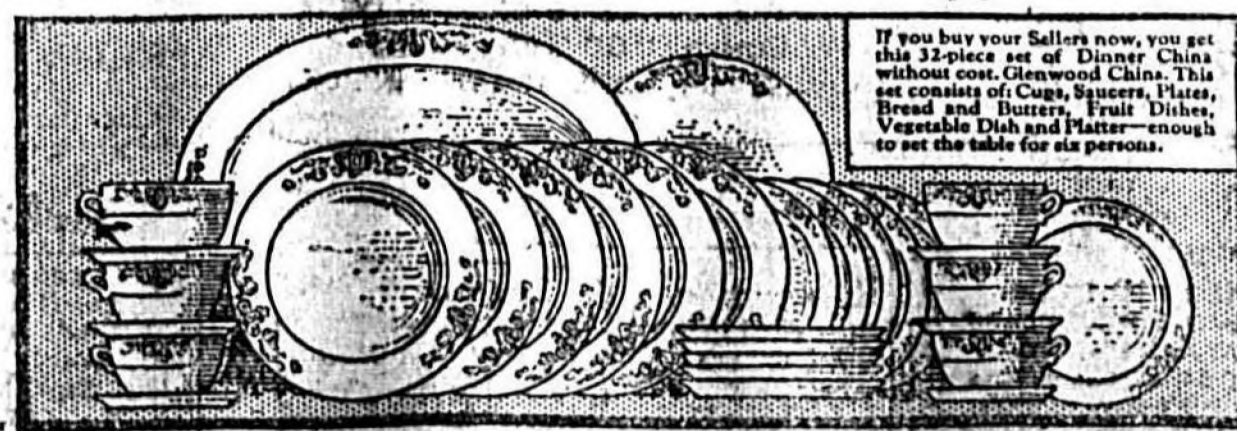
