The Constitutional amendments
seem to have won an universal
approval elsewhere in Florida as
they did in Seminole County.

It's a good thing the people of
the United States have the ex-
ample of China to show that it
doesn't pay to encourage invasion
by being unprepared.

Judging from the election re-
turns, the voters in some states
seem to think that the one-third
of our people who are under-
privileged, are the Republicans.

The Germans interpreted last
week's election returns as a slap
at Roosevelt, but we'll bet they
didn't rejoice much over the elec-
tion of Herbert Lehman.

The British have served notice
on Japan in a formal diplo-
matic note that they do not ap-
prove of the present empire plans
of China. To which do doubt the
Japs will reply, "So what?"

So far as we have been able to
find out Seminole County was the
only place in the state where bond
elections were held Tuesday which
carried. But the other bond issues
were for court houses, sewers,
paving, bridges and so forth.

Not only did a Republican win
the governorship of Rhode Island,
but a Republican by the name of
William H. Vandiver, a direct
descendant of the original Com-
modore Vanderbilt, one of the
richest economic royalists in the
country.

The overwhelming endorsement
of the National Guard amendment
shows that the people of Florida
are alive to the importance of
preparedness. They want no poli-
tics in their defense forces if they
ever have to use them against an
invading foe.

It is about this time of year
that the best advice anyone can
give is to beware of itinerant
peddlers, gold brick artists, and
fly-by-night racketeers from the
North. When the tourists begin to
come down, the snowbirds usually
come with them. Keep your doors
and windows locked at night.

The Fourth Florida District,
embracing most of the lower
East Coast, and once represent-
ed in the halls of Congress by
Ruth Bryan Owen and later by
Mark Wilson, has just elected
to the House of Representatives
A. Patrick Cannon. Here's hoping
he lives up to the performance
of his predecessors in office.

Hitler's Colonial Demands

Chancellor Hitler's current agitation for return of the
former German colonies is designed chiefly to permit him
to shift the blame for present internal conditions in Ger-
many on to the shoulders of England, according to Win-
ston Churchill, former British Chancellor of the Exchequer
and post-war Secretary of State for Colonies.

"The greatest motives are found in the internal poli-
tics of Germany itself," Mr. Churchill writes in Collier's.
"The regime in power calls upon the people continually for
sacrifice and exertions of the most severe character. Their
freedom is restricted. In time of peace they are com-
pelled to endure many of the hardships of war. Food
is scarce and the cost of living is high. It is a great con-
venience to the Nazi leaders to be able to attribute all the
inconveniences to some external cause.

"The raising of the colonial question is calculated to
give England something to think about on her own ac-
count, and to open an embarrassing discussion in which
Germany has nothing to lose and something to gain. 'If
we only had our colonies,' they exclaim, 'there would be
no need for any of these hardships.' But they are, in
fact, well aware that the return of the colonies tomorrow
would make no difference to the economic conditions in
Germany. They do not expect to have them returned
tomorrow. The grievance is useful in itself and as a
lightning conductor if public discontents arise."

Pointing out that the German population in the former
German colonies in Africa is slight, and stating that the
colonies were established by Bismarck in the first
place only for the purpose of creating a controlled Anglo-
British tension, Mr. Churchill expresses the belief that
a purely political consideration, England has a
moral obligation which prevents it from turning the various
African territories now under mandate back to Ger-
many.

"The record of the Germans in Africa extends only
over some thirty years," he says, "but it is crowded with
crimes. The story of the Hereros massacres as told in of-
ficial documents, for instance, is one of the blackest in
the whole history of civilization. The Hereros rose in re-
volt against the German tyranny in Southwest Africa in
1904. The rebellion was soon over. Men, women and chil-
dren were shot, bayoneted and clubbed to death. Of the
Herero nation of some 86,000 souls, only 15,000 were still
alive.

"A similar, but larger, tragedy occurred in Tangan-
yika in 1905-1906. The Magi-Magi rising was suppressed
by the Germans with a slaughter of 150,000 natives."

After describing in detail the history of Germany's
former colonial empire Mr. Churchill states that it offers
no reason to justify its return, or the return of any part
of it, to Germany, or still less to Nazi Germany.

"On the contrary," he says, "there are abundant
arguments against a step that could only weaken the de-
mocracies of the world and bring new strength to the
unster forces that seek to destroy the liberty we cherish
and the civilization we have built upon it."

A Brooklyn Holdup

Describing a crime which occurred four years ago
and which appeared to be the "perfect crime," the Miami
Daily News reveals what has happened to the participants
since then and points out again that crime does not pay.

It was the famous \$128,000 armored car holdup in
Brooklyn. The largest single holdup in history, the
go-away was clean. The criminals were clever and had ap-
parently concealed all traces of their identity.

"But," the Miami paper continues, "Three days after
the holdup was committed, the police knew the identity of
the participants. I was not a clean getaway after all.
True, the police could not prove what they knew to be
fact, so they could not formally 'crack' the crime for four
years.

"But, in the meantime, here is what happened to
seven members of that 'clever' gang:

"Two of them were caught in a subsequent kidnaping
and are serving penitentiary sentences of 77 years.

"A third was caught in the same crime and 'beat' his
sentence only by killing himself in jail.

"Another is serving a term of from 30 to 60 years for
an independent robbery.

"A fifth is in Sing Sing, sent up for possessing a
machine gun.

"A sixth killed himself accidentally in escaping after
the Brooklyn robbery.

"A seventh, according to press dispatches, was 're-
putedly' slain in 1936.

"That leaves only two of the gang alive and out of
jail.

"'Clever criminals.'
'Perfect crime.'
'Who said so?'"

State's Laws For Fish Conservation Will Be Enforced

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 11.—
The immense importance of con-
serving and replenishing Flori-
da's wide variety of seafoods
has been one of the major prob-
lems faced by Governor Cone's
administration.

For 100 years white men have
been fishing commercially in
Florida. Through these cen-
turies Nature has been able to
provide man with an abundant
supply of seafood and to renew
this supply unaided, until in re-
cent years destructive methods
and methods used by reckless
men have threatened to de-
stroy the state's most im-
portant resource.

Robert L. Dowling is some-
what of the conservation expert
and has been instrumental in
making a thorough study of the
situation and not only to enforce
the conservation laws but to de-
velop means of rebuilding the
state's seafood resources.

This requires the patroling of
about 1,100 miles of shore for
much of which extend into the
water lakes and up tidal creeks.

Florida water products com-
mercially about 60 of the Flori-
da more edible fish found in the
United States and worth all
more than 137,000,000 pound.

The State's total land area is es-
timated at 55,000,000 acres, of
which about 2,811,000 acres are
inland waters. The great belt of
coastal water extends from 10 to
40 miles in width and anno-
uncially around the state. About 8,000
fishing boats are used in the in-
dustry.

It is estimated that Florida
commercial fishing industry rep-
resents an annual turnover of
\$20,000,000, that about \$10,000,
000 is invested in equipment and
that fully 75,000 Floridians de-
pend on this industry for their
daily bread.

As a lure for tourists, Florida
fishing is second only to the
climate. It is conservatively es-
timated that tourists spend an-
nually upwards of \$75,000,000 to
enjoy this wonderful sport in
Florida's waters.

As a result of his studies on
this problem, Supervisor Dowling
has prepared a conservation pro-
gram for the preservation of
both commercial and sport fish-
ing which will soon be presented
to the public for its support.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 15. —(AP) —The CIO "peace" committee's report, declaring "there can be no compromise" with the organization's "fundamental purpose and aim" of organizing workers into "powerful industrial unions," was adopted today by the CIO's first convention.

The report asserted there could be no compromise with CIO's "obligation to fully protect the rights and interests of all its members and affiliated organizations."

It declared the CIO had initiated a move for a unified labor movement and commended CIO leaders for their "sincere efforts" in attempting to solve the unity problem "without destroying the gains which have been made or damaging the principle of industrial organization."

The committee's report followed President Roosevelt's appeal yesterday for peace between the John L. Lewis union and the American Federation of Labor.

Maxey Testifies Use Of Sprays Bad For Industry

Commission Head Declares Practice As Damaging To Citrus

Declaring that the use of insecticide sprays is one of the chief causes of the demoralized condition of the citrus market, Chairman John Maxey of the Florida Citrus Commission took the stand as principal witness at the hearing before Judge Millard H. Smith here yesterday.

Testifying for the defense on a petition for an injunction brought by F. L. Lumsden, grower, citrus grower, Commissioner of Agriculture Nathan Mayo from signing assented fruit, Mr. Maxey declared that the term "personated fruit" is being used to designate citrus on which insect sprays have been used. He asserted that the use of insecticide sprays is "damaging to the citrus industry" and that they are made for an inferior quality crop since it causes the fruit to pass 30 to 60 days before it normally would.

He stated he believed the use of arsenic made the fruit harmful for human consumption but later admitted on cross examination that chemical analysis has proved otherwise.

Tom Newman, supervising inspector in the Winter Haven area, said spraying with insecticide to acids in the natural fruit.

Others who testified included Charles Chatham, employee of citrus commission, and H. G. Murphy, citrus fruit inspector. Judge Millard H. Smith stated that the hearing would be continued for several more days. He transferred the hearing to Sanford from Titusville yesterday and indicated that the hearing will be held here for several more days.

Mr. Lingo alleges the law which gives the grower the right to spray grapes but not oranges and limes, is a hindrance to the shipment of fruit at a time when there is a big demand, the Christmas holidays.

He declares, in the demand for the fruit quicker, sweeter and it makes it look better and is not harmful.

He said he had his entire tin garage crop the last three seasons because he could not get the fruit to the market soon enough.

Dawson Urges Co-Operation With Plan At Meeting Of Growers

A brief outline of the operation of the AAA new average crop program for the citrus industry in Florida was made at a meeting of the Seminole County Agricultural Association last night at the hearing before Judge Millard H. Smith here yesterday.

H. G. Clayton, administrative officer in charge of the AAA in Florida, who is largely responsible for the program, will make the explanation.

Agent Dawson told the growers last night that the goal of the program was to reduce the citrus acreage by 15 percent. A goal of 2,000 acres has been established for the state as compared with the 7,200 acres grown last season.

Growers voted general approval of the voluntary plan to control the acreage before farmers go to the trouble and expense of producing the crop and then having to sell a portion of the crop. Nearly 100 percent of those present expressed a willingness to work under the program.

Agent Dawson pointed out that the real benefits of the AAA plan has not in the payments of approximately \$50 an acre for leaving out celery but in full cooperation of the industry with the program so as to increase the value of the remainder of the crop.

The County agent's office is busy setting goals for the various farmers in this section as material work on the program has already gotten under full swing.
