

Campaign Ends; Shadowed By War

WASHINGTON (AP) — The final days of the 1968 presidential campaign are being played out, shadowed at its end as at the beginning by the war in Vietnam and the meaning of the latest polls and surveys about the outcome.

With the election only a day away, an Associated Press survey and the latest major public opinion polls show Republican Richard M. Nixon leading, but Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey slipping into his margin.

The AP survey showed Nixon

ahead in 34 states with 216 electoral votes. Humphrey had the lead for 11 electoral votes and third party candidate George C. Wallace for 13.

But 20 states with 83 electoral votes were rated tossups, and Humphrey has been gaining ground in most of them.

The AP survey was based on data gathered prior to President Johnson's decision last Thursday to halt U.S. attacks against North Vietnam. It, therefore, does not reflect any shifts which might have been produced by that administration order.

Democratic National Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien Sunday pointed to the results of the latest major public opinion polls, which show Nixon's lead of two points over Humphrey. Earlier, Humphrey trailed in some polls by as much as 14 per cent.

O'Brien said Nixon's slippage indicated a Democratic victory, a prediction challenged by Republican spokesman Herbert G. Klein, who said:

"Nixon is leading substantially



Klein's view was bolstered by a New York Times survey of political opinion in all 50 states showing: Nixon leading in 30 states with 173 electoral votes.

100 electoral votes, Humphrey ahead in eight states and the District of Columbia with 77 electoral votes and George C. Wallace in front in five states with 46 electoral votes. Seven states with 117 electoral votes were said by the Times to be too close to call.

Commented the Times survey of a month ago, Nixon had 11 electoral votes and Wallace 11. Humphrey has gained 46, while those considered too close to call have increased by 13 electoral votes.

The Vietnam war was always a prime subject of campaign talk Sunday. Humphrey said in a television interview, offered to go to Paris, or even that he would.

Nixon appeared on the NBC-TV program "Meet the Press."

"If he would, for example, consider it helpful for me to go to Paris or go to Saigon in order to get negotiations of dead-end, I would be glad to go," Nixon said.

"... President Johnson and president-elect Nixon could knock out the idea that Nixon is going to gain from the negotiation table unless they cannot gain from the battlefield," he said.

"Let me make one thing clear: I don't suggest this as a grandstand stunt," said Nixon.

"I don't know what it will be helpful."

Nixon said the Paris talks should go on, despite the reluctance of the South Vietnamese government to send a delegation to the negotiating table.

U.S. Seen Ready To OK Port, Base Deals

Through the advice of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, Sanford Mayor W. Vincent Roberts and other interested citizens, two proposals vital to the future development of Sanford and Seminole County show prospects of almost immediate governmental approval.

According to information received during the week-end from Washington, several developments have occurred relative to the \$800,000 Economic Development Administration grant request by the Seminole County Port Authority and the turning over to the City of Sanford of the phased-out Sanford Naval Air Station.

Washington information revealed the port request has received favorable comment from the Maritime Administration and was returned to the SDA office for final action with a high recommendation for its approval, which is expected shortly.

The information revealed that Vice President Humphrey and his staff have taken a personal interest in both projects and are working for quick approval.

Interest of Vice President was brought into the talks by Mayor Roberts, who, in an Oct. 9 letter addressed to Sanford, requested the assistance of the Vice President in expediting the SDA grant for the port, and in getting help to speed the final disposition of the former Navy base to city.

This request, together with the efforts of on-the-scene Sanford interests, have resulted in positive action leading to an expected quick approval by the various agencies.

Comments from the Maritime Administration indicate the development of large port facilities and related industrial park should enhance the economic recovery of Seminole County and surroundings.

Holt-City Pact Dead

The Holt Corporation of Arlington, Va., is planning to locate at Brookley Air Force Base in Mobile, Ala., according to information released during the week-end by U. S. Rep. Jack Edwards, (R-Ala.), and Mobile Mayor Lambert Mims.

According to the two officials, Holt Corporation has filed first application with City of Mobile to lease buildings eight and 17 of the former base, to be used to overhaul and assemble electronic communications systems for the U. S. government.

The announcement of the pending Holt location in Mobile came after a Friday afternoon meeting of the Sanford City Commission, which was held to discuss the situation that developed when Holt, who had been negotiating with city for lease of 14 buildings at the abandoned Sanford Naval Air Station, failed to comply with certain stipulations laid down previously and subsequently agreed to by the Sanford firm and City Commission.

Holt, according to the agreement, was to show William Hutchinson, city attorney, proof of the contracts he said he possessed, and agreed to this provision.

Nov. 1 was the agreed date set by both sides in an Oct. 16 preliminary agreement.

According to city officials, Holt has not shown the financial responsibility required, and the door was opened Friday by commissioners to allow negotiations with three other aircraft firms who have indicated interest in locating here.

Still to be announced, the firms are well-known and have existing facilities in Alabama and Florida.

The commissioners did not leave Holt out of the picture, explaining the Virginia-based firm could still negotiate with city, if desired.

Called by telephone at Arlington today, Holt said he has not shown the financial responsibility required. "The Holt Corporation steadfastly regrets that an accord could not be reached with the city commissioners and the city manager for the firm's use of the former U. S. Navy Air Station."

"Holt, president of Holt Corporation, had informed the commissioners that unless negotiations could be completed by Nov. 1, the firm would have to start work on contracts in-hand at some of its other facilities. This is being done."

"On behalf of his firm, Holt expressed appreciation to the people of Sanford for the warm, friendly and co-operative attitude extended to the firm and its personnel."

Holt, in conclusion, did not rule out the possibility of future negotiations with the city concerning leasing part of the base.

Computers To Speed Results

Computers of Datametrics Corporation are all prepped and ready to go with the election returns as they come in when the polls close at 7 p.m. tomorrow in Seminole.

Datametrics is working as a public service with the Supervisor of Elections and The Sanford Herald to have the results of the election locally computed and available within 30 minutes after their receipt at the bank.

Richard Keady, of Florida State Bank, reported today that results from 16 of the precincts will be telephoned directly to Datametrics tomorrow night while the results of the remainder will be telephoned to the courthouse to speed up the returns.

Answers to carry the results between the bank and the courthouse office of Mrs. Camilla Bruce are being supplied by the Sanford-Seminole Javelin.

When results come into the bank they will be key punched and trial list run and checked with greatest return. Up-to-date totals will be posted with every five precincts.

Florida State is providing space for the press in the 12-station Loan Department. Space for the candidates is being provided in the bank lounge where results also will be posted. Outside Area will be left open from the lounge for convenience of the candidates.

Time for final unofficial results will be determined by the speed displayed in the polling places in tabulating totals as well as by the time polls close by close. According to last time all persons in line at the polling places at 7 p.m. will be given the opportunity of voting. Final results by close tomorrow will be determined with counting of the more than 2,000 absentee ballots Wednesday.

Eighty-five to 90 per cent turnout at the 25 Seminole County ballot boxes was predicted today by Supervisor of Elections Mrs. Camilla Bruce.

Some 25,000 persons are qualified to cast ballots in the general election for office conducted by the President of the United States in counties of the various districts.

In addition, some 400 new residents of the county are eligible to vote in the presidential contest only through their filing and approval of special applications.

More than 2,000 absentee ballots are expected to be turned over to the supervisor of elections by the 3 p.m. deadline today.

Mrs. Bruce again urged businessmen to give their employees time off to vote at other than the peak hours in early morning and late afternoon and evening.

Mrs. Bruce further reminds voters to carry their voter registration identification cards with them to the polls to be used in the event their eligibility to vote is challenged.

Sample ballots for the election have been placed at all city halls and postoffices throughout the county for the convenience of voters wishing to study them before tomorrow.

 expected the bombing from Sat-

 "I think President Johnson
 thoroughly expected the Saigon

 ing by the North Vietnamese
 to allow them to recover from
 their losses in the South," he
 said.
 Both Wallace and LeMay ap-
 peared on ABC's "Issues and
 Answers," in a separate ses-

sion.
 President Johnson cam-
 paigned at Humphrey's side for
 the first time Sunday, appealing
 for votes for his vice president
 before some 28,000 people in
 Houston's Astrodome.
 It was perhaps the largest
 crowd assembled for a session
 of political oratory during the
 campaign, and Johnson gave it
 to them.
 "For the sake of our Ameri-

become the 31st President of

Explosion Years Ago Takes Toll

PORT CHICAGO, Calif. (AP) —
 The aftermath of a monster
 explosion that occurred in Port
 Chicago 24 years ago now is
 committing its final destruction
 — of the entire town.
 Weeds are taking over every-
 where. Those bushes droop for
 lack of water. Lawns are
 parched brown. Old men sit for-
 lornly at the bus depot.
 Nobody cares for anything
 around here anymore, for Port
 Chicago is dying... by order of
 the U.S. Navy.
 On July 17, 1944, two ships
 loaded with ammunition exploded
 on the edge of Port Chicago, va-
 pored in a horrendous blast of 2.5
 million pounds of high explo-
 sives, killing 32 men. The town
 itself sustained heavy damage,
 and no one in its limits was
 killed.
 But the Navy feared that an
 other explosion at the pier
 could wipe out Port Chicago—
 33 miles from San Francisco on
 a northeast reach of the bay—and
 kill everyone in it.
 So, over the years, in six at-
 tempts rancorously resisted by
 many townspeople, the Navy
 tried to get Congress to let it
 buy up the town to create a
 two-mile buffer zone around
 loading facilities.
 The plan would handle 70 per cent
 of the munitions used in Viet-
 nam.
 The Navy's big argument was
 that today a single pier can han-
 dle nine million pounds of explo-
 sives rather than only 3.5 mil-
 lion—meaning, they said, the
 town could go up in a blast.
 Finally Got the Money
 This year, finally, the Navy
 got \$18 million to buy the
 5,000-acre town and about its
 3,000 inhabitants from their 400
 homes and businesses. The
 goal: raze the town.
 "Freedom was born in the
 U.S.A. and died in Port Chica-
 go," says the manager of the
 Port Chicago Theater.
 A skull and crossbones Jolly
 Roger flies on a man's house on
 Humboldt St.
 "That's my husband's way of
 protesting what the Navy is
 doing," said Mrs. Rita Nixon,
 whose husband, Bill, is in the
 Navy.
 "The fight for this town—it
 was terrible," she said. "You
 don't know when it's going to
 happen. You go through the
 middle of this uncertainty and fi-
 nally you are relieved just to be
 getting out."
 Homes and other properties
 are first appraised, then resi-
 dents are offered money. There
 are alternatives. They can con-
 sider the Navy and move; they
 can move their houses out of
 Port Chicago, or sell out to pri-
 vate contractors who will move
 the houses themselves. Resi-
 dents who refuse to move or
 deal with the Navy or private
 parties can be forced out
 through condemnation proceed-
 ings.
 Navy Wants To Settle
 Leslie F. Springmyer, direc-
 tor of the Navy's real estate
 section in Port Chicago, said he
 foresees few condemnations. He
 hopes to exhaust every other
 possibility first. But not every-
 one is willing to take the
 Navy's election brochure without
 challenge. About 10 property-
 owners have hired lawyers in an
 attempt to make a case of un-
 constitutional action against the
 Navy. One case already has
 been turned down by a U. S.
 District Court judge and an ap-
 peal has been taken to the U. S.
 District Court of Appeals.
 The final chapter in the story
 of Port Chicago will, officials
 say, be written this fall when
 the Navy expects to acquire all
 the property for good and for
 all.

Female Rebel Joins Paris Peace Talks

PARIS (AP) — A woman revo-
 lutionary led a Viet Cong
 delegation into Paris today to
 join the peace talks. She pledged
 that the war in South Vietnam
 will continue as long as the
 United States "props up the
 puppet administration of Sai-
 gon."
 Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh, a mem-
 ber of National Liberation
 Front's central committee, said

on her arrival from Moscow:
 "The population of South Viet-
 nam ardently wishes for peace,
 but this peace cannot be disas-
 sociated from independence and
 liberty."
 "As long as the American
 government has not renounced
 its aggressive aims and...
 Viet Ambassador Valerian Zor-
 rin. And Ambassador Xuan
 who leads Hanoi's delega-
 tion to the peace talks with
 the United States which began on
 May 12.
 A spokesman said the NLF
 "will be present" at the first
 meeting of the expanded talks
 Wednesday. They are attending
 as a result of the agreement be-
 tween Hanoi and Washington
 which President Johnson
 halted the bombing of North
 Vietnam last week.
 South Vietnamese President
 Nguyen Van Thieu has an-
 nounced that his government
 will not send a delegation to the
 talks because it will not nego-
 tiate with the NLF as a separate
 entity. He said the boycott
 would continue until Saigon is
 assured of direct, serious talks
 with Hanoi.
 U.S. officials privately feel
 Thieu's boycott will not wreck
 the peace discussion. Secretary
 of State Dean Rusk said he ex-
 pects South Vietnam to join the
 talks sooner or later.

Editorial Comment

Now The Voting: Time For Good Judgement

Within twenty-four hours of reading these words the qualified voters in Seminole County will be given the opportunity to cast ballots in the general election.

When the voter walks into the booth, looks at the ballot and makes his choice, a die is cast which will determine the future of our county, state and nation will be shaped.

There are seven columns on the ballot. The first column is for the presidential and judicial; the second, legislative; the third and fourth, county; the fifth, unopposed candidates; the sixth and seventh lists the proposed revisions of the state constitution of 1958.

A moment of thought in the booth is worth giving to the completion of the mechanical act of voting. But this should be the fruit of sober, logical appraisal after what must seem to many an unending flood of work, promises, allegations and denials by politicians.

City Airport!

Action by the Sanford City Commission in taking steps to provide the legal machinery which will allow the creation of a Sanford Airport Authority is timely, useful and has our complete support.

Such an authority, as reported in our news columns, would operate and manage the airport and the industrial park which would occupy the vacated Sanford Naval Air Station.

This move is made not a minute too soon. For it must have legislative action and will prove a sounding board to see just how much Sanford can depend on these expressions of interest in Seminole being so loudly proclaimed by candidates for the Orange-Seminole seats in the state legislature.

We are happy also that the motivation comes from not only a business sense of the need of such an authority if the interests of our city are to be properly protected, but a conviction that it should be a board made up locally.

Sanford and Seminole do not want appointive action taken by any outside authority—federal or state—which would not reflect the best interests of our city and area. We believe in local control.

In making this comment, however, we would ask that there be no quibbling when the matter of hiring an airport manager arises in the matter of salary.

We should be well aware that the operation of such an airport and industrial park, as envisioned, needs a very high grade of professional manager, that a penny-wise approach would prove pound-foolish in the end.

Be happy to put on the back for our city administration in taking this step toward legislation and a word to our legislative delegation—"we'll be watching!"

State Cracks Down On Open Land Sales

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - The Florida Land Sales Board today announced that a crackdown on sale of undeveloped land to which buyers have no legal access will begin Jan. 1, 1969.

In a move which signaled the board's new attitude, the board denied the application of a former Broward County legislator to register for sale inaccessible lots in Collier County.

The former representative, Republican Ben Kinsman of Pompano Beach, contended that his constitutional right to sell land was being abridged by the state board.

Board Vice Chairman J. Norman Romoser said that beginning Jan. 1, "any application for registration of land in which lots are without legal access will be scrutinized with a very critical eye."

Board regulations now permit the sale of such land if contracts and promotional material disclose that a buyer would have to sue to gain access.

"That will be enforced to the letter," said Romoser.

Kinsman's application was denied on the ground that advertising for his development on Palm and Pines Rancheros, did not disclose that buyers would have no access to their lots.

FAMU Homecoming Set

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Homecoming this week at Florida A&M University will mean a lot more than usual and is designed to carry an emotional message to the university officials.

They say they hope legislators, state officials and educators understand what the Nov. 9 weekend festivities will be saying: Keep FAMU separate and autonomous.

Every activity planned, from a downtown parade to halftime show at the FAMU-North Carolina A&T football game, is designed to boost the state's largest predominantly Negro institution and show its desire to remain autonomous.

Dr. William P. Foster, head of the FAMU band and homecoming chairman, said the intensity of homecoming "is probably due to the fact there has been so much pro and con in regard to the future status of the university."

"After moving through a number of possible topics we finally emerged with one which certainly is on all the minds of Floridians, especially those who are present students, administrators, state officials and educators," Foster said.

He said this topic is the matter of separation and autonomy for FAMU.

Talk has grown over the past few years of merging the school with Florida State University. FAMU President Benjamin Perh has already voiced vigorous opposition to merger talk.

Theme of the homecoming will be "FAMU Yesterday, FAMU Today, FAMU Forever."

"We felt this would be a splendid opportunity to make an indelible, firm, everlasting impression upon the minds, attitudes on people in regards to just how the university feels about its status, and our great emphasis will be in bright, bold letters 10 feet tall, 'FAMU Forever,'" Foster said.

Gov. Claude Kirk, all Cabinet officials, agency heads, Board of Regents members and many legislators will be invited to the homecoming festivities, Foster said.

Foster said the program will stress positive achievements of the university which has an enrollment this year of nearly 11,000.

"We'd like, though our floats, through our discussions, through persons, we'll have coming to an exhibit to the quality of the university, to let that state to the state, the region, the nation, and the world," Foster said.

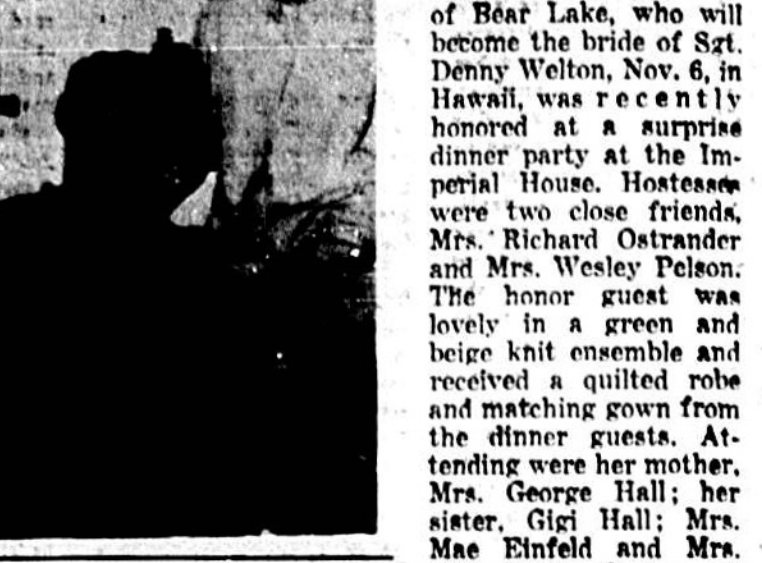

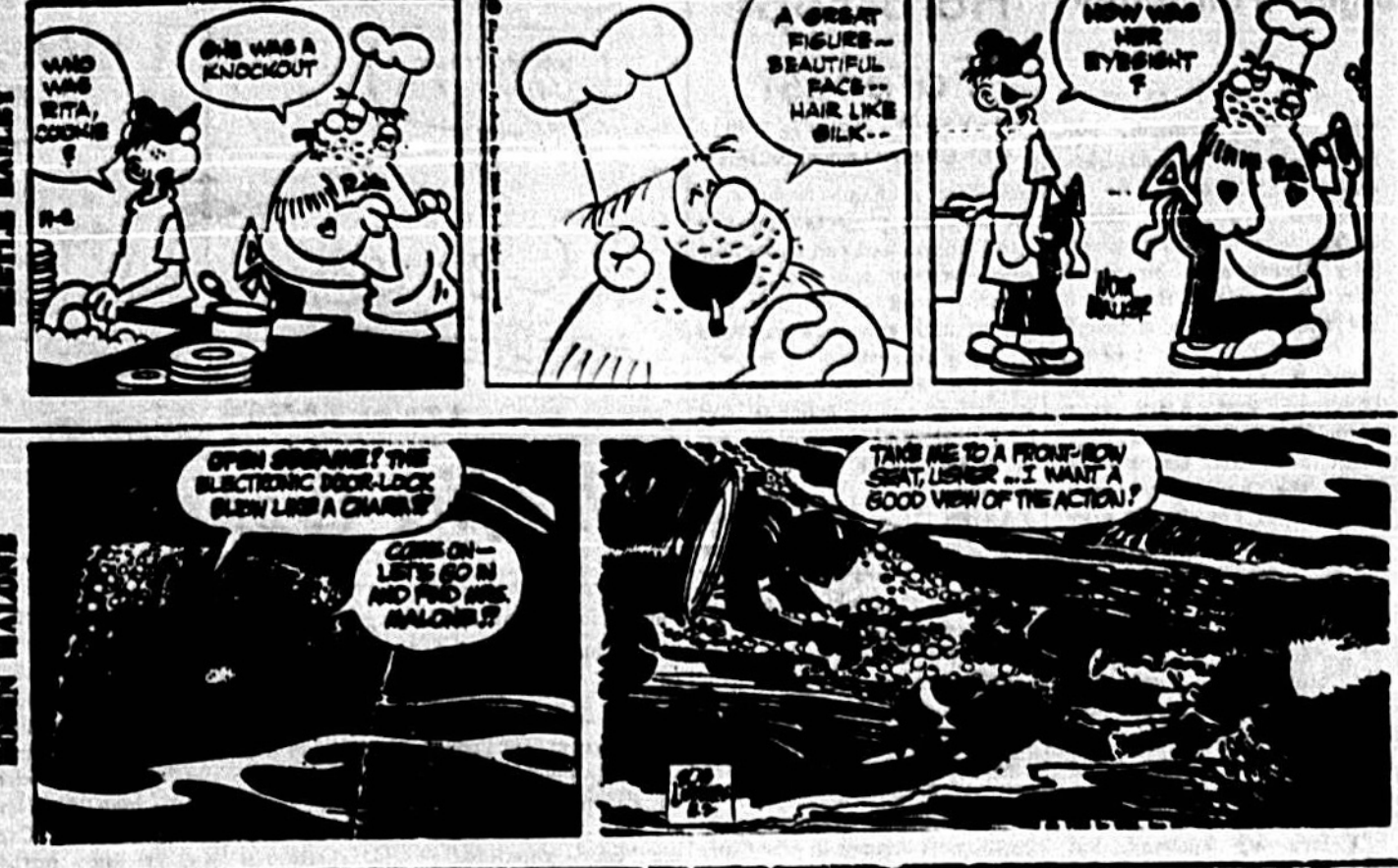

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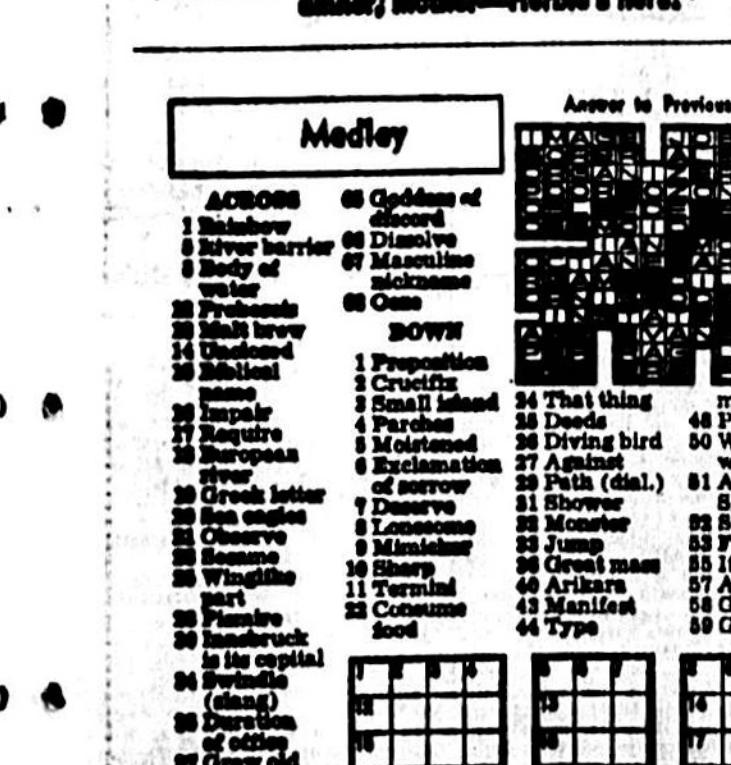

But I claim membership in an even more exclusive solo club. I have ridden a motorcycle around the world.

I rode 28,223 miles, crossing the continents of Europe, Asia, Australia and America. Including oceans crossed by ship and plane the distance was 45,000 miles, and took one year.

Why did I do it?

To see the world. I like fresh air, and I like people. On a motorcycle you are close to both. In an automobile, you are too often categorized as a "rich for sign tourist." On a motorcycle you are readily accepted as a traveling sportsman.

I met all kinds of people, ranging from a mechanic's helper in Greece to the governor of a state of 43 million inhabitants in India. Everyone was friendly in all the countries I visited.

People seem to warm up to you if they see you working on your motorcycle, with your hands and face all covered with grease. Most people are honest and helpful and will do anything in their power to see that you enjoy your visit to their country.

Once in Afghanistan I punctured a tire and rained my inner tube. I knew I would have to spend the night in the desert. Some passing shepherds pointed to the mountains and made signs indicating bandits. We couldn't talk to each other, but a flat tire is a flat tire, in any language. One of them built a fire, brought me food and spent the night guarding me.

This is just one of the many examples of friendliness I encountered all over the world from ordinary people.

You can ride most of the way around the world on paved roads, though it may be narrow and rough in places.

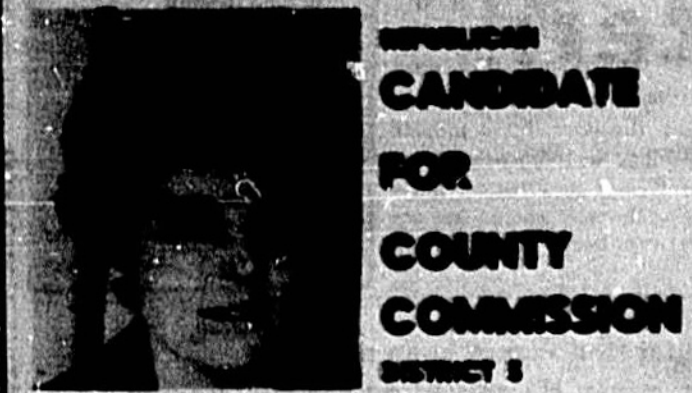

Coal Miners' Health Cause Of Concern

The proposed legislation would authorize the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to draw up health criteria upon which would be based final health standards.

It would extend federal safety regulations to the working face of underground mines and to all surface mines—strip and auger. It also would subject operators of unsafe mines to a fine and jail term.

Federal mining rules for underground mines now fill an 86-page pamphlet, while those covering surface mines are detailed in 40 pages. The amended Federal Coal Mine Safety Act fills over 60 pages.

People in the coal industry here deny the need for any further federal safety standards.

"It's the human element," said one mine foreman.

Even the members of mine rescue and first aid teams, who gathered here to pit their skills against other teams, denounced the introduction of more rules and regulations.

They accept the fact that mining is not a safe occupation, that a man working in a coal mine is probably more apt to be injured on the job than anyone in any other major industry.

But, it is a traditional way of life and a means of supporting the families of some 144,000 miners in America.

They breathe Coal Dust. The question of health, however, is quite another thing.

When a miner works eight hours taking coal out of the earth, he emerges covered with the sooty black dust of his product.

That same powdery blackness is the air he breathes and inevitably enters his lungs, often causing a condition known by doctors as pneumoconiosis and by miners as "black lung."

A recent study made by the United Mine Workers Union shows an increase in the disease among working miners. The increase was attributed to the use of large mining machines which create a continuous flow of dust.

Federal mining rules now provide for the control of dust in mines, but only as the amount of dust may contribute to the danger of an explosion, not as it may contribute to the disability of miners.

Mine operators say most large mining companies provide their employees with respirators to protect them from dust inhalation. However, they report the miners often refuse to wear the protective masks.

It's just like using safety goggles and safety shoes," one mine foreman said.

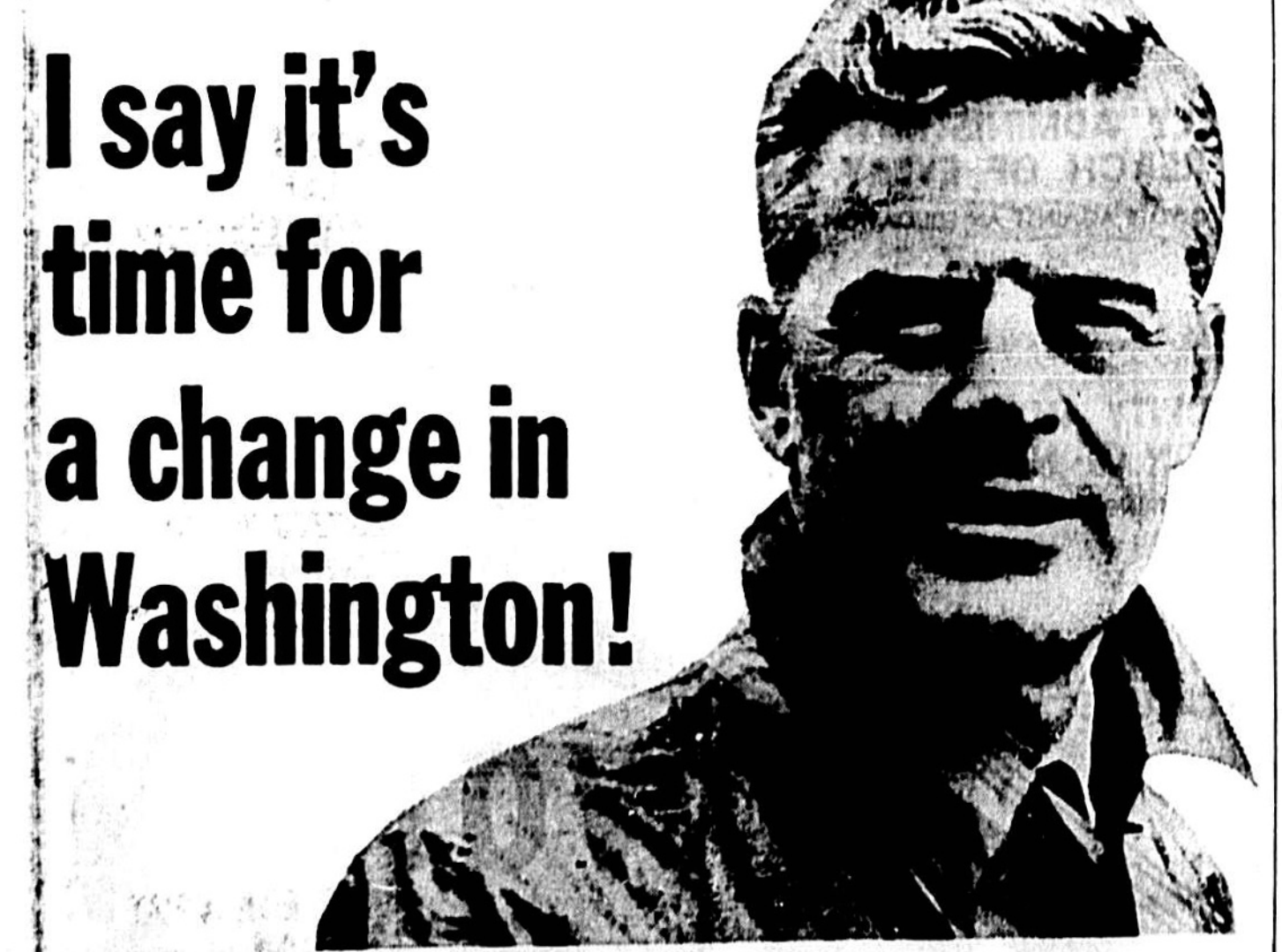

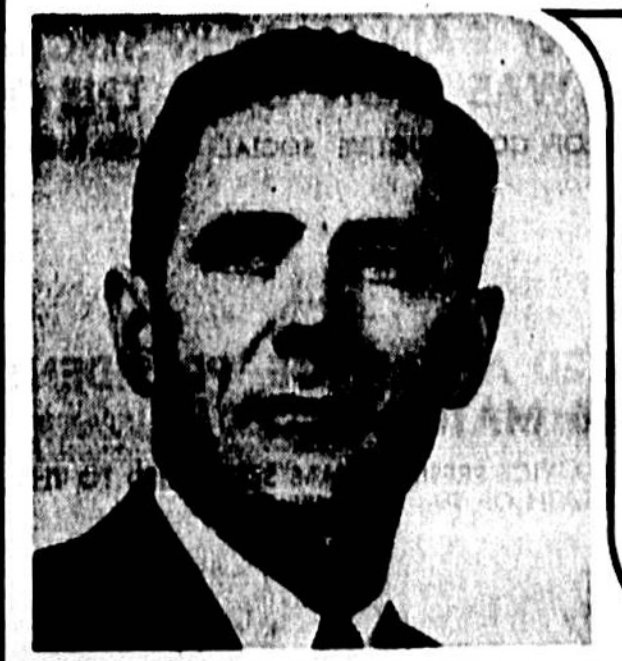

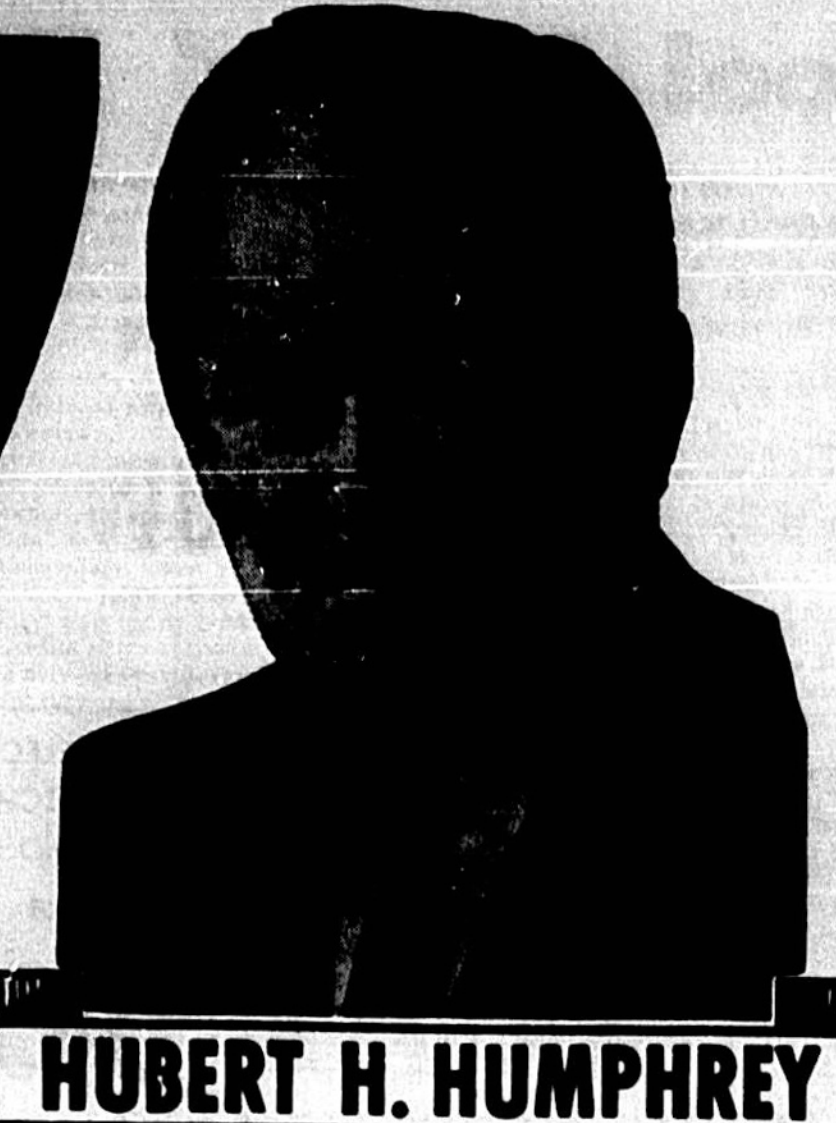

Fine Election Weather As Electors Turn Out



Record Seen In Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Floridians stood in long lines to vote today as fine election weather across the state contributed to what apparently would be a record turnout.

Many candidates have a big job ahead of them before election day. According to the election law, no political posters can be displayed within 500 yards of the polling places. Violation of the law is a misdemeanor. Apparently voters with bumper strips on their cars, may drive to the polling places to vote without removing the strips, but cannot loiter there.

Voting machines and computers have taken all the fun for newsmen out of the elections. It is anticipated that the newsmen will have the finest unofficial count by 9:30 tonight, thanks to the voting machines in each precinct and the Florida State Bank computer which will tally the count in 24 minutes. R. E. Porter remembers w-a-y back when . . . in the days of paper ballots and no computers. It meant working all Tuesday getting out that day's paper, work all night tallying precinct counts (there were 24 precincts then in Montgomery County (Dayton, Ohio), and then work all day Wednesday getting out that day's paper. Or worse in work at 4 a.m. Tuesday and wind up at 4 p.m. Wednesday. And one year he followed the election along with the "dog watch" on Saturday — 7 a.m. Saturday to 3 a.m. Sunday. (There weren't any wage-and-hour laws then, either. No bonus or time-off for extra hours. Accept it: Part of the job.)

One nice thing about having the campaign and election just ahead behind us — we can get back to viewing our favorite TV shows.

A good many people casting ballots for the first time in their lives. And they are not all 21-year-olds. We know one chap 47 who is casting his first ballot. He said he never was interested before.

Telephones in The Herald newsroom rang late last night and started again at 6 this morning. With mainly one question: Where do I vote? Precinct work at Ravenna Park reported that voters lined up at 5:30 this morning . . . not to vote there . . . but seeking instructions on how to use the voting machine when the polls opened.

An early fog over most of Florida broke with daylight, to give the voters a perfect day to exercise their choice of ballot.

Some 100,000 absentee ballots — also a record in Florida — could delay the outcome of close races for as long as two days in the biggest outpouring of votes ever in the state. "If the races for President and U.S. Senate are as close as they seem to be," said Secretary of State Tom Adams, "it may be late Wednesday or early Thursday when we know the winners in Florida."

Instead of the usual choice between Democrat and Republican presidential candidates, voters had a choice of three this time — Richard M. Nixon, Republican; Hubert H. Humphrey, Democrat; and George C. Wallace, the Independent Party nominee.

The race for the U.S. Senate between former Gov. LeRoy Collins, Democratic nominee, and Rep. Edward Gurney, Congressman from the Fifth District, generated more heat than any political race in Florida since retiring Sen. George A. Smathers defeated Claude Pepper in 1950. Collins and Gurney battled right down to the final day, with both claiming victory.

Incumbent Congressmen facing opposition include Democrat Robert L. F. Sikes, Charlotte; E. Bennett, Sam M. Gibbons, James A. Haley, Paul G. Rogers, Claude Pepper and Dante Fascell and Republican J. Herbert Burke.

Democrat Don Fuqua and Republican William C. Cramer are unopposed. Democrat William V. Chappell Jr. and Republican William Herlong Jr. seek to replace retiring A. Sydney Herlong, Democrat.

Democrat James C. Robinson and Republican Louis Frey Jr. are contesting for the seat being vacated by Gurney.

Three Supreme Court seats are to be filled. Republican C. Richard Leavengood of St. Petersburg and Democrat Joe Boyd of Hialeah are competing for the seat being vacated by Justice Elwyn Thomas.

Justice Millard Caldwell, a former governor and a Democrat, is retiring and his spot is being sought by Democrat James C. Adkins Jr. of Gainesville and David L. McCain, Republican from Fort Pierce.

Republican Wade Hopping, recent appointee of Gov. Claude Kirk, seeks to retain his seat and is being opposed by Democrat Vassar Carlton of Thononville.
