

Trade, Not Aid

Despite many handicaps post-war Germany is moving slowly and painfully toward recovery. The latest accomplishment in Germany's favor is the drafting of a plan which will permit the operation of an internal German airline with a fleet of twelve planes linking several large West German cities.

After World War II many of the victorious powers were determined to suppress German aviation forever. The new plan indicates that at least some of Germany's former enemies have realized that this would be an unrealistic policy which would be detrimental to the rehabilitation of Germany along peaceful lines.

The planes necessary for the operation of the proposed airline would probably be purchased in Britain or in the United States. But to make such purchases the Germans will have to have money and there can be only two places from which that money can come. It must either be raised in the form of aid from the United States, already overburdened with contributions to European recovery, or from trade between Germany and the West.

As the world leader in commerce as well as in military matters the success or failure of any trade program will depend to a great extent on the United States. Many prominent world leaders, including Winston Churchill, have asked for American emphasis on trade rather than aid in our relationships with Europe.

Our new Congress is economy minded. By taking every possible step to encourage trade it can eventually remove some of the pressure for aid which Europeans have exerted in the last seven years.



WASHINGTON U-If the new attorney general, Herbert Brow-nell Jr., yells "Ouch" when he steps into office next week, it may be from the hot foot his prede-cessor gave him. In fact the retiring attorney gen-eral, James P. McGranery, in an interesting burst of energy, has set the whole Justice Department ablaze with a big and brand new batch of investigations and legal

actions. For a man in his job only about eight months, McGranery may have established a record for get-ting things started. But, since he won't be around after next Tues-day's inauguration, it will be Brow-nell's job to finish what McGranery becam actions. began. At least McGranery can al-ways say, if only to himself, "Well, I guess I showed them." His activity had been contrary to the predictions of some congressional

critics of the Truman administration. They expected, out loud, that Me-Granery would just rock along till election anyway. But he started off like a man who expected the Democrais to win the election. When they lost, he kept right on going as if they had won. MeGranery, who gave up a life-time federal judgeship to take over the dueller Denartment last and a the Justice Department last spring, began by accepting the resigna-tions of some of the highest department officials. Then he went on to investigalions, antitrust suits, indictments

against some former top internal revenue officials and actions to denaturalize more than 100 under-world aliens. The McGranery energy was a contrast to the regime of the man he followed, J. Howard McGrath, whom Truman fired last April. Under McGrath the Justice De-partment had become a shooting gallery for Truman critics who wanted to know why the attorney general wasn't a little busier look-

Ing for corruption in government. McGrath called in a New York lawyer, Newbold Morris, as a spe-cial investigator. Not the most tactful of men, Morris began his brief Washing-ton career by announcing he would investigate the Justice Department first. He followed this with an at-tempt to make Justice Department

lawyers reveal the sources of their income, outside their government salary. McGrath immediately fired him. That was when Truman fired McGrath and called in McGranery. McGranery took care of the problem of outside income, or at least tried. He put a flat ban on outside law practice by depart-ment attorneys.
