at the recording. Goard said special elections normally produce much lower turnouts. She said the high level of press coverage of the school construction proposal and the controversy it has generated have made more people aware of the election.

School officials said they'll need 27 new schools to keep up with the increasing birth rate and new residents moving to the county Without the \$520 million bond, officials say they can't build so many schools and many emidren could be attending classes in portables or during odd hours or days. If cost-saving measures are found, they won't use all the money, officials promise.

But critics have said school officials failed to properly plan for the construction program and have only now begun to consider double sessions and other spending reductions after receiving criticism for the program. Once given voter permission to spend the \$520 million, critics fear school officials will use all the money, instead of part of it as promised.

#### Law designed to help fight 'hate crimes'

SANFORD - In an ellort to stem hate crimes, an Orlando lawniaker and gubernatorial candidate sponsored a bill that gives teeth to reporting and prosecuting these crim, s.

State Sen. George Smart. (D-Orlando). the bill's sponsor, said more than 19 hate crimes were reported in the first two months to law enforcement agenctes statewide. None of those reports, however, were filed in Seminole County

The Hate Crimes Act became law Oct. Land is aimed at curbing crimes based on racial, religious or ethnic prepublic. The law helps police use impoved tracking and reporting methods. "The Hate Crimes Act is designed to build a foundation for effective prevention of such activity." Stuart said, "especially by organized hate groups, and for aggressive law enforcement to stop meidents before they occur.

Seminole County Sheriff's Sergeant Greg Barnett said (nittal reports of hate crunes are rare here. When police are told of hate crimes, it is hard to track down a suspect. Barnett said. Before, the bill became law, the

sheriff's department received reports of hur telephone calls in early 1989 that are classified as hate crimes. Barnett said. He added that so far there has been no significant hate crime activity here.

Barnett said he is studying reports on hate crimes reported in Orange County in case the situation here changes. "Finnot saying a problem doesn't exist there). We're not aware of it if it does." Barnett said. He added that the sheriff's department will report all complaints of hate crimes to the FDLE in compliance with the Hate Crimes Act

#### These snowbirds don't congest the roads

SANFORD - A group of snowbirds have returned to Santord for the winter

But this group has not bartered economic impact in exchange for congesting cut streets with out of state traffic

It not for their impressive wing span soaring over Lake Monroe, Sanford might not even notice the group has arrived

The Great White Pelican has returned to Sanford for its winter stay on Lake Monroe.

The National Audubon Society calls the great white pelicari one of the largest American finds. The pelican is a large white bird with black upped wings spanning right to nine lect. From beak tip to fail. The white pelican can be up to five feet long.

The white pelicans do not breed in Florida but winter in areas from the Panhandle to southern Florida. The pelicans nest in Utah on the Great Salt Lake, and in areas from British Columbia. Canada to northern California, according to the National Audubon Society

Fred Antonio, Central Florida Zoological Park curator, said the white pelicans have been wintering

on Lake Monroe for at least 10 years. The birds are a fresh water bird unlike the saltwater brown pelican seen along Florida s coast-See Pelicans, Page 5A

#### Animal Rights group protests cosmetics

BOCA RATON — About 300 protestors chanting "Animal rights! Now!" converged in front of the Boca Raton Resort and Club during an annual meeting of the Cosmetics. Toiletry and Fragrance Association.

The protestors, members of the People for Ethical Treatment of Animals, vowed Sunday to continue boycotting perfumes, colognes and tolletries made by companies that test their products on animals.

The crowd jeered Michael Petrina, an officer of the tolletry association, who explained the views of the 250 companies

represented at the meeting.
"If it comes down to the life of a child or the life of a laboratory rat, we have to choose the rat," Petrina said. "There are no tests or series of tests that can totally eliminate the use of animals."

Since the industry's last convention, some of the largest cosmetic companies. Including Avon, Revion, Redken and Christian Dior, have stopped testing their products on animals.

But the U.S. Food and Drug Admnistration requires companies to scienfitically prove product safety, and in many cases the only way to do that is by testing the products on enimals. Petrina said.

#### Parachutists charged with trespassing

MIAMI - Two parachutists skydiving off a 400-foot radio tower were charged with trespassing after they safely spiashed down into Biscayne Bay beside the Venetian Causeway. Miami police arrested Steve Jester, 25, and Dennis McGlynn.

26, after they swam to shore Sunday.

Jester said he had parachuted almost 1,000 times from

airplanes. Sunday's jump from the WQAM tower by the causeway was his 57th jump from a fixed object.
"It's just a different way of getting a thrill." Jester said.

#### Captured Dolphins may be returned

TAMPA - A pair of dolphins snatched from Tampa Bay two years ago and taken to California for a research project may be coming home in April to resume life in the wild, a researcher

Echo and Misha, two young male dolphins captured near Ruskin, may be released soon, said dolphin researcher Randy

He said this weekend he wants to track their movements for a year after their release to see how they fare.

It would be one of the first experiments of its kind, he said. We're trying to hedge our bets as much as possible by returning them to an area they're already familiar with." Wells said.

Releasing the pair at the same time may improve their chances for survival, Wells said. They have spent the past two years together in captivity at the University of California's Long Marine Laboratory in Santa Cruz.

They will wear radio transmitters for about two weeks. When those fall off, they will be tracked visually for a year by a

biologist working with Wells.

If the animals do not make a successful transition to the wild, they will be recaptured, Wells said.

They were free for the first five or six years of their lives, he said, so scraping out a living on their own should come

Also, he said, the area likely contains many of their relatives. In fact, his research has shown that about 60 percent of the 300 or more dolphins in the bay are related.

Officials, developing the Florida Aquarium in Tampa, scheduled to open in 1993 on Harbour Island, have agreed to aupport Wells' project.

Aquarium administrator Dena Leavengood hopes the \$80 million aquarium will include an exhibit showing Echo and Misha's movements, as providing other information about Tampa Bay's dolphins.

"If these animals can be returned successfully, it may pave the way in the future for more dolphins to be set free," Leavengood said.

Paul Johnson, a spokesman for Gov. Bob Martinez, said he wasn't familiar with Wells' proposal, but that Martinez wants to see captive dolphins returned to the wild.

#### Tot injured in fall remains stable

HOLLYWOOD - The toddler who fell seven stories from a hotel balcony in Pompano Beach last week remains in stable condition at Hollywood Memorial Hospital and is expected to recover from the injuries.

Ryan Smith is being treated for broken heels on his feet and two fractures in his spine, Dr. Mark Rotlewicz said Sunday. The child had been playing on the balcony at the Quality Inn when the railing gave way. He fell 70 to 80 feet to a concrete patto near the pool.

Ryan is doing well and is expected to recover, the doctor said. "He's very, very lucky," Rotlewicz said.

The boy was vacationing with his parents, Frank and Diane Smith of Huntington Beach, N.Y.

When firefighters arrived, the house was enguifed in flames, preventing any rescue

He identified two of the victims as Carter's wife. Jackie Lynn Carter, 34, and his 4-year-old son, Sampson Carter. Schauland said three others who died in

the blaze were related to Carter, but he could not say how. They were identified as Willie Carter, 7, Harold Carter, 26 and Linda Price, 38.

Schauland said Herbert W. Price, 22, was able to escape from the house.

"The exact cause of the fire has not been determined," Schauland said. "There was a heater in the house, but we don't know that that is what caused the fire."

MIAMI - An off-duty Hialeah policeman shoved a 12-year-old girl during a youth soccer match, drawing the wrath of parents who stormed the field and smacked the officer several times during a four-minute brawl, spectators said.

Metro-Dade police filed a battery report listing Hialean Officer Carlos Colon, 39, as a suspect but did not charge him with a crime in the incident Saturday at Palm Springs North Park.

Colon ended up with a bloody none. The girl was not injured.

The brawl broke out during a game that pitted longtime rivals. Play had been stopped for an injured player when Susette Diaz, 12, a player on the Palm Springs North team, began to chase the officer's daughter, Jacqueline Colon, 12, of the Miami Lakes team.

The officer told police he ran to the midfield area and stepped in front of the girl because she was trying to kick his daughter.

Witneses said he grabbed the girl by the shoulders and shoved her to the ground. She got up and he shoved her again, the witnesses

More than 30 spectators responded by running to the midfield area. Palm Springs North Coach Lee Schaltenbrand ran forward screaming. Twe never seen anything like this," he said.

"The people in the stands came out after him (the officer) and I went out to break up the fight," said Miami Lakes Coach David Wilson. A large fight broke out and several people hit Colon in the face during the brawl.

#### Police officer protects suspect in stabbing from angry witnesses

PEMBROKE PINES - A suspect in a fatal stabbing outside a chili cookoff ran to a highway patrolman for protection from a mob of angry witnesses and the officer held the crowd at bay with a shotgun until help arrived.

"They wanted to get him pretty good," said Florida Highway Patrol Trooper Douglas Coley. "I was trying to keep my suspect safe and myself safe. If they had turned on me, I would have been helpicas."

The stabbling occurred about 5 p.m. Sunday at C.B. Smith Park as country western singer Eddle Rabbit finished his performance at the fifth annual Chili Cookoff.

Eugene Milkr, 25, of Hollywood, was stabbed in the heart about 100 yards from the gates About 100 country western fans leaving the concert gathered around the victim. Some tried to revive Miller, who was at the park with his pregnant wife and 5-year-old daughter. The Millers did not attend the concert.

Miller was siritfied by a Broward County Sheriff's helicopter to Memorial Hospital, where he died abut 6:10 p.m., police said.

No arrests had been made as of Monday morning. Police were interviewing two suspects, one 18 and the other 23, and were still unsure how the fight started. Because there were so many fights at the park Sunday, they were having difficulty sorting out the details of the killing, Pembroke Pines police Lt. Carl Hall

said.
"We believe it was over some words exchanged and some of those words may have been racial," Hall said.

#### Martinez' use of state planes reported heavy

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Bob Martines has been taking full advantage of the state aircraft at his disposal, logging 125 trips covering 83,000 miles in state planes last year, according to a published report.

That is three times as many trips and four times as many miles as Bob Graham, Martinez' immediate predecessor as gov-ernor, took in 1988, his last year in office, The Gainesville Sun

reported Sunday. During the first six weeks of 1990, Martinez took 20 trips covering about 10,000 miles. They included trips to schools to erect "Drug-free School" signs and a foray into Miami to announce a Free Cuba Com-

mission." It is a rare day that Martinez does not sally forth aboard one of the five state aircraft at his disposal. Last week, for example, he traveled four days out of five. The Sun dubbed the fleet "Air

Martinez." "The governor gets out," said Brian Ballard, a top administration aide. "It's a big state. He thinks it's important to be on the road and talk to people and hear

what they have to say."
Administration and re-election campaign aides say they take pains to separate purely political trips from official business.

Sometimes it is hard to separate politics from policy, the newspaper said. But even if William Branshaw is extradited to Florida, convicted, then sentenced to die, the sunshine state may have to wait 25 years to get its hands on him.

Branshaw is serving 25 years to life for the brutal murder of a popular 17-year-old Oswego County, N.Y., boy. He must serve at least 25 years before being considered for parole.

#### **Energy efficiency key** to new home sales here

efficiency will be the key to selling Florida homes in the '90s, according to housing

experts. add energy saving features when they're not the ones to get the lower energy bills." said Thomas Wood, a University of Florida architecture professor. "But increasing consumer demand will result in builders making new homes more energy efficient in the next decade.

Although energy efficient said. leatures can raise the average price of a new Florida home by \$2,000 or \$3,000, homeowners will make up for it on their monthly utility bills. sald Wood, a specialist in energy aspects of building design.

"You might be paying an extra \$30 a month in mort-gage, but saving \$50 a month on energy bills," said Gary Cook, a building construction professor at the university.

A super-efficient home can save more than 30 percent on energy bills compared to a standard Florida home, said Cook, a specialist with Florida's Energy Extension Service. Savings would be even greater when compared to homes built before the 1980 Florida Energy Efficiency

"An efficient house will also have better resale value as energy prices rise." Wood

said. The most important energy-saving features in a home are proper building orientation, energy efficient appliances, a radiant heat barrier that reflects sunlight away from the roof, good insulation and an energy-

GAINESVILLE - Energy efficient floor plan, the experts said.

Cooling represents 30 percent to 35 percent of annual energy costs in a Florida Builders are hesitant to home, with hot water heating accounting for another 25 percent and home heating using up another 18 percent. Cook said.

Installing foll-like radiant heat barriers in the attle and ventilation in the roof improves comfort and saves another 8 to 10 percent in annual energy bills. Cook

The radiant barriers reflect heat waves away from the house, while the roof ventilation system funnels hot air back outside.

"In Florida, the roof is the primary solar heat-gathering surface." Wood said.

At a cost of 35 cents per square foot, the cost of installation is paid back in five or six years, Cook sald. A good energy-saving feature pays for itself within six or aeven years, the average length of home ownership in Florida, he said.

Energy saving building ortentation and floor plans can lower energy costs without adding to construction costs. Wood and Cook said.

For example, the kitchen should face east for morning light and cool evening cooking, hot water heaters should be in vented bathrooms where extra heat is no problem and closets should buffer the west walls from hot evening sun.

said Cook. Roof overhangs and window shading can also keep morning and afternoon sunlight from heating up living spaces without sacrificing daylight.

## Atlantis sets launch-delay record

#### Bad weather grounds astronauts until Wednesday at the earliest

CAPE CANAVERAL - Today's fifth attempt to launch the space shuttle Atlantis sets a record for liftoff delays in the post-Challenger era.

The record-holder for late Munches was the Jan. 12, 1986, flight of Columbia, which got off the ground on its seventh try, 16 days before the Challenger disaster.

The hard-luck crew of the Atlantis has been grounded at least 48 hours to Wednesday because of bad weather.

"We're disappointed we didn't launch today, but we're convinced the launch team ... made the correct decision based on the Information available," Atlantis

skipper John Creighton said in a statement after climbing out of the 82 billion spaceplane. "We are looking forward to our next opportunity.

Launch delays have plagued the shuttle program since it began, with only eight of the 34 flights to date getting into space on time.

The fatal flight of Challenger was launched on the sixth attempt. That disastrous mission was delayed by various weather and mechanical problems.

Each daylong launch delay costs about \$250,000 if the attempt is called off before the spaceship is fueled. If fueling takes place, the cost of a postponement goes up to about \$624,000, adding the price of

pumping a half-million gallons of liquid hydrogen and oxygen rocket fuel into the shuttle's giant external tank. So if Atlantia launches Monday, demillion to the cost of the puter broke down, forcing mission

Atlantis, poised for blastoff on a secret mission to launch a military spy satellite, originally was scheduled to fly early Thursday. But that launch attempt was called off when shuttle commander John Creighton came down with a cold.

The launch try was rescheduled for Friday morning. but bad weather moved in and combined with Creighton's health to prompt a second delay. A Saturday attempt also was

postponed because of foul weather when a cold front brought rain, wind and heavy clouds into the area.

#### Status hearing set for today for Noriega

MIAMI - Former Panamanian strongman Manuel Antonio Noriega, who is acheduled to go to trial March 5 on cocaine trafficking charges, was to appear in court for a status hearing today.

Three of Norlega's five codefendants also were to appear in U.S. Distict Court before Judge William Hoeveler and were expected to ask that they be tried separately from the deposed dictator, who surrendered to U.S. agents following the Dec. 20 attack on Panama.

Two co-defendants, pilots Eduardo Pardo and Daniel Miranda, have pleaded guilty to transporting drug money from the United States to Panama. Miranda is free on bond and Pardo is in federal prison. Both are awaiting sentencing.

The other co-defendants are Lt. Col. Luis del Cid, a member of the Panama Defense Forces accused of acting as Norlega's liaison and courier with drug traffickers; Brian Alden Davidow, a suspected Miami cocaine distributor who met with Noriega to arrange shipments to south Florida, and William Saldarriaga, accused of being a Colombian cocaine trafficker.

Noriega, his five co-defendants and 10 others, who remain fugitives, were indicted on drug trafficking charges by a federal grand jury in Miami in

February 1988. In the 12-count indictment. Nortega was charged with turning his country into a haven for Colombian drug traffickers, protecting cocaine as it passed through his Central American nation on its way north, allowing amugglers to set up a processing laboratory and letting them deposit profits in Panama banks. The alleged criminal acts took place between 1981 and 1986.

#### Improve the odds

Richard Nixon's grasp of geopolitical realities is once again evident in his warning that the Soviet Union not be allowed to maintain a strategic foothold in Afghanistan. As the stalemated civil war drags on with no end in sight, Afghanistan could yet become a vantage point from which Moscow could threaten American interests throughout Southwest Asia and the Persian Gulf.

When the Soviet military was withdrawn from Afghanistan a year ago, it was widely assumed that the communist puppet regime in Kabul would collapse within a matter of months. This assumption proceeded from the premise that a coordinated military campaign by the Afghan resistance, which controls 90 percent of the countryside, would storm the major cities and send Marxist President Najibullah fleeing. Instead, the guerrillas failure to take the city of Jalalabad last March prompted even more dissension among the already splintered resistance, with disastrous consequences for the guerrilla cause.

Mr. Nixon correctly concludes that the rebels are at a tactical disadvantage because they lack both the experience and the equipment to wage a conventional war against the well-armed Afghan army.

When the Soviets pulled out of Afghanistan, they left behind some \$1 billion in military hardware. Each month since then, Moscow has airlifted to Kabul \$300 million worth of weapons, planes, tanks and SCUD surface-to-surface missiles. During that same period, the freedom fighters have received approximately \$120 million in U.S. aid. That money, however, is routed through Pakistan, where it is divided among the disparate share of the aid has gone to Hokmatyar Gulbiddin, an Islamic fundamentalist leader who is not necessarily sympathetic to Western interests.

The United States has long insisted on self determination for the Afghan people and the complete removal of Soviet occupation troops. At the Malta summit, Soviet leader Mikahil Gorbachev suggested a transfer of power from the communist government to one that is mutually agreeable to the Afghans.

The transitional government most likely to enjoy broad-based support would be headed by former King Mohammed Zahir Shah, who was deposed in 1973. The Bush administration should press for the 75-year-old monarch's return, on the condition that free elections be held in the near future.

Yet, none of this is likely to happen until the freedom fighters are able to prevail on the battlefield. And that won'd happen until, as Mr. Nixon notes, the United States does as much for its Afghan friends as the Kremlin does for its client regime.

## Rocks, hard places in South Africa

WASHINGTON — Can you sit down at a table and negotiate freedom? If history teaches any lessons, the prospects of South Africans negotiating a peaceful termination of apartheld negotiate at the Bastille. The American colonists fought a war for their independence. And the Israelis had fought two successful wars with the British and the Arabs by 1948. Yet, world opinion expects two South African leaders to defy history by acting as a bridge over racially troubled waters and mediating the conflicts within their respective constituencies.

Nelson Mandela had barely been out of prison when the media began a slow shift from sycophantic adoration to critical questions about his ability to fill the vacuum of leadership among South Africa's disparate black masses. Quickly forgotten were the courageous roles of Bishop Desmond Tutu. Rev. Allen Boesak and the young brothers and sisters who repeatedly have put their lives on the line during Mandela's 27 years in prison.

In Mandela's first remarks, black South Africans enthusiastically applauded their brother's insistence on the retention of international sanctions and his refusal to rule out armed struggle as a possible means to the end. But younger blacks are already disenchanted with his willingness to sit down and negotiate over what our Declaration of Independence calls their "inalienable rights." White South Africans were relieved by the charismatic Mandela's reasonableness ("I understand their fears") but dis-

tressed by the reaftirmation of his primary obligation to the African National Congress, his militant rhetoric and his fist in the air. But to have done anything less would have immediately destroyed his credibility among black South Africans.

Across the racial divide. South Africa's colorless President F.W. de Klerk has been cautiously praised by blacks, grudgingly supported by most whites and angrly condemned by a small group of Nean-derthal Afrikaners



Younger blacks are already disenchanted. who are threatening a racial civil war. For the positions occupied by Mandela and de Kierk, the ancients had two names: Scylla and Charybdis. Today, we call it, "being between a rock and a hard place."

Whatever de Klerk and Mandela try to do, either individually or together, they may not be able to negotiate their way out of their dilemma. Equally probable, both could be sacrificed by the extremists on their own sides. "The revolution is like Saturn — it eats its own children." Buchner lamented. Yet, because these two pragmatic menhave become their nation's pre-eminent symbols, they are like Gorbachev — the only game in lower.

After 31 years of writing about the imperative for South African democracy. I think Mandela and de Klerk deserve breathing space to negotiate. But economic sanctions must not be lifted until the non-negotiable bedrock of democracy — one person, one vote — is achieved. One alternative, however, could assuage white South African fears. It is the same alternative that Staten Island, a borough of New York City, is pursuing — secession. Should Afrikaners refuse participation in a biractal partnership, a small enclave, the Republic of Afrikaans, similar in size, say, to Bophuthatswana (about the size of West Virginia) should be an available alternative.

## Economy is the key to communism

WASHINGTON — During the 1980s. Washington got used to male attire that made a political statement. Earnest conservatives were neckties emblazoned with likenesses of Adam Smith, a pioneer of free-market economic theory and a moral philosopher, ideological neckwear is now another American idea that has gone east.

At a meeting in Davos, Switzerland, of European leaders from east and west, Vaclav Klaus, Czecholsovakia's new finance minister, was wearing a University of Chicago necktie. He never went to that noble institution, but it, in a sense, came to him.

The name "Chicago school" has recently referred to the free-market teachings of that university's economists, such as Milton Friedman and George Stigler, both winners of Solvet Prizes.

Richard Perle, who was a bete noire to the "socialist bloe" when he was an assistant secretary of defense, and who now is invited to contribute articles to publications that until recently excorated him, congratulated Klaus on his necktie. Klaus responded: "The Vienna School may be dead in Vienna, but it is alive in Prague." And so the circulation of ideas comes full circle.

The "Vienna school" of economics.

exemplified by Friedrich von Hayek and Ludwig von Mises, taught not only the efficacy of free markets as rational allocators of resources, but also the morality of capitalism by virtue of its connection with free political arrangements. These teachings took a detour through the Hyde Park section of Chicago on the way to Prague, where the intellectual flame was kept by a small group—let's call it a cell—of free-market students within the Communist youth organization.

Communism is like bagpipes, only even worse. A mother once asked Sir Thomas Beecham, the British conductor, what instrument — violin? trombone? — her son would take up. She said she was worried about the possible wear and tear on family nerves from her son's first efforts. Sir Thomas recommended bagpipes: "They sound exactly the same when you have mastered them as

when you first begin learning them."

Communism came to power in the Soviet Union as an irrational approach to modernization and has become more irrational as the 20th century has become more modern, it was dreadfully inefficient, even as an approach to forced-draft development of heavy industry in a backward country. It has become steadily less suited to society as the quantity and velocity of information has mattered more and more to economic life.

Communism was a moral imperative to some of its adherents, but to the Soviet regime it has always been primarily a doctrine of modernization. This explains Gorbachev, his

motives, his strengths — and glaring limitations as a leader.

He is a modernizer who knows that the essence of the Soviet system, "democratic centralism" (control of a command society by a party claiming a monopoly of the interpreta-

tion of history), is incompatible with modernity. Modernity requires broad dispersal for deciston making. Gorbachev seems reconciled — one cannot, on the evidence, put it any stronger — to such dispersal.

Speaking with asperity, Gorbachev recently said to the Communist Party Central Committee that. "Pluralism of opinion is not dissent but democratic centralism understood in a new way." Note well: He defends "pluralism of opinion" only by distinguishing it — by undisclosed criteria

from dissent,
 which is, by implication, deplorable.
 For all his narrow-gauge range.

For all his narrow-gauge radicalism. Gorbachev is a recognizable Russian phenomenon. He is a modernizer looking west, as Peter the Great did. However, he is not also a moralist. He has received much, in fact quite enough, praise for saying that every store shelf in the Soviet Union says: Communism does not work. But he has never said communism is wrong.

By Indicating existing arrangements solely in terms of materialist criteria — yes, we have no bananas — Gorbachev convicts himself, in advance but not far in advance, of failure as defined by those criteria. In Davos, Nikolai Shmelve, a member of the Soviet Parliament, predicted that the Soviet Union might soon require "100 percent rationing of everything — a labor eamp ecomony." So the distinction between the camps in Soviet society may disappear before the camps do.

To reconcile his restive citizens to what is certain — grinding scarcity for the foreseeable future — someone needs to make the moral side of the argument: Freedom is a natural right, right for our nature and an end in itself.

Gorbachevism is dangerously thin gruel because it lacks what Vaclav Klaus and kindred spirits find so satisfying about the Vienna and Chicago "schools:" a fusion of economic analysis and moral philosophy.

## USIA official's past catches up with him

WASHINGTON — A close friend of George Bush was arrested in a sleazy Washington. D.C., prostitution sting in 1988. Less than a year later, he was given a key government position and security clearance. Until Feb. 2 of this year, Jonathan (Jack) Sloat was a special assistant to Bruce Gelb, the director of the U.S. Information Agency, Gelb kept Sloat on the Job with a security clearance even after

he learned about Sloat's arrest for "soliciting for lewd and immoral purposes." Gelb confided to friends that he needed Sloat for his "social connections" and as a pipeline to Bush. The president also knew about the arrest, but did not ask Sloat to resign.

Sloat to resign.

Sloat and Bush go back a long way.
They were contemporaries at Yale and soccer teammates. Sloat became an ardent Bush backer and fund raiser during the 1980 presidential campaign. Bush stayed at

Sloat's home during campaign visits to Washington. The two play tennis together.

In 1981, Bush put Sloat in the job as general counsel at USIA and then as congressional liaison for the agency. He lasted for four years under USIA head Charles Wick. Wick didn't think Sloat was suited for USIA, so he gave him six months to find another job. Sloat didn't, so Wick gave him another six months, and then another six months. Finally, Wick simply let him go. Sloat, a lawyer, found work at the Washington Area Tennis Patrons Foundation. At least that was who he listed as his employer on the night of his arrest on sexual solicitation charges. March 29, 1988.

Confidential police files in Washington. D.C., say that Sloat was arrested by a policewoman posing as a prostitute. The policewoman, Karen Moss, and her partner, Mark Gilkey, reported that Sloat offered Moss \$15 to perform a sex act in his car. Sloat's guilt or innocence was never determined. He took a route offered to first-offenders - doing community service in exchange for having the charges dropped. Sloat completed 40 hours of community service work in Washington and the charge was dismissed. He told us the whole thing was a misunderstanding. He said he stopped to ask the woman for directions to a gas station and she must have misunderstood him. In their banter, Sloat told us, he may have told her to 'stop giving me a snow job," and she may have mistaken that for solicitation for a sex act. Sloat thought the embarrassing incident was behind him when Bush was elected president and appointed him to head the USIA transition team. Then Sloat was made a special assistant to the new USIA director. Gelb, at a salary of \$63,900.

Gelb tried to get Sloat "Top Secret Codeword" security clearance so he could read the National Intelligence Daily, which goes only to the president and less than 100 top federal officials. A knowledgeable source told us Sloat then called Bush at his Kennebunkport, Maine, home and told him about the arrest. Sloat kept his job and was eventually cleared to read no higher than "top secret" materials. According to one intelligence source, the CIA was "in a dither." Sloat is a married, socially prominent, wealthy man. That makes him a larget for entrapment by the KGB or other hostile agents.

We started asking USIA officials about the Sloat case in December. When they were reluctant to discuss it on the record, we sent a written list of questions on Jan. 30. Two days later, Sloat's employment at USIA was

#### Panic selling rocks Tokyo exchange

TOKYO - Tokyo stock prices nosedived in panic selling today, apparently reflecting investors' disappointment with the weak bond market and the dollar's rally to an eight-month high against the yen.

The benchmark Nikkei Average of 225 selected issues, which tost 2.569.35 points or 10.34 percent last week, plummeted 1.458.79 points — 4.2 percent — to close morning trading at 33,432.18, falling below the 34,000-point level for the first time

It was the second-largest single-day fall next to the record plunge of 3,836.48 points since the Black Monday global market crash Oct. 19, 1987.

The TOPIX or the TSE index of all listed major shares also fell 98.57 points to 2.455.74

#### Lithuanians vote for independence

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. - Lithuania's pro-accession opposition Sajudis front swept to victory in most parliamentary races as the Soviet republic's voters dealt a crushing blow to the Communist Party.

But Sajudis leader Vytautis Landsbergis cautioned Sunday that new, almost dictatorial powers sought by Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev may become the main obstacle to Lithuanian independence and that military intervention from Moscow could not be ruled out.

"Gorbachev may get a wide scope of power." Landsbergts said. "They want to stop the collapse of the Soviet Union. The power may be aimed at blocking Lithuanian independence.

#### Democracy rallies draw throngs in USSR

MOSCOW - Hundreds of thousands of people gathered for peaceful pro-democracy protests in the Soviet Union that stretched across 11 time zones from the Far East to the Volga River heartland of Russia.

'Our children, who will live in a free country, will remember this day and our decisiveness." radical Deputy Gavril Popov told an estimated half-million people in Moscow Sunday who participated in the largest pro-democracy demonstration in Soviet history.

The nationwide rallies, staged by radical legislators and activists to keep up pressure for democratization, took place in a period of enormous political ferment including mounting rebellions against local Communist Party chiefs, contentious regional election campaigns and recent Moslem insurrections against communist rule.



#### Peace dividend urged for education

WASHINGTON - The National Governors' Association called for using part of any "peace dividend" for school spending as they adopted education goals designed to flesh out those set forth earlier by President Bush.

Bush and the governors agreed to develop goals for the nation's schools at their education summit last fall in Charlottesville. Va., and Bush announced six objectives in January ranging from making U.S. students the world leaders. in math and science to cutting illiteracy and the high school dropout rate.

#### Bush, Kohl agree on Germany

WASHINGTON - West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl outlined a course to a new Germany under the reassuring umbrella of NATO as the steady march toward reunification has raised security concerns fed by memories of two world

Welcoming reunification as "a golden moment" in history. President Bush countered the anxiety of some other Western leaders Sunday in embracing Kohl's vision of a united Germany that honors the security needs of all states.

Barnett said the four hate crime phone calls involved pro--Nazi, anti-semitic remarks directed at persons with apparently Jewish names from a anonymous callers. Because the incidents were random and laolated, Barnett said "We're going to be reactive rather than proactive."

Stuart said the nineteen incidents reported to the FDLE by local law enforcement agencies between Oct. 1 and Nov. 27, 1989, involved a total of 30 separate offenses. The majority were violent manult, intimidation and vandalism.

Of the 30 offenses reported in the first two months, FDLE classified 23 offenses based on racial prejudice, three based on religious prejudice and four based on ethnicity or national origin.

"The recent bombings of judges and civil rights activist in the South are chilling reminders that there are elements of our society who espouse extremist views of bigotry and prejudice, and are prepared to act on those views with violence and intimidation." Stuart said.

Such activity, he said, "go beyond the bounds of free speach and has no place in America today."

MANAGUA, Nicaragua - U.S.-backed opposition presidential candidate Violeta Chamorro won a stunning upset victory over President Daniel Ortega and the Sandinista leader indirectly conceded today by saying Nicaragua is heading down a "new road."

"I want to express to all Nicaraguans and all the world that the president and the government of Nicaragua will respect the election mandate,

Ortega said election results showed the opposition with 54.3 percent of the vote to 41.5 percent for his leftist Sandinista party.

"This number is a tendency which can't be ignored," he said, adding that Nicaragua was starting on 'anew road. Ortega, during an early morning news conference, said his party went into the election with idea "this battle on the electoral field had to decide once and for all the end of the war to bring

peace and tranquility to the Nicaraguan people." Chamorro declared victory early Monday after returns showed she won a stunning upset win amid returns showing her leading by almost 12 percentage points.

The Sandinista-controlled Supreme Electoral Council as of 6 a.m. was saying Chamorro's National Opposition Union, known by its Spanish acronym UNO, was leading 54.8 percent to 41.5 percent with votes from 61 percent of the country's 4,391 polling stations counted.

Election officials said they expected to have 80 percent of the counting finished by 10 a.m. [11



OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. - A woman won an apparent North American record of \$1,070,482.40 on a \$2 pick-six wager at Remington Park Saturday by correctly picking the winners of the third through eighth races. the track reported.

The woman requested anonymity when she collected her winnings from a track teller, a Remington spokesman said.

There is no national clearinghouse for the recording of pick-six wagering marks, but a survey of major North American tracks turned up no previous payoffs of \$1 million.

The highest pick-six payoff found at those tracks was for \$976,229.60 at Santa Anita Park on Feb. 28, 1986.

There had been no pick-six winners at Remington for six days, resulting in a carryover pool of more than \$627,000 going into Saturday's race card. Another \$788,034 - a track record - was wagered on the pick six Saturday.

## For low maintenance yards, think simple

aspects to consider in landscape design is the amount of time you want to put into maintenance.

By planning in advance, you can have an attractive landscape that is functional and requires a minimum amount of mainte-

The first principle to remember is to keep the design simple. Fancy curves, oddshaped flower beds or hedges add confusion to the design and increase maintenance time. Avoid a scattered arrangement of beds, shrubs, trees and garden features. All plants and objects in your garden should serve some purpose and have a reason for being there whether it is to screen your air conditioner or to create a walkway.

Group plants with similar cultural requirements in the same bed. This way, plants with high water requirements can be watered without having to water the entire landscape. As part of the design, set the irrigation system up so that it has separate zones for planting areas and grass. The grass areas, which need to be watered more frequently than shrubs, can be



watered separately. By deesigning your landscape this way, you will be conserving water, too!

Similarly, plants like azaleas and gardentas like a soil with an acid pH (around 5.0), while most other trees and shrubs like a pH of 6.5. It is difficult to grow plants successfully with different pli requirements in the same planting bed. One or the other will not grow well and thrive. So grouping your plants together by their cultural requirements does mean advance planning but your gardening success will make it worth the effort.

Next, your choice of plant material will definitely affect the amount of care required to maintain it. Plants should be selected according to the environmental conditions on your

get. You may have areas of full sun and areas of heavy shade. There are plants available that will grow in almost any sun or shade level, but most plants that grow in full sun will not grow in shade and vice-versa. Other environmental characteristics to be considered are drainage, sally irrigation water and soil type.

For areas that need a low growing shrub like under a window, try some of the slow growing or dwarf-type shrubs now available at garden centers and nurseries. These also work well in zero lot line properties or mobile home sites. Use of these dwarf varieties will reduce your maintenance time for pruning. Dwarf yaupon holly, Indian hawthorn and dwarf azaleas are some auggestions for small shrubs that require little prun-

More maintenance is required with annual flowers than any other plants in your garden. Maintenance tasks like removing spent blooms and fertilizing are constant. Flowers, however, give a spectacular show for your landscape by adding color. If you property. Check out your yard to are not interested in putting the

perennials, like daylillies which

require a lot less maintenance. Mulches help keep weeds down, conserve moisture and thus reduce work out in the garden. Mulch can also moderate soil temperatures and improve the appearance of your planting beds. Mulches can be any organic materials such as pine bark, compost, wood chips or inorganic materials such as gravel, rock or landscape fabric.

A lawn is an important part of your landscape design, but too much lawn area may mean extra work for you. A small well-kept lawn is more attractive than a large area of weeds. Devote a larger portion of your yard to trees and shrub areas.

Design and plant your yard to be functional and enjoyable, and not to be a continuous job of pruning, watering, apraying, mowing and weeding. For a free fact sheet titled "Low Maintenance Landscapes." give me a call or drop by the Agriculture Center.

# Hypertension may be cause of nosebleeds

79-year-old father has frequent nosebleeds. Can you give a possible reason why this might happen? Is there a solution?

DEAR READER: Nosebleeds (epistaxis) are caused by injury to the delicate blood vessels within the nostrils, particularly those lying on the septum, the thin plate of cartilage separating the nostrila.

In most cases, epistaxis is the result of trauma to these vessels. For example, a blow to the nose often ruptures the vessels, as can nose-picking and brisk none-blowing.

Also, irritation and infection such as allergies and the common cold - can erode the thin membrane covering the septum, exposing the blood vessels and leading to seepage of blood. These causes of epistaxis are generally trivial: the bleeding ordinarily stops of its own accord or after firm pressure (pinching) on the nostrils.

In troublesome or recurring nosebleeds, the temporary use of a nose spray - such as 4 percent Neo-Synephrine - will shrink the nasal lining and stop the bleeding.

Some people with high blood pressure will experience epistaxis when the pressure within the thin-walled vessels literally bursts them. This is a serious cause of epistaxis because the nosebleed may serve as a warning of more serious future events, such as stroke. Also, uncontrolled hypertension will lead to heart strain.

In a 79-year-old man, I worry that hypertension or some other serious condition, such as a blood-clotting disorder, could cause epistaxis. Therefore, I urge your father to seek medical attention from his doctor, who can diagnose the reason for the nosebleeds and suggest treatment, including referral to an ear-nose-and-throat specialist, if

Severe nosebleeds may have to be treated by cautery, during which the specialist uses an electric current to coagulate the

bleeding blood vessel. Your father needn't put up with frequent nosebleeds. Therapy is always successful, once the cause has been identified.


