

JFK's Mother Killed Cape Bill

Canaveral Change Measure Blocked By Massachusetts Congressman, Friend Of The Late President

MIAMI (AP) — A personal telephone call from Rose Kennedy to Massachusetts Congressman Thomas O'Neill Jr., apparently helped to kill a bill to change the name of Cape Kennedy back to Cape Canaveral, the Miami Herald said today.

Clark Hoyt of the Herald's Washington Bureau said O'Neill in turn contacted Rep. George P. Miller, D-Calif., chairman of the Science and Astronautics Committee, and asked him to block the name-changing bill.

The measure to rename Cape Kennedy was pushed through

the Senate last July by Florida Sens. Edward Gurney and Lawton Chiles. Cape Canaveral was named Cape Kennedy in 1964 in memory of President John F. Kennedy.

The Herald said Miller could kill the bill by merely failing to put it on his committee's agenda.

"He (Miller) likes Tip

(O'Neill) pretty well, so that pretty well wipes it out," the Herald quoted an unnamed congressional staff member.

An aide to O'Neill confirmed Tuesday that the congressman did go to Miller and stop the bill. As of now, its finished," the Herald said.

But the aide, according to the newspaper, while admitting

that the mother of President Kennedy had phoned O'Neill, denied the Boston-area Democrat was acting on her behalf.

"He is doing his own thing because he was a friend of Jack Kennedy's and doesn't feel that all of a sudden, we should start changing the names of places named after the late president," the aide told the Herald.

Florida members of Congress, who say they are acting on the wishes of residents of the area, have been trying for several years to reinstate the name Cape Canaveral, first given to the region more than 400 years ago by Spanish explorers.

The Herald said Rep. Lou Frey, R-Fla., was so incensed Tuesday over the apparent killing of the bill that he threatened to try to change the name of Cape Cod, Mass., to Cape Kennedy.

218,000 Population Seen In 1990 Seminole Fastest Growing County

Seminole County is the fastest growing political subdivision like proportions within the United States, according to a report by the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, released today by its

Oseola-Seminole-Orange committee chairman, Sidney Vihlen Jr., vice chairman of the Seminole County Commission.

Not only is South Seminole County expected to near double in size by 1975, as compared to 1970, but, according to Vihlen, "the south part of the county is becoming saturated (population-wise) and the trend now is shifting to the northern part of the county."

Vihlen elaborated by pointing out that the Greater Sanford area was estimated in April 1972 to have a population of 37,500 and that it is anticipated it will grow to 48,000 in 1975 and 72,000 in 1990.

Vihlen stated: "The Planning Council has been monitoring growth in the Greater Sanford area based on housing construction, school enrollment and utility hookups ... it has become apparent that our previously liberal projections should be revised."

He pointed out that presently there are 7,000 homes under construction in the Greater Sanford area alone. To further elaborate on the Sanford area

growth he indicated the proposed 1,200-acre (each) tracts of "Heathrow" and "Greenbelt" - slated for the Interstate 4-Lake Mary Boulevard intersection - as two prime examples of future growth.

Further, estimates for 1990 were increased from 148,000 to 172,000 while the projection for 1990 is 218,000 persons in Seminole County. Vihlen terms these estimates as "very conservative."

To recap, Vihlen pointed out Seminole as a whole is expected to nearly double from the 1970 census figure of 83,692 to an estimated 1975 population of 150,000 while Greater Sanford is

expected to grow from 37,500 last April to 48,000 in 1975.

Nixon Has Plans, Too McGovern: Can End War

Sen. George McGovern will announce on Oct. 10 a plan to end the Vietnam war, campaign aides said. It will be part of an intensive antiwar campaign by his supporters during the Columbus Day weekend.

McGovern "will tell America what Richard Nixon cannot: how a president of the United States can bring all of our servicemen out of Vietnam and back to America," said Lawrence O'Brien, chairman of McGovern's Democratic presidential campaign.

But Vice President Spiro T. Agnew hinted that the Nixon administration may have some peace developments of its own to announce.

McGovern, who planned appearances in Buffalo and New York City today, criticized Nixon administration spending policies.

He said the total deficit during Nixon's first term may exceed \$100 billion and accused the administration of conducting a "political con game"

in its demands for a \$250 billion ceiling on federal spending.

McGovern's running mate, Sargent Shriver, appealed for the labor vote in Columbus, Ohio, telling a labor group: "In every stage in his career Richard Nixon has said no to programs designed to benefit the workers of this country."

"Any labor leader who tells you to vote for Richard Nixon is telling you to vote against your own interests—to slash your own throats—to vote against the labor movement," he said.

President Nixon has not scheduled any campaign appearances this week. Vice President Agnew campaigned for the ticket in Indiana and Montana. He planned to go today to South Dakota, McGovern's home state, and Nebraska.

In Great Falls, he praised the administration's initiatives in farm exports, saying they meant "cash in the pockets of American farmers." He also said the Democratic Congress has acted on only six of 31 administration proposals on the environment.

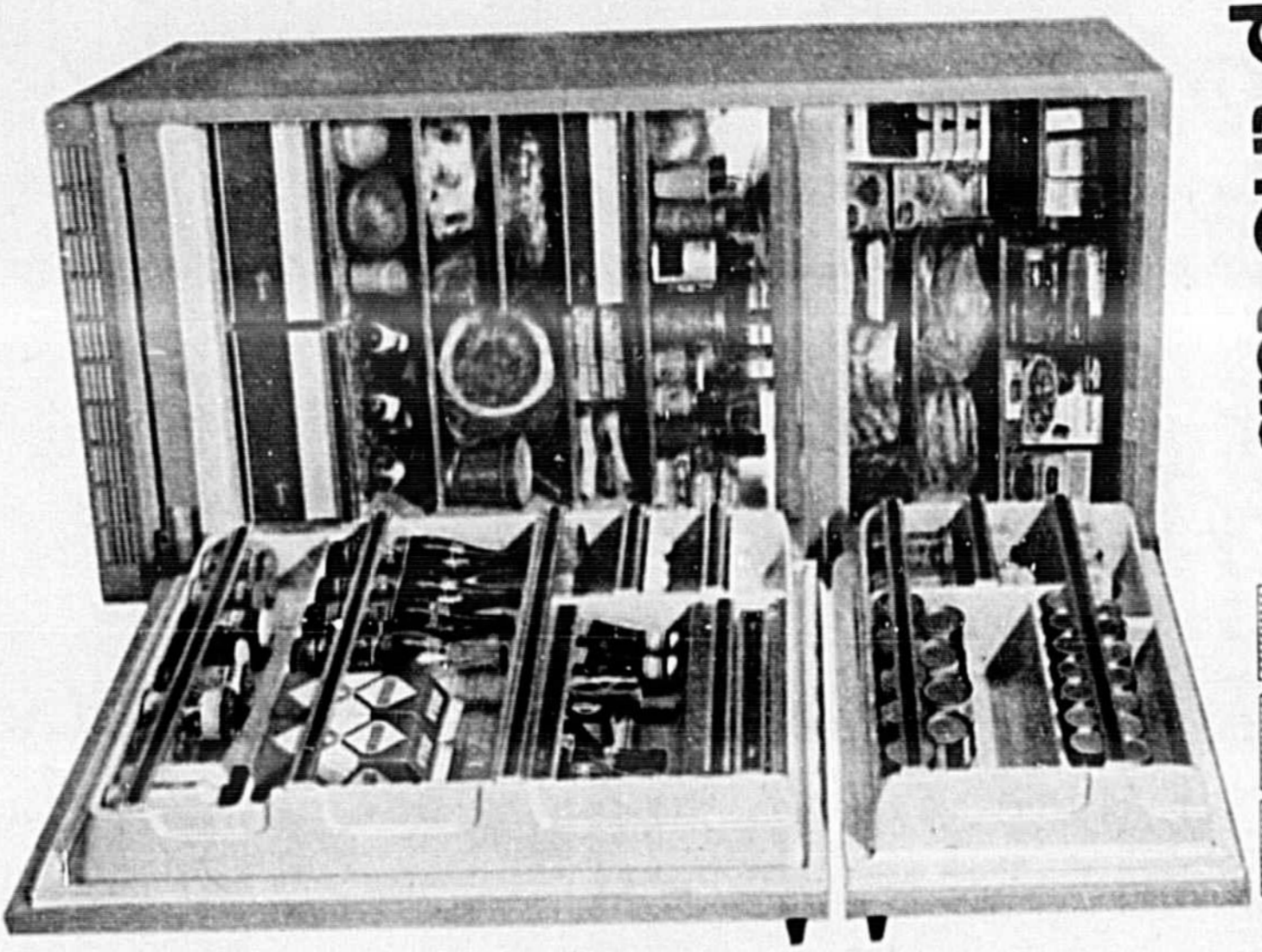
The Nixon campaign organization Tuesday began dispatching 9.3 million letters to lists of voters in California, New Jersey, Illinois and Pennsylvania. A spokesman said the goal is to increase the Nixon vote by 2 per cent over what it would otherwise be.

American Party presidential candidate John Schmitz said in Atlanta, Ga., Tuesday his party will be listed on the ballots in at least 32 states and he has an "excellent" chance of winning in California, Michigan and Wisconsin.

The California congressman predicted the voters will turn to the American party in four years. "If Richard Nixon is re-elected, things are going to get so bad that people are going to remember who told them the truth in the first place," he said.

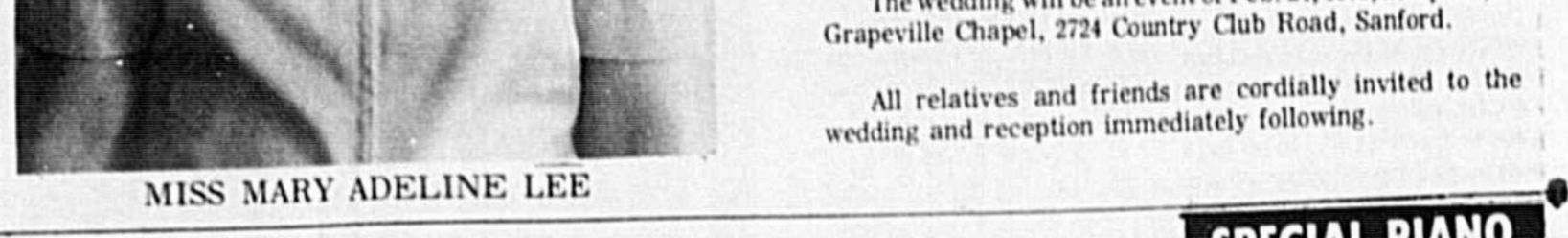

Why Should I Be A Sucker...?

CLEVELAND—(NEA)—In France, Italy and in other parts of South America, tax evasion has become almost a way of life.

It has become a game, with citizens openly bragging about what they are getting away with, coupled with a degree of government tolerance.

This country has always prided itself on the way its citizens voluntarily assess themselves and pay their taxes annually. Since the advent of withholding this degree of "voluntary compliance" has become somewhat of a fiction, since most working people at least substantially all has been deducted from their earnings before they even get it.

Even so, Internal Revenue officials like to report that about 98 per cent of all Americans correctly report all their income and compute their own taxes and willingly settle their accounts.

In recent years a new problem has arisen. More taxpayers seem willing to let a chance of getting away with something.

It's not just individuals who are involved. Internal Revenue Commissioner Johnnie M. Walters said in Detroit recently that "alarming" abuses are prompting a careful look "for tax fraud in corporation returns."

Where warranted, the commissioner said, "the Service will recommend prosecution of officers or employees responsible for corporate evasion."

Citing a number of examples, Walters said "It is not merely astounding that large publicly-held corporations engage in such schemes, it is indeed shocking."

Tax cheating generally results either from the feeling some people are getting away without paying their fair share or a rebellion created by the feeling the tax load has become too heavy.

In the first instance, the resulting attitude is "Why should I be a sucker when so many millionaires or racketeers are getting away without paying?"

When the feeling that too much in taxes is being taken away becomes a conviction, there is a tendency on the part of some to see what they can get away with.

They attempt to justify their actions by insisting they can't get by if they pay all

To Counter Red Plans Bombing Stepped Up

By GEORGE ESPER Associated Press Writer SAIGON (AP) — The U.S. command ordered a stepped-up 152 bombing campaign in the Saigon region today to counter Communist plans for a wave of attacks timed to influence the U.S. presidential elections next month, senior officials said.

Meanwhile, the Command disclosed in a delayed report that three American helicopters supporting South Vietnamese troops were hit by enemy ground fire within an hour of each other Monday near the district town of Ben Cat, 25 miles north of Saigon.

The Command said two of the helicopters sustained light damage and returned safely to the bases, while the third made a crash-landing and was destroyed. A total of three crewmen were wounded in the three incidents, the Command said.

Senior officers reported that South Vietnamese field commanders had shifted their forces closer to Saigon to defend major installations near the South Vietnamese capital, including the big base at Bien Hoa and Long Binh where hundreds of American support troops and airmen are still stationed.

Thirty B52 bombers struck enemy targets on four sides of Saigon. U.S. officers said the strikes were aimed primarily at new stockpiles of war materials and were ordered intensified after earlier raids proved successful.

Over North Vietnam, Typhoon Lorna sharply curtailed U.S. air operations, military sources said.

Policeman Testifies Of Murder

The trial of Stanley DeBose, 18-year-old amateur lawyer charged with the Aug. 7 most clever slaying of Vera Lee Mathis, continued into the third day today with testimony of Sgt. William Bernsky, Sanford Police Department.

Bernsky identified numerous objects taken from the defendant or from his residence and dispatched to the Region IV crime lab.

Among these were a lavender shirt worn by the defendant when arrested, which the witness said had no blood upon it. Neither did a pair of trousers the defendant removed, Bernsky testified, however, both were soiled and contained hairs. Shoes the defendant wore had blood stains upon them but were unidentifiable as to human or animal blood.

Defense Attorney Ned Julian Jr. succeeded in getting the sergeant to admit he knew of no violation perpetrated by DeBose when he was arrested him, and there was no specific reason the defendant was incarcerated. "I didn't know what to arrest him for," Sgt. Bernsky related. However, the witness noted that DeBose told him, "I'm the one you want."

Although he advised DeBose of his rights, Bernsky said he never told the defendant what he was doing in jail. Further, Bernsky testified he was advised when he visited DeBose's home that he shared a bedroom with a younger brother.

At one point in the testimony, attorney Newman Brock requested Circuit Judge Richard Muldrew to admonish the defendant to refrain from shaking his head at testimony, thus distracting the jury.

DeBose, wearing tennis shoes with the back portion removed, sits at his seat at the defense table alternately scratching his head and resting it upon his hand.

Bernsky testified there were no finger prints of value retrieved from the store.

Upon recess examination by Julian, controversy arose over a photo taken of the defendant by John Spolski, Sanford Herald editor.

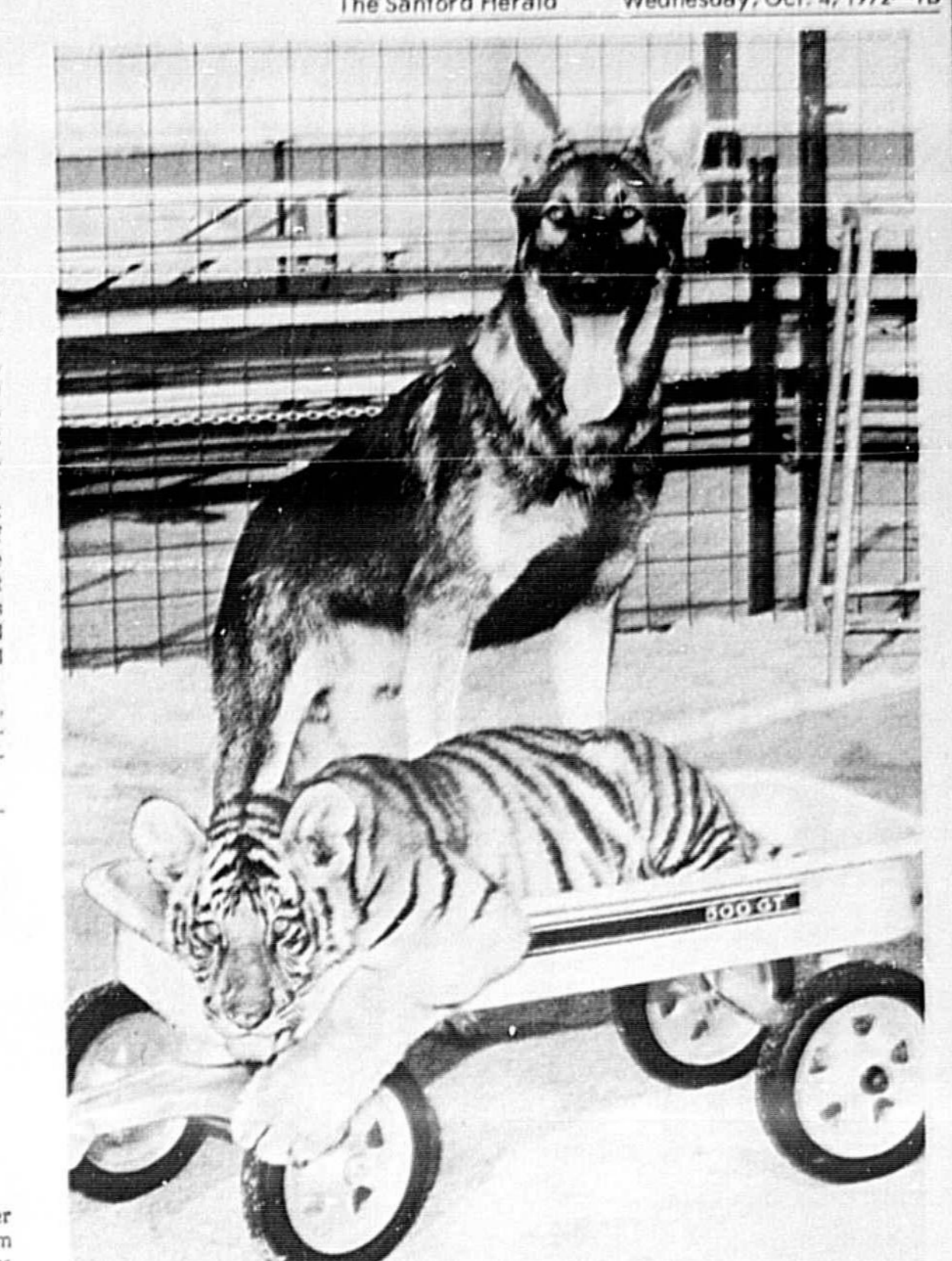

Zoo Needs Grants

Future of the Seminole Zoological Society's efforts to establish a Central Florida zoo and botanical gardens may depend on whether state and federal moneys can be obtained to help carry the zoo project forward.

This was disclosed by Clifford Nelson, society president, to the Sanford City Commission in a status report on efforts by the society to relocate the present Sanford zoo onto county property for expansion into a larger animal attraction.

Nelson said the society now has \$34,301 in cash and \$28,224 in pledges for a total of \$62,525 in assets. He said, "based on existing support we expect to have \$166,000 by April."

But "the name of the game" is to apply for federal grants, he added. "I feel we will have the animals out of Sanford by the end of the fiscal year," he predicted.

Nelson disclosed that borrowing of \$3,000 may be necessary in order to have enough matching funds to apply for the state and federal funds for zoo operational purposes.

Park construction is expected in mid-June, 1973, with work on access roads, utilities, animal cages, concessions, nature trails, a natural history museum building and the botanical gardens.

Nelson placed society membership at 1,386 members and the fund goal at \$250,000.

"The minute we fail to meet one of our milestones, we will let you know," Nelson told the commissioners.

Later Monday Nelson appeared before the Seminole County School Board and received endorsement of the zoological endeavor. The School Board approved a resolution favoring the attraction but advised it could not legally pledge school funds unless for services rendered.

Nelson said he was seeking money from five Central Florida county boards that send children to the Sanford zoo. In addition to Seminole, these include Lake, Orange, Volusia and Brevard.

Potato Is Fashionable, Versa

The potato is hardly a glamorous object to behold, but it is probably the most important vegetable on earth today, serving as the main source of nourishment in many lands.

Graceless as it looks, the potato became a fashionable vegetable in Europe. It was introduced there by the Spaniards who discovered the tuber in the 16th century during their conquest of the Inca empire of Peru. But it waited a long time to reach the gourmet league.

For more than a century after its appearance, the potato was grown only in flower gardens in England and on the continent — a botanical curiosity with showy flowers that was regarded with suspicion because it was a member of the nightshade family.

By the end of the 17th century, the impoverished Irish became aware of the nutritional value of the tuber and began to cultivate it throughout their land. In fact, immigrants from Ireland brought the potato to America with them and it became known here as the Irish spud.

The potato finally came into its own when France's King Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette began serving it at the royal table. Soon the top chefs in France and Germany were creating potato dishes on the haute cuisine level.

There are said to be more than 80 varieties of tuber, but even the farmers have difficulty telling them apart. For practical purposes there are two main types, the new potato known for its firm waxy quality and good for boiling, and the mealy, tender tuber like the Idaho which is best for baking.

One of the attributes of the potato is its ability to absorb a number of flavors and still retain its own identity. An example is the Francillon Salad popular in France in the last century. It consisted of hot, sliced potatoes, cooked in bouillon instead of water, then marinated in champagne and blended with poached mussels. The potatoes and mussels are seasoned with oil, vinegar, chopped shallots and aromatic herbs, plus salt and pepper. This salad is served covered with sliced truffles in a crystal bowl. Hardly an economy dish!

One gourmet potato specialty that is considerably more reasonable is the famous soup known as Vichyssoise which is usually served chilled. It consists mainly of potatoes, cream and watercress, sorrel or spinach.

One of the finest examples of

this soup I have encountered is served at the Renaissance restaurant specializing in continental dishes and located on

New York's East side. Michael Kirvan, the Renaissance manager, uses watercress in his version of this great soup. Here

is his recipe.

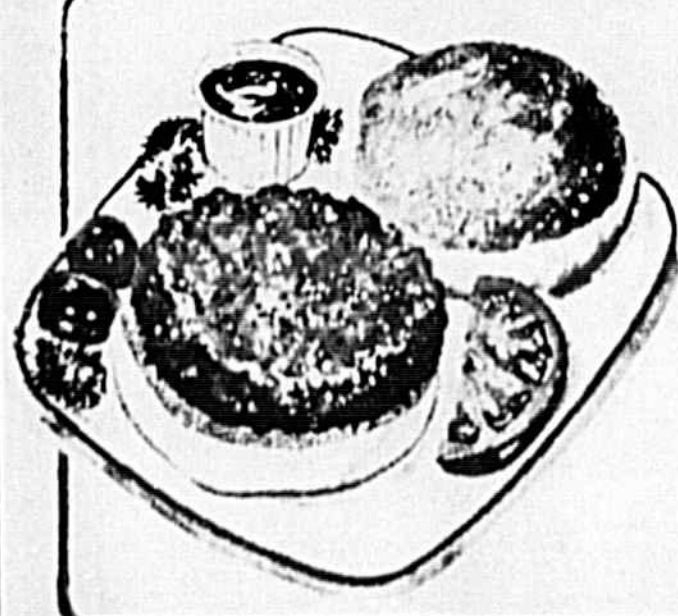

Chicken W/Pears Salad

Ingenious cooks team chick-
en salad with fruit. And here's
the latest version of this recipe
we've tested.

Diced Bartlett pears are
added to the chicken mixture
and it is moistened, most appropri-
ately, with curried mayon-
naise and served on pear
halves. Salted peanuts make
the topping.

The amount of curry powder
called for in the recipe gives
distinct flavor; if you want a
milder combination, add less of
the curry.

CURRIED CHICKEN AND PEAR SALAD

7 Bartlett pears
2 cups diced cooked chicken
1/4 cup diced green pepper
1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
2/3 cup mayonnaise
1 teaspoon curry powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of white pepper
Lemon juice
Salad greens
1/2 cup salted peanuts

Halve, core and dice one of
the pears; mix with chicken,
green pepper and celery.

In a small mixing bowl, with
a spoon or fork, blend the may-
onnaise, curry powder, salt and
pepper; toss with chicken-pear
mixture. Cover and chill.

Shortly before serving time,
halve and core the remaining
six pears. Brush cut surfaces
with lemon juice to prevent
darkening. Cover and chill.

At serving time, line individ-
ual salad plates with salad
greens; place two pear halves
on each plate. Top with chick-
en-pear salad. Sprinkle with
peanuts. Serve at once.
Makes 6 servings.

Vegetables again are win-
ning their way into a neces-
sary niche of the daily menu.
Young eaters who often turn
down spinach, peas, caulif-
lower and carrots now seem
to be nibbling away with no
complaint at these nutrition-
ally sound goodies in their
raw or cooked state. It may
all be the result of the em-
phasis on natural foods and
stress on healthful eating.

Whatever the reason, the
willingness to eat such foods
does cut down on mother's
job in the kitchen and event-
ually she may be finished as
a mere short order cook.
Something to try on the
youngsters are Candied Car-
rots. These go well with hot
dogs, hamburgers, chicken
or turkey.

CANDIED CARROTS

1 1/2 pounds fresh carrots or
2 packages frozen whole
baby or crinkle cut
carrots
1/2 cup orange marmalade
3 tablespoons butter or
margarine
Juice of 1/2 lemon
1 tablespoon snipped
parsley

If fresh, scrape carrots and
remove ends. Cut into 3/8-
inch thick strips or crosswise
into 1/4-inch slices. Cook in
1 inch salted water, covered,
until tender (about 10 to 15
minutes for strips, 3 to 10
minutes for slices). If frozen,
cook according to package
directions. Drain thoroughly.
Heat marmalade, butter and
lemon juice in a large skillet
until blended. Add drained
carrots and cook over low
heat, stirring occasionally,
until evenly glazed and
heated. Sprinkle with par-
sley before serving. Makes 6
servings.
