
Ryan states that the petition attacks a Florida statute, governing murder, as not being a felony but rather a misdemeanor.







# Democrats Attack Nixon "Corruption"

It is now abundantly clear that the Democrats will focus on the issue of "corruption" as the presidential race gathers speed for the final weeks of the campaign.

This is, of course, not a new tactic for the political strategists who have used "throw the rascals out" as an ear-filling slogan for many

Yet this year it is different. For there have been scandals in the open and in the making which have been received by an apathetic public or else one - and this is the most dangerous attitude - that is convinced graft and special privilege is an occupational hazard of all politicians.

Strong attacks by Democratic Nominee Senator George McGovern and even more telling accusations from the '68 presidential nominee Senator Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota are the spear-heads of this new and forceful tactic.

McGovern's spells it out. "The Nixon administration is the most morally bankrupt administration in the entire history of our country. "Lesser scandals than ITT or the wheat deal shook previous administrations to their very

Many voters must have their private doubts about the honesty of an administration which is well aware of the "Watergate Caper" and all the questions which it has raised and now appears to relegated answers to an after Nov. 7th airing.

Perhaps the most unfortunate decision by Candidate Nixon is to leave hard answers (which are rarely hard) to the lot of his many "surrogates." For what is needed and what has been evaded is word from the man whose word is law to his cohorts and could, with profit for all, make the answers clear and acceptable to all.

### Goodbye, Doll!

It is called "Women's Lib" but that is a misnomer. What is happening is that men are being liberated from some unholy obligations that piled up during the centuries when matrimony was considered some special kind of holy alliance.

Consider the action of the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court in rejecting a claim by a woman for back alimony. In a unanimous decision, the court said that it is appropriate for a judge "to take into account the enhanced ability and desire of women today to look after their own affairs and to provide for their own economic well being."

## The Man Who Would Rather Be Right

His best remembered words are that "I would rather be right than be president." Contrast this with the impression given by an overabundance of figures on today's political scene, which, in quotation form, would be: "I would rather be president than anything.

We're talking, of course, about Henry Clay, born April 12, 1777. Clay lived to a fairly advanced age for his time, and he was right a good many times. But he never became

In fact, this country has had a lot of good men who inscribed their names in history without moving into the White House. Clay was one of these; one would also have to name Daniel Webster, Robert Taft, Arthur Vandenburg and, of course, others.

Clay's father was a preacher who died when Henry was four and the boy had only three years of formal schooling. But he was a great reader and from a clerkship qualified himself for the practice of law.

He was elected to the Kentucky Legislature when he was 26 years old, and he was named to fill a U.S. Senate vacancy stitutionally, but apparently no challenge was ever made.; Clay was a leader to the group that figured the U.S. had to fight England in the War of 1812; he resigned from Congress to help write the peace treaty, then returned to the House of Representatives and there became immortal, in the

history books, for engineering the Missouri Compromise. He was developing his record of being right, and made his first pitch for the presidency in 1824. In that election (election procedures were different then) no candidate received a majority of the electoral votes, so the task fell to the House of Representatives.

Clay threw his support to John Quincy Adams, who was named president even though Jackson had led in popular voting. Clay wound up as Adams' secretary of state. Clay was in the presidential race in 1844 and this time lost to James K. Polk. And he was itching for another whack at it

in 1848, but his party (the Whigs) figured he had gone to the post too often already and passed him by. Actually, Clay was a presidential nominee only three times, which ties him with William Jennings Bryan and puts him one up on Adlai Stevenson and Tom Dewey among history's also-rans.

### Agnew's Switch: Attacks McGovern By BRUCE BIOSSAT

WITH AGNEW CAMPAIGN (NEA) The plan to have Vice President Spiro Agnew devote

his campaign time to making earthy appeals to drifting Democratic workers of ethnic-Catholic background has been shoved aside for a time. He's busy knocking Sen. George McGovern on foreign policy. On his swing into Texas and Illinois, the President's running mate hasn't been within hailing distance of the hard hat guy with sleeves rolled up and glass of beer in hand. Yet all the advance notices said he was going to concentrate on this fellow, to remind him of his disenchantment with the Democratic party and keep him from slipping back into his old Democratic voting habit.

Evidently it has proved more tempting to hit at McGovern in another vulnerable spot. Polls show that, for all his stress on ending the Vietnam war and cutting back U.S. defenses, McGovern is not registering well with voter as the "peace candidate." Mr. Nixon is being given high credit for having remov

510,000 troops from Vietnam, for cutting our casualties, for ending our combat role. He is also making strong points on his new approaches to China and Russia. So Agnew, as always delivering his speeches like a corporate board chairman calmly totting up the year's profit and loss, recites the Nixon strong points. And, in the process, he puts the rap on McGovern as a man he portrays as incapable of doing the job. Sample assault on McGovern's proposal to slash defense

outlays by roughly a third: "No reasonable, informed person can believe that our nation's defense expenditures can be slashed 30 per cent without inviting aggression and chaos in the world, dis-

solving our partnerships with other nations, and imperil-Agnew told an audience in San Antonio that proposals like McGovern's are so naive as to be "nothing short of frightening." Successful dealing with the heavily-armed Soviet Union, he said, is done from strength, and not through "drastic, unilateral disarmament," He added: "The Soviet Union is not moved by mere smiles or frowns from any president of the United States . . .

On his current swing, the vice-president has been talking to retired federal workers, farmers, Republican fat cats gathered to raise "victory funds," and outfits like the National Defense Transportation Association, But, no matter what the audience, he rarely can resist taking

swats at McGovern as a foreign policy novice. The Democratic nominee, he suggests, is a "Pied Piper" who would not only have us throw away our guns but lead us down a path where he would either have to place "our trust in the enemy's good will" or, as in the oft-cited matter of our prisoners of war, go begging to

Hanoi for their release. "A strong nation," says Agnew, "need never beg at the bargaining table. You could say that all this amounts to hitting a man

when he's down, for there is hardly a scrap of evidence from the various polls to indicate McGovern is well regarded as a peace negotiator or a foreign policy manager. You could also say that, in helping Nixon press his advantage in this field, Spiro Agnew is not simply confining himself to the "issues" as he promised he would, but is striking hard at McGovern himself. By word and tone, he contrives to make McGovern seem like a green lad who couldn't get a "C" grade in foreign policy in a junior

In one respect, there is no generation gap or understanding gap between college campuses and the general public, and that is disgust with the war in Vietnam. But that is as far as the resemblance goes.

According to Prof. Howard Schuman of the University of Michigan's Institute of Social Research, "College students and faculty tend to oppose American involvement in Vietnam on moral grounds. They criticize U.S. devastation of a foreign country and cite the deaths and injuries that have resulted on both sides.

"The public at large has become disenchanted for a more practical reason-our failure to win." Schuman's findings, based on data from Gallup Polls and other opinion surveys and in-depth interviews with adults and college students, are scheduled to be pubished in the American Journal of Sociology in November

The general public (wnich includes noncollege youths

in their 20s) has not turned against the war by expanding American military moves, he says, but by major Ameri-For instance, prior to the Communist Tet offensive of anuary, 1968, with American leaders confidently predicting victory, the number of self-described hawks outnumbered doves by a ratio of two to one. By the end of

that year, doves outnumbered hawks by nearly two to This shift represented probably the most significant change in public opinion during the entire war, says Schuman. The My Lai massacre, which aroused moral indignation on the campuses, "caused scarcely a ripple in the

Schuman's studies cast doubt on the common assumption that public opposition to the Vietnam war was awakened by college and university demonstrations. The fact is that a substantial portion of the antiwar public is also extremely hostile toward college protesters.

## Potato Is Fashionable, Versa

The potato is hardly a glamorous object to behold, but it is probably the most important vegetable on earth today, serving as the main source of nourishment in many lands.

Graceless as it looks, the potato became a fashionable vegetable in Europe. It was introduced there by the Spaniards who discovered the tuber in the 16th century during their conquest of the Inca empire of Peru. But it waited a long time

to reach the gourmet league. For more than a century after its appearance, the potato was grown only in flower gardens in England and on the continent - a botanical curiosity with showy flowers that was regarded with suspicion because it was a member of the nightshade family.

By the end of the 17th century, the impoverished Irish became aware of the nutritional value of the tuber and began to cultivate it throughout their land. In fact, immigrants from Ireland brought the potato to America with them and it became known here as the Irish spud.

The potato finally came into its own when France's King Louis XVI and Marie Antoinette began serving it at the royal table. Soon the top chefs in France and Germany were creating potato dishes on the haute cuisine level.

There are said to be more than 80 varieties of tuber, but even the farmers have difficulty telling them apart. For practical purposes there are two main types, the new potato known for its firm waxy quality and good for boiling, and the mealy, tender tuber like the daho which is best for baking.

One of the attributes of the potato is its ability to absorb a number of flavors and still reain its own identity. An example is the Francillon Salad popular in France in the last century. It consisted of hot, sliced potatoes, cooked in bouilon instead of water, then marinated in champagne and blended with poached mussels. The potatoes and mussels are seasoned with oil, vinegar, choped shallots and aromatic nerbs, plus salt and pepper. This salad is served covered with sliced truffles in a crystal bowl. Hardly an economy dish! One gourmet potato specialty



Heat marmalade, butter and lemon juice in a large skillet until blended. Add drained carrots and cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until evenly glazed and heated Sprinkle with parsley before serving. Makes 6. servings.






