General Shanks In Talk Tells Object Defense Day Test

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 22.-"A city buys a fire engine, not because it wants a fire, but because it wants to be able to save itself from destruction by fire," declared Major General David C. Shanks, commanding officer of the fourth corps area, of the United States army Thursday in a statement pointing out the object of the national defense test to be observed through-

out the country on September 12. Asserting that the object of the defense test "is two fold in its nature," Major General Shanks said that its first object "is to try out the machinery which has been established under the national defense act for the safety of our nation" and further that a large part of the "machinery" consists of civilian soldiers "who have voluntarily taken training in order to be prepared to serve their country

in time of need." The defense test in itself, according to General Shanks, will be entirely local, and voluntary "and without expense to the government," In its military aspect, "it is merely a drill to see how the machinery provided for our national defense would work in actual practice," says the general.
"These men know the horrors of

war; they know the necessity for proparedness, and they have a viswpoint which enables these to judge clearly both of the necessity and of the propriety of this proposed action by the government."




