

John A. Walden, 61, of White Springs, drowned in the flood waters when he apparently stepped into a hole while walking home, sheriff's deputies Sheriff Hardy Spradley esti-

mated crop damage at \$100,000 in Columbia County alone and the river had flooded parts of adjoining Hamilton and Suwannee Counties as well. Officials said about a dozen homes on both sides of the river were evacuated Friday morning. The flood waters almost completely submerged several

homes. The Suwannee, which normally flows past this town of about 3,000 population at a depth of nine feet, was measured at 37.67 feet, exactly one foot above the record set in

Meat sales remained off in most parts of the nation with some price reductions by retailers, but there was no general drop in prices. An Associated Press spot check of prices of eight meat

items on Monday and again on Thursday showed only scattered changes. The boycott continued to take its toll of layoffs at meat packing houses, and livestock markets reported trade was

generally light. Leaders of the boycott have announced plans to meet in Washington next Wednesday to discuss future moves. One of the directors of Fight for Inflation (FIT), the organization that sparked the boycott, said the group will ask





This is particularly evident from the opinions of more than a thousand members of Phi Delta Kappa, the national honorary education fraternity, on financing schools and making best use of the money. Their views are reported in the fraternity's March magazine.

One of education's most critical questions is where and how to get the money to pay the continually increasing costs of schooling. The government level-federal, state or localproviding the most money will exercise the most control over curriculum, personnel, administration and construction and more and more politicians at all levels are admitting it.

Also involved is the kind and amount of school taxes you will pay and to which level of government; the jobs and salaries of millions of people and the future of collective bargaining between school boards, teachers and ad-

In the poll, 79 per cent agreed that if the state provides all the cash for local schools, "more program control will likewise move from local boards...to state agencies."

Fifty-four per cent oppose a single state agency to determine needs, prepare budgets and allocate appropriations for kindergarten through college. At the same time, 42 per cent said the largest share of money should come from the state and 60 per cent favored raising funds via a flat or graduated income tax, rather than property taxes.

Slightly more than half agreed that local school boards should limit expenditures to the revenue available, even though it may restrict programs and limit employe benefits and 60 per cent said the current emphasis on categorical federal funding "constitutes undesirable federal control of local schools." (Education revenue sharing opponents take note.)

Sixty-seven per cent oppose public support of parochial schools; 71 per cent want more federal funds; 54 per cent believe "class size is a major factor" in school achievement, despite substantive research to the contrary.

Sixty-three per cent said competition for financial support between higher education and elementary-secondary education works to their mutual disadvantage. Sixty-five per cent do not believe in keeping pupils who cannot do the work in the same grade or subject until they master the material. To put it another way, they support mandatory promotion. Fifty-two per cent oppose teacher strikes for focusing attention on 'inadequate' financial support.

While those polled support equalization of education funds within and among states, 80 per cent said once a basic program has been guaranteed, local districts "should be allowed to spend additional locally raised funds for program expansion to whatever extent they

Polls such as this clearly show that the credibility gap between the public and those granted a monopoly to "educate" its young gets wider all the time. They cast grave doubts on the sincerity of widely publicized efforts to close the

Instead of clear thinking and knowledgeable, straight answers, the public gets contradictions and woolgathering even from those supposed to be leaders in their field. These same schoolmen are spending considerable time and money lobbying for their ideas before local. state and federal legislatures and claiming to speak for the general public.

If the public is worried about increasing school taxes for decreasing school effectiveness and loss of local control, all it can do is ask its school officials and teachers sharp questions, demand clear, factual answers supported by unbiased research and beware the "educator" who talks out of both sides of his mouth.

Profound Change

Serious Rupture Among Classes?

NEW YORK - "By 1969 the most serious rupture in the nation," writes White House adviser Patrick J. Buchanan in his just published work, "The New Majority," "was not between Republicans and Democrats, but between the lower and middle-class Democratic center and right, and its

upper middle-class elite and left..." Buchanan, in effect, contends that American politics has undergone a profound change, one which has barely been perceived by the public and most politicians alike. It is a change from bread-and-butter economic issues to one involving class values. In the aftermath of the November, 1972, Nixon landslide, this columnist wrote that Sen. George McGovern's crushing defeat was largely the result of a "class vote" that involved cultural more than political

Buchanan confirms that the Nixon campaign strategy for victory, which was, in Buchanan's words, "years not weeks in the making," was indeed one that was fashioned along cultural lines.

"While the Nixon landslide," he writes in his book, "was a victory of the man over McGovern, it was also a victory of 'The New American Majority' over 'The New Politics,' a victory of traditional American values over the claims of the 'Counter Culture,' a victory of 'Middle America' over the

In the meantime, the traditional Democratic Party seems fated to accept former policeman Mario Biaggio with the New York Conservative Party endorsement.

The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling upholding the use of local property taxes to finance public schools has, perhaps predictably, been decried by a number of educators "The yield of crops and the concentration of wealth in individual communities will continue to determine the kind of education each child receives," says Allan M. West, acting executive secretary of the National Educa-

tion Association. "Thus the quality of education a child receives depends in no small part upon the accident of birth or residencethe place a child's parents happen to live." This is essentially true, but it is also true that a great

many other things in life also depend upon the accident of birth, beginning with looks and basic physical stamina -the kind of parents one happens to "choose." The question is how far government should attempt to level out the inequalities of life, and this seems to be one thicket which the Supreme Court wisely refrained from

If it is properly within the domain of the courts to equalize the financial disparities between a state's school districts, what about the disparities between the quality of police and fire protection and other government services in each community? Then there is the larger question of educational inequalities between the states themselves. As West points out, there is nothing in the decision to prevent the states from reforming their own school finance systems. Justice Lewis F. Powell Jr., writing for the majority, made clear that the court was not endorsing

This, and the fact that there have been so many classaction suits on the issue, not just the one in Texas on which the court based its decision, suggests that it is a very real problem which the individual states must sooner or later find ways of remedying.



BRUCE BIOSSAT Diplomatic Party A Tiring Rat Race

By BRUCE BIOSSAT WASHINGTON (NEA) The people I know in the U.S. diplomatic service or in consistent contact with it are generally appalled, annoyed and bored stiff with the amount of party-giving and party-going that constitutes a veritable hallmark of

life in the realms of diplomacy. I can't speak for our ambassadors, career or otherwise. My links are with middle-echelon types-economic and political attaches, consuls, and the like. Though their competence and hence their usefulness to this country abroad varies widely, they have passed severe tests and done much studying to get where they are. Mostly they are highly dedicated, serious-minded people who want to

It is no exaggeration to say that some are literally exhausted, in spirit if not in body, by the endless round of parties which are a built-in feature of their every foreign assignment - with some exceptions in certain Sovietdominated Iron Curtain countries. How long this furious party pace has been a custom

I have no idea. I only know that I've been listening to . complaints about it from people in the U.S. Foreign Service for nearly two decades. Obviously the blame for this phenomenon can't be laid principally at America's door. You can safely generalize and say that Europeans, particularly, are traditionally great lovers of ceremony. As author Lewis Mumford long

ago pointed out in his classic study of the development

out almost as backdrops for pomp and show. There is nothing wrong with ceremony, either on the spacious avenues or in diplomacy's great halls. Every nation, as every individual, needs it. 



Donna's **Deliberations**

The red carpet was out for Casselberry at this past Wednesday night's CALNO Council of Local Governments meeting in Altamonte Springs. Winter Springs Mayor Granville Brown chose his words

very carefully as he said he wished to "announce Casselberry has ah-ah-. We are happy to accept Casselberry Mayor Lawrence Swofford of Altamonte said,

'Casselberry has been a member of CALNO all the time. They have just been absent from several meetings." Mayor Bill Grier of Casselberry, meanwhile, with a big

smile on his face presented a check for his city's membership fee. A little later in the meeting Grier got off his chest something that has bothered Casselberry for some time the contract for fire protection Altamonte has with Zayre's Shopping Center

"Casselberry is in a unique position with one side of SR 436 completely within the city while the other side is not in the

As mutual aid fire agreements were discussed, Grier brought up the delicate subject of placing within the mutual assistance pacts a prohibition of any city contracting for fire protection within the territory of a sister city. He cited the "classic examples of Zayre's and K-Mart.

Swofford, in answer to a query from Grier, said his city in the fire protection contract receives about \$3,000 annually Grier said if Altamonte took the position not to contract within the territory of another city, Zayre's would come to

Casselberry for annexation. The Casselberry mayor added that it is well known his city does not levy an ad valorem tax and the only tax Zayre's would have to pay would be on utility Swofford pointed out neither Zayre's nor K-Mart are

within Casselberry's city limits. He indicated as well that he has no intention of stopping contracted service to these

CALNO, Super-Government?

Another item discussed at the CALNO meeting was what the study being conducted by planner Harlan Hanson will most likely say concerning fire protection.

Winter Springs Mayor Granville Brown and Swofford both seemed fairly certain the study will have a recommendation that the cities go to a "regional" fire and police protection system. In fact, Swofford said he "hoped" the study would show one main station with those currrently in the cities designated sub-stations.

When Longwood Mayor Eugene Jagues said if the services were set up on a "regional" basis, the action would be changing the way of governments currently seen in the cities, Swofford said CALNO is not a "super-government." The cities will be asked to fund a "regional" program and once the various city councils approve, "they have

nothing more to do with it. After they fund it, their responsibility is over," he declared. when Jaques said the idea sounds like "consolidation Altamonte Springs Councilman Dan Dorfman said it would he "functional consolidation," Jaques persisted that he

understood CALNO was to be an "informational" The need for a ladder fire truck was also a part of the discussion. Swofford said Altamonte will probably budget for one in the new year. "We have talk of 12, 15, 18-story

buildings coming into the city," he said. The CALNO city representatives adopted unanimously a resolution expressing gratitude to former Mayor Ken Brown of Longwood for his service as chairman of the organization in the 1972 year. The resolution lauded Brown's dedication and hard work, giving him a "heartfelt thanks for a job well

Mooney Bill Opposed

CALNO also voted to adopt a resolution opposing the bill sponsored by Rep. Eugene Mooney, chairman of the Seminole Legislative delegation, to add supplementary requirements for annexations.

The resolution recommended by Swofford passed on a 3to-1 "inform my Council and get the advice of the city at-Swofford told the other members he has commitments

from the Dade and Hillsborough legislative delegations and five members of the Orange delegation to oppose the bill. He asked that copies of the resolution be forwarded to the president of the Senate, the speaker of the House, the governor and local legislation committees of both houses of

The bill would require the cities to hold public hearings at which both city and county residents could speak on proposed annexations.

It also would require that land annexed retain its current zoning for at least 90 days before another public hearing would be held to change the zoning for higher density use. The lawsuit brought by the Attorney General challenging the annexation of a parcel for apartment construction on

Planners Analyze Growth

A population in Seminole County of 281,922 by the year 1990 was predicted by Al Lewis, who with Harlan Hanson and George Hoffman, is compiling various studies for the CALNO

Lewis said by 1990, the "CALNO area" (defined as that area bounded on the cast by the Oviedo city line, on the north by Five Points and on the west and south by Orange County including both incorporated and unincorporated territory) will have a population of 189,006.

He predicted Altamonte Springs will be the largest city in the county with 72,381 persons; Sanford 50,270; Casselberry 28,508; Winter Springs 15,515; Longwood 12,160 and Oviedo 6,755.

He said the character of Seminole from the time of the 1970 census in April of that year until December, 1972 changed from a predominately non-urban one to an urban


Lewis reported the density per acre in 1990 will reach 3.72 housing units per acre and the size of the average household will drop to 2.9 from the current 3.0 figure.

Lewis said the average age of persons living in the CALNO area is in the 20 to 65 year group and the area's young population is closely balanced in ratio of mele to female. Altamonte residents have the highest average education in the county at 12.7 years and the highest percentage of high

school graduates at 78.4, he said. Some 88.1 per cent of the people residing from the CAI NO area work in Orange-Seminole and 29.9 per cent work in Seminole The cost of homes averages \$21,300 in Altamonte Springs; Casselberry \$19,000; Winter Springs \$12,600 and Longwood \$12,300.

Vegetable Crop List Surge In Harvesting

The spring harvest for many of Florida's vegetables surged in output last week. Harvest should continue to increase steadily throughout the rest of April. Interstate shipments shown an increase, with cabbage leading in volume. Other vegetables listed in order of quantity were: Celery, tomatoes, sweet corn, potatoes, peppers, endiveescarole, snap beans, romaine lettuce, radishes, carrots and

Cabbage harvest in North central and Northeastern Florida growing areas reached a peak level last week. Total Florida shipments provided approximately 70 per cent of the U.S. cabbage supply. Texas continues to supply most of the balance. Florida will be the main supplier until May.

Trading for cabbage at Florida shipping points was active Monday, the 2nd of April; however, the market was weaker and demand had decreased. On Monday 1% bushel crates of good quality and size, domestic round green type ranged from \$3.25-3.50. The market remained bearish and by Wednesday most offerings were sold at \$3.00 per crate. Even at this lower price, demand continued to be sluggish. The quality of most cabbage presently is variable. Some problems have occurred as a result of excess rainfall, which can affect keeping quality. Size has continued to be large, as many lots range from 16-22 heads per crate.

Celery supplies from Sanford, Oviedo and Zellwood should increase slightly this coming week. Shipments of the past week were at a normal level. Trading continued moderate with only a fair demand. Prices declined or Monday for the 4 & 6 dz. stalk sizes and advanced for 21/2 dz. Wirebound crates of pascal type were priced: 3 & 4 dz. \$2.50, 2 dz. \$2.75, 6 dz. \$3.00 for the 21- dz. size.

Radishes continued in good demand with active trading. Cartons of 30-6 oz. film bags of red type sold at \$1.50. The white icicle type are in lighter supply as cartons of 24-8 oz. film bags ranged from \$2.50-\$2.75. Quality has been good and sizes mostly desirable


Carrots remained at a steady level of price and volume of shipments. Demand, however, has tapered off slightly, but has remained at a fairly good level. Prices for 48-1 lb. film bags medium-large and 50 lb. sacks loose large were \$2.75.







"We're gonna be tough, I guarantee you that," commented Jones, who runs the team with his partner. Vel Miletich, "These cars are quite a bit faster than last year." Making up the 'super team' are defending USAC champion Joe Leonard, along with former Indianapolis 500

winners Al Unser and Mario Andretti. The cars are already easily passing 200 miles per hour, with Andretti blasting the Texas World Speedway in his Viceroy Special at an unofficial record 211.76 miles per hour. "Right out of the box they showed more potential than last year's did at the end of the season," said Andretti, who led several USAC races last year but still went without a

Last season the team had four USAC wins, with three of them credited to Leonard while enroute to his second straight driving title.

Maurice Phillippe, designer of the Parnelli racing cars, feels his team has more confidence in this year's cars. Phillippe, who designed Formula I and other racing machines for Lotus before joining the Jones team, said the cars wound up doing well at the end of last year after early problems. "They were more suited to circuit road course

"We took one or two calculated risks that didn't prove too practical last time," said Phillippe, citing the canted "V" air fins on the sides of the 1972 Parnelli cars that were removed because they caused more problems than they solved. This year's cars feature shovel-snout noses and are lower than the 1972 racers.

Jones is looking for a big improvement in the team's efforts this season, especially on the oval tracks, where they haven't won since 1969.

Children shouldn't suffer A Matter of Taste

Have you ever wondered if you have taste? Maybe when you stared at a famous abstract painting in the

art museum and asked yourself why it looked just like something your 3-year-old had brought home from nursery school. Maybe when you saw a monstrous sofa in the furniture store, picked up the price tag and saw \$2,000. Maybe when your friend's decorator suggested chocolate brown and purple for her living room. Does everyone have taste? How can we trust our own taste, when decorators and furniture faddjsts often suggest combinations that seem too cold, too hot, too bizarre.

Milo Baughman, one of the top furniture designers in the country, a professor of environmental design and an outspoken critic of antihuman interiors, says we all have taste, preferences of some kind. The trouble is, we don't have the courage to press for what we prefer. We're sually expressing what someone else prefers "Too often we make the taste choices we do, not because we honestly respond in the depths of our truest being to certain colors or forms or styles or design ideas. but because we respond to the pull toward social conformity-worrying about what others will think. We are persuaded to do certain things because they may create an

mage of economic achievement beyond our particular economic reality. Our preoccupation with having a nice

house should never get in the way of the life of that

I experienced a twinge of guilt at this point, remember ing how I shoo the kids off the new chairs. I thought of one relative who practically had her living rooms roped off. In fact I couldn't think of anyone who had gotten new furniture that didn't let their nice new furnishings, or carpeting, or drapes get in the way of the living in their louse, at least for a little while.

But I still didn't know if I had taste, that is good taste Baughman quoted another designer, Harley Parker, who said, "Good taste is the first refuge of the noncreative. It is the anaesthetic of the public." He told me what passes for good taste may be nothing more than fashion. ad and forced obsolescence. So how can we know when we're choosing the right sofa.

the right table? "Instead of someone else's good taste we should exhibit," say: Baughman, "authentic taste"—authentic self-expression responding to what's really inside rather than what mother did or what the neighbors think

"The purpose of trying harder and of eventually achiev ing," says Baughman, "is to gain happiness. For most, it is the setting of the home that should provide this happiness." Is there, perhaps, in the very nature of the ex-pensive, excessively designed interior, something that militates against this happiness? Is owning the "house beautiful" a built-in trap, a new source of worry and preoccupation that drains off energy and time that would be better spent elsewhere, particularly in human relations? "The best designed living room I was in," says Baughman, "was an uncomfortable place in which to try to live. It was terribly intimidating, particularly to the children who lived there. Everyone was so awed by the presence of important design that it got in the way of the authentihuman contacts that should have happened there." So get out your handmade ceramics, your kids' camp trophies and the picture of grandma. Sit down in the liv ing room with the kids, smack dab on the new chairs, stop worrying about taste and have some authentic family con-

Santord Awaiting 'Explosion'?

Almost anyone you meet these days who is familiar with Sanford's present growth and development to any reasonable extent at all will agree that the City on the river that flows north is about to explode I believe it, too

But a great deal of care and consideration is going to have to be given to bringing about the City's development in an orderly progressive manner. The City Commission of Sanford is making an bonest and

sincere effort to do just that. When growth and development results in a better way of life for the citizens of Sanford, that is considered progress. When growth and development results in a regressive way of life for the citizens of Sanford, that is not progress. Of course, it could very well take the wisdom of Solomon

future where progress may evolve into regression. But it is the responsibility of the City Commission to do its best to detect that line when it appears. In the meantime, however, the Commission is going to face one problem right after another as growth and

to determine the fine line that exists out yonder in the near

Two Problems

development take place in certain areas of the City.

Right now, for example, Sanford has two problems. One deals with real estate, the other deals with the economic situation in the greater Sanford area. Let's take the latter first.

Customers walk into Sanford real estate offices everyday seeking homes for rent or homes they can buy for a reasonable down payment. There are no rentals to speak of at this time. One Sanford agency simply suggests to people wanting a rental to visit The Sanford Herald office about press time, buy one of the first papers off the press and if there is anything listed in the Classified Section run, not walk, to the nearest phone and ask the landlord to hold it until Those who can't find anything to rent-and there are

dozens of them everyday-turn to seeking a home they can yes for a reasonable down payment. But to tell the truth. there are few of those. Today a \$20,000 home-and even they are few and far between-under FHA financing calls for a down payment of \$950. Most newcomers don't have that much anymore. But even if they did monthly payments on such a home, inside the City limits, are going to run about \$185 a month.

This constitutes our economic problem To purchase a home under FHA or any kind of financing today that calls for a monthly payment of approximately \$185 a month the buyer is going to have to have an income of something like \$850 per month at the very minimum.

Now, a fellow making \$2 an hour for a 40-hour week will gross only \$80. A fellow making \$3 an hour for a 40-hour week will gross only \$120. To make \$850 per month he's going to have to gross away over \$4 per hour and there aren't many jobs in the greater Sanford area for unskilled, semi-skilled or skilled workers which pay that much

Little Is Left

Let's take the stock clerk making \$2.25 an hour in a local store. His 40-hour week produces a gross of \$90. He's got a wife and three children. Frankly, I don't see how he gets past the check out counter at the supermarket on Friday nights. Forty dollars of that \$90 gross goes for rent and the rest of his net take home pay goes for groceries, medicine and whatever necessities the family must have. It doesn't take a crystal ball to realize that this fellow is

going nowhere but in the hole. What I'm saying here is that the time has arrived when wage scales in this area are going to have to become commensurate with the cost of the necessities of life. If wages don't increase, two things will happen: The lower income group is going to be wiped out and they'll be forced to leave or go on welfare.

The truth is that the only way many of our lower income families are making it today is by both husband and wifewhenever possible-working to bring home enough to provide for the family. As evidence of what I'm talking about, the State Em-

ployment Office in Sanford today has more jobs available than it has ever had. Many of the job opportunities available just don't pay enough to feed, clothe and house a family. And, the situation apparently is going to get worse before it gets any better. The second problem facing Sanford right now is

businesses which want to expand to make more jobs available are finding it extremely difficult to get-first-the high priced land upon which to construct new stores andsecondly-the right kind of zoning for a particular type of business. If Sanford is going to enjoy a well rounded growth the

City has got to grow commercially as well as residentially or else we'll become the bedroom community that south Seminole has become in relation to Orlando and Orange A property owner recently went before the City's Planning and Zoning Board and was turned down when he

tried to get the lightest commercial zoning for a corner be owned to construct a building to house several small shops. The property is located on Sanford Avenue, south of SR 46. One homeowner who recently purchased a home on Sanford Avenue objected to the commercial zoning because he said traffic on Sanford Avenue was so heavy now that he encounters extreme difficulty in backing out of his driveway.





We've been reading about Sanford's new RC-1 zoning acategory. Would you explain what it is and what can go into these areas'

Dear Mrs. PAM: RC-1 is the zoning symbol for a Restricted Commercial District. This is a new category for Sanford since it was not in the old zoning ordinance which was recently replaced by the

City's new comprehensive zoning plan. Among the uses permitted in RC-1 districts are convenience retail business or services, providing that no establishment contains more than 2,400 square feet of floor space. Fast food establishments and drive-in restaurants are not considered as convenience retail businesses.

Also permitted are beauty and barber shops; medical, dental and other professional offices; prescription stores when located within the same structure as a medical office; typical quick service markets and stores; laundry and dry cleaning pickup stations; dance and music studios; enclosed commercial recreation establishments, physical fitness studios; flower shops; tailoring shops, day nurseries, kindergartens and other child-care centers. There are several conditional uses permitted in the

public interest such as hospitals, private clubs and lodges public buildings and churches. There are certain restrictions on density controls, set

backs, lot coverages and off-street parking. Hope this gives you some idea of what Restricted Commercial zoning means.

I sell the house to you for \$2,000 cash and you take over the mortgage. You do not have to qualify. For a transfer fee the mortgage company will put the mortgage in your name. In some instances, however, I may still be held responsible since I was the original mortgagor. Many home sales are handled in this manner. It saves buyers and sellers a lot of money in refinancing costs.

Brown patch fungus has been more prevalent the past few weeks. This disease is a erious parasite of all major grasses and for turf in Florida Brown patch occurs during warm weather when sufficient surface moisture is present for the disease to develop. Night emperatures in the 60's and laytime temperatures between deg. an 85 deg. is most avorable for the fungus.

Brown patch kills the grass in a roughly circular pattern that may range from a few inches up o several feet in diameter. When the disease is active, grass at the outer edge of the affected area may appear dark and wilted and exhibit profuse growth of the fungus on its surface. In some instances, a circular pattern is not

If diseased grass is examined closely, a rotting of the leaf sheath will be evident. This type of damage is especially noticeable on coarser grasses such as St. Augustine. Because of this rot, entire leaf blades can be pulled from the plant with little effort. Where the grass is thinned over a large
