Judge Hall last week sentenced two other juveniles involved in the same charges to 20-day terms in the county jail.

The vehicle was damaged while parked near the woman's apartment, according to the report. Portions of the vehicle were removed and paint was scratched off.

Building Offered To Public SIC Members Uphold Dave Kelley

By BILL SCOTT Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) at this morning's meeting approved a motion which will allow the advertising for lease of a Sanford Airport building, formerly held by the SIC for possible lease to the Florida Law Enforcement Department to house a state police academy.

By a unanimous vote, the seven SIC members indicated the former Navy barracks building, which had been offered to lease at \$20,000 a year, will be advertised for leasing to the first acceptable offer, subject to the approval of the city commission.

This does not mean that if and when the State Cabinet decides to select a site for the proposed police academy, the local facility will not be available. On the contrary, it was the attitude of the industrialists that the group would still lease to the state for a police school or to any other state agency, such as the Agriculture Department, for whatever use it could be adapted.

But, it was also evident that any other proposal dealing the structure to be used as an acceptable use, would also be considered. SIC Director David F. Kelley this morning requested permission to advertise the airport facility in The Wall Street Journal and this was granted subject to a modification by W. E. Knowles, member, that the city commission approve at Monday night's meeting.



REVIEWING SEMINOLE'S SCHOOL SYSTEM

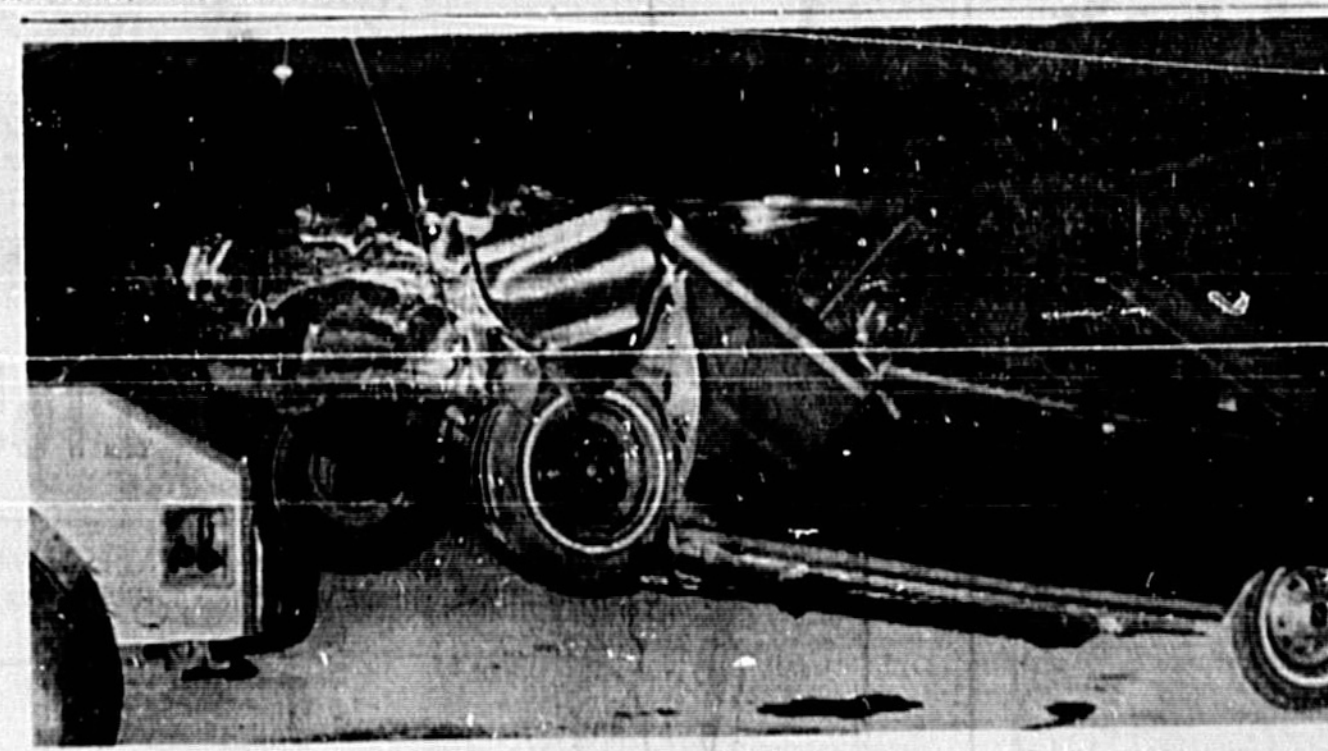

School Buildings Eyed

A state survey to determine in which general areas new county schools should be built has begun since the first of the week. Headed by Dr. Stanley W. Oviatt, school survey specialist with the State Education Department, the survey team numbers some 15 persons and includes an educational gambit running from curriculum gamut narrators to high and elementary school principals and central office personnel from the state education office at Tallahassee.

Some of the contingent includes students working in other county school systems across the state, who have been retained to make the Seminole survey. Dr. Oviatt said the survey will be finished today and a report will be forthcoming in 90 days to Supt. John Angel, who will make the diagnosis available to the School Board.

The information gleaned by the surveyors in their four days of work then will be used in determining where to construct new elementary and high schools. Ordinarily, the State Education Department makes these surveys every 10 years but in practice do it every five years. Dr. Oviatt advised.

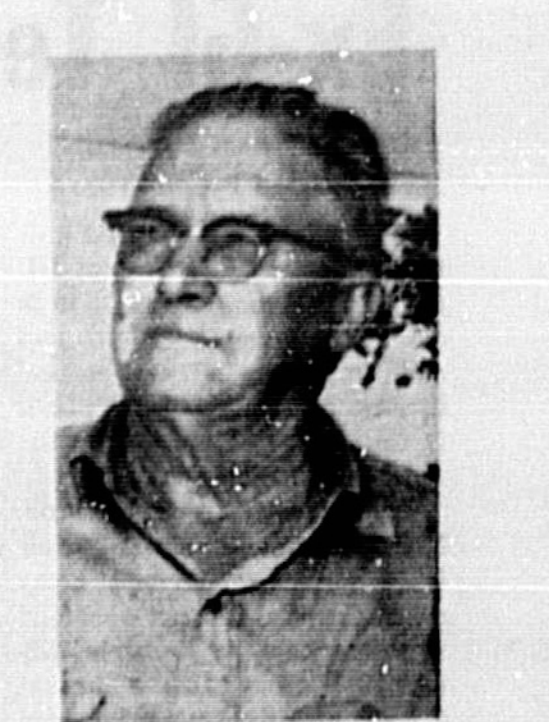
Altamonte OKs license Fee Rates

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — City Council has adopted on second and final reading an ordinance setting occupational license fees in the municipality. Most fees remain the same, with the exceptions being general contractors reduced from \$100 yearly to \$75, accountants reduced from \$20 to 25, drive-in theater operators from \$100 to \$75 and special operators in coin operated machines reduced to \$15. Coin operated machines or agencies remain the same at \$100.

Administrative Assistant Rolfe Wagner reported to Council that he had reviewed the statement submitted by Glace and Radcliffe on Nov. 6 for design services upon the sewage system. Wagner said the statement was in order, and Council approved payment to the firm subject to the approval of the HUD field engineer and the availability of appropriate funds.

Taxpayer Relief Asked In Canal Building Funding

By MARION BETHEA "If it has to be subsidized by the taxpayer, then it is either welfare or art." This is the comment of S. B. (Jim) Crowe in relation to the St. Johns Indian River Canal, which presumably he will reiterate at tomorrow's hearing at the Civic Center by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The canal will run between Sanford and the Indian River near Oak Hill. Crowe, member of Seminole County's long range planning committee for recreation and Seminole County representative on the state's St. Johns River Advisory Committee, has stated that he is not against canals per se but that he does not see why the taxpayer should subsidize a corporation, and further that no project that will not show a profit has a place in our capitalistic society. Crowe contends that the canal has been a "darling of politicians and catnip farmers since its inception in the early 1800s." However, he notes, "it has never shown any real economic need or with all the push it has received from politicians and news media it would long ago have been accomplished."

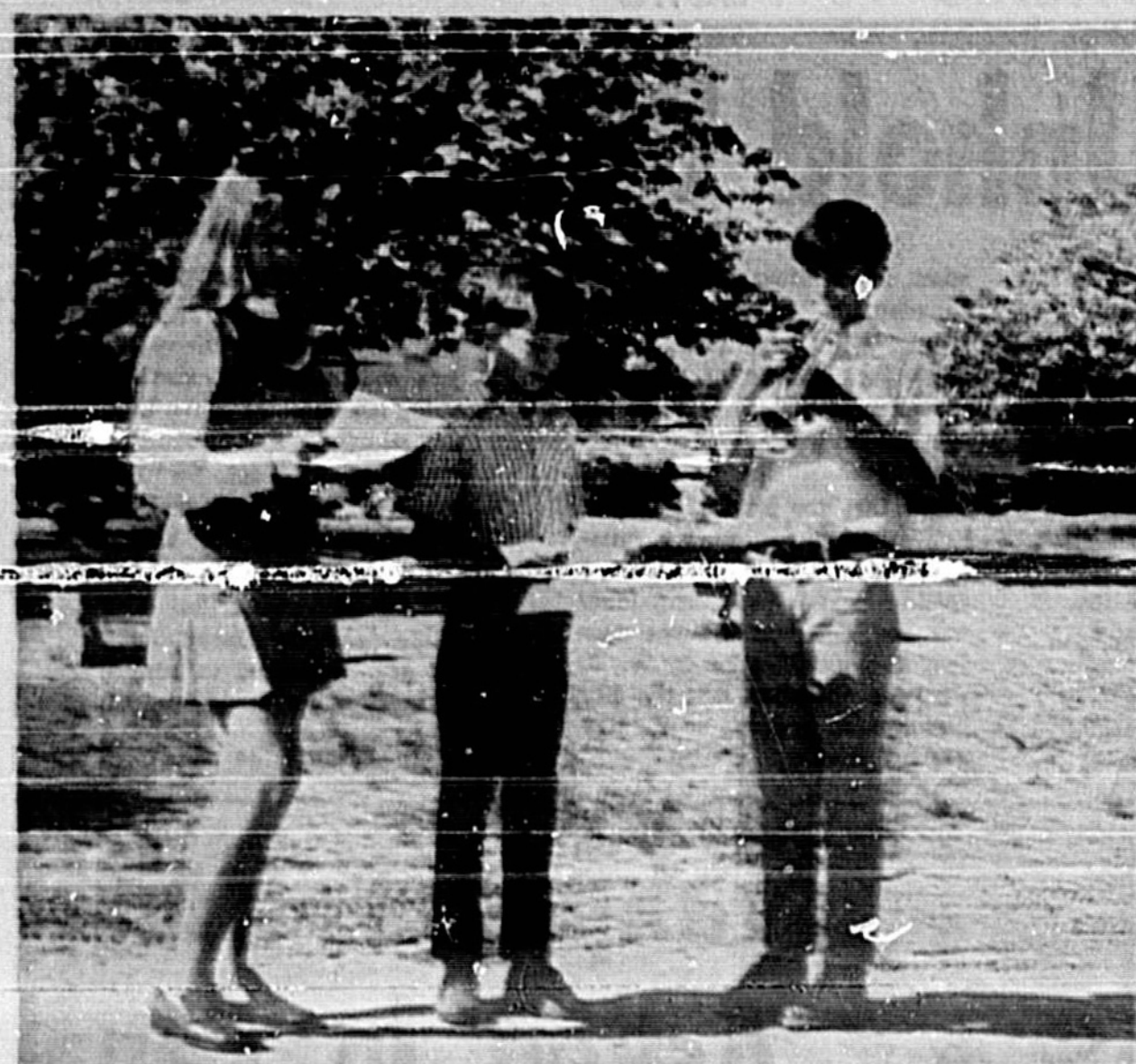
Subdivision Regulations Amended

Ex-GI Testifies On Deaths

 FT. BENNING, Ga. (AP)—Frank Beardlee, a former GI dead in Vietnam, testified today that he saw 15 to 20 dead Vietnamese women and children at My Lai. But he said that he did not see Lt. William L. Calley Jr. on the day of the assault on the hamlet.

Beardlee, 22, of Lathrop, Mich., corroborated the earlier testimony of a former Army combat photographer who said he witnessed the multiple killings of Vietnamese civilians at My Lai and also took pictures of the slayings.

Both Beardlee and a Los Angeles free lance photographer, Ronald Haebler, 28, testified they were near Calley at My Lai on March 16, 1968.

The court-martial of Calley, 27, a stubby, reddish-haired lieutenant, enters its third day today. He is charged with murder of 102 unarmed Vietnamese civilians. If convicted, he could face the death penalty or life in prison.

The prosecution made no attempt Wednesday to connect Calley with the testimony of Beardlee or Haebler. However, the Army prosecutor, Capt. Aubrey Daniel III, said he intended to establish first that mass murders did occur at My Lai on March 16, 1968.

Beardlee, a slender blond, said he went into My Lai with the third platoon and that as he approached the village he saw possibly 15 to 20 women and children.

Asked by Daniel if anyone was with the Vietnamese civilians, Beardlee replied: "Yes, American GIs."

Beardlee said later he came upon a group of Vietnamese bodies.

General Motors Men Due To Report Today

DETROIT (AP)—Workers at one strikebound General Motors plant were due to report to their jobs today for the first time in nine weeks, but the United Auto Workers international union said a back-to-work move is a second plan.

GM gave callback notices to the 5,000 hourly rated employees at a Fisher Body Division plant in Kalamazoo, Mich., and to 2,800 at a Fisher Body plant in Grand Blanc, Mich.

But the union ordered workers at the Grand Blanc plant, near Flint, not to report to work until Monday, when a tentative national contract currently being voted on is expected to go into effect.

It could not be learned why the union gave apparently contradictory orders. Union leaders at both plants have approved both the national contract and plant level agreements.

Don Ellis, UAW regional director for the Flint area, said "orders came down from the international" but that no one was to report for work until the national contract is ratified.

Spokesmen for the local at Kalamazoo said Wednesday they had received no such orders.

General Motors said it would welcome any workers who wished to return to either plant.

The pace of ratification of the national contract accelerated Wednesday as 27 locals voted approval, bringing the number of units which have ratified to 33 of 35.

The first rejection of the pact by a bargaining unit, however, was also recorded Wednesday when members of the Technical Center engineering staff in Warren, Mich., voted 4 to 27 not to ratify.

With news of the callback Wednesday, hopes rose that GM might be able to get back into full production by its target date of Dec. 1.

Reform Proposals Discussed Welfare Clients Hit Nixon, Dogs

 WASHINGTON (AP)—Welfare recipients saw a chance to tell Congress their ideas on new welfare reform proposals and attacks on several senators, as well as President Nixon and his dogs.

One woman claimed Wednesday President Nixon spends \$2,700 yearly to feed and house his three dogs while the administration proposes \$1,100 less as subsistence income for a family of four.

"I want to know who thought up \$1,600 a year when Tricky Dick's dogs cost \$2,700 a year," Roxanne Jones of Philadelphia asked a special Senate hearing on the administration's welfare reform package.

The White House said that the cost of feeding Nixon's dogs is absorbed in the President's personal budget.

The hearing presided over by Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., was marked by frequent bursts of applause, shouts of clenched fists and shouts of "Right on!"

Democratic Sens. Abraham A. Ribicoff of Connecticut, James O. Eastland of Mississippi and Russell B. Long of Louisiana all came under attack after a University of Pennsylvania professor of welfare law said the administration's plan included a work incentive feature that would provide a pool of labor

to plant crops while welfare recipients can't make ends meet with government funds.

Mrs. Jimmy Simon, executive director of the WWRO attacked Congress as argued for defecation of the administration.

"The point is," she said, "we know that if you don't have enough in that hand we bite it off."

McCarthy, in a prepared statement said "the floor was raised in the administration bill, \$1,800 for a family of four is not enough for subsistence, let alone an adequate standard of living."

Income Tax Services Offered Free By IRS

 WASHINGTON (AP)—The Internal Revenue Service, a stickler for accuracy, is offering to figure income taxes free for 30 million Americans, 3.6 million of whom fouled up their returns last year.

The IRS said Wednesday a taxpayer could qualify if he earns no more than \$20,000 a year, takes the standard 10 per cent deduction rather than itemized deductions, and has income only from salaries, wages, dividends, interest, pensions, and annuities.

In another move aimed at easing the pain of separating citizens from taxes the IRS unveiled a revamped standard deduction form—form 1040. This year the instructions on how to fill blanks are in a separate booklet, not on the back of the sheet where last year's aggravated form-fillers were forced to keep peeping.

Taxpayers who qualify for free figuring can simply fill out vital information about themselves, list their income, and send in the return, along with W-2 forms.

The government does the rest. If a taxpayer's withholding doesn't cover the amount owed, he will get a bill. If he's due a refund, that will be sent along.

Young Also To Benefit

"We are attempting to reach all households in Lake, Marion, Orange, Osceola, Seminole and Sumter counties with the Christmas Seal message," said Al West, president of the association. "The CFTDRA programs in respiratory disease, air pollution and medical education and research need to be intensified."

West announced the availability of four post-graduate stipends for study at pulmonary function seminars that will be held in New Orleans in December and at Boston in 1971. Interested applicants should contact the association for further information immediately.

Educational programs for people with emphysema and their families are being conducted on a monthly basis in Seminole and Osceola counties and a new series of programs is being planned for Orange County.

Smoking cessation classes are being held when a large enough group of patients apply for the course with their physician's approval. This service is planned to be expanded to counties outside Orange for easy accessibility by the patients.

"Air pollution activities will require a maximum educational effort with students, community groups and private citizens. With the imminent possibility of the area being included in an air quality control region we will need the full support and participation of the people in order to maintain and enhance the air in Central Florida when public hearings are scheduled," West stated.

The mobile X-ray unit, which last year took 45,559 chest X-rays, and educational programs designed to curtail smoking are other CFTDRA continuing programs that serve the community.

Penn Central Defaults On Commercial Paper

NEW YORK (AP)—The commercial paper market has long been an unglamorous area of high finance, a market in which large corporations routinely lend or borrowed from each other for short periods.

Commercial paper is an unsecured note. A company seldom can afford to keep any excess cash idle, so it lends it to another company or institution, perhaps through a dealer, for a few days or up to 270 days.

Single deals run into many millions of dollars, and the amount outstanding now totals more than \$30 billion, but the business had always been conducted solely among professionals, and so quietly as to be unknown to the public.

No longer. The default by Penn Central Transportation on its commercial paper has shaken professionals who felt there was no danger in such investments. And hearings may provide the public with a fascinating insight into this hidden world.

The background involves, among other things, incredible losses and naivete on the part of professional money men, misunderstanding of responsibilities, and a puzzling lack of knowledge about the product being bought and sold.

Regarding the last point: The Penn Central was one of the most highly publicized corporations in America. Presumably, as much or more information was known about its operation as any other, with tons available from Interstate Commerce Commission Hearings and proceedings leading to the merger of the New York Central and Pennsylvania railroads.

And yet some of its directors were uncertain about its financial condition until a few days before it filed for reorganization under the bankruptcy laws.

The firm of Goldman, Sachs Co., which bought and resold Penn Central paper, believed one month before the collapse that the company was sound.

States Pushing High Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — A decision appears imminent on a drive by 17 states to have the Supreme Court consider their suit charging the major auto manufacturers with conspiring to delay the development of anti-smog devices.
The states want the court to order General Motors, Ford, Chrysler and American Motors to equip all their cars built since 1975 with devices that would cut 185 with the carbon monoxide released annually from auto exhausts.
That would mean going to work on an estimated 85 to 100 million used cars. Even if the court agrees to consider the matter, such an order is a long way off however. First the 17 states, headed by Washington, must persuade the justices the Supreme Court is the only suitable forum to settle the suit.
Then the states would have to win their argument that the four manufacturers are guilty of conspiracy in violation of the Sherman antitrust act.
Frederic C. Tausend, a special assistant attorney general for Washington state, seemed hopeful in a telephone interview that the court would at least consider the suit.
If the states are turned down, Tausend said, they will consider filing the same kind of suit in a federal district court.
Attorneys for GM, Chrysler, Ford, American Motors and a fifth defendant, the Automobile Manufacturers Association, argue the Supreme Court is the

Wekiva Flood Plain Report Is Available

A flood plain information report on the Wekiva River was presented to County Commissioners by Col. A. S. Fullerton, district engineer of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, who said that he represented Randolph Hodges, director of the State Department of Natural Resources.
Colonel Fullerton stated that the report had been requested by the commission two years ago, and had been funded last year.
The report, he noted, indicated how the county could fit into flood plain management, and that the information is available to citizens who wish information on flooding problems in the Little Wekiva.
However, he continued, should the county wish to pursue federal flood plain insurance, this would be processed by the Department of Community Affairs.
To be eligible for this insurance the county must have a program to prevent flooding by zoning or building program requirements. Although the county is responsible for flood plain management, the state is anxious to give assistance, the engineer noted.
Sam Cowan, Jacksonville, District Corps of Engineers, distributed reports and pamphlets to the board upon the flood plain information. He mentioned that there was 45 square miles of drainage area in 25 miles in Seminole County and the rest in Orange County.
Cowan explained that the report had studied past floods in making the report and estimated that future floods would be less frequent. He mentioned that intermediate regional floods occur with a frequency of one every hundred years, but that standard projected floods are not assigned upon any frequency. Cowan explained that there were two problems in the report — estimating conditions and proposed

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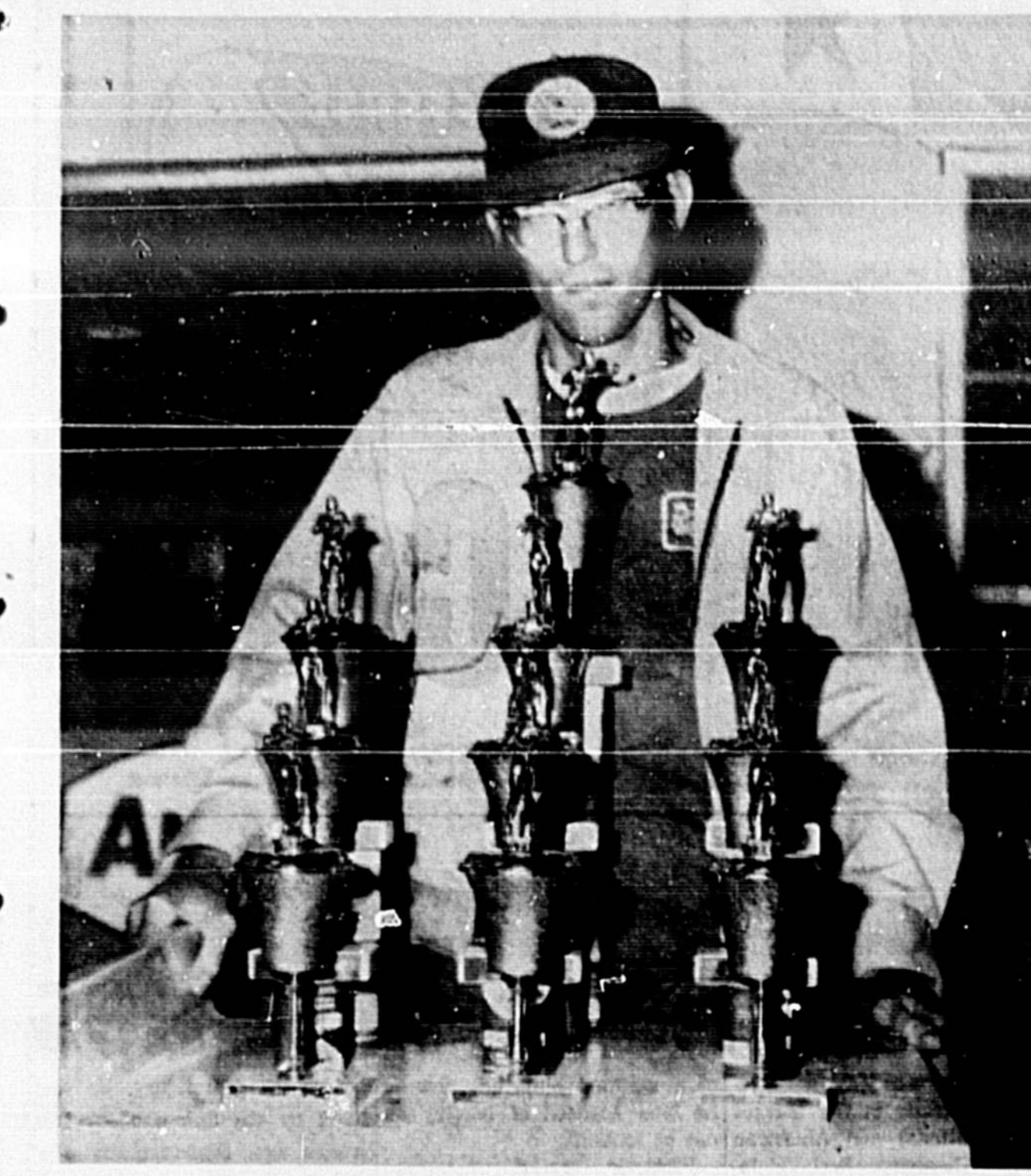

Winning teams in the first round of the playoffs will get \$32,000, survivors of the semifinal playoffs will collect \$40,000 and the winners of the championship series will get \$90,000.

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif. (UPI)—Dean Caldwell and Warren Harding are men of enduring courage and physical strength, each with a different feeling upon becoming the first to conquer a 3,000-foot sheer granite monolith.

Caldwell, 27, a photographer from Milwaukie, Ore., and Harding, 46, a surveyor from West Sacramento, Calif., completed their epic 30-day ascent of the previously unclimbed southeastern wall of El Capitan Wednesday.

"We're insane," retorted the former Harding, sponsored by his fellow adventurers one of the half-dozen best mountain climbers extant. "You have to be insane to do this."

They eventually cut back to make one day's worth scratch for two days, then for three, four and five. Finally, a couple nights ago we stopped eating altogether. "We spent a lot of time lately talking about food," Caldwell said, "and I think I smell like a beached whale."

Each of the climbers took a bruising 50-foot fall during the rain-delayed climb, which Park Information Officer Larry Quist called "a major accomplishment in the annals of sheer face rock climbing in Yosemite, if not in the United States."

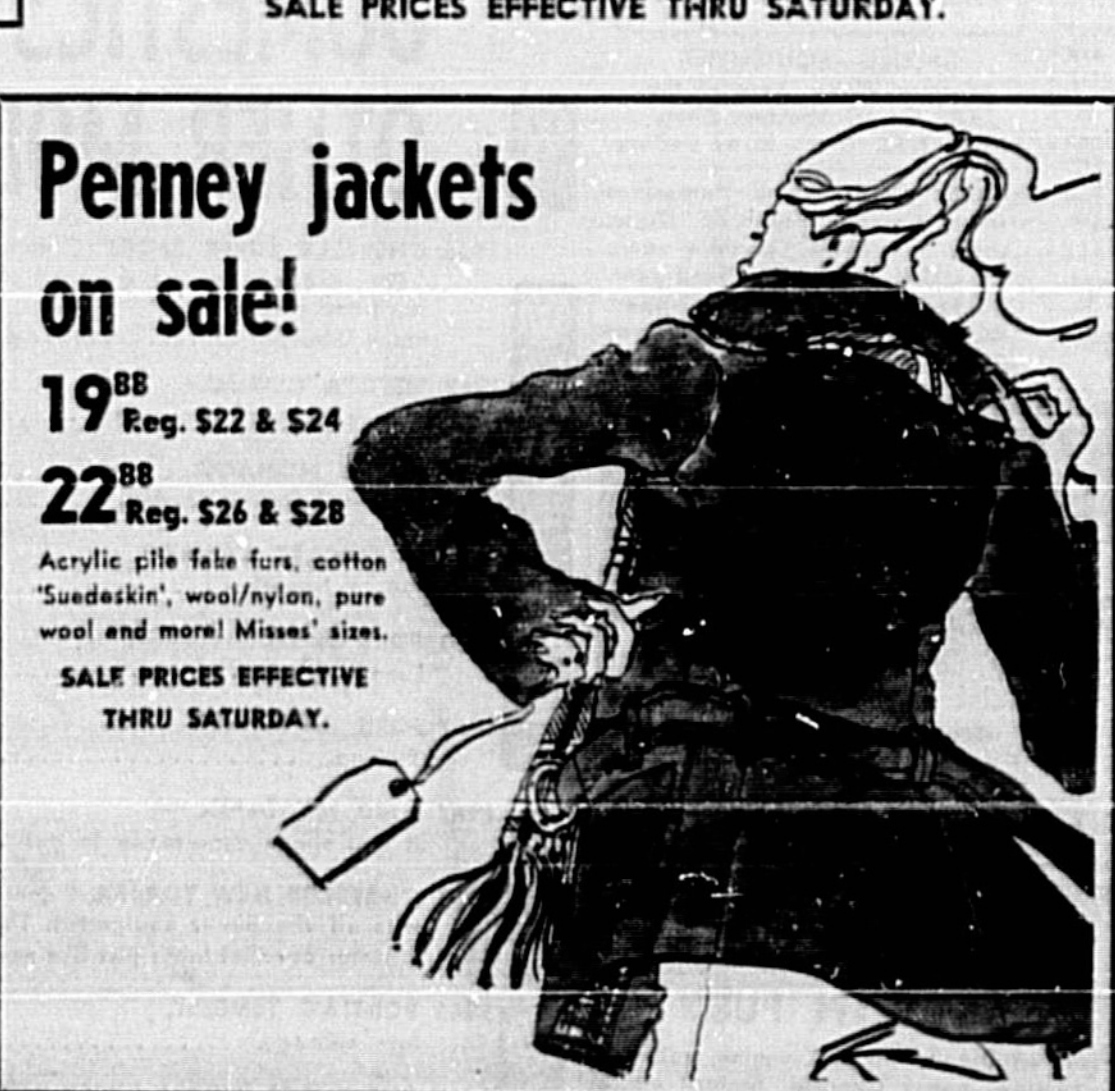

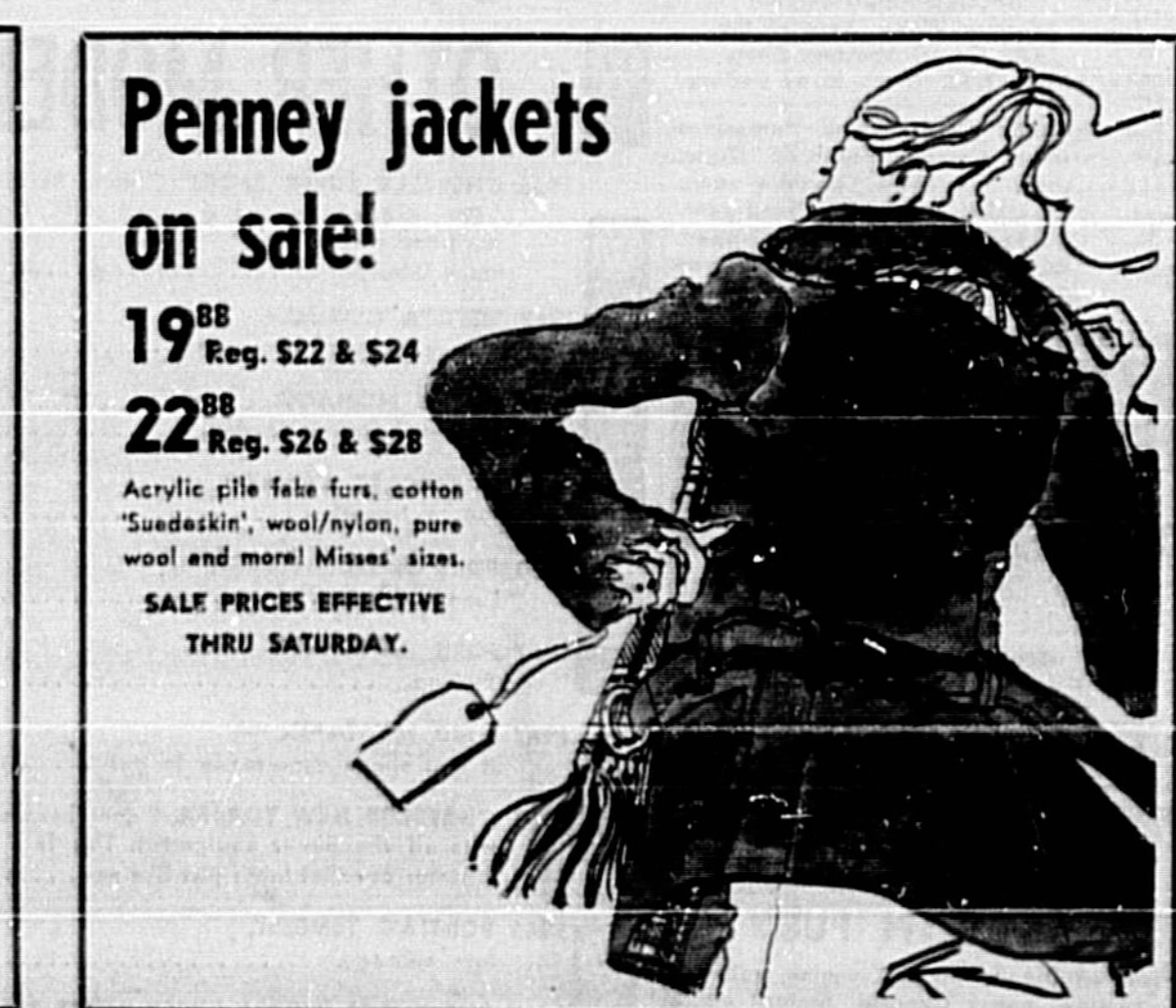

All of the children with the exception of Paul and Mark were present for the celebration with their children and families. The honored couple also has 36 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

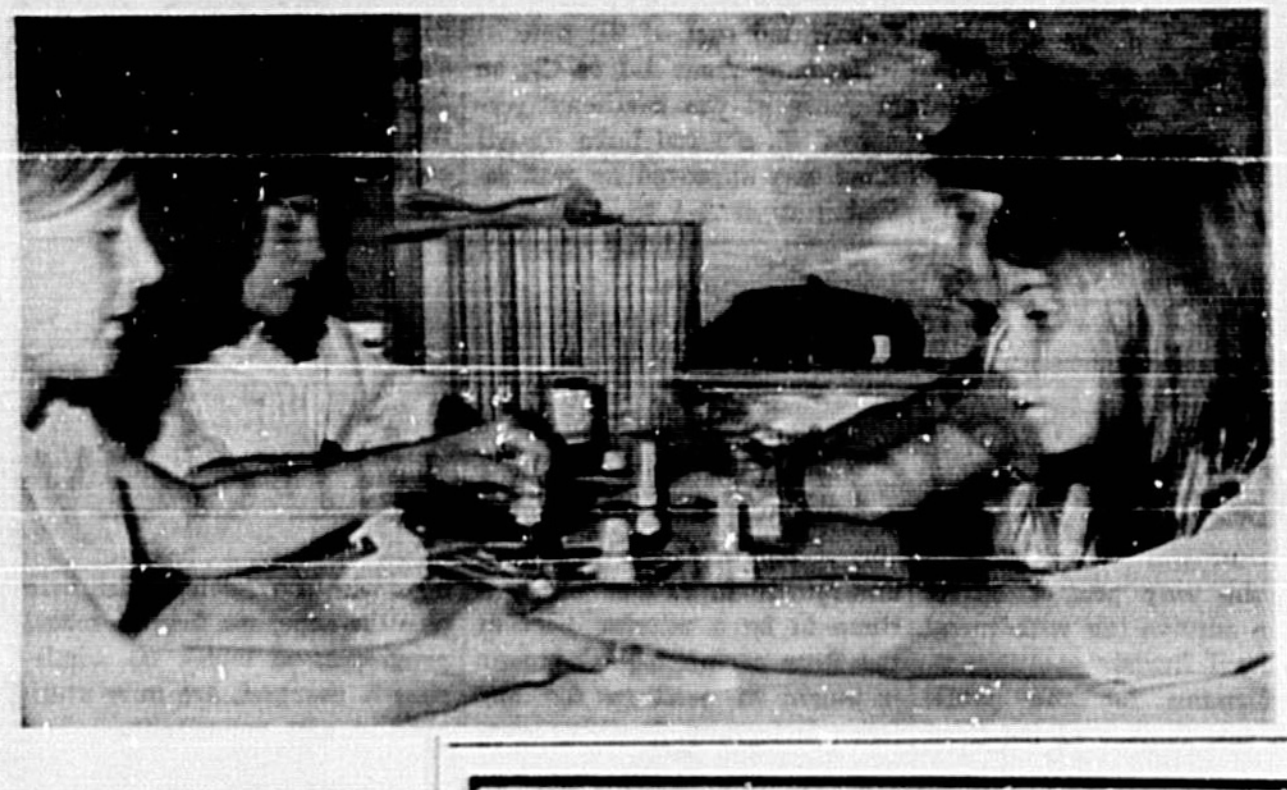
