Giant Airlines Plane Thought Lost In Crash

Missing Twelve Hours Plane Sighted From Air Apparently After Forced Landing

19 Passengers Are Endangered

Report Says Wreck- age Could Be Seen For Some Distance

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 18.—(AP)—A missing United Airlines plane with 19 persons aboard was sighted from the air today 12 miles southwest of Evanston, Wyoming. The huge transcontinental transport was discovered by Bob Berrensen, a United Airlines pilot, and Bill Williams, an observer, but they could not determine if it was badly damaged or still alive.

The pilot floor had been missing for more than 18 hours. Sixteen passengers and a crew of three were aboard when Pilot E. D. Woodard radioed at 8:19 P. M. Mountain Time, last night over Rock Springs, Wyoming, "Almighty rough. All O. K."

At that time a drizzling rain and a heavy fog blanketed southwestern Wyoming. This morning there was only a 200-foot ceiling at Cheyenne. Snow fell at Denver and spotty weather conditions prevailed generally.

Sheriff M. J. Dankowski led a ground party of 19 men into desolate foothold country south of Green River, Wyoming on the theory the Douglas airliner might have made a forced landing there. Only a few ranches are in the barren treeless country studded with buttes.

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Karl Lehmann Tells Massachusetts C Of C Of Central Florida

WORCESTER, Mass., Oct. 18.—"Central Florida has its eyes on Massachusetts and now New England," said Karl Lehmann of Tampa, Fla., secretary of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce in addressing the Traffic Division of the Worcester Chamber of Commerce this noon.

"Florida is a cosmopolitan state composed of people from all parts of the United States and of the world, and many New Englanders have come to make their home in this Southeastern section of the United States."

"In addition to this, thousands of winter visitors come from New England to Florida, and as they return they bring increasing goodwill and knowledge about this section."

"Many Floridians return annually to New England for their summer holiday and carry back with them to Florida after their season of rest, bigger enthusiasm for the development of all parts of the country."

"Florida is given now in the midst of a growth and development that resembles in some particulars the great boom of ten years ago, but the experience of the past decade is standing the leadership of the state in good stead in curbing the extravagance and inefficient performance of ten years ago," said the Lake County secretary.

Four Persons Face Death In Auto Accident

Barber Has A Close Shave, But Escapes Serious Injuries

More Hanson, W. C. Flemming, local barber, and two girl hitchhikers narrowly escaped death when the car in which they were riding left the highway and turned over several times, knocking down a power line pole. Before the bouncing auto finally came to rest.

The accident occurred about noon today near the junk yard of Ratliff and Son as Mr. Hanson attempted to pass another car on the highway. The cause of the accident was attributed to some mechanical imperfection in the steering of the car by Deputy Sheriff Carl Williams who investigated the accident.

All of the occupants of the car escaped serious injuries in the accident. Mr. Hanson received a few minor lacerations about the hand and a small bruise on the cheek and the barber sustained a minor back injury and also small lacerations but neither required medical attention.

The two girls were removed to the local hospital where they were treated for minor lacerations but were released.

The left front fender which struck and knocked down the power line pole was completely demolished. In spite of all the bumping and bouncing, there wasn't a glass in the auto broken.

France Wants 4 To 1 Deal With IL Duce

New Crisis Looms As France Insists Duce Give Up Four Volunteers For One

LONDON, Oct. 18.—(AP)—France sent the Spanish "volunteers" crisis toward a dangerous deadlock last night by insisting that Generalissimo Francisco Franco demobilize at least four of his mercenary insurgent soldiers for every man withdrawn from the loyalist ranks.

The French ambassador to London, Andrew Charles Corbin, received court orders from Paris to "stand by his guns" against the Nazi-Fascist bloc, when the London non-intervention committee meets again Tuesday.

The moribund neutrality body of 27 nations is attempting, through its chairman's sub-committee of nine powers, to find the basis of a bargain whereby Italy will call home her thousands of blackshirt legionnaires serving with Franco's insurgents.

At yesterday's meeting of the sub-committee the Italian ambassador, Dino Grandi, announced that Italy agreed to a "symbolic" withdrawal of her blackshirts, providing Franco is granted belligerent rights and an equal withdrawal is made from the loyalist forces.

Grandi demanded "equal withdrawals" while Corbin, pleading before the nine-power committee. (Continued on Page Three)

Florida Concerns Lose In Appeal To Supreme Court

Securities Commission Is Upheld In Telegram Subpoena

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Three Florida companies lost in Supreme Court today in an attack on the Securities Commission's attempt to subpoena their telegrams. The tribunal refused to review decision against the companies by the circuit court of appeals.

The latter sustained the subpoenas as well as the 1933 "trust in securities" act under which the subpoenas were issued.

Justice Black was assumed to have participated in the action announced today on approximately 30 controversies, appealed from lower courts. No announcement was made that he had not participated. An announcement usually is made when justices disqualify themselves for any reason from passing on litigation.

The refusal of the high tribunal to review the attack on the Securities Commission produced renewed speculation as to whether Black's supposed participation would give the companies grounds to challenge the court's ruling.

While the chairman of the Senate Lobby Committee, Black used the telegrams obtained by the Communications Commission which had been sent and received by persons under investigation by the committee.

The 1933 Securities Act required the registration of proposed issues of stocks with the Securities Commission.

Those attacking subpoenas were the Ryan Florida Corporation of Tampa, Income Royalties Company of St. Petersburg, and the Florida Text Oil Company of St. Petersburg.

Huge Losses Reported In Tazang Fight

"Death Battalion" Of 1,400 Chinese Is Entirely Wiped Out; 3,000 Japs Are Slain

Aircraft Raids Increase Fears

More Than 200 Chi- nese Civilians Are Killed By Bombs

SHANGHAI, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Chinese authorities said today that a "death battalion" of 1,400 Chinese troops were killed today in a battle for the possession of Tazang about five miles northwest of Shanghai.

They described the engagement in which the Chinese fought to protect their supply lines as the heaviest single encounter in the Shanghai area since the hostilities began.

Colonel Chin Ching-Wu, commander of the Chinese force at Tazang, had delayed they would fight to the last man. After 30 hours of continuous battle against the Japanese infantry supported by planes and naval guns Colonel Chin was killed and his force wiped out.

Chinese and Japanese air raids and anti-aircraft shelling caused increasing fears in the international settlement that Shanghai may suffer a repetition of "Bloody Saturday" catastrophe of August 11. There was a growing demand among foreign residents for some sort of evacuation area. Resuming bombing of civilian areas outside Shanghai, Japanese planes were said to have killed and wounded more than 200 Chinese mostly peasants.

The Japanese appeared to have suffered their severest reverses of the Chinese war in the northwest campaign where "flying columns" of Chu Teh, China's famed "Red Napoleon," reportedly had cut through their rear guard and isolated three divisions.

Japanese deprecated the report, pointing out that even if it were true, Japanese advances in Hopei, where they have penetrated to within 60 miles of the Honan border, would counteract reverse in Shansi to the west making it impossible for Chinese to hold out any length of time.

Nevertheless, reports from both sides indicated the veteran Eighth Route army, composed of campaigners of the old "Red Army" and crack National troops, had put a crimp in the general northwest campaign and made it necessary for the Japanese to rush reinforcements.

Chinese sources said Chu Teh had not only endangered the badly-stretched Japanese line of communications in to Shansi from the north, striking at the vital Yenman Pass which controls the north-south movement of troops in that area, but also had smashed the Japanese back at the Great Wall Pass at Ningzang, where a column from Hopei was driving westward toward Taiyuan-Fu, the Shansi capital.

Chinese reports also said a detachment of 3000 Japanese troops had been cut off at Nanshusun, in Northern Shansi, and two-thirds of them moved down by Chinese communists.
