## Pioneer Resident Succumbs

Edwin Bennett Randall Jr., 81, founder of Randall Electric Company in Sanford, died at 9:15 a.m. Monday at Seminole Memorial Hospital after an illness of several months.

Born April 19, 1887, in St. Augustine, he moved to Sanford in September, 1901. He founded Randall Electric at 112 Magnolia Avenue in 1922 and operated the business until the early 1950s, at which time it was sold to Sidney Vilhes Sr., present owner-operator.

He was a member of the Congregational Church in Sanford, was worshipful master of Sanford Lodge 52, F.A.M. in 1924, and was president of the Sanford Kiwanis Club in 1943. He was listed in "Who's Who in Sanford" in April, 1953, and is credited with installing the first "White Way" in Sanford.

Survivors are a sister, Mrs. Anna M. Randall, of Daytona Beach, and a niece, Mrs. Alice Randall Davenport, and a nephew, Lawrence H. Randall, both of Knoxville, Tenn.

Funeral services will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. Thursday in the chapel at Gramkow Funeral Home with Dr. Harold A. Harris of Sanford Congregational Church officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

# County Building Boom Tops \$20 Million Mark

## Record Of 1958 Topples

Seminole County had the biggest building year in its history during the fiscal year which ended yesterday, far surpassing the boom year of 1958, Robert Brown, county zoning director, reported to The Herald today.

Brown said building permits for construction valued at \$20,212,070 were issued during 1967-68 and the end of the boom is not in sight.

After the books closed at noon yesterday permits for some \$75,000 in new construction were issued and one for the new Pinebreeze Farm Eggs Processing Plant on Sanford Avenue valued at \$13,000 was issued this morning.

The county zoning office has been put on notice that permit will be requested momentarily for the new \$2,785,000 Lyman High School.

In addition, permit for the \$2 million apartment complex dubbed "Valley Forge" to be located on SR 426 west of Altamonte Springs is expected to be requested in the next week to 10 days.

Total value of building permits issued during the 1967-68 fiscal year was \$3,477,275, less than half of the value of construction in the fiscal year just ended.

County's office reports new construction is almost equally divided among apartments, single family dwellings and commercial and industrial ventures.

Some \$2,008,501 in new construction was begun in Seminole in the month of September.

## Pinebreeze In Expansion

Pinebreeze of Sanford broke ground today with a host of dignitaries on hand at Sanford Industrial Park to watch the preliminary steps to what will be a doubling of existing Pinebreeze facilities and the future employment of approximately 75 persons to peak plant capacity.

Located on three acres, the new operation will expand its processing facilities to 35,000 square feet with a weekly output of approximately 75 million eggs.

New plant is expected to be ready for occupancy by end of January with other state operations both here and in Tampa expected to be phased out.

On hand for today's ceremonies were Pinebreeze officials Bernard Johann and Jesse Rowe, president and vice president, respectively, from general offices in Jacksonville.

Some of the VIPs introduced by Kridler included: Howard Hodges, president of Sanford Atlantic National Bank; George Touhy, executive vice president of First Federal; Scott Burns, chairman of Chamber's Industrial committee; William Jarman, local Pinebreeze manager; Roy Lane, executive vice president of Sanford Atlantic National Bank and treasurer of Sanford - Seminole Development Company.

Representatives from H&H and Cobia were also present for the ceremonies.

Pinebreeze Farms processes all eggs sold in Wm-Dixie supermarkets and services areas in Florida and the north-eastern states.

## County OKs Dog Worker

Control of unlicensed dogs was apparently solved today with authorization by County Commissioners to hire an animal control worker.

The board approved the hiring of the worker to be under control of the Health Department (Animal Control Officer Val Robbins, specifically with extension of the service to be furnished by the county general fund.

The Commission also with the authorization of the worker requested Supervisor Elliot to turn over a truck, transferred by the county to his office several years ago for picking up animals, and to turn over equipment on hand and new equipment authorized in his budget for the animal problem.

In other business at the meeting, Road Supt. J. C. Lavender was directed to proceed with construction of a 18-foot wide asphalt strip along the right-of-way of Oxford Road to be used as a "student separation lane" for walking students and bicyclists traveling to and from English Estates School.

District Commissioner Robert Parker recommended the action be taken to assure the safety of walking and bicycling students to the school.

He said little co-operation is being received from the Sheriff's Department on the traffic problem and pointed out further that many of the worst traffic offenders of the speed limits are parents transporting their children to school.

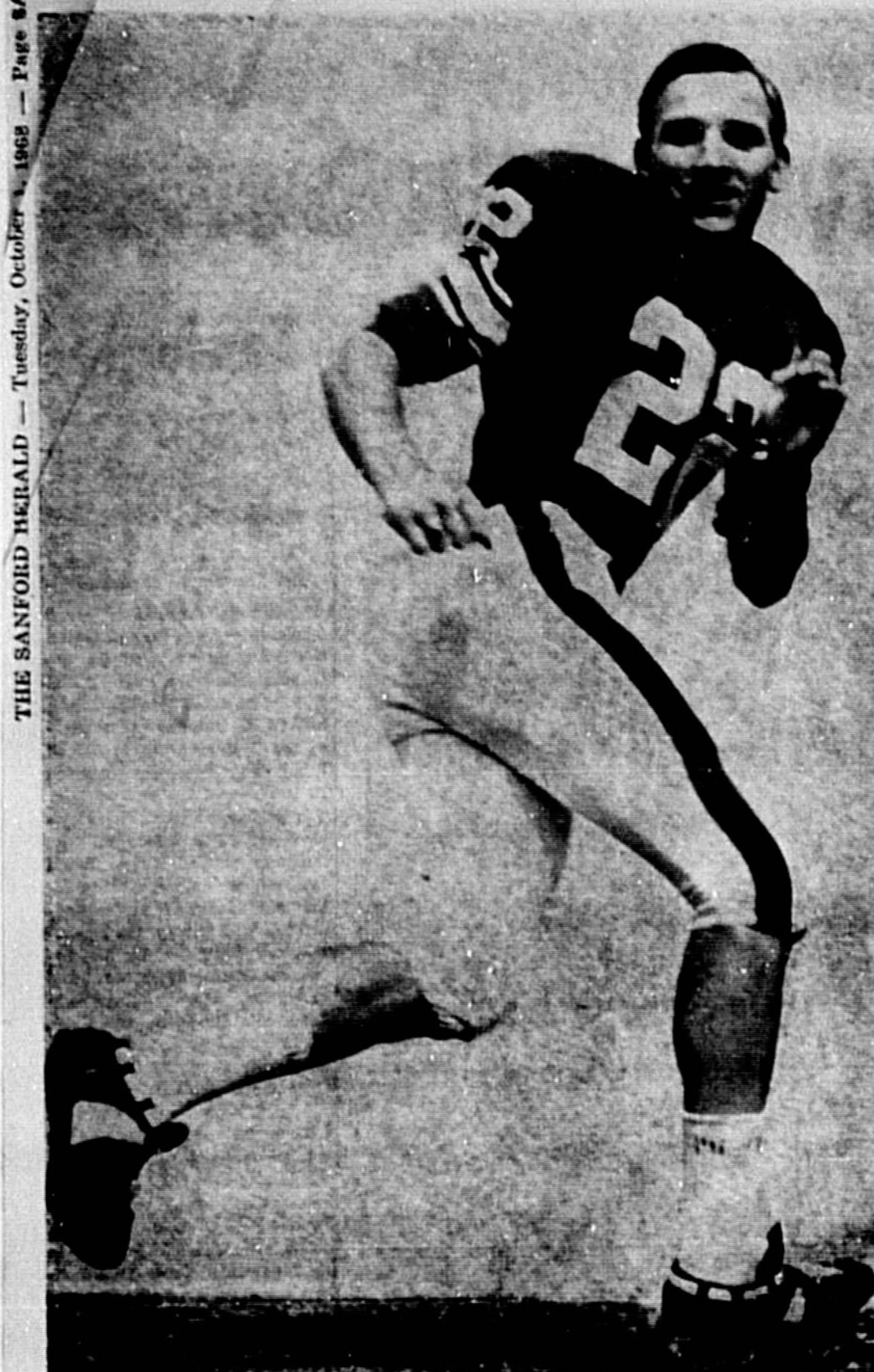

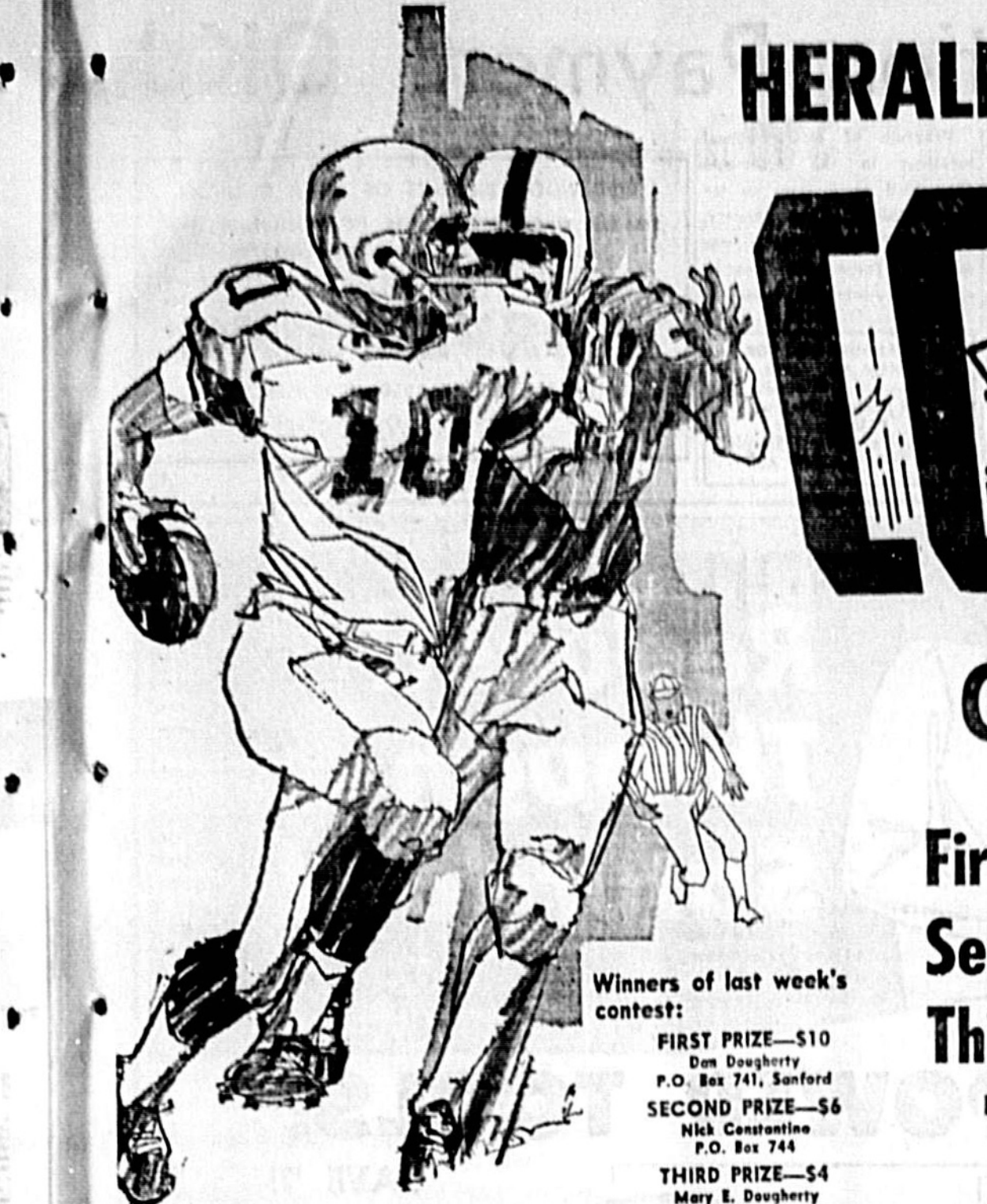

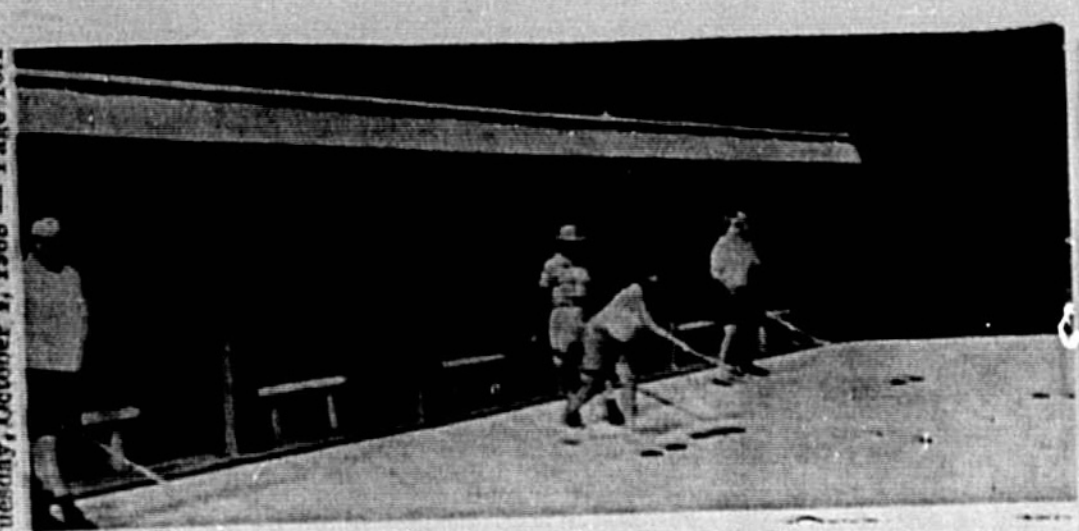

# HHH Would Stop Bombing For Peace

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey says if elected president he would stop the bombing of North Vietnam as an "acceptable risk" for peace if Hanoi shows willingness to restore the demilitarized zone.

In his first paid nationwide television broadcast Monday night, and speaking from Salt Lake City, Humphrey urged the Democratic presidential candidate to stop the bombing of the North as an acceptable risk for peace because he believes it could lead to success in the negotiations and a shorter war. This would be the best protection for our troops.

"North Vietnam, according to its own statements and those of others, has said it will proceed promptly and in good faith negotiations if we stop the present level of violence in either North or South Vietnam. We must seek to de-escalate."

He based his stance on the bombing halt by citing the Democratic platform which says the next president should take reasonable risks to find peace in Vietnam, and it noted: "The ultimate key to an honorable solution must be free elections in South Vietnam."

"The ultimate key to an honorable solution must be free elections in South Vietnam," Humphrey added that "if the government of North Vietnam were to show bad faith, I would reserve the right to resume the bombing."

There was no immediate response to Humphrey's speech from Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, a fellow Minnesota Democrat who was the vice president's principal rival at the Democratic convention in Chicago.

But Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, whose late brother, Robert, was another Humphrey rival for Democratic nomination, sent a congratulatory telegram. He wired Humphrey: "To all who look for peace in Vietnam, you have given great encouragement and hope. To all who seek new and more constructive directions in American foreign policy in the nuclear age, you have taken a position of distinct leadership."

They are the only candidates for president who has offered the American people proposals for ending the war in Vietnam. Aides to the vice president made a point of emphasizing that, "We have made no effort" to inform President Johnson in

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# Fortas' Friends Accepting Defeat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supporters of Abe Fortas' nomination to be chief justice soon are expected to accept defeat in their effort today to kill a filibuster against the appointment.

On the eve of today's crucial vote whether to limit debate, Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., floor leader of the nomination, applied his forced retirement when he commended Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., for supporting Fortas.

"It may well be that the present debate is the only opportunity we will have for such speeches," Hart said Monday in an obvious reference to the slim chances that exist for stopping the filibuster.

Hart joined another Fortas backer, Sen. Joseph Tydings, D-Md., in the melancholy assessment. Tydings Sunday predicted flatly that the filibuster could not be beaten.

Senate Democratic Majority Leader Mike Mansfield said the margin of any defeat would determine whether he'd drop the nomination or make another attempt later in the week to limit debate.

Mansfield said when Minority Leader Everett Dirksen announced his opposition last week that Dirksen's switch made it tough to get the two-third vote necessary to limit debate.

Fortas' leading opponent, Sen. Robert F. Griffin, on the other hand, was elated about the situation.

"After today," said the Michigan Republican, "the Senate will stand taller in the scheme of government. We make it clear that we not only claim but we intend once again to exercise with care and diligence the constitutional power to advise and consent."

His remarks were in a speech prepared for delivery prior to the vote.

Today's vote was on a motion to bring the nomination to the Senate floor.

Several Fortas opponents argued in Monday's debate that no vacancy exists, and the Senate should not even consider the nomination.

The argument was based on the circumstances under which

## Commission Split 3-2 County Hassles On Roads

Partial county road program for fiscal 1969 was adopted by the Board of County Commissioners yesterday afternoon on a three-to-two vote. Voting against the \$147,200 partial plan were Commissioners W. Lawrence Swofford and John Alexander. Swofford termed the program the "worst" the county has ever adopted and warned during consideration of the plan that he intended to make it an issue.

He further urged that funds be set aside for use when road work is needed for school walks are determined. Some \$12,800 of budgeted road funds were left unappropriated with the plan as adopted.

Alexander first defended the program and then cast his vote against it when Lake Emma Road in his district was not included.

Projects were Grapeville Avenue extension, \$5,000; Uptala Road widening and resurfacing, \$14,000; and Rantoul Lane, \$3,500 in district five (Commissioner John Fitzpatrick) for a total of \$22,500.

District four (Commissioner Robert Parker)—Lake Howell Lane \$1,000; Derbyshire Road resurfacing \$1,200; Lakewood Stores, resurfacing, \$2,500; Fernwood Blvd., \$4,500; Snow Hill Road, \$13,000; Charlotte St. extension, \$13,000; Melody Lane, \$4,900; and North Street, \$4,900 for total of \$53,700.

District three (Commissioner Swofford)—Magnolia Street extension, \$2,000; Raymond Avenue, \$1,500; Palm Springs Road, \$15,900; Tulane Ave., \$1,900; Forest Lake Drive, \$7,500; and Spring Lake School access (sidewalk and foot bridge) \$3,900 for total of \$37,500.

District two (Commissioner Alexander)—missing link of Lake Mary Blvd., \$4,000 and Onora extension, \$13,900 for total of \$17,900.

District one—(Commissioner Edward Yarbrough)—Brisson Avenue, \$6,900; Sipes Avenue, \$4,000; Onora-Olivia resurfacing, \$7,000 and North Cameron Avenue resurfacing, \$3,000 for total of \$20,900.

Estimates of cost for the projects were for materials only and do not include labor and equipment costs.

Seminole Junior College Board of Trustees last night approved student policy regarding discipline of students as already outlined in college catalogue.

The action by trustees affirms existing policy governing student conduct and all low SJC students to use only drugs prohibited by a physician, prohibits the use of alcoholic beverages and forbids cheating, gambling, hazing or wearing apparel termed to be disruptive to the school.

Dr. Earl Weldon, SJC president, said there had been no incident at the school which provoked this restatement of already existing policy, but he felt trustees' action was required to affirm rules of conduct.

Trustee Chairman S. Joseph Davis Jr. asked Dr. Weldon if any steps were being taken to work the curriculum of the college into the needs of local industry.

Davis said he felt college should approach industry here and ask what subjects could be instituted at college to serve local needs.

President Weldon revealed that college enrollment for the fall quarter now totals 1,825 students and said he did not know when federal funds from U. S. Health, Education and Welfare would be made available for construction of permanent facilities.

Approved moving two in-house full time noncertificated secretaries to registrar.

Approved waiver of fees for two students and deleted two waivers.

Authorized Weldon to proceed with taking of bids for equipment for drafting and audio-visual departments.

Authorized school to request additional Title I and Title VI grants from government.

Approved moving two instructors to another pay rank after verification of master's degree.
