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# Homemakers

# Corner

By Mrs. H. L. Johnson  
Have had several requests for two recipes that I tried out on my family. So here they are:

### FRUIT COCKTAIL PUDDING

1 cup flour  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. soda  
1 egg, well beaten  
1 303 can fruit cocktail (well drained)  
1 cup brown sugar  
1/4 cup nuts (I used black walnuts)  
1/4 tsp. cinnamon (optional)

Sift the flour and sugar, salt, soda together, add well beaten egg. Add drained fruit cocktail, mix well. Don't get discouraged that it is too dry because it will mix just right. Pour into well greased large oblong pan, sprinkle well-mixed brown sugar and nuts over top. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 45 minutes or a 300 degree oven for 1 hour. Serve with whipped cream or this sauce.

### HEALTHY BAR CAKE

This is very delicious. Can be stored and eaten at a later date.

3 cups brown sugar  
3 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup butter  
1 egg, beaten  
1 cup milk  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. vanilla

Stir sugar into flour and mix well. With a pastry blender or mixer cut in butter until mixture is like cornmeal. Measure out 1 cup of the mixture and set aside for use in the topping. To rest of mixture add egg, milk, soda and salt and vanilla, beat well. Pour into greased and floured 9 by 13 by 5 pan, spread with topping and bake in 350 degree oven for 35 minutes.

### TOPPING

Put 6 Health Bars in freezer. When hard, break up with hammer leaving the wrapper on. Remove crushed bars from wrappers and add to brown sugar mixture and the nuts. Blend well and spread on top of cake.

### SPICED SHORT RIBS

3 lbs. beef short ribs  
1/4 cup flour  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
3 tbsps. lard or drippings  
1 cup water  
1 cup dried prunes  
1 cup dried apricots  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 tsp. allspice  
1/4 tsp. ground cloves  
3 tbsps. vinegar

Combine flour, salt and pepper. Dredge meat with seasoned flour. Brown meat on all sides in lard or drippings. Cover lightly and simmer 1 1/2 hours. Pour off drippings. Add water, prunes and apricots, sugar, cinnamon, allspice, cloves and vinegar. Cover lightly and continue simmering 1 hour or until tender. Serve fruit over short ribs. Thicken liquid with remaining seasoned flour, for gravy if desired. Serves 6.

### DIXIE PORK CHOPS

6 pork rib chops, 1 in. thick  
3 tbsps. lard  
3 tbsps. flour  
1 cup water  
1 tsp. vinegar  
1 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. sage  
5 apples, cored and cut in rings  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1/4 cup raisins

Brown pork chops in lard or drippings. Remove pork chops from frying-pan. Add flour to drippings and blend. Add water and vinegar and cook until thick. Return chops to frying-pan and season with salt and sage. Place apple rings on chops and sprinkle with brown sugar. Add raisins. Cover lightly and simmer 45 minutes to 1 hour or until done. Serves 6.

### FAMILY REUNION HAM LOAF

3 lbs. ground smoked ham  
3 lbs. ground pork  
3 eggs, beaten  
1 can (16 1/2 oz.) evaporated milk  
1 can (10 1/2 oz.) condensed tomato soup  
1 cup cracker crumbs

Combine all ingredients thoroughly. Pack into 3 by 3 by 5" loaf pans or form into 2 loaves, each about 9 in. long and place in a large roasting pan. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 1/2 hours. Serve hot or cold. This will serve 24 people.

### CHERRY MEAT MUFFINS

2 cans (12 oz. each) luncheon meat  
1 1/4 cups soft bread crumbs  
2 eggs well beaten  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1 tbsps. prepared mustard  
Grease 12 medium muffin pans. Mash the luncheon meat with a fork. Combine meat, bread crumbs, eggs, brown sugar and mustard and mix thoroughly. Pack mixture into muffin tins, filling each full. Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees 20 to 25 minutes or until lightly browned. Serve hot with Cherry Sauce. Serves 6 to 8.

### CHERRY SAUCE

1 can (16 oz.) sour pitted cherries  
1 tbsps. cornstarch  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 tsp. red food coloring  
Drain cherries and save juice. Add water to juice, if necessary to make 1 cup. Combine cornstarch, sugar and liquid. Mix well. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick and clear. Add cherries and red food coloring. Serve hot. Makes 2 cups.

### GINGERBREADS

2 cups light brown sugar  
5 cups sifted flour  
1 cup milk  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1 tsp. ginger  
1 cup lard  
2 eggs  
1 tsp. vinegar  
1/4 cup dark molasses

Sift together flour, soda, salt and ginger. Cream lard and sugar. Add eggs and beat well. Add vinegar and molasses. Mix in dry ingredients and roll in balls about the size of a walnut. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) to 10 to 12 minutes or until done. Makes 6 dozen.

### CABBAGE ROLLS

3 cups mashed potatoes  
1 medium onion  
1 green pepper  
salt and pepper  
1 cup cold cooked meat, ground or chopped celery salt  
cabbage leaves  
boiling water or stock  
sage to taste

Combine the vegetables, meat and seasonings and shape the mixture into small rolls. Roll each of these in a wilted cabbage leaf (wilted by placing in boiling water for 5 minutes) and place them in a greased baking dish. Add sufficient boiling water or stock to cover them about halfway. Cover and bake in a moderate oven until the cabbage leaves are tender.

### CAULIFLOWER AU GRATIN

1 medium sized cauliflower  
1 1/4 cups thin white sauce  
1/4 cup cheese  
salt and paprika  
buttered crumbs

When the white sauce is smooth, add the cheese, salt and paprika, and pour the sauce over the cooked cauliflower. Turn the mixture into a buttered baking-dish. Cover with buttered crumbs. Brown in a moderate oven 350 to 400 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes.

To prepare cauliflower for cooking: Remove the green and imperfect leaves from the cauliflower and place it top downward in a dish of cold water to draw out the dust and other impurities. Leave whole or break into flowers, boil until tender in a

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef  
3 medium eggplants  
1 medium onion chopped fine  
1/4 cup chopped bell pepper  
1/4 cup cooked rice  
1/4 cup fine bread crumbs

### MOCK CREME BRULEE

## 'Leaning Tower' Threatened

FLORENCE, Italy (UPI)—The ground under the Leaning Tower of Pisa "may reach the limit of its resistance soon," a leading architect said Wednesday night.

Prof. Nello Borzadori, superintendent of Monuments for Pisa, warned the situation is "grave."

He is one of several experts who have warned in recent months of the increasing danger to the tower.

Borzadori suggested propping up the tower with hydraulic jacks and installing a new foundation to fill the area where the earth is now soft and threatening to give way.

This would restore the tower to the position it held when it was completed in the 14th century — still leaning, but not leaning quite as much as it is now.

## Ivanov Top Russian Name

MOSCOW (UPI)—The most popular surname in the Russian part of the Soviet Union is Ivanov, the equivalent of Johnson, the government newspaper Ivestia reported Wednesday.

Ivestia said in Moscow alone there are 80,000 Ivanovs out of a population of about 7 million. Other popular names are Kuznetsov (Smith), Petrov (Peters) and Popov (Pope).

## Britain May Be Facing New 'Ice Age'

LONDON (UPI)—Hubert Lamb, an official long-range weather forecaster, said Wednesday Britain may be heading for a "little ice age."

Lamb, a member of the meteorological office team that procures Britain's monthly weather forecasts, wrote in the magazine 'Discovery' that the records going back to the year 800 indicate the weather has an 800-year cycle.

He said after the 12th century the weather deteriorated and reached its worst in the 16th century, when most of Europe suffered from harsh winters and wet summers. In the 17th century it began to warm up and reached its best about 1800.

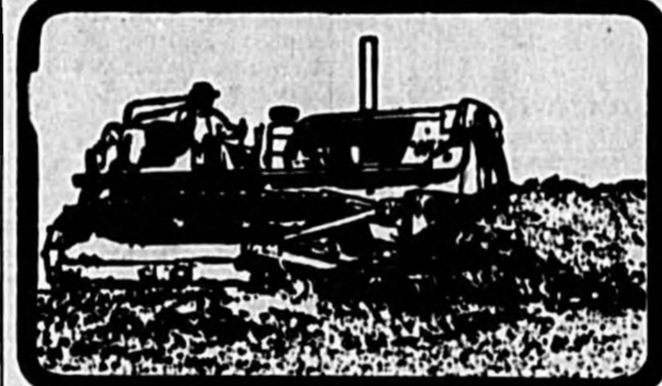
The past two cold winters may be the first signs of another long-term decline in Britain's usually mild climate, he said.

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### Another Day Of Picketing For Atlanta

 Atlanta braced for picketing and counter-picketing by bands of militant young Negroes and the once-dreaded Ku Klux Klan today following unsuccessful attempts by Mayor Ivan Allen to restore racial peace.

Grand Dragon Calvin Craig of the Georgia KKK promised that members of his organization would show up at each racial demonstration "until the Negroes quit this demonstrating and ruining people's businesses."

Craig made his promise after leaders of the desegregation movement spurred a Monday demonstration.

Mayor Ivan Allen's plea Wednesday for a 30-day cooling-off period in the demonstrations which have brought more than 200 arrests.

Appearance of thousands at a mass racial protest last week brought jeers of "toothless tigers" from angry Negroes and almost touched off a serious clash.

Negro and white pickets demanding integrated classes in Cleveland, Ohio, schools engaged in a shouting match Wednesday with a crowd of about 150 jeering whites.

## U. S. Watches Developments

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U. S. officials closely watched developments in South Vietnam today, but were unable to assess immediately what effect the peaceful coup d'état would have on the war against Communist guerrillas.

They said that Maj. Gen. Nguyen Khanh and two paratrooper colonels had been successful in overthrowing the military junta which had ruled the strategic Southeast Asian nation for nearly three months since it deposed Ngo Dinh Diem's regime.

However, officials were puzzled by the new leaders' hint that the latest overthrow was necessary because the junta was conspiring with France to "neutralize" Viet Nam as Laos has been neutralized.

The ousted rulers had repeatedly denounced the "neutralization" idea suggested by French President Charles de Gaulle. And spokesman for De Gaulle has reportedly said that the French leader was talking only in very long-range terms and had no immediate neutralization plan.

## Dearborn Reopening Rests On Finding Plant

 Resumption of operations by Dearborn Electronics Laboratories, Inc., will depend primarily upon the firm being able to find adequate quarters.

F. X. Dorgan, executive vice president, during a press conference Wednesday, said the company has problems at least most numerous to mention in finding a building in which to operate.

This is going to be no easy task since the operations of the firm must be carried out in an atmosphere where the humidity is completely controlled and air filtering systems must keep the plant's interior virtually dust free.

The company was founded in 1953 in Chicago. In 1959 the firm moved to its present Florida site and initially employed only 12 people. Prior to the fire which destroyed the plant on US 17 92 Monday morning, the company manufactured highly reliable, miniature capacitors, filters and other allied components.

Many of these components are used by the aerospace industry, in national defense, and by the Atomic Energy Commission.

The prime reasons for the firm locating in Florida were the availability of good labor market and the need for a cleaner atmosphere. Even with this condition, rigid controls are still required internally to introduce only highly filtered air into the plant.

A speck of dust within a component reduces the reliability considerably.

In August of 1960, the company expanded their facilities to total over 15,000 square feet and employed over 100 persons. This expansion was undertaken due to the increased demand for its components.

There are 65 firms in this country manufacturing various types of capacitors. Dearborn, however, is considered a specialty house in that it produces a specific type of capacitor.

Benjamin Navan, chairman of the board, said that Dearborn had become widely known in the field since it has been able to fill orders within a matter of a few days or weeks rather than maintain a huge backlog of orders as do most other similar firms.

The expansion program undertaken in 1960 made Dearborn one of the largest designers and manufacturers of electronic components in the Southeast. Prior to the fire the firm employed approximately 130 persons.

## Rogers Seeks Re-Election

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Florida Democratic congressman Don Fuqua and Paul S. Rogers announced Wednesday they would seek re-election in November.

Rogers, of West Palm Beach, said he would base his campaign on the record he had established in representing the Sixth District for the past 10 years.

Fuqua, the youngest Democrat in the Congress, said he had represented the Ninth District in North Florida on the basis of what he felt was best for the nation, state and his constituents.

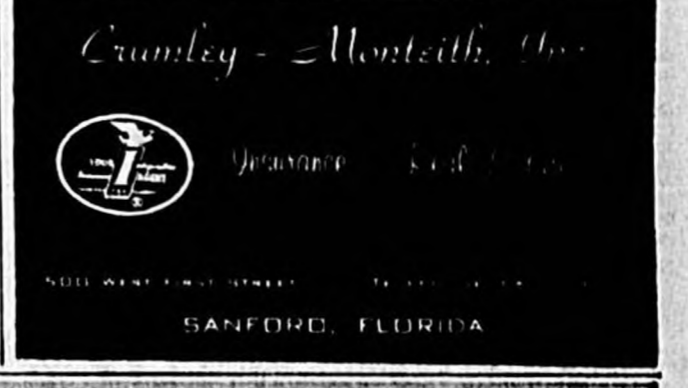

## 'Dardenella'? Selvin First To Record It

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Being ever interested in the fine arts, I had a talk this week with the music consultant for a mining company.

At first glance, that title might not look very impressive. But when I tell you that the consultant is none other than Ben Selvin, it still does not look very impressive.

Let us face it, Selvin is not one of the world's 10 best known men. You probably

could drop his name from here to New Market, Va., without hearing a single grunt of recognition.

In a way, this is rather paradoxical, because Selvin has for the last 50 years been one of the leading figures in the popular music field.

Know who made the first record "Dardenella" to sell more than a million copies? Selvin. Know who has recorded more music than any other man in the world, being responsible for some 9,000 discs? Selvin.

Benny Goodman used to play in Selvin's orchestra. So did Tommy Dorsey, Meredith Wilson and Jerry Colonna, who started out as a trombonist. So did Eugene Ormandy, the symphonic conductor.

Know who was the first orchestra leader to have a dance program on radio? Selvin.

Okay, if Selvin has done all of these things, how come he is not more famous than he is?

Well, one reason is that he used a lot of aliases.

During his peak productive years, in the 1920s, he made records for nine different companies, using nine different names.

If he and his orchestra were recording a waltz, they called themselves the Cavaliers. If it happened to be a Latin number, they became the Castilians. For show tunes, they were the Knickerbockers.

Selvin also directed the Harbor Society Orchestra, the Newport Society Orchestra, the Broadway Syncopators, the Southampton Serenaders, the Harmonians and the Ben Selvin Novelty Orchestra—all of which were the same outfit.

In addition, he worked for several record companies as the anonymous conductor of the studio orchestra, or "house band."

Know who was at the baton when Jimmy Durante first recorded "Inka Dinka Do"? Selvin. Know who started Bing Crosby whistling? Selvin.

Recently, he came out of retirement to serve as consultant to the Minneapolis Mining and Manufacturing Co., which is bringing out a new line of tape recorders.

Know who gave Eddie Fisher his first big break? Eddie Cantor. After all, Selvin could not do everything.

## Russia Charges Cyprus Plot By U. S., Britain

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union charged today that Britain and the United States plan "aggression" against Cyprus and warned them not to endanger peace by landing troops on the island.

The Tass news agency disclosed that the Cyprus government told the Soviet government that "there is now a serious danger of aggression against Cyprus."

A Tass statement called on the Western powers to refrain from steps that would "complicate the situation in that area of the globe."

In London, Britain's proposal to send a NATO peace force to the strife-torn island appeared to be gaining support. The United States was said to be the key to the plan, and the Johnson administration was understood to be in favor of some form of U. S. participation in the force, if diplomatic steps also were taken to settle the crisis.

Tass said Russia supports Cyprus' independence "and denounces any attempts of foreign interference in the internal affairs of . . . Cyprus, no matter under what pretext or form it may be carried out."

Informed sources at the London peace conference on Cyprus said other NATO countries were likely to go along with the British peace force proposal if Washington is agreeable.

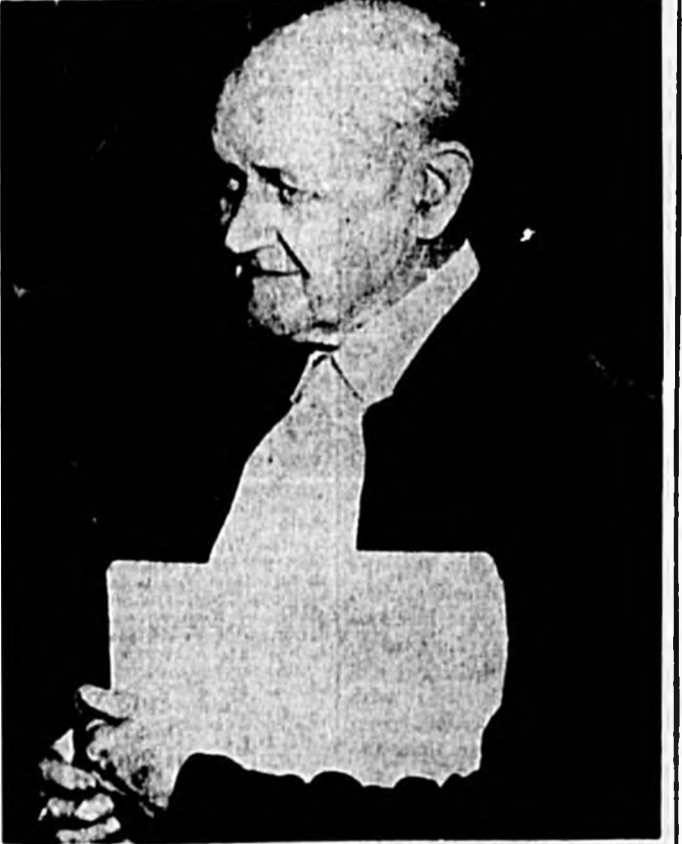

#### "Hot Stove League Dinner"

With all of the major league talent, scouts, coaches, managers and what not who winter in Florida, some organization (established or to be established) is missing the boat in not sponsoring a Central Florida-wide hot stove league dinner.

In many sections of the nation, particularly in California, this is one of the main attractions for baseball fans during the off season.

It shouldn't be too difficult to get a dozen or so of baseball's personalities to appear at such a gathering which usually is geared for men and boys. At this confab, generally held in some large dining room, the ticket holders hear these men of baseball spin yarns—both serious and hilarious—and listen intently as some of the men who still are active in the game tell of their experiences and predict their futures.

Yes, sir, we're missing the boat on this one. We'd be glad to go over the details of such a plan with any organization that would be interested in putting on such a program.

#### Seminole Athletic Hall Of Fame

Seminole County is now more than a half-century old. During these years, as the county grew and developed in so many ways, it has produced a remarkable number of athletes. From time to time we remember them in conversations or perhaps we even see some of them from time to time.

But we believe that the time has now arrived when we should find a way to better remember some of those who made names for themselves in the field of sports.

We propose the formation of an organization to be known as the Seminole County Athletic Hall of Fame.

The organization would be open to membership to all for an annual membership fee which would include his meal at the one meeting of the organization each year. There would be a board of governors in addition to a minimum number of officers.

The board of governors would organize itself into a minimum number of committees. At each annual meeting several former athletes, not more than five, would be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

For the first few years a room in some particular building can be established where portraits of the members of the Hall of Fame would be displayed. Later, as finances permitted, a small building could be erected whereby those who had excelled in sports could be remembered.

Actually, it is a very simple operation. But it would be one in which every sports fan in Seminole County could have pride. And what a challenge it would provide for the youngsters of today.

## Finley Back At Starting Line

KANUAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Charles O. Finley, owner of the homeless Kansas City Athletics, was back today where he stood more than one month ago—at an impasse in lease negotiations with his former landlords at Municipal Stadium.

Finley refused again Wednesday yield in his demands for a two-year lease, saying that a longer commitment here would invite bankruptcy.

The city, likewise, would not back down in its demand for a lease of at least four years in length. City officials said fans here have a right to baseball stability after supporting the second division club with an average annual attendance of 84,984 for the past nine years.

"But we don't know what the attendance is going to be here," said the owner, speaking of the future. "I cannot survive on small attendance."

He told city officials the Internal Revenue Service believes he should have spread the depreciation benefits over a longer period of time.

"I got a letter from them asking for approximately \$250,000 more," he said.

The owner, whose baseball team is incorporated within his multi-million-dollar medical insurance company, said he was thus rejecting the alternate city proposals for a four-year lease that he took under advisement last Saturday.

## Davidson Loses To Mar Record

United Press International Davidson struck one second too soon for Little Davidson, and the Wildcats' star center Fred Hetzel was transformed into a pumpkin.

Davidson, a school with a total population of 3,000, had entertained fairly-tale hopes of going undefeated against the country's basketball powers until a crushing go-ahead violation against Hetzel in the last second of Wednesday night's game enabled West Virginia to edge the Wildcats, 75-73.

The Wildcats stood 15-0 until substitute Marty Lentz left play with a scorching 50-foot shot from midcourt with the score tied at 73-73. Hetzel, the Southern Conference player of the year in 1962 and Davidson's first authentic All-American candidate, kept the ball in his hands and grabbed the rim and net for the costly penalty.

Hetzel, however, did score 10 points for Davidson, which led at the half, 44-38. Game honors went to Wildcat teammate Dick Snyder with 20. Davidson easily whipped the Mountaineers, now 10-3, in an earlier meeting, 93-82.

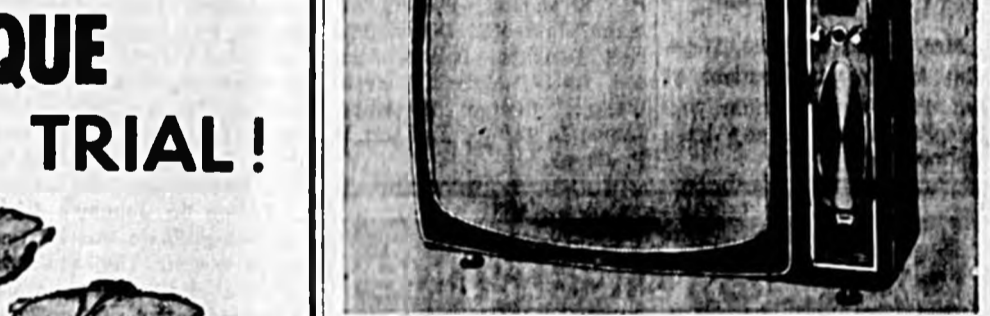

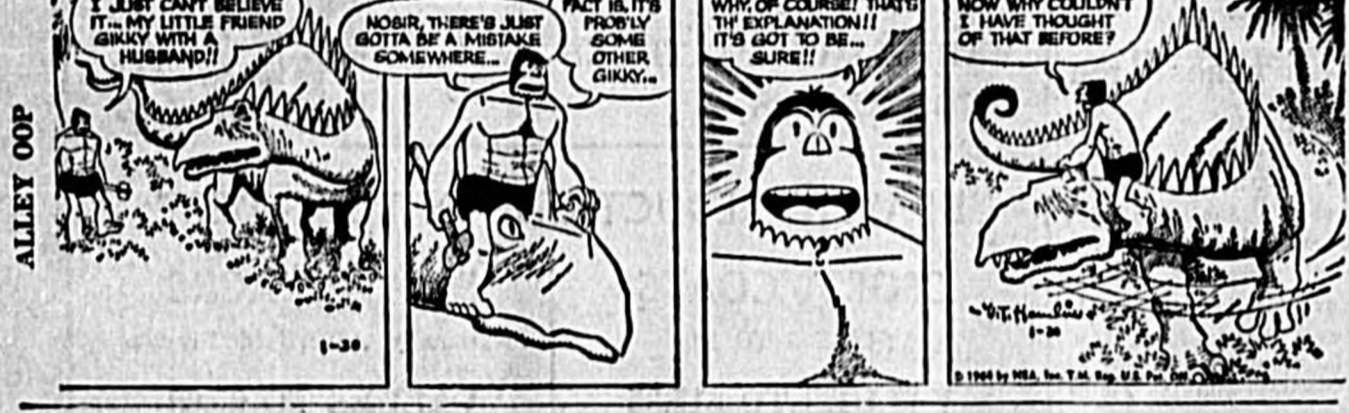
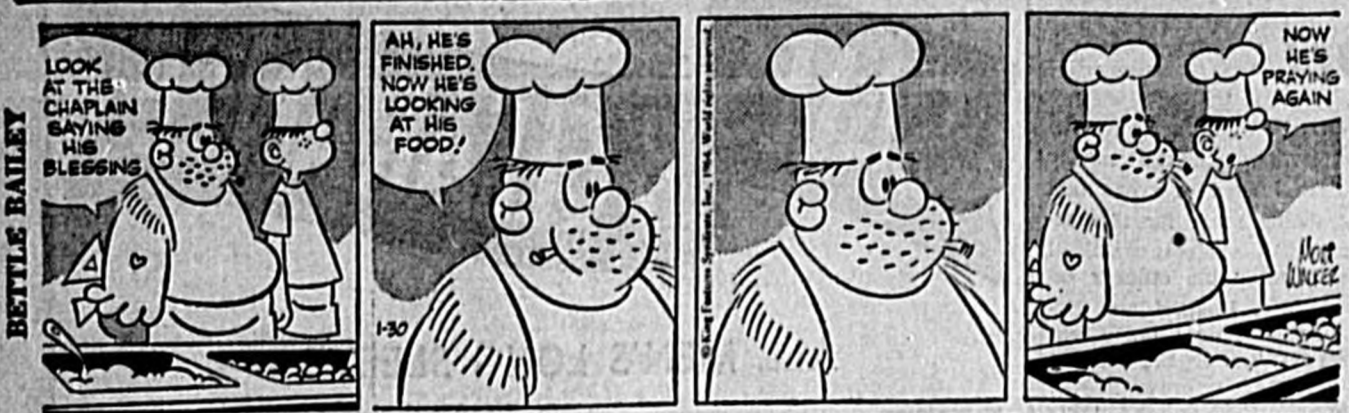

# Geneva Farmer Wins Dairy Herd Citation

Elbert Cammack, owner of Fairglades Jersey Dairy, Geneva, and Baker's Dairy, Sanford, have been cited for outstanding achievement in dairy herd production and efficiency, according to Cecil Tucker, county agricultural agent.

Fairglades Dairy was selected the state winner in the efficient dairy production awards program for Dairy Herd Improvement Association (DHIA) members. Baker's Dairy was named runner-up in the state dairy herd management awards program for those dairies on a co-operative record keeping system

other than DHIA. Cammack received an embossed plaque and a check as first place state winner in the large herd division of the efficient dairy production contest.

The program is directed by the Agricultural Extension Service, County winners are selected in counties with DHIA work and from these the state winners are selected by a committee comprised of agricultural extension agents, extension dairy specialists and college dairy science department representatives.

The 1963 selections were made in "large" and "small" herd divisions, all herds under 100 being considered in the small herd division.

The herds are scored on feeding practices, herd replacement program, herd health, use of records in herd management and the results secured as evidenced by the DHIA record and business analysis data from farm accounts. The latter gives evidence of a successful business operation.

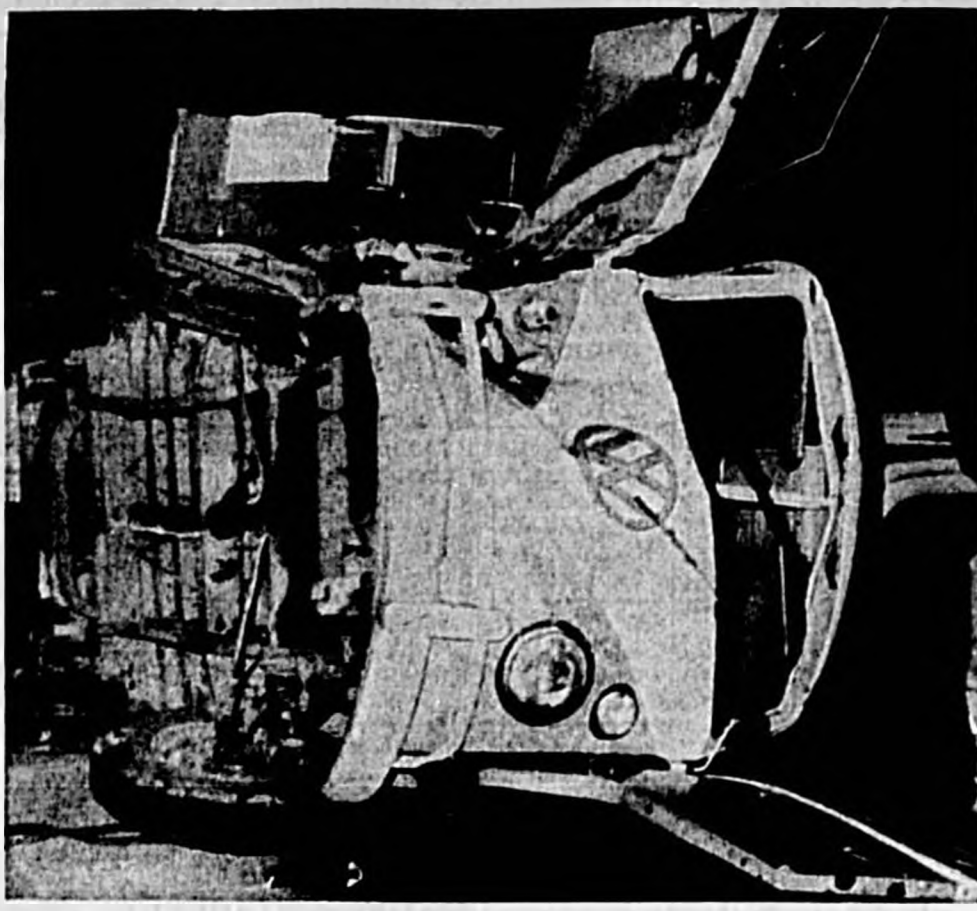

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who is ineligible for the job, said he would be glad to run as the vice presidential nominee on a ticket with any of the men who spoke.

Richard M. Nixon, the 1960 presidential candidate who

could be re-nominated, said he was sure the 1964 nominee was among those who spoke Wednesday night.

Eisenhower and Nixon, along with announced and prospective Republican presidential candidates, addressed 25,000 Republicans who paid \$100 a plate to attend dinners in 21 cities tied together by closed circuit television.

Those who spoke in this order were: Sen. Thurston B. Morton of Kentucky from Houston, Nixon from New York, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York from Los Angeles, Gov. William W. Scranton of Pennsylvania from Indianapolis, Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona from Pittsburgh and Gov. George Romney of Michigan from Washington.

Goldwater took another swing at the GOP liberal wing by saying that the party must give voters "a Republican choice... not an echo" of the Democrats in the 1964 election.

But Scranton threw a soft jab at the conservative wing by saying that the GOP had enjoyed its greatest success when it was not "standing as the negative party but by serving as the party of positive action."

## Booth To Head Study Of State Laws On Fraud

**TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—** Duval County Solicitor Edward Booth will head up a statewide committee named by Atty. Gen. James Kynes to study Florida laws on fraudulent business schemes.

Kynes said fraudulent business practices are becoming an increasing problem in the state and laws needed to be strengthened. He called on all prosecuting attorneys Wednesday to take part in the study.

"We must give constant attention to keeping the business climate of Florida free from suspicion," the new attorney general said.

Eisenhower followed these speakers with a proposal for a "United Stateamanship" for writing the 1964 Republican platform. He urged that Republicans experts set up forums on a regional, state, county and precinct basis to talk issues to the voters.

The ex-President also recommended that GOP national headquarters set up a suggestion center to receive voter comments on issues facing the country.

From this effort, he said, the Republicans could write a platform which would be "an expression of mainstream thinking of an informed people."

**DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI)—** William Fay, Ireland's ambassador to Canada since 1960, was appointed ambassador to Washington Wednesday night.

Cornelius Cremin, a former ambassador to London and Paris, was appointed Irish delegate to the United Nations.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant does not want the State Cabinet to take final action on a proposed new university site until he hears what probably will be a plea from Brevard County officials for an alternate site.

(Seminole County leaders for the proposed university have decided to adopt a "wait and see" attitude, according to Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce university site committee.)

J. Broward Culpepper, executive director of the State Board of Control which has recommended the Adamueli site for the new east-central Florida space institution, wants the Cabinet Board of Education to consider the recommendation at its Tuesday meeting.

### Farm Message Asks Study Of Marketing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today sent Congress a special farm message coupling new agricultural programs with a study of the growing economic power of supermarket chains.

The president said the new cotton plan, which he framed in broad, general terms to allow room for congressional compromise, should make market prices more competitive with other fibers.

The wheat plan on which Johnson asked "prompt action," is designed to head off a \$500 million-\$700 million drop in grower income this year by offering higher price supports to producers who voluntarily curb output.

The wide-ranging message also called for fresh steps to attack poverty in rural areas, action to broaden food aid to the needy, and a five-year extension of the decade-old Food For Peace program.

In one of the few real surprises in the message, Johnson said there was "pressing need" for a bipartisan commission to study revolutionary changes which have been sweeping the food marketing system.

The President said one of every two dollars spent for groceries now goes to fewer than 100 corporate, voluntary, or cooperative chains. Not enough is known about the effects of this "greatly increased concentration of power" or about changes including contract farming and vertical integration of production and marketing, he added.

"I urge that the Congress establish a bipartisan commission to study and appraise these changes, so that farmers and business people may make appropriate adjustments and our government may properly discharge its responsibility to consumers," Johnson said.

### Casselberry Horse Track Sale Pending

Clyde Hart, director of Seminole Park Raceway, announced today that negotiations are under way to sell the racing plant to a group of Jacksonville businessmen headed by Dallas L. Thomas, Jacksonville city commissioner, whose hobby is raising and racing quarter horses.

The pari-mutuel track, which opened last year under adverse conditions, had been reported to be in financial difficulties this season.

They are now in the process of getting together creditors, stockholders, the federal government and others involved so that the transaction can be completed without too much delay in opening the racing season.

The season was scheduled to open today and, unable to meet this date, the new owners have been striving to open during the first two weeks in February.

Thomas promised the group of horsemen that racing will start by Feb. 14. The date is subject to approval by the State Racing Commission. An effort also will be made to have the season extended until April 15.

Thomas said that the new management would continue the combination of harness horse and quarterhorse races.

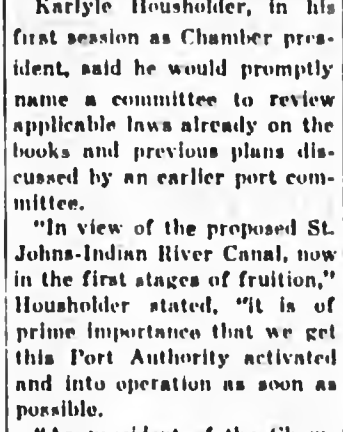
### CC President, County Chairman Ask Action

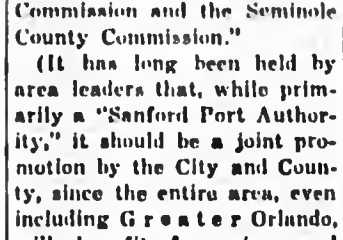
Karlyle Housholder, in his first session as Chamber president, said he would promptly name a committee to review applicable laws already on the books and previous plans discussed by an earlier port committee.

"In view of the proposed St. Johns-Indian River Canal, now in the first stages of fruition," Housholder stated, "it is of prime importance that we get this Port Authority activated and into operation as soon as possible."

"As president of the Chamber," he added, "I pledge the fullest co-operation of our group with the Sanford City Commission and the Seminole County Commission."

A Chamber of Commerce port committee did operate through 1962 and on Oct. 29, 1962, signed a contract for a port feasibility study with Reynolds, Smith and Hills, Jacksonville engineers. An application for a \$10,000 loan for the engineering study was made with the U. S. Housing and Home Finance Agency on Jan. 8, 1963, and this hinges on the government's demand for repayment of a loan of \$7,900 made to Sanford in 1949 for a sewage disposal plant engineering study.
