



JAPANESE OFFER TO SURRENDER

President Truman Explains Results Of Potsdam Meet

Calls Upon Japan To Surrender Or To Face Destruction; WPB Rules Upheld

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10. (AP) — President Truman urged Japanese civilians last night "to leave industrial cities immediately and save themselves from destruction."

In a nation-wide radio report on the Potsdam Big Three conference and the war in the Pacific, Mr. Truman said the Japanese attack was "a warning of things to come," and added that unless the Japanese surrender, while spread atomic bombing of war industries is certain.

Saying this country and Great Britain realized the "strategic significance of the atomic bomb," the President in his prepared address went on:

"The world will note that the first atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, a military base. That was because we wished in the first attack to avoid, in so far as possible, the killing of civilians."

"But that attack is only a warning of things to come. If Japan does not surrender, bombs will have to be dropped on war industries and on civilian centers, and thousands of civilian lives will be lost. I urge Japanese civilians to leave industrial cities immediately, and save themselves from destruction."

Mr. Truman gave no indication that the enemy had made any gestures, either since the advent of the terrible new weapon or the entry of Russia into the war, and by capitulation the destruction of which he warned them.

Surrender or Ruin

Only surrender, he said, will stop the use of the new weapon of annihilation and the Japanese alternative is ruin.

In his first lengthy radio talk, Mr. Truman gave no indications when he expected the Japanese to surrender, either through force or through force.

But he said the Soviet decision to declare war on Japan was only one of the reasons for the Potsdam conference.

"The Japs will soon learn some of the other military secrets agreed upon at Berlin," he asserted. "They will learn them first hand—and they will not like them."

The Chief Executive devoted a large share of his address to an appeal of what he called "the Potsdam conference with Premier Stalin and British Prime Minister Churchill and Acheson."

Sharp Rise In Navy Losses Is Reported

Submarine Lagarto Is Given Up As Lost With Crew Of 90; 47th Sub Missing

(By Associated Press)

A sharp rise in Navy losses has boosted the combat casualties of the armed forces to 1,098,216 the Army and Navy reported last night. The Army placed its losses at 922,139 and the Navy at 116,077.

In an ironic note, a peace agreement announced the other day, the Navy announced the submarine Lagarto and her crew of 90 were lost while on duty. Japanese waters it was the 47th sub lost.

Stores Will Close Following Official Ending Of The War

Liquor stores and beer parlors must close in Sanford for a 24-hour period immediately following the official ending of the war, announced today by Mayor Edward Hickey.

Dr. W.V. Ritting, president of the Sanford Merchants' Association, announced that immediately following the President's proclamation, stores in general will close and remain closed for the rest of the day if the proclamation is issued in the morning but if in the afternoon or evening stores will close for the rest of the day and remain closed on the following day. Restaurants, drug stores and filling stations will follow Sunday closing hours.

Closing of liquor stores and beer parlors will also be compulsory throughout the county for the 24-hour period, Deputy Sheriff Jack Hickson said today, speaking for Sheriff Charles Head.

The Sanford Post Office will close according to the President's ruling, but will operate on holiday schedule and will make collections as on Saturdays; it was announced by Joel S. Field, postmaster.

All departments at the City Hall and at the Court House, are expected to close with the exception of the Sheriff's office.

(From Tokyo and Moscow cables reports today that Japan would quit the war if she could keep her emperor.) London said: "It looks like the end of the war." But the White House said at 10:40 A.M. EDT that the United States is continuing to fight Japan in the absence of any Japanese surrender offer.

The peace offer reports came during Japan's worst hour. Soviet armies were reported invading Korea, Manchuria and the Jap-held half of Sakhalin Island. More than 1,500 carrier planes and Superforts were roaring over the Jap mainland in continuing attacks.

Moscow reported the Soviet fleet in action. Soviet ships are already driving down three established communication routes toward the heart of Manchuria and were reported within 300 miles of Hulin Chadar, the Jap forward base on the Korean peninsula.

It was reported that the Emperor Hirohito would be retained as a condition of the Japanese surrender.

The pilot of the plane which launched the first atomic bomb on Japan was of course a Florida boy. But, as we have said before, Floridians are not the only ones who are fighting this war.

It was kinda like the man biting the dog the other day when Col. Jimmy Roosevelt of the United States Marines, brother of General Elliot Roosevelt, dog fancier, was put off a plane for a civilian with a higher priority rating.

Included in our post-war planning should be the construction of a new and modern hospital for which the County has already voted some \$70,000 worth of bonds. These should be matched by an equal contribution from the federal government.

Russian Strategy

If any additional impetus were needed following the dropping of the first atomic bomb, to drive Japan out of the war, it should surely have been furnished by the Russian declaration of war on Japan.

It has of course been obvious from the beginning that sooner or later Russia would come into the war against Japan. Though fearing the Germans more, she could have hated the Japanese no less and until the unprovoked Nazi attack far more friction and provocation for war had occurred along the Siberian border.

A clash of interests between the two countries developed more than 50 years ago and the passing of years, with Japan's further encroachments upon Korea, Manchuria and China proper, has not served to assuage Russian sensibilities.

Still smoldering in every Russian's heart is resentment against the humiliating defeat by Japanese forces in the war of 1904-'05. Then, as if the mere destruction of two Russian fleets at Port Arthur and in the Sea of Japan were not enough, powerful forces were landed in Manchuria and in a series of battles from the Yalu to the fall of Mukden, the most tremendous battle of all history up to that time, the Russians were whipped to a frazzle.

Not since then has any occasion presented itself for the Russians to redeem themselves, at least against the Japanese. It is to be remembered that in the first World War, largely through the diplomatic pressure of Great Britain, Japan was aligned with the other Allied nations against Germany and toward the close of the war, after the Communist revolution, Russia was not and never has been until recently, in a position to fight Japan.

So it is not surprising that she seizes upon this, her first real opportunity, to take a crack at the Japs. Coming into the war now will give her a powerful voice in the postwar settlements in the Far East comparable to the one she now enjoys in Europe. And her interests in Manchuria, Korea and China are probably as great as anywhere else in the world.

Clear As Mud

Although many thousands of miles of words have been published on the subject since the first atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima three days ago, there still seems to be some confusion, if not downright ignorance, in the public mind as to just how this tremendous explosive force is produced. But in spite of its vital military significance, we do not believe we will be giving any undue aid and comfort to the enemy if we explain it further.

You see, it's like this. The mechanism consists primarily of a bit of radium, a little metal beryllium, some paraffin wax and a dash of uranium 235. The penetrating rays of the radium strike the beryllium and cause that metal to emit rays of its own. Now these rays are different from those of the radium. That must be kept clearly in mind. And they are called neutrons.

Now as these neutrons come off the beryllium, they are traveling too fast to have any effect on the uranium and that's where the paraffin wax comes in. It slows down the neutron rays. When the neutrons reach the very slow speed of approximately 25,000 volts, these particles easily split the uranium atoms in twain. And it seems that whenever these uranium atoms are split in twain, nobody within a radius of several hundred miles a damn what happens after that.

So there you have it, folks, just as simple as that. Gives you some idea of what the Japs are up against. And isn't it funny nobody ever thought of it before?

CHILDREN IMPORTANT TOO

At Potsdam, as at Yalta and Tehran, the Allied leaders met to arrange the future world. That was the purpose, consciously and confidently in their minds, and with equal confidence anticipated and approved by the peoples they represented. They, and we, expected to be in mind that at various times in the past, what was then the future of the world was arranged with equal care, confidence and benevolence of intention. The future of the world was arranged at the Treaty of Utrecht and later at the Congress of Vienna. It was again arranged at the Treaty of Versailles in 1919, but did not remain thus arranged long enough to avoid the present rearrangement quarter-century later.

More potent than statesmen in determining the world's future are the relations of peoples and nations to each other and to certain natural forces. One is birth rate. Sometimes far-seeing statesmen recognize this or have their attention called to it by scientists. Prime Minister Churchill, looking to the preservation of Britain's power, its status among nations, said:

"A dwindling birth rate is one of the most somber anxieties which beset those who look thirty or forty years ahead. If this country is to keep its high place in the leadership of the world, and to survive as a great power that can hold its own against extraordinary pressures, our people must be encouraged by every means to have larger families."

What are the reasons? By every means. But specifically, just what means? In discussions the common way to approach the problem in terms of economics. It is said that by legislation the economic condition of people should be improved, so that youth would be able to marry early and parents able to rear more children. But it is the common observation of all who see and reflect that persons relatively high in economic status have few children, those of low economic status many. Hold the thought. "Poor" is a word of scornful energy. Half the babies in the United States are born to the one-third of the population with the lowest incomes.

Problem in France... There is greater certainty, though here again not perfect certainty, in the viewpoint which leads statements of some nations to believe that an increase in birth rate is essential to national strength.

General De Gaulle, a France, is almost certainly right when he assumes that a low birth rate has been a chief cause in the decline of his country's status as a great power. He says that France must increase her population by at least 12,000,000.

Beneath all this concern of many nations about their birth rate, repeated over and over, is the assertion that by the year 1970 the population of Russia will exceed, by 25,000,000 the total population of all Northwestern and Central Europe. The forecast is made by statisticians of the League of Nations. If it is borne out, if the Russian birth is not reduced, nor the birth rate of other countries increased, by forces not now possible to foresee, then the predicted preponderance of Russian population will have more weight on the future of the world than was done at Potsdam or may be done at other conferences of statesmen.

But he also touched at some length on the Pacific war and asserted that this Government did not lightly undertake the production and use of the terrible atomic bomb.
"We have used it," he said, "in order to shorten the agony of war, in order to save the lives of thousands and thousands of young Americans.
We shall continue to use it until we completely destroy Japan's power to make war. Only a Japanese surrender will stop us.
Britain and the United States he said, do not intend to release the secret of history's most terrible weapon until means have been found to control it so as to protect ourselves and the rest of the world from the danger of total destruction.
"The atomic bomb," Mr. Truman declared, "is too dangerous to be loose in a lawless world."

Consumers Will Pay Utility Tax On 4 Utilities

keep records at all times during business hours open to inspection by authorized city agents, which records shall show prices charged and date of payments.
Section 6 provides that where all collections of utilities are on a monthly basis, taxes imposed may be computed on the aggregate amount of sales during such period, provided that the amount of tax to be collected shall be the nearest whole cent to the amount computed.
Section 7 authorizes the City Clerk to add the tax to water service charges. Failure to pay the total within 15 days after rendering the bill will result in service being discontinued.
Section 8 provides that all taxes collected on utilities shall be deposited in the city's ordinary funds.
Section 9: Persons or firm-representatives violating the tax law are liable to \$200 maximum fine in City Court, or imprisonment not exceeding 90 days.
Section 10 repeats all the ordinances that may conflict with Ordinance 379.
