### STATISTICS SHOW STRIDES OF RADIO MADE IN AMERICA

Radio Division Of Commerce Department Discloses Figures Which Show Phenomenal Growth Of Industry

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(INS)—The phenomenal forward strides of the United States in development and employment of radio communication is disclosed by figures by the Radio Division of the Commerce Department.

In 1927 in operation in United States were 39,814 transmitting stations of all classes and 13,821 in other countries. The 1928 figures showed 2,974 foreign and 2,130 American stations.

In numbers of stations the American amateur exceeded any other class in this country or the world with 15,426 transmitters in operation at the close of the year. Despite the gradual narrowing of the restrictions against amateurs they still are contributing much to radio development and are achieving transmitting and receiving records that parallel those of the big commercial operations.

Radio commissioners and private engineers attribute much of the progress of American development to the work of the amateur who attached wireless transmission first as a plaything and gradually built it up to a world-wide communication system.

United States had 694 broadcasting stations and probably 12,000,000 receiving sets in use at the end of last year. Experts estimate a night radio audience of probably 30 per cent of the population of the country. Undoubtedly this audience is increased to over 50 per cent of the population during the broadcasting of national events such as political conventions, world baseball series and heavy weight championship prize fights.

The foreign broadcasting system has not developed to the extent of that in America. There are several reasons. The purchasing power of the foreign population is not so great making it impossible for the people to buy sets as they are purchased in the United States. Restrictions are placed on the operation both of sets and transmitting stations, while there are other factors to prevent the progress of the United States.

Undoubtedly the big expansion of broadcasting in United States is due to the fact that radio has become an excellent advertising medium. Most big corporations which have competitive articles to sell the public maintain highly paid entertainers who appear weekly over the broadcasting chains.

Advertising Methods The advertising methods of the more important corporations are not offensive and detract little from the entertainment value of the program. The percentage of advertising time taken up in the program is not as great as the advertising space in the newspapers or magazines and the wise advertiser is taking care that their methods of selling do not become offensive to the public.

There are about 185 experimental stations in operation in United States maintained by universities, manufacturers of broadcasting and receiving equipment, communications companies, newspapers and private engineers. These stations are making large contributions to the wireless transmitting art.

The government has 1,203 ship stations and 33 land stations, most of them operating outside the broadcast band between 200 and 600 meters.

The local chapter will be designated as Alpha Mu and plans have been made for the installation of the order here today under the supervision of Upsilon chapter of Rollins College in Virginia.

The Phi Omega group organized in 1921, has had a definite part in the activities of Rollins College, taking leading place in the musical field. It was under their fostering that the national honorary sorority, Phi Beta, was organized and granted a chapter at Rollins. In line with their work in the field of music, this local sorority had the Rollins girls assembled and printed in a very attractive book which they presented to the college last spring. This year they have offered a prize of \$25 to the girl having the highest scholarship record in the college, their object being to create an interest in this field of study.

The granting of this national chapter marks an epoch in the history of Rollins College. It is further proof of the high standing of the college and an indication of the faith of educational leaders in its future.

LONDON, June 6.—(INS)—

Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, former dictator of the reeking government of China, who was wounded in a bomb attack while fleeing to Mukden, Manchuria, was still alive early today, but in a very weakened condition, said a Tokio dispatch to the Evening News.

Chang was in his Mukden palace surrounded by his entire family (or families)—five wives and 16 children.

Propped up in an improvised lounge which was flanked by two huge, stuffed Manchurian tigers, Chang addressed his wives and children telling them to be of good cheer. He said he was sure that he would recover and that the sunshine of victory would blaze upon the banners of his army before many months had passed.

Through Col. Dihara, one of his advisers, Chang issued the following public statement: "I am all right. Tell my people not to worry. I have escaped too many times to fall victim to any plots this time."

### CALIFORNIA WILL ADOPT NEW PLAN FOR AUTO SPEED

Proposal Is Made To Abandon Old Law And Permit Motorists To Maintain Any Speed Consistent With Safety

SACRAMENTO, Cal.—June 5 California, with the second greatest squadron of automobiles in the world, may tear down its "No Speeding" signs next year and substitute the automotive honor system—"any speed consistent with safety."

A proposal to lift the speed limit entirely is under consideration by Assemblyman Roy J. Nielsen of Sacramento, he admitted today. "Let your conscience be your guide" is the substance of the Nielsen plan, now said to be in operation in one or two other states. There would be no fixed speed limit, except perhaps on

mountain roads or badly congested highways.

"Speeders" would still be subject to arrest and prosecution, the assemblyman declared, but excessive speed would bring them before the bar on a charge of reckless driving, instead of violating any particular speed limit.

Nielson made known that he is contemplating introduction of the bill to abolish fixed speed limits in the wake of state-wide discussion of a superior court decision in Fresno County that California's present 40-mile per hour limit does not apply under certain conditions.

The Fresno decision, however, is not considered binding by the State Division of Motor Vehicles and Frank G. Snook, chief of the department is still committed to "rigorous and rigorous enforcement" of the 40-mile edict. "I have given considerable consideration to the plan to abolish a fixed limit," said Assemblyman Nielson, "but am not yet ready to make a definite decision in the matter. It seems feasible, but I first want an opportunity to determine how it has worked out in

other states." The new law, if adopted, would provide as follows: "No person shall operate a motor vehicle on the public highways of the state recklessly or at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable, or proper, having regard to the width, traffic and use of the highway; or so as to endanger property or the life or limb of any person."

Under the terms of such an act Nielson pointed out, it would be possible to travel 50 miles an hour, or possibly faster.
