7-year-old killed while fishing

Mother's vehicle hits child after being struck by truck

SANFORD — A 7-year-old girl was hit and killed by a car Tuesday afternoon as she fished atop the sea wall along U.S. Highway 17/92.

According to police, Ellen Ross and her son Antonio, 14, went to buy bait, while her daughter Chenitra, 7, and Ellen's boyfriend Ricky Knight were fishing on the sea wall.

Ross was returning south on 17/92 and stopped to make a

left-hand turn across the highway to park. A small truck driven by Joshua Schams of Chef's Pride Inc. in Longwood slammed into Ross' vehicle, sending the sedan across the highway and into Chenitra before landing upside down in the lake.

Knight jumped into the water and retrieved Chenitra, while the Rosses climbed out of the car and onto shore. Neither Ellen or Antonio Ross suffered injuries. Chenitra Ross was in critical condition at the scene. Emergency

personnel transported her across the street to Central Florida Regional Medical Hospital, where she died less than an hour after the incident.

Sheana Goff, an off-duty emergency room worker at the South Seminole Hospital, and Richard Fenton were the first to arrive on the scene. Both were driving along 17/92 when the accident occurred.

"I performed CPR and I brought her pulse back," Goff said as Chenitra was being transported to Central Florida Regional. Fenton, who was on his way to work at the Department of Corrections in Daytona Beach, assisted with the

Singing Ambassadors

Lake Mary choir one of few in the nation to perform at the Vatican

LAKE MARY — While many high school students couldn't wait for summer vacation to relax, 57 students from the Lake Mary High School Choir journeyed to Vatican City to become only one of a dozen U.S. schools ever to be honored with the prestigious invitation.

Also along for the trip was students from the Lyman and Leesburg high school choirs. In all, the caravan had more than 100 students and chaperones for the 12-day tour through Italy and Switzerland.

Taking the LMHS Choir on exotic trips is nothing new for the 18th-year veteran choir director Alice Ann Nilsen. She said she goes "about every three or four years some place." This was the first time the choir had been to Italy. In the past Nilsen's choir have been on six trips to different countries like France, Wales, Scotland, Spain and England on three separate occasions.

"The purpose of this thing was to share our singing with other people in these marvelous cathedrals," Nilsen said. "You read in the book, but when you're standing in the Sistine Chapel it's nothing like the textbook."

n't the only venue the choirs performed at as they also sang at the Santa Maria Cathedral in Rome, Chiesa Santa Jacob in Florence, San Marcos Square in Vienna and a cathedral in Lucerne, Switzerland.

For one Lake Mary family the school sponsored trip turned into a family affair with plenty of celebrations along the way. The day the Ryans left from Lake Mary, Dr. John and Norma celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary and in the streets of Lucerne their son Greg became a teen-ager celebrating his 13th birthday.

Becky and Abby Ryan both said they enjoyed the trip but similar to their peers they said they enjoyed different parts of the trip. Becky said her favorite part of the trip was looking over the city of Florence while Abby said she enjoyed the double-decker bus rides throughout Europe quite well.

Similar to the Ryan girls, mother and son Jane and Andrew Ivey also enjoyed different parts of the trip.

"The scenery was incredible. For two hours it was all waterfalls," Andrew said about the trip to Switzerland. "It was

like left, right, left, right — it's just like the movies — unbelievable."

"My favorite thing was seeing the kids sing, hearing those precious voices," Jane added.

For Jane and many of the other chaperones the trip wasn't all fun and games as the choir members only brought two tuxedo shirts for their performances, and with the lack of laundry facilities, chaperones found themselves washing the shirts in the bathtubs.

"We stayed in a resort outside of Venice, but we didn't have time to enjoy it because we were so busy," Jane said.

Groot resigns from SHA

SANFORD — A member of the Sanford Housing Authority Board of Commissioners has resigned less than two months after being appointed to the position.

Lonnie Groot, a former attorney for Seminole County, submitted a letter Friday, June 15, to Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard.

"Based upon a change in employment that will occur within the next two weeks, I am hereby respectfully tendering to you my resignation from the Housing Authority of the city of Sanford," Groot wrote.

Groot is leaving the firm of Shuttles & Bowen to join Stenstrom, McIntosh, Colbert, Whigham & Simmons, a Sanford-based firm that represents the city of Sanford. Lessard said Groot resigned to avoid potential conflicts of interest.

SHA Board Chairman Joe Davis said Groot contacted him by e-mail of his plans to resign.

"It's the ethical thing to do, and I wish him the best of luck in his professional life," Davis said. "In the short time we worked together, I thought Lonnie helped us tremendously in setting the right direction for

SANFORD — Seminole County is recognizing National HIV Testing Day Saturday with food, games and free testing.

Sponsored by the Seminole County Health Department, the Central Florida Area Health Education Center, the Seminole Community Mental Health Center Inc., and The Sanford Bridge, the event will be held in Coastline Park from noon until 3 p.m. Free HIV testing, syphilis screening, blood pressure checks and education materials will be available.

Along with a day of health education and awareness, Saturday's event will include plenty of entertainment. According to Lori Soble, senior health educator at the Seminole County Health Department, music will be provided by 102

JAMZ and Valley Boys Studio I.I.I., there will be samples from Crystal Water, May Kay Cosmetics and Mayfield Ice Cream, and there will be a free raffle with prizes, including Orlando Magic shirts, Orlando Miracle tickets and a Rivership Romance cruise. A free barbecue lunch will also be available to those who are tested.

"We would love to see lots of people come out and have a

good time," Soble said. "It's a chance to hang out with friends and neighbors."

The priority, however, is HIV testing. State statistics indicate there are more than 80,000 people with AIDS in Florida, including more than 700 in Seminole County. Orange County has the fourth largest percentage of people infected with the virus of all

Not only that, he got six hits for his own team in a 7-0 upset. But no one in his family was there. His father was taking his brother to another baseball game in another town, and his mother was playing women's softball at another field.

When we have stories about upcoming Special Olympic games, the request is always that people attend the competitions and show their support. The same holds true in pre-announcements about Sanford's Golden Age Games, and all other sporting events.

Parents, family, friends, even strangers, play a big part in the activity when they are seen in the stands cheering on their favorites. Especially for youngsters, this is an important time in their life.

Regardless of how good or bad your son may be at playing ball, if you are there when he gets that lone hit — or socks it out of the park — he is doubly proud. Youngsters, especially those in the Special Olympics, have not accomplished what they believe are any great deeds in their short lives, and a pat on the back, a hug, or compliments can go a long way in boosting their morale and formulating their feelings about themselves.

They CAN do it, and there IS reason to be proud.

But how do you think members of a team, especially comprised of youngsters, would feel if there was no one in the stands to express appreciation and joy, if there was no one near the finish line when a Special Olympic contestant finished the race, when a basketball player gets in the winning shot. "Nobody cares," they may think. "Why should we do anything?"

My son will tell you. He's a gymnastics coach. When parents attend gymnastics meets, their youngsters try harder and do better almost without exception.

Go to that event, and even if your child or the person you want to support hasn't done anything of note, find something positive to say, and let them know they did a good job. They tried their best.

And when you do go to a game in which your son or daughter is participating — pay attention. "Mommy, did you see me hit that home run?" "No, son, I didn't. I was on my cell phone making a hair appointment." That's just as bad as not being there at all. A sad state of affairs, isn't it?

Regional Rails Metroplan Orlando's proposal for a rail transit fall short

Central Florida's business and elected officials haven't shown much leadership when it comes to rail-oriented mass transit issues. Orlando and Orange County flirted for years with a light-rail proposal that justifiably was criticized as serving the interests of the tourist industry rather than local residents. Now comes Metroplan Orlando, a regional transportation planning group, with a light-rail plan that runs from downtown Orlando to Altamonte Springs with a terminal near the Crane's Roost area. Problem is, the plan isn't very regional.

For whatever reason, these regional leaders have yet to articulate what it is they want a rail system to accomplish and how such a system would improve the region's transportation woes. In the current debate, the stated goal of light rail is to relieve traffic congestion on Interstate 4. However, the plan presented doesn't accomplish that goal. Anyone who thinks I-4 traffic becomes bottlenecked at Altamonte Springs hasn't tried to cross the St. Johns River bridge at rush hour. Furthermore, State Road 436 is one of the busiest highways in Seminole County, and the intersection of 436 and I-4 can be a nightmare to navigate. It does not make sense, then, to terminate a rail system at this location. Rail commuters coming and going from the terminal would increase the congestion along 436 and I-4, making the problem worse, not better.

If Metroplan members are serious about a rail system, any plan must include three components:

- **Regional scope** — Sanford and Lake Mary have a substantial role to play in a rail transit system. For that matter, so do Deltona and DeLand. Volusia County is not a member of Metroplan, but its residents significantly affect transportation in Seminole and Orange counties. Only when Metroplan members grasp this fact will the organization begin to create real solutions to transportation problems.

- **Clear objectives and measurable results** — The Altamonte Springs plan doesn't relieve traffic congestion, and taxpayers will not support a costly alternative that fails to achieve its stated objectives. Leaders must identify goals and create a plan that meets those goals.

- **Reasonable solutions** — The statewide high-speed train system voters were conned into last November is not a reasonable transportation solution, and MPO would be wise not to create a similar project on the regional level. Any rail system will be expensive, so MPO must compare the cost of a rail project with the likelihood the project will achieve its stated goals.

Traffic in Central Florida will get worse not better in the coming years, and we need regional leaders like those at MPO to provide practical, regional, solutions to the traffic problem.

Residents should vote 'yes' to improve their neighborhood

Property owners in the Sanford Historic District have a unique opportunity to improve their neighborhood by voting in favor of the Special Assessment District for Streetlights. Sanford, like many Central Florida cities, lacks well-lit streets. By approving the special assessment, property owners can resolve this problem.

Property owners should approve the special assessment for three reasons:

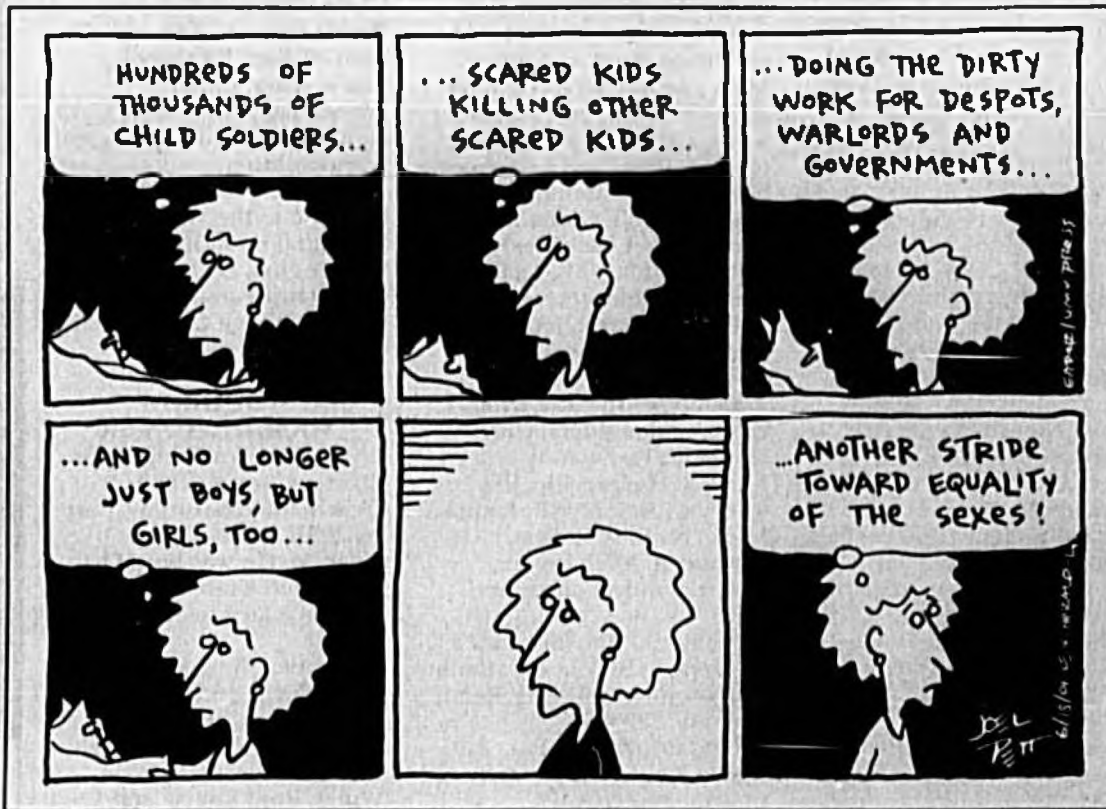
- **To deter crime and other unwanted behavior.** Ask any law enforcement official, dark streets provide criminals with the cover they need to conduct their activities. A well-lit neighborhood helps expose these activities, forcing criminals to scurry like cockroaches away from the light.

- **To improve safety.** Whether for exercise or just a pleasant after-supper stroll around the block, well-lit streets allow residents to take advantage of Sanford's sidewalk and park system without fear of stumbling around in the dark. This is particularly important during the summer when extended twilight hours provide residents a chance to be outside without the blistering heat of sun baking down on them. Streetlights also help motorists identify potential hazards — bicyclists, joggers, potholes — which allows drivers more time to react to those hazards.

- **To set the example for other neighborhoods.** The Historic District is not the only neighborhood in Sanford in need of streetlights, but the success of this program in the District will encourage residents in other areas to ask for similar streetlight improvements.

Some owners have complained about the cost of the streetlight program. The assessment is based upon the total square footage of each property, and home owners will pay an average of \$12 to \$15 per month for 10 years. After that, owners will pay a \$4.28 monthly maintenance fee, a price FP&L has guaranteed. These costs are minimal compared to the benefits residents will receive from 123 new streetlights, not to mention the increased property values that occur when such neighborhood improvements are made.

District property owners should vote in favor of the special assessment, and they should make sure their ballots arrive at City Hall no later than July 2.

In the matter of nominee John Negroponte

President Bush's nominee as ambassador to the United Nations, John D. Negroponte, is one of the more impressive products of the Foreign Service. He has served as ambassador to Mexico and the Philippines. He speaks five lan-

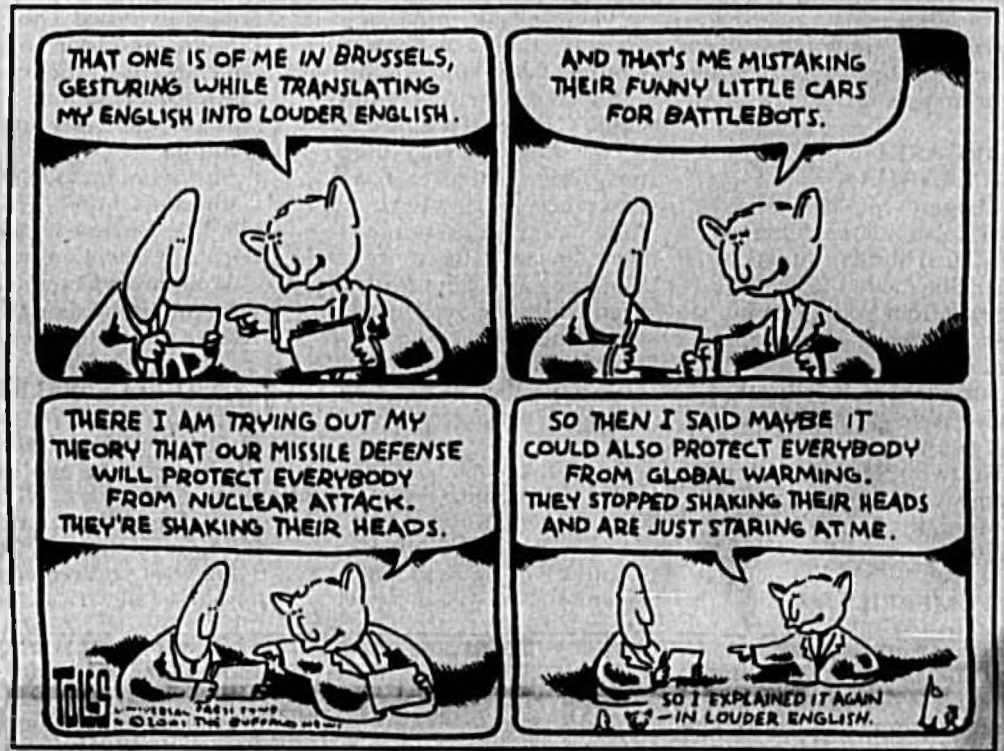
guages, and as a young man resigned quietly as a key assistant to National Security Adviser Henry Kissinger because he believed Kissinger was misleading the American people about the terms of the agreements that ended the American war in Vietnam. Now he will almost certainly be called a war criminal — or at least a Cold War criminal — during his confirmation hearings before the U.S. Senate. Most of the accusations will involve his 1981-to-1985 service, under President Reagan, as ambassador to Honduras during the United States' not-so-secret secret contra war against the Sandinista government of the country next door, Nicaragua.

Most of the charges are essentially true, including turning a blind eye to human rights abuses by the Honduran military. That said, I would vote to confirm Ambassador Negroponte — and investigate President Reagan.

Before Reagan became president on Jan. 20, 1981, the sleepy embassy in Honduras was considered at the same level as our station in Port au Prince, Haiti. But soon it was, in size at least, as important as the embassies in Mexico and Brazil, with 147 civilian professionals and 97 military advisers. Negroponte was sent there to help run the secret war. That was no secret. Even then he was called, in a John le Carre way, as he will be during the hearings, "the American proconsul."

All this for a country — "Now that's a real banana republic," former President Richard Nixon told me in an interview that same year — with a mostly illiterate population of less than 4 million at that time. I was there for a while that year — in fact, I had dinner with Negroponte at the embassy — and met with Honduran military commanders, who had all been trained in the United States or at the U.S.' police academy in Panama.

Their men, Honduran soldiers, were a sorry lot. One of the recruiting techniques was to show kung fu movies at Tegucigalpa theaters, films that attracted



young men. During the show, the army would surround the theater with trucks and then send men inside to grab the audience, driving them away under guard and putting uniforms on them.

Again, none of this was a real secret. Driving in the countryside one day 20 miles or so from Tegucigalpa, I was stopped at a roadblock next to a U.S. Army truck driven by a sergeant. The name patch on his uniform read "Kelly." Suddenly two old C-47s, twin-engine transports, came in view over the low mountains in front of us, and 30 paratroopers jumped out and floated toward the road ahead.

"Who are those paratroopers?" I asked. "What paratroopers?" said Sgt. Kelly with a grin.

That is the way it was in those days. Anyone who didn't know, didn't want to know or was not paying attention. That is the way it had pretty much been in Latin America since the administration of President James K. Polk in the 1840s. Now one of Negroponte's most important opponents, Miguel Vivanco, director of Human Rights Watch/Americas, says: "Even his critics consider him very, very competent. How could someone who is such a skillful diplomat be so out of the loop?"

Of course, he was not out of the loop. And I assume Negroponte believed in

what he was doing then — or he would have resigned as he did in 1973 when he believed, correctly, that Kissinger was knowingly dooming the South Vietnamese government of Nguyen van Thieu by allowing North Vietnamese troops to stay in the south after American forces withdrew.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee should have no trouble showing what Negroponte did. His signature, for example, is on November 1983 documents recommending secret and illegal arms transfers to anti-Sandinista forces. (The arms, incidentally, or not so incidentally if you are interested in how the world actually works, were delivered by Israel from stores of weaponry captured from the Palestine Liberation Organization.) But under the signature are the initials "RR" — President Ronald Reagan approved the recommendations and gave the orders.

The ambassador was doing his job — or, using more loaded language, "just following orders." It was the president — and 20 presidents before him — who gave the orders. That is what we should investigate when we are grown up enough to face the truth of what we have all been part of these many decades.

Contacts with the Navy Department apparently revealed that there were no AJ or AJ3 aircraft available. Even if one were located, the size and weight of the aircraft may prove to be a problem.

Possibly the biggest news came on June 14, when the committee was informed that they had been awarded a grant of \$150,000 from the State of Florida.

According to Patty Mahany, vice president of the committee, Representative David Meador "is one cloud nine" over the grant. Meador is responsible for bringing the request before the Legislature.

"One of the reasons I pushed for this bill with the Legislature,"

Meador said, "is because I believe in it. I also believe the Governor recognizes the dedication and sacrifice of the men and women who served there and gave of themselves."

He pointed out that this is the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the base. "As such, we're lucky to have three veterans groups, those of World War II, Korea and Viet Nam, who serve there and are helping support this."

He envisioned that once built, the monument could become a point of interest to international tourists coming into Sanford, and the focus of education of our school children. "Our children right now are among the luckiest ever," he said, "without war. But considering this, it is important

to stress that we cannot leave our guard down, and must always be prepared."

The committee only asked for half the money needed. The rest is to be raised through donations, many of which have been received by individuals and businesses. The latest report indicated approximately \$40,000 had been raised in the local community. The airport has already donated the land for the memorial, which is to be placed near the entrance of the airport grounds at the corner of Marquette Avenue and Red Cleveland Boulevard.

Mahany said there has been discussion concerning placing a gazebo near the monument as well, but that concept is still only in the consideration stage.

The artist's concept is the creation of Tom Wilkes, with a company called Guard Lee, Inc. of Apopka. They specialize in aerospace restoration and fabrication, and will be assisting the committee with the plane and mounting.

The Sanford Airport Memorial Committee consists of Jack Dow, president, Patricia Mahany, vice president, Bob Parsell, treasurer, and Tom Alley, Secretary. Directors include Glen Travis, Louis Rotundo, Jerry Bohm, Bob Karas, Bob Walter and Maurice Touhey, with Doug Stenstrom as honorary director.

counties in the state. "And, it doesn't take long to drive to Orange County," Soble said. "Figures also can sometimes lie."

HIV (human immunodeficiency virus) is the virus that causes AIDS. A retrovirus, it is passed from one person to another through blood-to-blood and sexual contact. In addition, infected pregnant women can pass HIV to their babies during pregnancy, delivery or breastfeeding.

Twenty years ago in June, the first report on AIDS was published in the "Morbidity And Mortality Weekly Report." Since 1981, almost 800,000 people in the United States have been reported with AIDS and more than 400,000 have died.

"It's been 20 years, and it's still around," Soble said. "There is no cure. There is nothing but prevention and education."

On Saturday, people will have an opportunity to be tested through an oral-fluid test known as OraSure. Although it is not a saliva test, a cotton-like swab is used to collect fluids from the inside of the mouth. According to Soble, the test does not require blood being drawn from a person, and it does not hurt.

The tests will be sent to Jacksonville, and within two or three weeks, the Health Department will have the results. The Health Department will notify anyone testing positive for HIV.

The importance of testing is two-fold, Soble said. Early diag-

nosis allows a person to seek case and medical treatment, including state and federally funded drug programs.

"The earlier a person is diagnosed, the earlier a person can receive medical treatment," Soble said. "Maybe they can extend their lifetime."

If a person is tested and is HIV positive, that knowledge may also prevent the infection of others. It is a third-degree felony in Florida to knowingly infect another person through sexual contact.

"People getting tested can help themselves and help others," Soble said.

HIV testing, food, entertainment and raffles are all free during Saturday's event, she said. Coastline Park is located on 9th Street near 17-92 in Sanford.

Audit reveals flaws in county's Development Review Fund

In a six month audit of the Seminole County Development Review Fund, Clerk of the Circuit Court Maryanne Morse and her staff revealed that some developers were overcharged by the county as much as \$150,000 while others were undercharged a total of \$69,000.

The Development Review Fund is used to account for the revenue and costs associated with implementing and enforcing the county building codes. A large portion of the Development Review Fund are impact fees, which are collected from developers for new construction, expansions or remodeling.

The impact fees are collected to provide the county with necessary funding for the cost of capital facilities required as a result of the growth in population. The county collects impact fees for roads, emergency medical services, libraries, schools and respective fire districts.

"Was I surprised? I wish I could say I was, but I had a feeling coming in that there were some issues out there," said Don Fisher, director of the Seminole

County Planning and Development Department. "Kevin (Fall, financial manager) and I immediately, without even knowing what the results of the audit would be, started working on a few issues."

Fisher and Fall even had a follow-up report to the audit published April 26 before the audit was released on May 1. According to Fisher, many of the problems arose because of two reasons; a new implemented computer software program and a lack of protocol for assessing impact fees.

"When you get a county like Seminole where there is tremendous turnover and a \$650 million budget you're are going to get some people that don't know what they're doing," Morse said about the audit's discoveries.

The audit produced three major findings:

- The first finding outlined the gross discrepancy in impact fees assessed to developers. From the computer system, the Internal Audit selected a sample of 86 building applications totaling more than \$2.75 million in impact fees. Internal audit found discrepancies in more than one-third of the sample.

The largest error occurred

when a rate input was incorrectly entered into the computer system and consequently Bill Heard Chevrolet was overcharged \$150,350. County employees also undercharged a developer \$10,300 when the incorrect square footage was entered into the computer.

"The nonresidential permits are unique to each building because they are based on square footage and what not, all of those now as supposed to go through a technician and out the door they go through Kevin (Fall's) office for a double check," Fisher said. "Primarily it was one major over assessment to Bill Heard, and that was a double charge. I don't know the details how it was entered twice, but it certainly was put into our system two times. We immediately refunded the over assessment even before the audit came out. The others were much more minor in comparison and those are all taken care of."

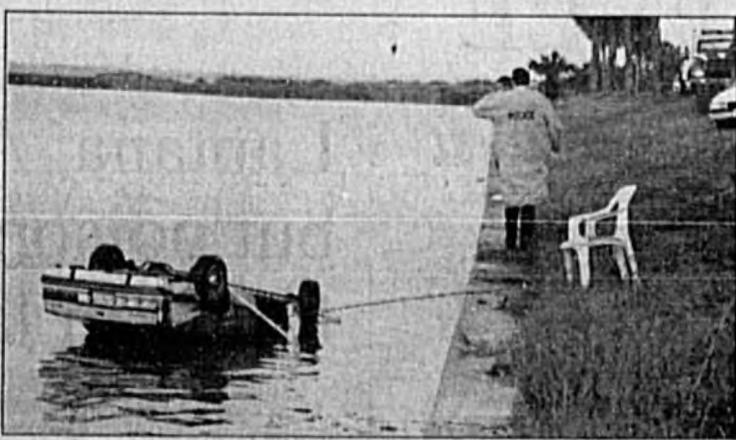

The county owes the county several hundred dollars from re-inspections, even though building department records indicate that building permits are routinely issued to him.

The department answered the problem by creating a monthly outstanding fees report that will help the department address and collect all outstanding debts from developers.

The audit's third finding recommended the planning and development department establish written policies and procedures to document how the division will accept applications, process permits, schedule inspections, collect fees, document its work. The response report prepared by Fisher's department created those policies and procedures for the operations pertaining to the Development Review Fund.

According to Fall, the problems pointed out in the audit were caused by the constant winds of change through the department's processes.

"One thing that is very hard for the average person to realize — I've been here since 1987 in four or five positions and it has gotten me the most — is how the various processes change," Fall said. "Those things change not just from the people that are processing them and the ordinances override those things, but the platforms or the vehicles we use to do them."

"I mean it used to be we do everything on a spreadsheet with a piece of paper and 32 column spreadsheets. Then we started getting into Lotus and the very first stages of computerization. All of those things have evolved where we're at now and in the last five to seven years almost every county operation has gone through some type of change in their (computer system) platform."

"From our stand point it couldn't come at a worse time," Fall said. "It was the same time we were booming with development, so we were having to process more volumes of work with a system that was new to us, that we had a learning curve on and it didn't do everything the old system used to do."

Lantana: A beautiful but poisonous plant found in landscapes

Lantana, also known as shrub verbena, is native to the West Indies but naturalized in Florida where three native species of Lantana occur. It is grown in Florida because of its beautiful flower colors and great adaptability to different environmental conditions. It is widely planted in butterfly gardens and recommended for dry areas in the landscape.

hybrids of native and exotic species. Weeping lantana is a lavender-flowered species from South America that can be used as a ground cover or placed in pots throughout the garden.

Ecological Significance
It is considered a serious weed in many countries and

in some areas has altered habitats and threatens to eliminate populations of native plants and animals. In Florida, it often forms thickets in sunny open areas, commonly invading disturbed sites such as roadsides, spoil islands, pastures, citrus groves, and cultivated woodlands.

The Plant
Lantana is a deciduous shrub up to 6 feet or more in height, with multiple square stems, covered with bristly hairs when green, often armed as well with scattered small prickles.

Leaves are opposite, simple, blades oval, rough hairy, to 6 inches long and 2.4 inches wide, with blunt-toothed margins and blade bases broad, squared off; leaves have a pungent odor when crushed. Flowers are small, multicolored, borne in stalked, dense, flat-topped cluster about 1.5 inches across with the corolla forming a narrow tube with four short spreading lobes.

Flowers may be white to pink or lavender, yellow to orange or red, changing colors over time. Fruit is a round, fleshy, two-seeded drupe, about 0.2 inches wide, green turning purple then blue-black when mature.

Culture
Grows in many types of well drained soils and is drought tolerant once established. Flowers best in full sun. Cuttings for propagation can be taken at any time, except when the plant is dormant.

Varieties
The varieties 'Gold Mound', 'New Gold', 'Alba', and 'Patriot' are not known to produce viable seed in nursery or landscape plantings. Other varieties available are 'Confetti', 'Flame', 'Raspberry', 'Salmon', and 'Tangerine.' Most yellow-flowered lantanas found in nurseries are

Also frequent in well-drained undisturbed habitats such as native pinelands, hammocks, and beach dunes. Widely promoted for ornamental cultivation since the early 1800s, it has extensively hybridized with native Lantanas, contaminating the local gene pool. Strongly resists foraging, contributing to its pest-plant status outside its natural range. Can tolerate fire by regenerating from basal shoots.

It produces flowers year-round in warm weather. Seeds dispersed by birds.

Toxicity
This plant is considered to be one of the chief causes of poisoning in Florida. The soft green, unripe fruits are the most dangerous.

The ripe fruits are apparently not harmful, but the leaves are known to be fataly poisonous to animals, even in relatively small quantities.

Pests And Diseases
Caterpillars can destroy foliage and reduce flowering. Control with any recommended insecticides.

Victim warns women to be careful when dating friends

There are two things I would like to say. To other women: Be very careful of whom you are alone with no matter how well you think you know the man, and watch your drink at all times.

To friends and parents of the rapist: When a woman says she has been raped, please believe her. Most women will not put themselves through the painful experience of telling people they have been raped unless it is true.

Abby, I don't blame myself for what happened, but I wish I had been more aware and less trusting.

SURVIVOR IN SAN FRANCISCO

DEAR SURVIVOR: Having known the man since childhood, there was no reason not to trust him. You could not have foreseen that he would criminally violate you. According to studies cited by Gall Abarbanel, president of The Rape Foundation in Santa Monica, Calif., 80 percent of rapes are committed by someone the woman knows. Although acquaintance rape is often questioned, women MUST report such crimes to the authorities. A woman has a right to say no to sex, and when a man denies her the right to say no by slipping her drugs or forcing her, he is committing a criminal act. If the victim doesn't report him, he will be free to rape again.

I urge you to report your childhood friend's crime to the authorities to stop him from violating another woman as he did you.

DEAR ABBY: I am disturbed by the way some people categorize others. I will use myself as an example.

I have eight piercings in one ear — none in the other — and a tongue ring. (I also have a couple of tattoos, but they are not visible.) Right away, people put me in the "freak" category. What they do not know is that I am the mother of a beautiful 5-month-old girl. I am totally responsible for her and work very hard to give her a "normal" life without a father.

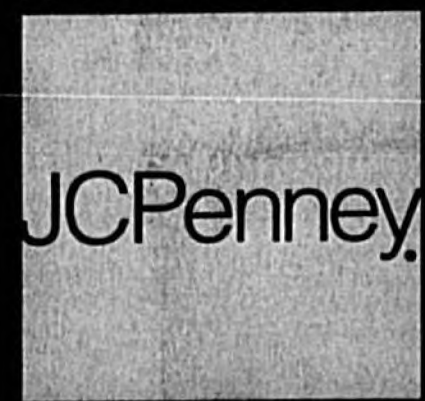

Economic benefits of boat ramps and piers revealed

In 2000, Floridians and tourists made 5.5 million visits to public boat ramps, 10 million visits to public salt-water piers and 750,000 visits to piers owned by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), according to a recent study conducted by the agency.

The total economic impact of public boat ramps statewide is approximately \$1.3 billion per year in Florida. In addition, more than 25,000 jobs are created statewide, and almost \$128 million generated in state and local tax revenue.

Similarly, the total economic impact of public piers is more than \$479 million annually. More than 9,000 jobs are created statewide and \$36 million collected as state and local taxes. The average economic impact per year for saltwater boat ramps is \$1 million and \$440,000 for freshwater ramps. The combined total economic impact for pier and boat ramps is \$1.8 billion, generating 34,944 jobs and \$165 million in state taxes.

"Clearly, public boat ramps and piers are important not only to their users but also to thousands of Floridians who are inextricably linked to the recreation supported by boat ramps and piers," said Dave McElveen, FWC's planning director.

The FWC is the state agency responsible for the management of state-operated ramps and piers. The agency worked with economists from Florida A & M University and Florida State University to evaluate the benefits and economic expenditures generated by recreational boaters and others who use public boat ramps and piers.

"The information from this study will be used by the FWC and other public agencies to make better informed decisions in design and construction of future boat ramps and piers," McElveen said. "Such decisions also depend on an accurate assessment of the economic importance of these facilities, including an understanding of how their use might impact the local, regional and state economies and measuring the enjoyment they provide to their users."

Two things are on the agenda at the moment to help defray the costs and everyone with an interest in helping to put on the best tournament possible is encouraged to attend or help out.

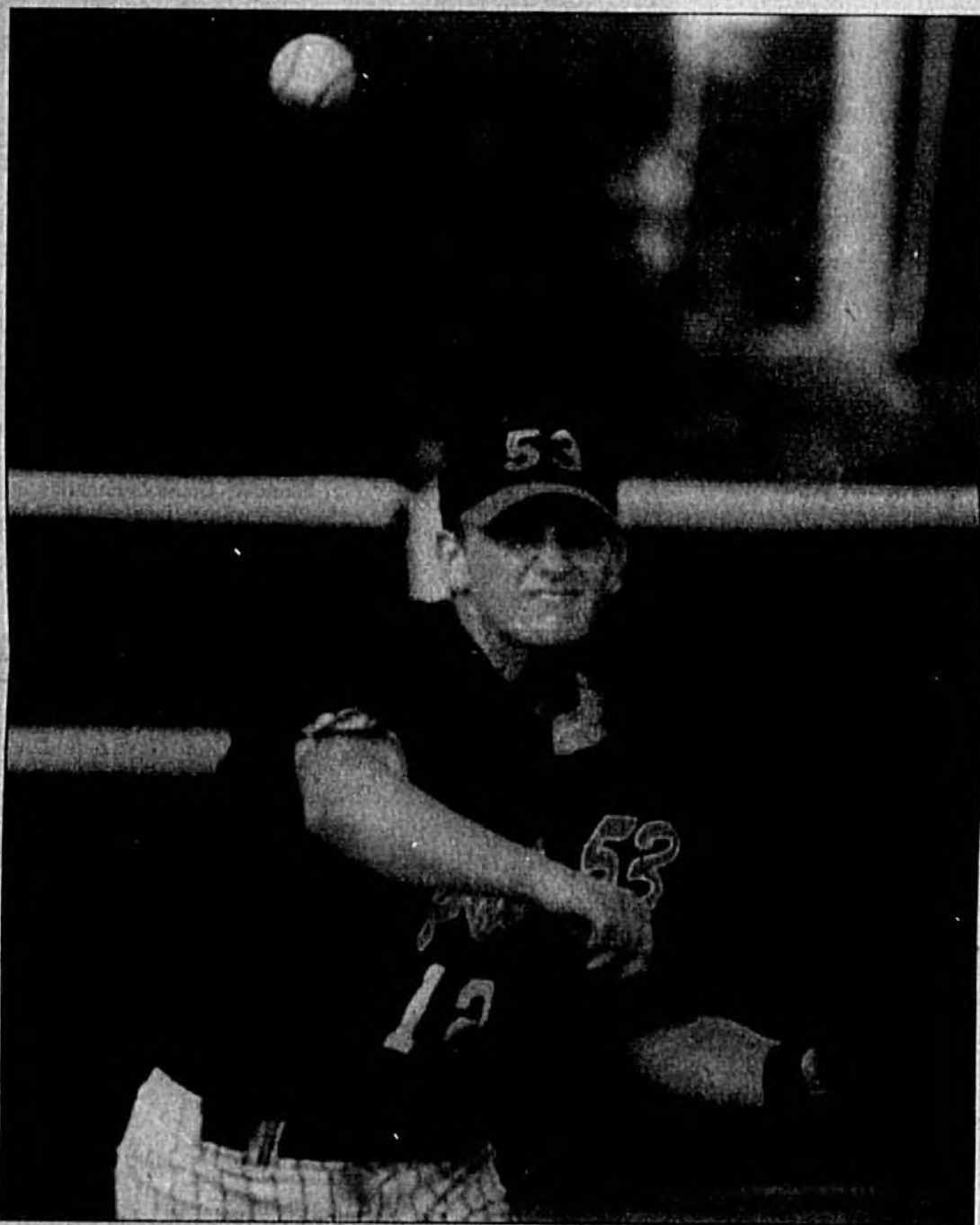
The first up will be a Professional Wrestling Show this Saturday at Seminole High School Bill Fleming Memorial Gymnasium.

SANFORD — In a world where even heroes are looked upon with as much suspicion as villains there comes along those few that just show genuine compassion and concern in making this world a better place.

One of those people lives here in Seminole County and his name is Martin Holloran. At 70 he is retiring from coaching middle school basketball at All Souls Catholic this year. Ending a career in youth sports spanning 40 years that started in Massachusetts.

Citing concerns for his health and a need to see his children and grandchildren, which spans five states, he will be just as busy as when he was coaching.

He came to All Souls seven years ago when he his wife, Marylee and granddaughter, Karen Holloran moved to Seminole County.

With so many years involved in sales, Holloran added, "I would be so stressed from my job, the gym relaxed me."

Holloran said his secret has been a mixture of discipline and just an important need to be involved with the kids lives.

Part of that involvement was allowing every player play at least one quarter even if it meant losing a game.

"I felt it was important to learn the fundamentals of basketball," said Holloran.

He immediately wanted to be a part of the basketball program at All Souls where as he saw it, "I became a fixture at the school," said Holloran. "I just was doing something that I love. I feel I am giving something back to the Lord and the children."

best action with bass will be early and late in the day. Bream and catfish will continue to bite steadily. The Puzzle Lake area will still provide fair bass action due to low water levels. Most of the bass are confined to the narrow channel, where they are easily located in deep bends and slough mouths.
Sebastian Inlet has good catch-and-release snook action with linesides to 20 pounds. Also expect fair action with redfish, trout and flounder. A few tarpon will also be present.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports fair to good offshore action with cobia, dolphin and king mackerel. Reefs such as 8 A and Pelican Flats will have all three species on any given day. A few king mackerel are also just off the beach and in the buoy line. Sheepshead and flounder are

biting inside the Port, while trout and redfish are rated as fair in the Banana and Indian rivers.
Ponce Inlet has fast action with sheepshead, drum, redfish, jack crevalle and a few flounder. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

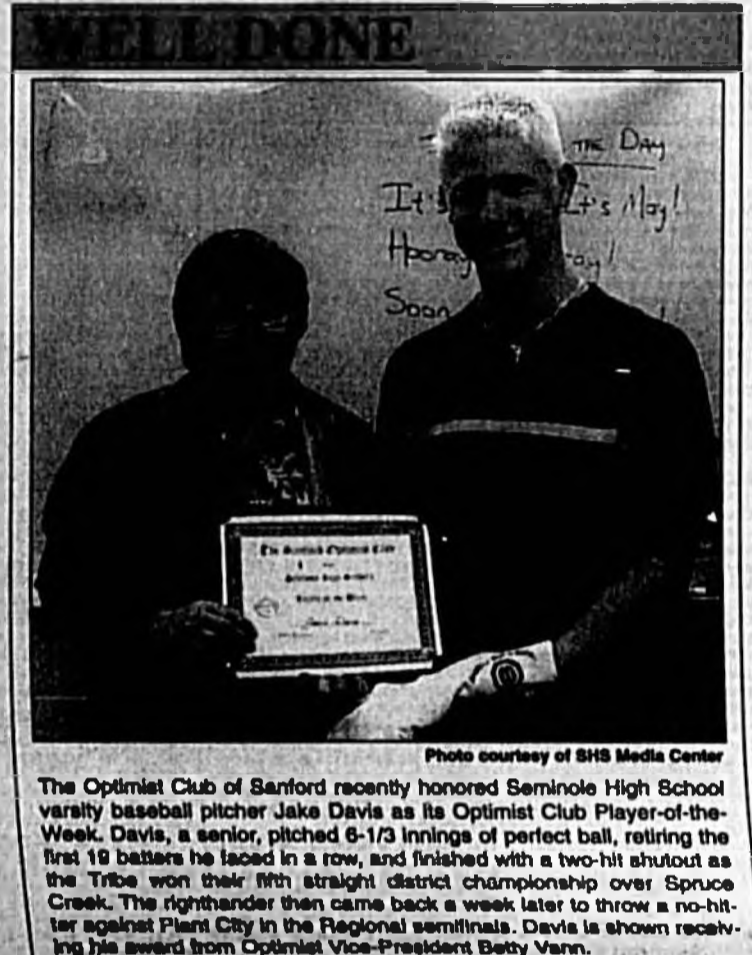

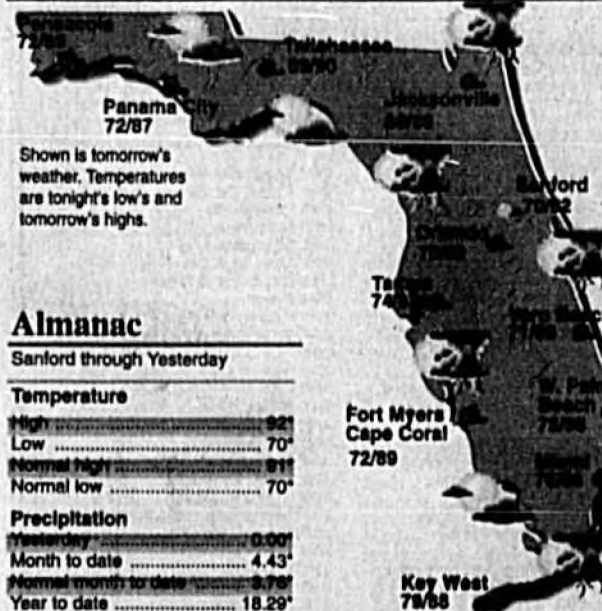

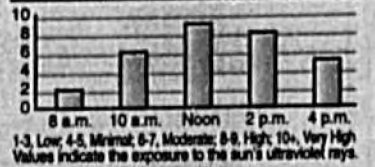
