Claims 1st Ballot McGovern: Over The Top

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen George S. McGovern said today

he has received assurances of enough added support from blacks to assure him of a firstballot nomination at the Democratic National Convention. McGovern, Rep. Walter Fauntroy of the District of Columbia, Rep. Louis Stokes, D Ohio, and other black delegates

96% previously uncommitted delegate votes for the South Dakota senator.

'There is no question now,' McGovern said, "that this is enough to put us over the top in July on the first ballot. It gives us a generous margin of 115,"

In return for the commitments of black delegates from 12 states and the District has assured black leaders that federal judgeships and posts within a McGovern administration "in reasonable proportion" to their numbers in the

Murder Suspect was studying . . . all intent on baying nothing more than what

Michael Francis Whalen, charged in the murder of Richard Franklin Day, assistant manager of a Casselberry liquor store, this morning entered a guilty plea to the charge before Circuit Judge Dominick Salfi.

Judge Salfi accepted the guilty plea and a hearing will be held tomorrow upon aspects of the case. State Attorney Abbott Herring asked for the

death penalty, while Defense Attorney David Ervin requested mercy. Each will argue his position before Judge Salfi tomorrow; Herring citing the aggravation factor in the case, which the state feels warrants the electric chair and the defense arguing the mitigating circumstance aspect. Herring probably will place witnesses on the stand to support the state's contention.

Whalen, 34, already faces a life sentence in a guilty plea on May 23 to robbery of the store. In this instance, he and Fulton Perkins forced store manager Walter Barone to open the store. The state, in the negotiated plea, dropped charges of kidnapping in the case.

The murder occurred last Dec. 27, when Day was found stabbed to death on a remote road near Trinity Preparatory School.

Perkins pleaded guilty to the murder charge on May 1, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. The state dropped robbery and kidnapping charges against Perkins.



Prisoners Face New Charges

Sheriff John Polk said today two county jail prisoners who tried to overpower a jailer and escape Friday afternoon will be charged with attempting to escape and assaulting an officer.

The sheriff said Raymond Harold Gray, brought here for trial on an auto larceny charge after having been sentenced to a 30-year-term in state prison, and James Everett Brown, 25, of Charleston, W. Va., an escapee from Tampa, would be charged after they tried to overpower Jailer Hanford (Dusty) Rhodes.

Sheriff Polk said one of the men asked Rhodes to let him out into the walkway to get a drink of water.

After the jailer opened the cell door, Polk said the two men jumped Rhodes but the escape attempt was not successful as other jailers came

Brown was unsuccessful in a June 13 escape try when he was being returned to his cell from a hearing at the courthouse. He kicked off his shoes and ran but was recaptured minutes later by Sanford police Lt. Edward (Bucky) Hayden. Brown was caught inside a Handy Store by Deputy Scott Grant June 3.

Reds' New Forces

HONG KONG (AP) - North Vietnam said today that "new forces" have joined the struggle to maintain its transportation system against the heavy U.S. bombing.

The statement, which came at the end of a long description of that struggle, did not identify the new forces. Radio Hanoi claimed the maintenance efforts were succeeding.

Flood Cleanup

Massive cleanup, relief and rebuilding efforts have begun as the flood waters recede in the devastated East. The death toll from the week-long storm stood at 117 today and tens of thousands remained homeless.

The governors of five states and a representative from a sixth met in Harrisburg, Pa., Sunday with George A. Lincoln, director of the President's Office of Emergency Preparedness.

14 Guerrillas Shot

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) -British troops claimed they shot 14 guerrillas in gun battles Sunday as the cease-fire promised by the Provisional wing of the Irish Republican Army neared. Six other persons were killed during the weekend, raising Northern Ireland's death toll to at least 383 in three years of communal violence.

British officials feared the guerrillas planned to press the assault right up to midnight tonight, when the cease-fire was scheduled to begin.







Know-How Needed for Washing Nylon Curtains

Polly's Problem DEAR POLLY-I have made many crewelwork pictures and pillows, so consequently have a lot of eftover yarn and I would like some suggestions as to how this might be used .- MRS. H. L. F.

DEAR POLLY-My Pet Peeve is with greeting cards with a glossy or wax finish that are impossible to write on, either with a ballpoint or a regular pen. Manufacturers, please note.-MRS. F. G.

DEAR POLLY-Emma, who has wrinkles in her nylon

curtains, should never wring them when she washes the curtains. When washed, add a little starch to the rinse water, put the curtains in a basket, carry out-of-doors and hang on the line while dripping wet. A windy day is best, as the wind should blow out any wrinkles. As the wrinkles are already in Emma's curtains, it may take two or three soakings to remove them.-ROSE

DEAR POLLY-My nylon marquisette curtains used to be a mess after washing, but now I sprinkle them and but waxed paper between the iron and the curtains and they look beautiful after ironing. I also use waxed paper to iron net. Hope this helps Emma .- MRS. J. C. B.

DEAR GIRLS-If long nylon curtains are hard to lift up and down so as not to get any wrinkles as they are being washed, try folding lengthwise and then over and over to make a square or rectangle and rub soapy water into them with the hands, being sare to keep turning so they get clean all the way through. Rinse the same way. NEVER squeeze or wring so wrinkles form during the laundering. After they drip-dry, if the hems do not look as nice as you would like, push the ironing board up against the window and press hems with curtains still hanging.-POLLY

DEAR POLLY-A sixpack pop bottle carton comes in handy for storing baby's bottles in the refrig erator. They are easy pick up if something in the back is needed and also this keeps six bottles from this keeps six bottles from tipping over in every direction. When I make up new formula and still have one or two bottles left over, I slip a rubber band over

They have been looking for an end to poverty, for more and better jobs, schools, houses, recreation But the critical fact, of course, is that these expectations have been only partly fulfilled. We all know the huge gap between promise or

Like others, I have written often of the politicians' deepest habit of overpromising, which surely has come fullest flower in recent decades.

In the unfolding summer of 1972, the consequences of all this threaten to be desperately serious. Explicit in the voicing of the citizens' discontents is their plea for leaders "who mean what they say." Translated, that signifies desire for leaders who will in fact deliver on things already promised by others, and maybe on much more. Should Sen. George McGovern move in the months ahead to win the Democratic presidential nomination and then the fall election, this could prove to be the worst man trap ever prepared for a White House occu-

For McGovern has been a superextravagant promiser and yet, in a time of great disillusionment, he has been believed. The burden upon him as president thus would

Rape Victim Tells Jury Of Attack

A 10-man, two-woman Circuit Court bory heard testimony this morning from the victim of the rape for which Willie Anderson, 28, possibly faces the death penalty. Anderson is charged with raping the 17-year-old Sanford girl on April 15. She reported to police she was assaulted in bushes between Oak and Myrtle Avenues, and that she was beaten by her assailant, whom she knew, when she attempted to resist his advances. The victim, barely speaking above a whisper,

related intercourse had lasted for 30 minutes; that she fought her assailant so violently he knocked off her wig, and that she attempted to escape while the defendant retrieved it. Later, she testified, he offered her two \$20 bills and said if she reported the rape, he would kill her. The victim said she recognized the defendant but did not know him on a name-to-name basis. After the alleged rape, she said, she walked to

her home, pursued by the assailant and was scared "he'd grab me again." The young victim, who wore her ebony hair in pigtails, said blows to her eye, inflicted by the defendant, resulted in four stitiches. She returned to her home, after meeting a patrol
