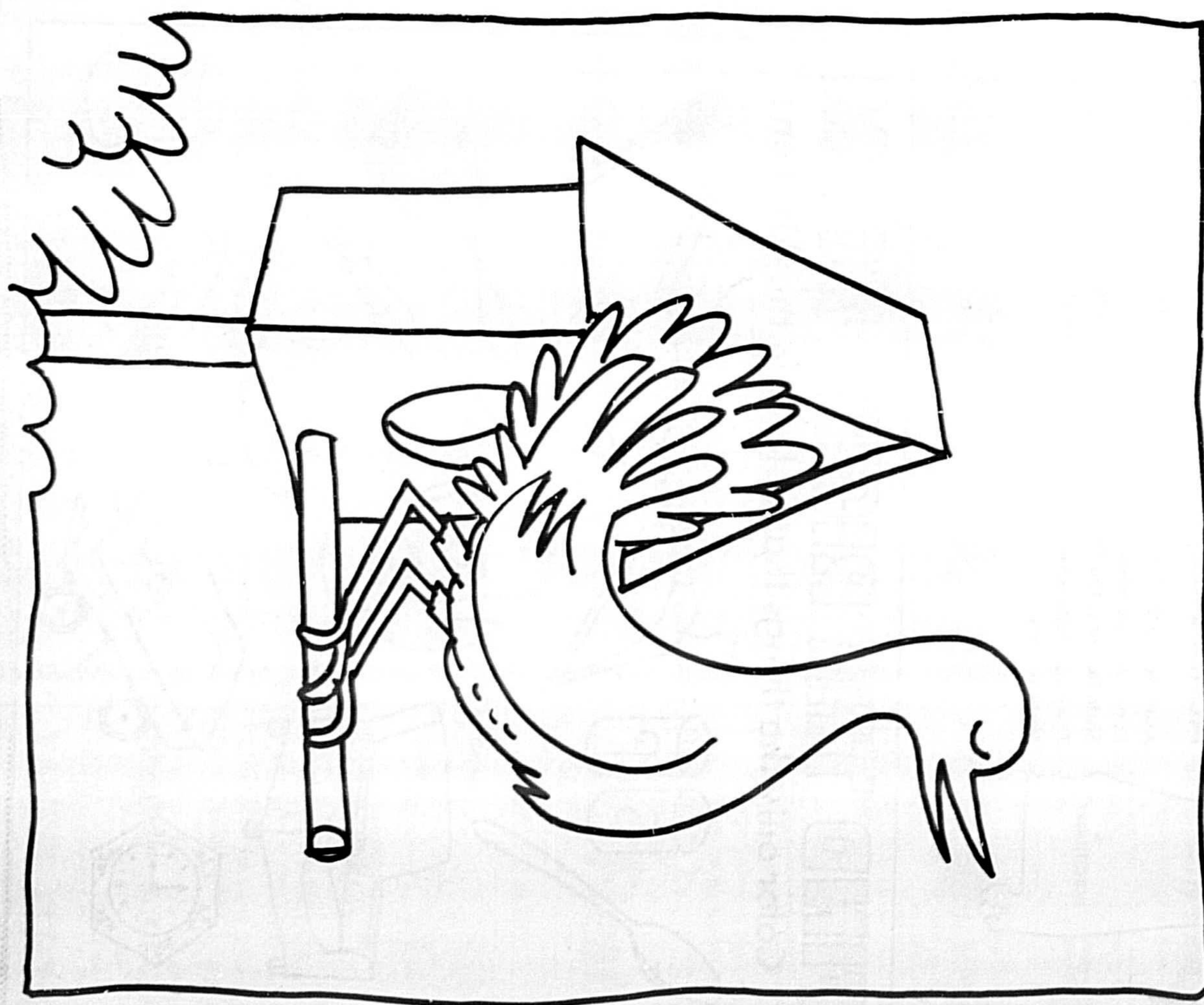

Mitchells In Hassle On Politics

NEW YORK (AP)—Martha Mitchell says the election campaign "is nothing but a cops and robbers game, and I'm trying to get my husband out of it."

The wife of former Atty. Gen. John Mitchell flew in from California Sunday and told the New York Daily News in an interview, "All I want is my husband back."

"There is no reason for us to be involved in politics," she told reporter Marcia Kramer in an interview at her two-room suite at the Westchester Country Club in Rye, N.Y.

Mrs. Mitchell's husband left the Cabinet to head the Committee to Re-elect the President. She declined to talk about the "dirty things" she knew about politics, but was voluble about her dispute with a security guard that she said led her to leave her Newport Beach, Calif., villa.

Murder Suspect Enters Guilty Plea

Michael Francis Whalen, charged in the murder of Richard Franklin Day, assistant manager of a Casseberry liquor store, this morning entered a guilty plea to the charge before Circuit Judge Dominick Salfi.

Judge Salfi accepted the guilty plea and a hearing will be held tomorrow upon aspects of the case.

State Attorney Abbott Herring asked for the death penalty, while Defense Attorney David Ervin requested mercy. Each will argue his position before Judge Salfi tomorrow; Herring citing the aggravation factor in the case, which the state feels warrants the electric chair and the defense arguing the mitigating circumstance aspect. Herring probably will place witnesses on the stand to support the state's contention.

Whalen, 34, already faces a life sentence in a guilty plea on May 23 to robbery of the store. In this instance, he and Fulton Perkins forced store manager Walter Barone to open the store. The state, in the negotiated plea, dropped charges of kidnapping in the case.

The murder occurred last Dec. 27, when Day was found stabbed to death on a remote road near Trinity Preparatory School.

Perkins pleaded guilty to the murder charge on May 1, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. The state dropped robbery and kidnapping charges against Perkins.

Claims 1st Ballot McGovern: Over The Top

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. George S. McGovern said today he has received assurances of enough added support from blacks to assure him of a first-ballot nomination at the Democratic National Convention.

McGovern, Rep. Walter Fauntroy of the District of Columbia, Rep. Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, and other black delegates in the past several days 96% previously uncommitted delegate votes for the South Dakota senator.

"There is no question now," McGovern said, "that this is enough to put us over the top in July on the first ballot. It gives us a generous margin of 15," he said.

In return for the commitments of black delegates from 12 states and the District of Columbia, McGovern has assured black leaders that blacks would be appointed to federal judgeships and posts within a McGovern administration "in reasonable proportion" to their numbers in the population.

Fauntroy told newsmen the new McGovern delegate strength includes: Alabama 1 vote; Connecticut 4; Louisiana 14; Ohio 8; Mississippi 15; Illinois 3; Missouri 8; New Jersey 3; South Carolina 7; Georgia 8; and D.C. 12%.

The figures added up to 96% rather than 95%. There was no immediate explanation for the discrepancy.

The announcement culminated several days of meetings and long-distance telephone calls seeking the previously uncommitted black delegates.

At an earlier news conference this morning, Stokes, head of the congressional black caucus, said the McGovern delegates would be appointed to federal judgeships and posts within a McGovern administration "in reasonable proportion" to their numbers in the population.

Altamonte Will Fight For Mayor

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Mayor Lawrence Swafford faces what will make a decision on a course of action to be initiated in the possible difficulties Mayor Lawrence Swafford faces with the U. S. Department of Internal Revenue.

An agent of the IRS, Trevor Hawk, has challenged a salary increase Mayor Swafford received last December which hiked his remuneration from \$7,300 annually to a full time position of \$12,000.

According to Hawk, the increase exceeds the federally approved limitation of 3.5 per cent. Hawk also proposed the salary increase be rescinded. However, Mayor Swafford has contended, and the council has concurred, that the increase is justified with the added responsibilities which he has assumed as well as the growth factor in the city.

Council also will consider the Legacy of Parks program, which is being developed in phases. The city, it is felt, is in need of recreational facilities but possibly a priority will be placed in erecting concession stands at existing baseball diamonds as well as sanitary facilities.

The city's planners, Harlan Hansen, George Huffman and Al Lewis, will be on hand to present the new city and county zoning map and Lewis presumably will discuss regulations which are being initiated governing fences.

Council probably will approve plats of Northwood and Barclay Woods. The plats were tentatively approved last week subject to appropriate bonds and, according to City Clerk Jane Richards, the bonds now have been received by the city.

Trucker Held For Income Tax

JACKSONVILLE — Franklin John Rathbun, West Palm Beach trucking firm owner and former head of the Florida Trucking Association, was arrested in West Palm Beach by special agents of the Internal Revenue Service, intelligence division.

Rathbun was charged with 36 violations with respect to the withholding of social security and income taxes from the wages of employees. The criminal information filed by the U.S. attorney in Miami specifically charged that on 36 different occasions during 1969 and 1970 Rathbun withheld over \$11,000 in taxes from the wages of the employees of Scarlett Truck Service but did not deposit the funds in a trust account for payment to the Internal Revenue Service as required by law.

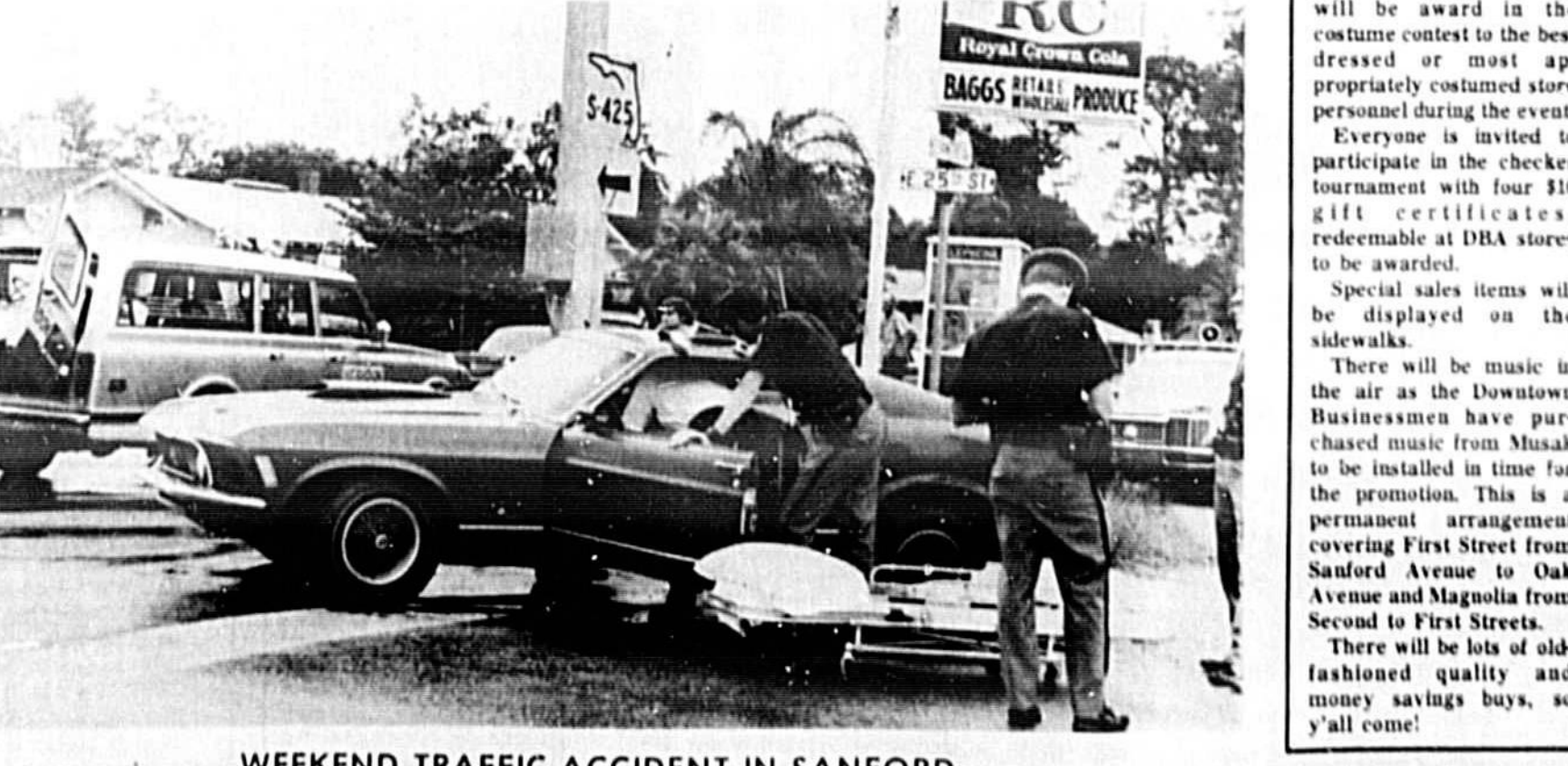

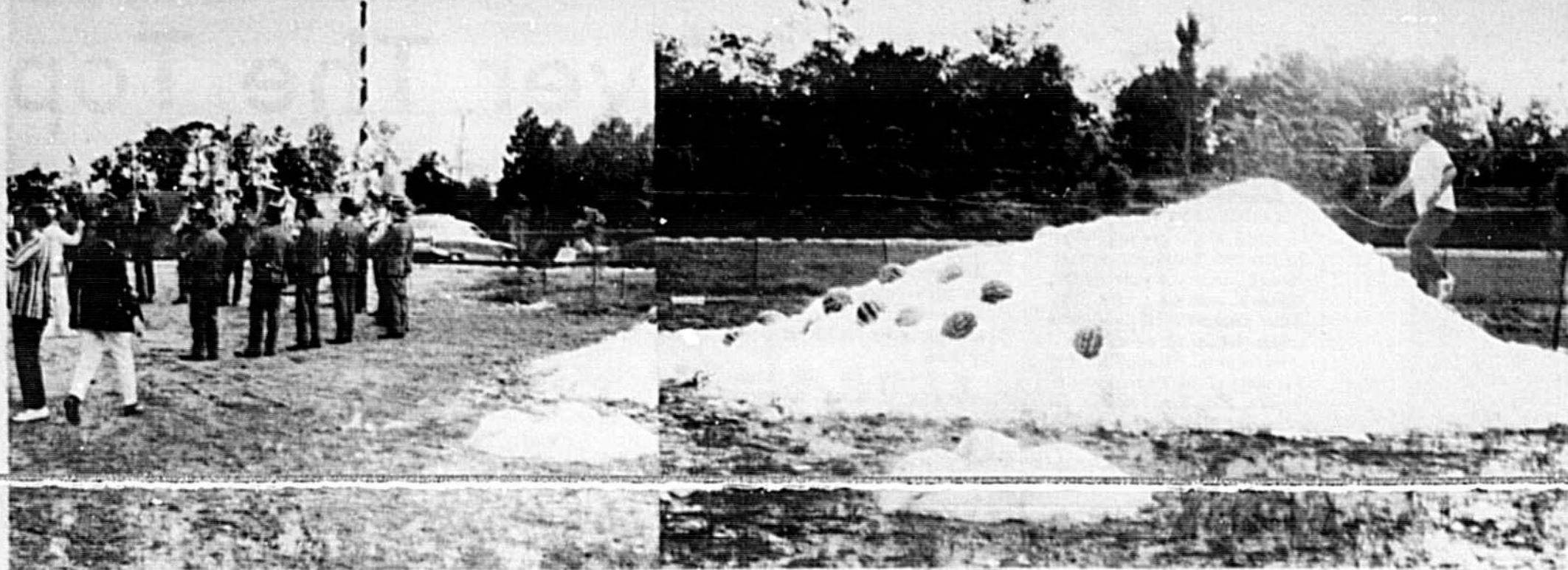

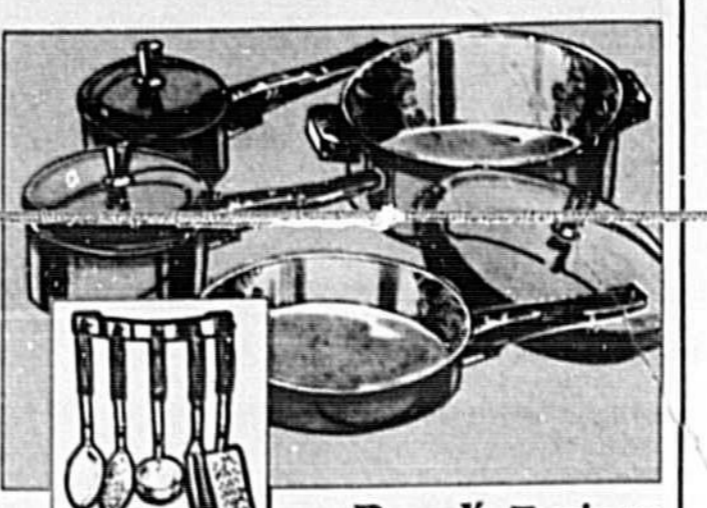
The bride's mother chose a becoming two piece jacket dress of imported double knit in a spice shade, with beige accessories and a corsage of Regal Gold sweet heart roses.

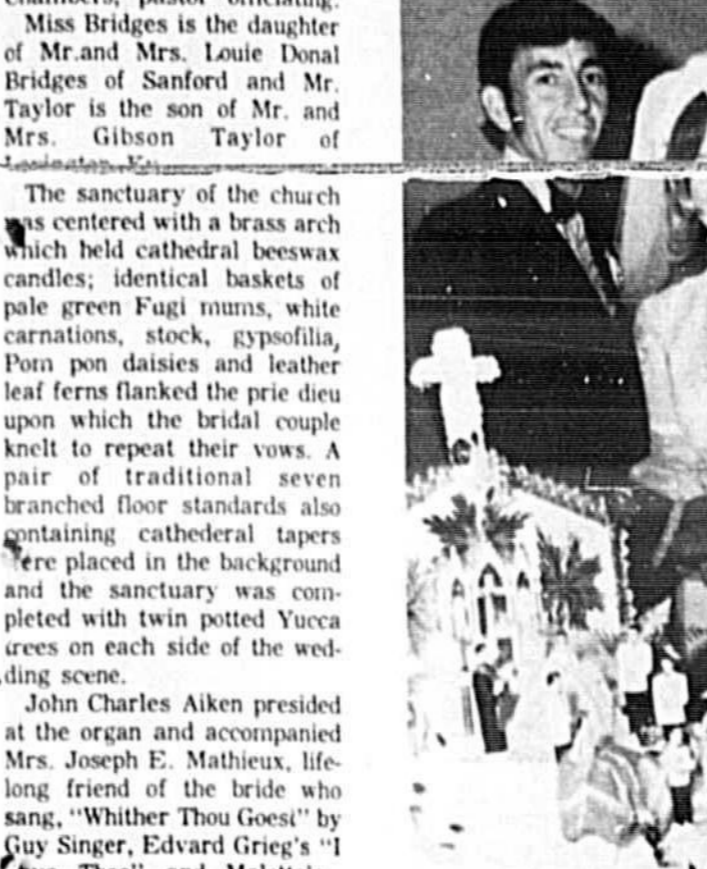

In Writing Platform Demos Facing 'Storms'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The speedy Democratic platform drafters, who nearly avoided intraparty warfare on their job, are now facing a storm of criticism and slower going today in Vietnam, defense spending and school busing.

Spokesman for Sen. George McGovern and Gov. George C. Wallace indicated that minority proposals would be introduced, precipitating floor fights at the drafting sessions of the full 150-member Platform Committee today and Tuesday.

Sen. Fred R. Harris of Oklahoma also urged platform drafters to revolt against their 15-member drafting subcommittee by demanding stronger tax-reform and anti-trust planks and a denunciation of strip-mining.

consider the subcommittee's proposed busing plan—still not disclosed to the public or the full drafting committee—is unsatisfactory. And a number of supporters of McGovern reportedly felt aggrieved that the South Dakotan's positions were inadequately reflected in the planks being drafted.

The small drafting subcommittee labored almost all Saturday night to produce three domestic planks. The policies started with a "guaranteed job" proposal and federal income supports not unlike McGovern's share-the-wealth plan—but far less specific.

The three planks will be general approval from spokesmen for Democratic presidential candidates. Back at its labors all day Sunday, the subcommittee planned to present a complete eight-plank draft to its parent

committee by this morning. That body in turn had 48 hours to rewrite and approve a final draft which must be in the mail to every delegate 10 days before the Democratic National convention opens in Miami Beach on July 10.

Sunday's draft planks called for a guaranteed job for everyone, plus replacement of the present welfare system by an "income-security program" providing federal payments to insure every family an income at or above the poverty level.

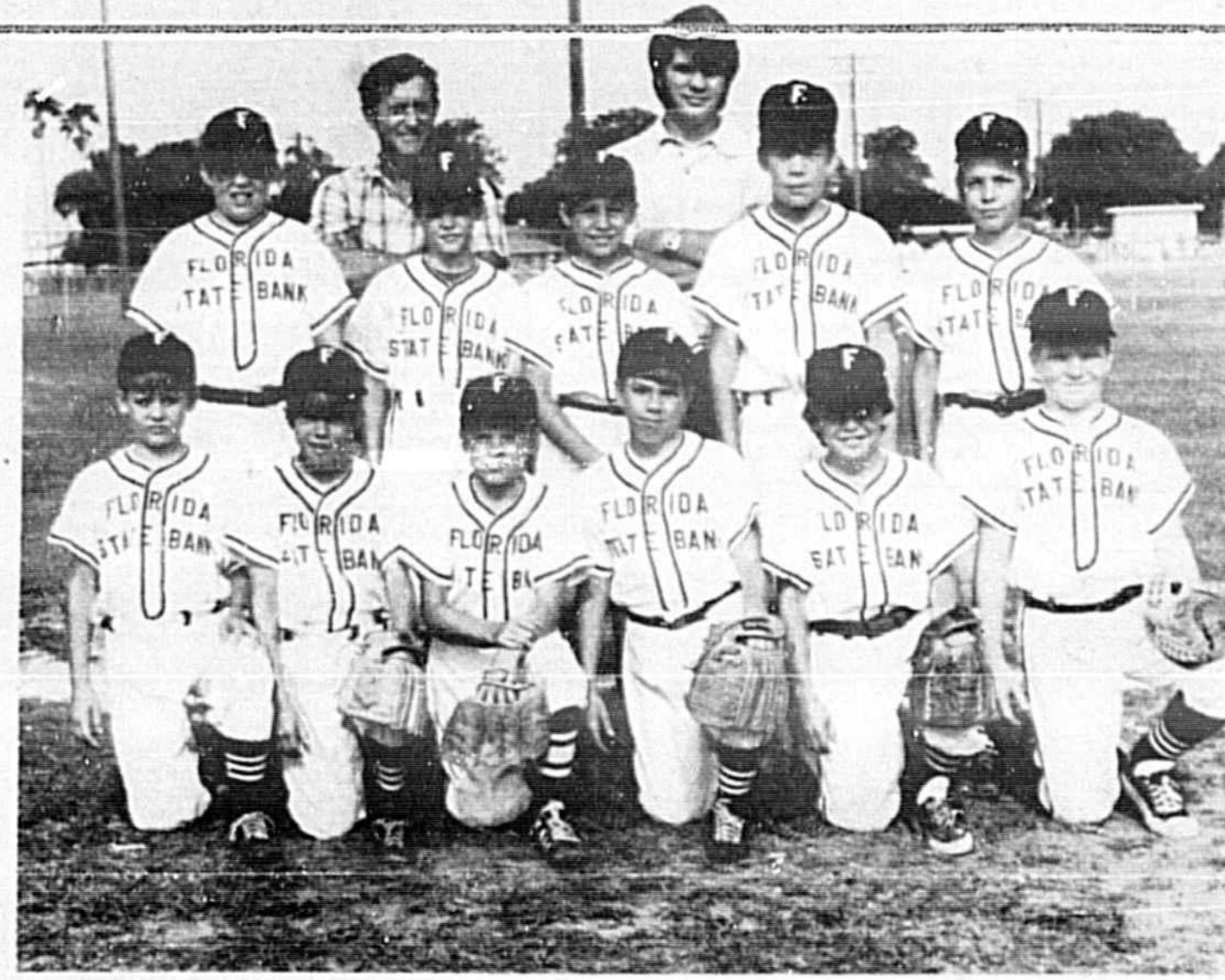

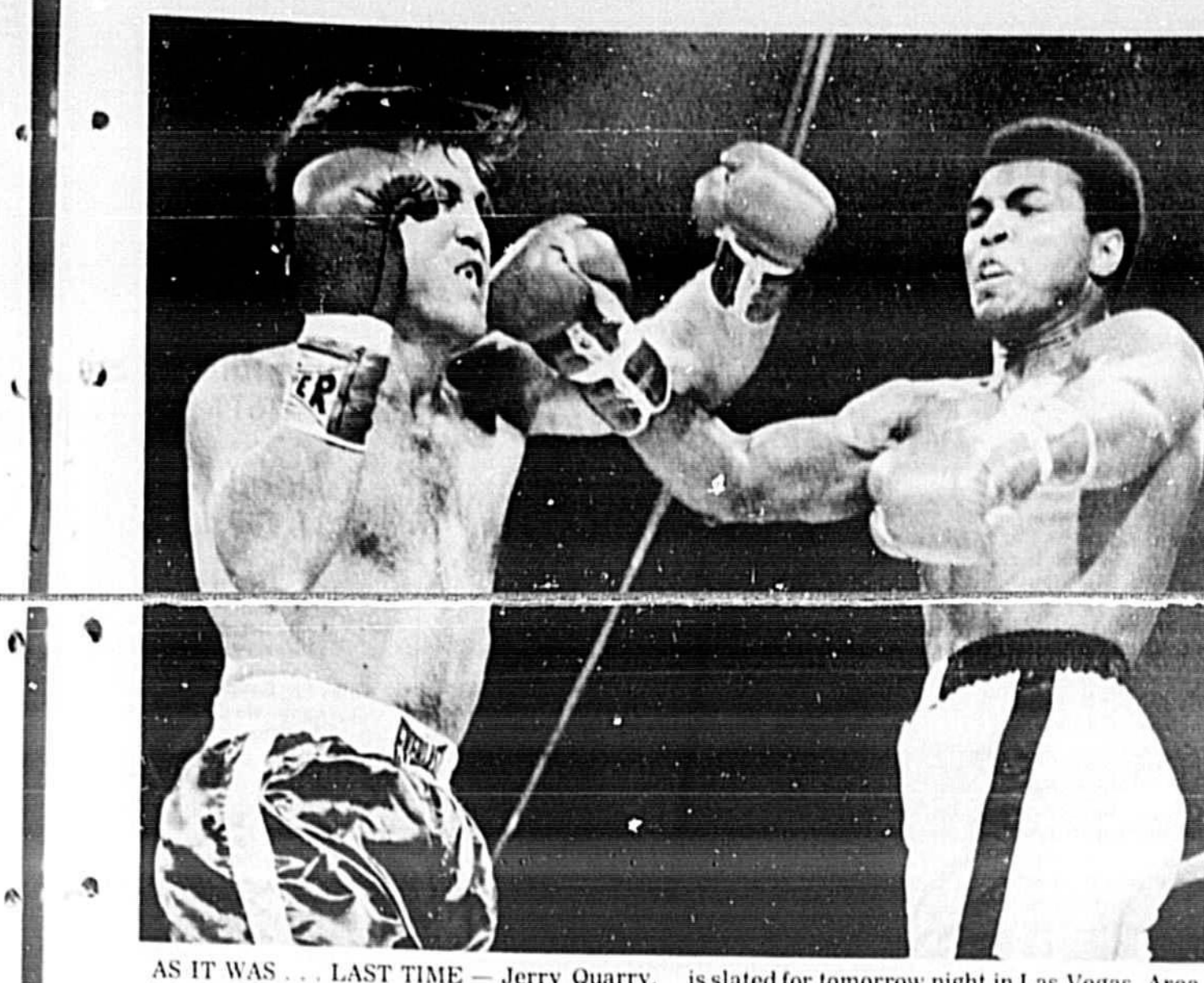

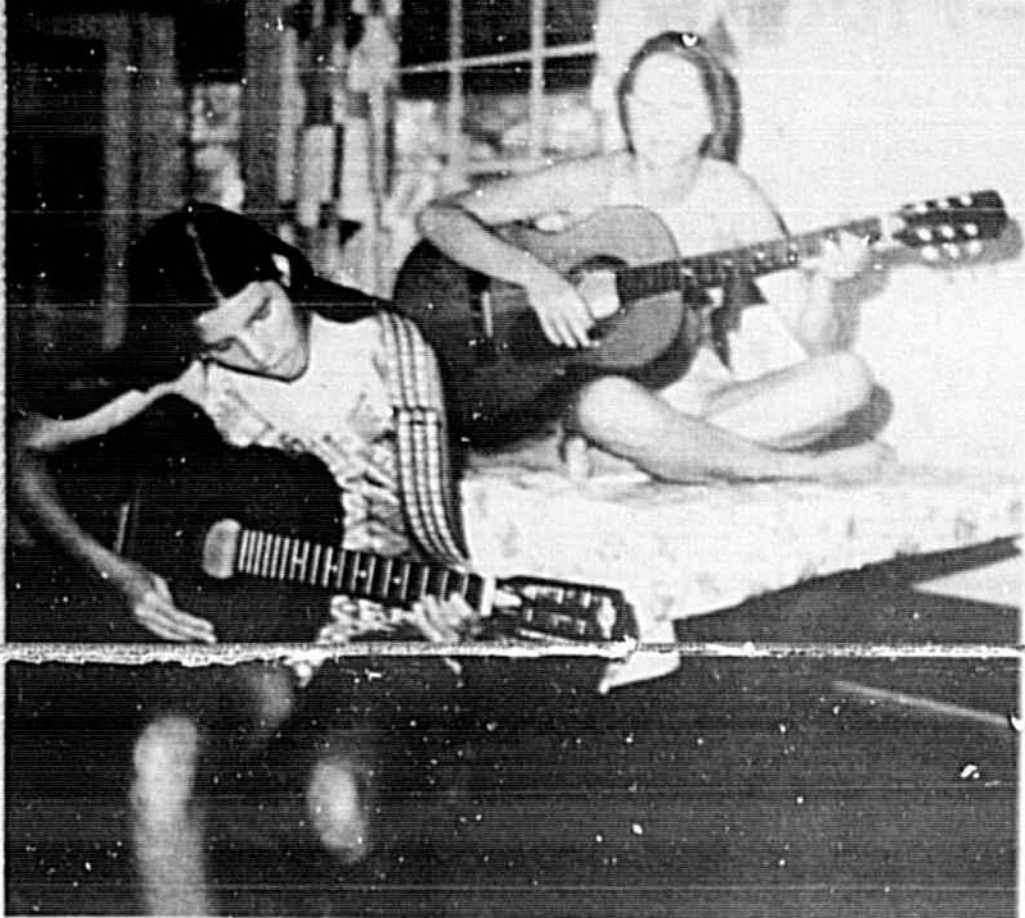

Pound Devaluation Hurts World Trade

By JOHN CUNIFF AP Business Analyst NEW YORK (AP)—The new and unexpected devaluation of the pound may not have an immediate impact on ordinary Americans but it is very bad news just the same. Britain's failure to maintain the value of its currency at about \$2.80 represents a defeat for the entire trading world. And since major nations are traders, most eventually will be affected, mainly adversely. British goods now will cost less in other countries, and so their exports can be expected to rise. Foreign goods will cost Britishers more than before, and so they will be forced to restrict imports.

But there are even larger matters involved. For many months the world's great trading nations have been seeking monetary reform, based on agreements to maintain currency values. Fixed values, it is felt, are necessary to provide confidence for trade. Even greater damage may have been done to another set of goals sought through a monetary union of Common Market nations. Under this agreement, Britain and other member nations agreed to maintain parity with each other. The challenge now is to coordinate the damage and repair the crack. But the danger exists also that it might spread and throw into disarray a good many other agreements that were laboriously worked out. In one respect the world's trading nations are being drawn together. But at the same time, many of them are either posing subtle restraints on trade or are declining to lift existing impediments.

Rape Victim Tells Jury Of Attack

By MARION BETHEA A 10-man, two-woman Circuit Court jury heard testimony this morning from the victim of the rape for which Willie Anderson, 28, possibly faces the death penalty. Anderson is charged with raping the 17-year-old Sanford girl on April 15. She reported to police she was assaulted in bushes between Oak and Myrtle Avenues, and that she was beaten by her assailant, whom she knew, when she attempted to resist his advances.

The victim, barely speaking above a whisper, related intercourse had lasted for 30 minutes; that she fought her assailant so violently he knocked off her wig, and that she attempted to escape while the defendant retrieved it. Later, she testified, he offered her two \$20 bills and said if she reported the rape, he would kill her. The victim said she recognized the defendant but did not know him on a name-to-name basis.

After the alleged rape, she said, she walked to her home, pursued by the assailant and was scared "he'd grab me again." The young victim, who wore her ebony hair in pigtails, said blows to her eye, inflicted by the defendant, resulted in four stitches. She returned to her home, after meeting a patrol car (she did not report the incident because she was scared), and then told her sister she had been raped by "one of the Anderson boys." An entourage comprised of her sister, mother, father, boy friend and sister's boy friend proceeded to the local hospital, where she was examined by a physician.
