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LBJ's 'Crisis Cities' Plan Far-Reaching

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's proposal to Congress for solving the "Crisis of the Cities" is more far-reaching than many urban experts have expected.

The rapidly worded message toward the regular Tuesday morning session of Congress included several proposals of possibly great impact that had not been part of the President's State of the Union or Budget messages. Foremost among these:

A program for the nation's big metropolitan areas to create a large number of new housing units for the first time. The initiative: Ten billion dollars.

A new federal committee to provide American families all through the year with an alternative to the crowded conditions of the slums and the ghettos.

Urban officials who reacted not to the proposal but to the message that the President has set his sights on the problems of big cities over the next four years, said one official, "and some people are going to think he should have gone further."

But considering the mood of the country and the mood of Congress for solving the "Crisis of the Cities" it is more far-reaching than many urban experts have expected.

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Red Troops Overwhelm Marine Platoon

SANFORD (AP) North Vietnamese troops ambushed and overwhelmed a U.S. Marine platoon of 500 yards outside the combat base today. A second platoon of about 40 men went to help also suffered casualties.

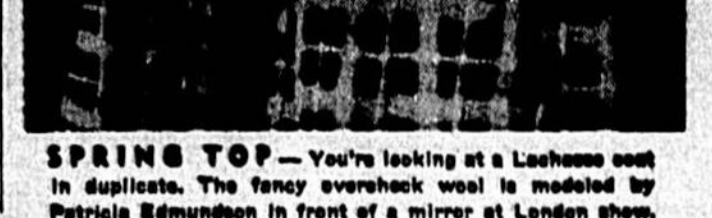
The heavy bombardment of the base also continued without stop, and several hundred rounds dropped into the base area today. Reports of the exact number also was varied.

The giant B-52 bombers also pounded suspected enemy positions and troop concentrations within three miles of the base.

Eight Marines were killed and wounded over the weekend by the enemy shelling of the base and a brief firefight involving a small Marine patrol south of the combat base. An American helicopter was shot down Sunday, but the crew escaped to safety.

Future King Charles Progressing In School

CAMBRIDGE, England (AP)—Prince Charles, heir to the British throne, has begun his second term at Cambridge University with his private life still in shadow. But his tutors say he is showing good academic progress.

The prince of Wales has established himself as a courteous, soft-spoken and self-effacing student at Cambridge's Trinity College. His fellow undergraduates now hardly bat an eye when the 18-year-old son of Queen Elizabeth II strolls into a lecture room.

"The main thing that's happened since he arrived last October is that nothing has happened," shrugged one of Charles' fellow students at Trinity. "He'll be king someday and I guess he just can't afford to take risks."

The risks he avoids are being seen in one of those pubs where, or being seen with one of the 200 codes who study among 9,000 males.

He has politely but firmly refused to accept invitations to tea or sherry parties from anyone who is not among his close circle of friends. A local nurse, Vivian Morgan, II, received a note "regarding" after she and public friends invited Charles to "bring his own bottle" to help celebrate the end of nursing school.

His Royal Highness prefers to entertain friends in a weekend cottage in nearby Norfolk—always unannounced and accompanied, as a minimum, by his 17-year-old brother, Prince Andrew, who also lives in Trinity.

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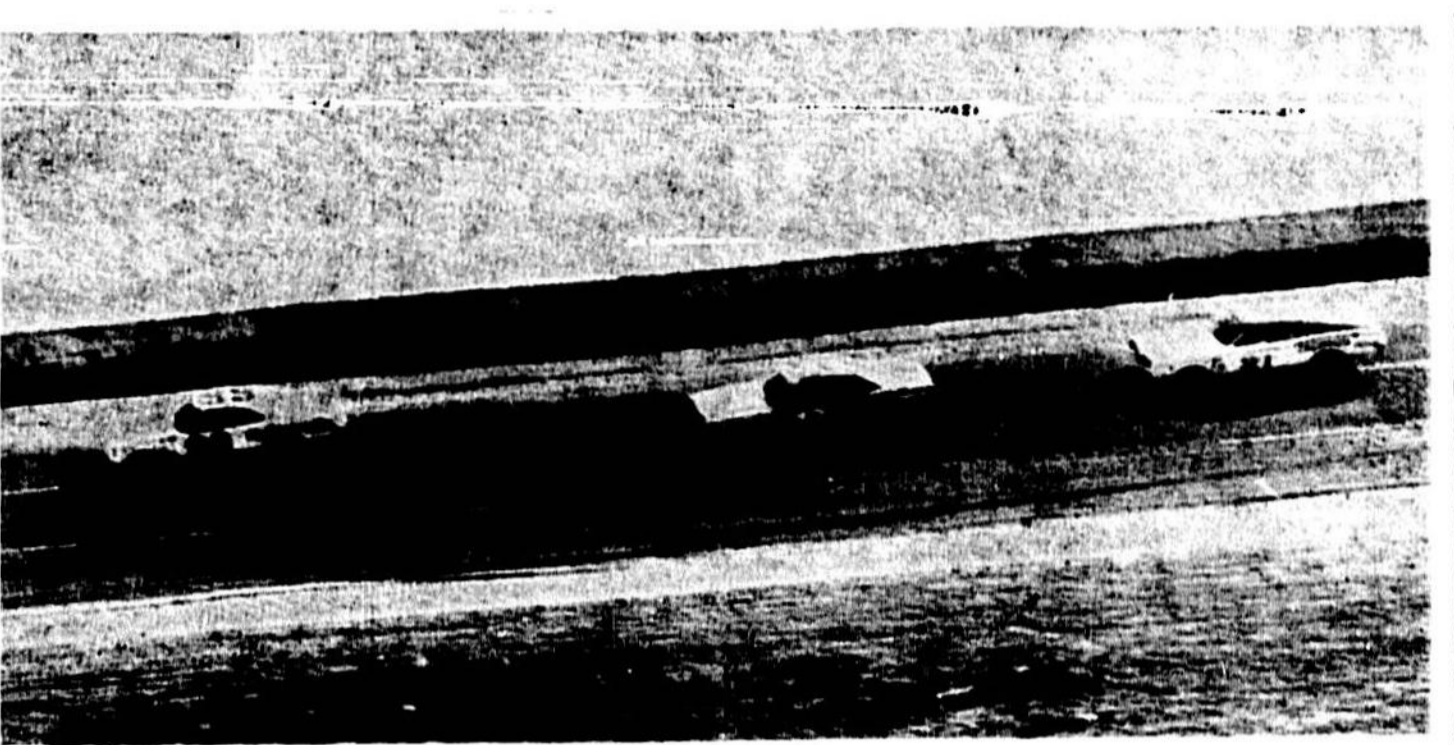

Westmoreland gave no estimate of how many more U.S. troops might be needed above the 523,000 already authorized.

Westmoreland, the U.S. commander in Vietnam, conferred over the weekend on the troop situation with Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, who was in Saigon.

Westmoreland's views on the Vietnam situation were expressed Sunday in written answers to questions submitted by The Associated Press in which he expanded on comments voiced in a two-hour informal interview.

He said he did not believe Hanoi could stand a long war and he likened the recent Communist lunar new year—Tet—offensive to the Battle of the Bulge of World War II in 1944.

He had no reason to believe the North Vietnamese have changed their plan to attack the South.

The bombing of North Vietnam has not stopped the flow of men, material and supplies to the South.

"I liken the recent Tet offensive by the leadership in Hanoi to the Battle of the Bulge in World War II," Westmoreland said. "By committing a large share of his forces in a major offensive, he achieved some tactical surprise. This offensive has required us to react and to modify our plans in order to take advantage of the opportunity to inflict heavy casualties upon him."

Westmoreland said he estimated the Communist infiltration tactics in their Tet offensive but said they nevertheless "suffered a military defeat."

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Arch Critic Of U. S. Policy In Vietnam Charges:

More Troops For War 'Disastrous Course'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. J. W. Fulbright urged a Senate debate on a full-scale congressional debate on any further U.S. escalation in Vietnam, saying dispatches of more American troops to the war would be "a disastrous course."

The Arkansas Democrat, Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a long-time arch critic of U.S. policy in Vietnam, said Sunday he feels the country deserves a "re-examination of the purposes, the objectives" of that policy.

The president of South Vietnam and a top U.S. diplomat sprang meanwhile U.S. Secretary-General U. Thant's call Saturday for an end to American bombing of North Vietnam.

In saying the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong would take military advantage of any bombing halt, President Nguyen Van Thieu predicted the enemy would grow weaker and weaker the year and a half.

"I believe this is the last year for the VC," the Communist guerrillas in South Vietnam.

Undersecretary of State William P. Bundy said North Vietnam must indicate clearly in advance that it would not take military advantage of a bombing halt.

"We just can't take this on faith—pure and simple," said Bundy.

Fulbright was interviewed on the ABC radio-television program, "Issues and Answers."

His statement was relayed in the magazine Tonkin controversy between the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara.

McNamara testified for two hours last week before a closed session of the committee. The transcript of the hearing was released Sunday.

And even if the ships were attacked, said the Arkansas, U.S. military retaliation was far too harsh.

Can you imagine how they (the North Vietnamese) look at it, having done nothing to us and then suddenly to have 64 missiles with enormous tonnage dropped on you?" he asked.

Fulbright referred to 64 U.S. bombing sorties against North Vietnam launched shortly after the destroyers Maddox and Turner Joy reported being attacked by North Vietnamese torpedo boats.

Three days after the incident Fulbright—acting as floor manager—steered through the Senate the so-called Tonkin Gulf resolution authorizing the President to use "all necessary measures" to repel further aggression.

Fulbright said Sunday if he had known what he does today he would not have supported the resolution, which won overwhelming Senate adoption.

His proposal for a full-scale Senate discussion of Vietnam policy came when he was asked about reports Gen. William Westmoreland, U.S. commander in Vietnam, has requested more troops.

Fulbright said further escalation could bring Red China into the war.

"I think this is a disaster to the country and there is nothing we could possibly achieve cooperative with the cost," he said.

Maxwell D. Taylor, former U.S. ambassador to Saigon and chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said Sunday the Communist strategy of attacking South Vietnam's cities is a "disaster."

Taylor spoke at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. While maintaining the administration has never proved the two destroyers actually were under fire in the Gulf of Tonkin, Fulbright appeared to be shifting the focus of his criticism when he said of the reported torpedo-boat attacks:

"It really doesn't matter when they did or not. No damage was done. The (North Vietnamese) boats employed were little Swatow (patrol boats) with little 37mm guns. They had no torpedoes."

"This is immaterial, whether it did or didn't. I do say that the response was not commensurate with the provocation."

\$12,000 Costs Pondered

County Commission indicated interest in the "Great White Way," lighting of 17.95 around the lakefront from Interstate 1 to the Sanford city limits, today and appointed Commissioners W. Lawrence Swafford and Robert Parker to serve on a committee which represents the Chamber of Commerce to study the matter.

Scott Burns, manager of Florida Power and Light Company, estimated cost of installation of the lights required would be \$12,000 with power costs per month of \$115 per light.

Mayor W. Vincent Roberts stated the "city is prepared to perform the labor and in the installation if the county will provide the materials for the project."

Kenneth McIntosh, C. of C. president, declared the Chamber has clarified the project for the lighting as an "emergency" and urged the board to undertake the project at the earliest possible date.

Meanwhile, Byron Kingham appearing on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, said the lighting would improve the appearance of the city and the importance of the economic future of the county.

John Krider, Chamber manager, said the project described for the whole county would cost approximately \$800 to \$2,000 annually with the cost of the lighting would be of major importance to the economic future of the county.

Commissioner Chairman John Alexander stated the funds are available at this time to enter such a program, but agreed to the study nonetheless.

In other business at the meeting, the board heart report from Harlan Hanson, Director of the Orange-Seminole-Osceola Joint Planning Council, explain the highway transportation study recently completed by his group and which will be presented to the State Road Department in Tallahassee Thursday.

Major disagreements expressed by the board to the plan presented was lack of adequate roads planned in the Osceola area to use new Florida Technological University.

It was reported that Commissioner Parker met with the Osceola Council last week and they recommended the County Commission request that SR 119 be included in the plan as well as alignment of SR 128 to SR 228.

Alexander suggested 119 be aligned from the proposed Jessup Causeway south to pickup the connection between Red Bug Road and S. 320.

Swafford declared the "plan doesn't do much for the east side of the county," and further said Osceola would be making a serious mistake in wanting a major arterial road to go through the center of the city.

Casselberry Council Snubs SS Gas Authority

Casselberry apparently slammed the door on the South Seminole Natural Gas Authority last night with authorization by the City Council to post a proposed franchise ordinance with Florida Gas Company. Council action was unanimous.

Edward Lunn, the Casselberry appointment on the authority while was formed nearly 10 years ago by the Cities of Casselberry and Longwood to furnish gas to the South Seminole area, pleaded with the Council to postpone any further discussion with the gas company until after the June 4 hearing before the Federal Power Commission.

"Any discussion will jeopardize the authority's position at the hearing," Lunn said. The hearing is being held on the authority's request for a gas allotment.

Lunn reminded that under the authority the city would be 50 per cent owner of the gas utility while the franchise with Florida Gas it would receive only six per cent of gross receipts.

Council Chairman Charles Woodruff declared the lack of "continuity of good strong management" to be expected under the authority where cooperation between Longwood and Casselberry will be necessary and the authority can change with the election of each new councilman.

Lunn's prediction that the authority should be able to lay out within five to seven months following granting of the allotment by the Federal Power Commission brought the retort from Norman Duke, attorney for Florida Gas, that hearings before FPC, with the authority's request being contested by both his company and Florida Public Utilities Company, would take "some long time."

Porting of the ordinance is the first step required in its adoption. Following posting for 10 days, the Board will further consider the matter.

City OKs Rental Program
