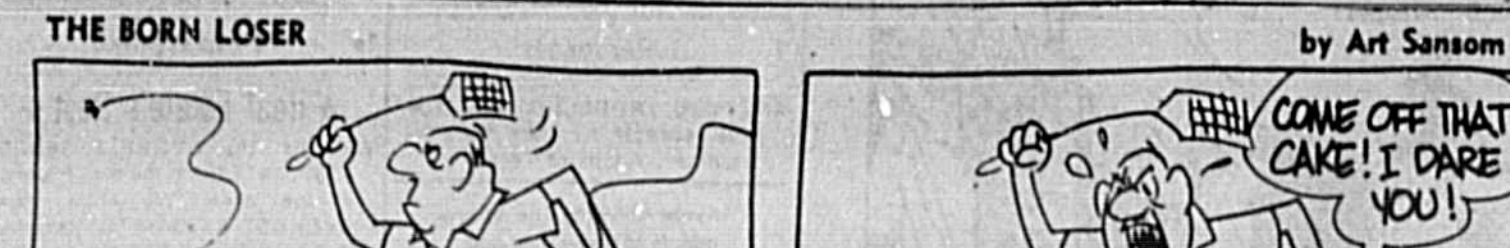

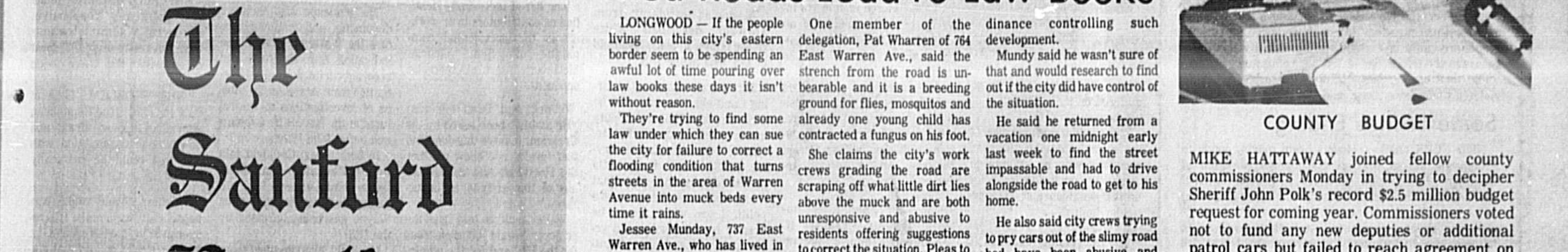

Convicts End Holdout

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two armed convicts have ended a 105-hour ordeal at the U.S. District Court here by surrendering to law officers. Before surrendering, the two made a desperate attempt to escape their besieged cellblock through ventilation ducts but were driven back by gunfire and tear gas. After their surrender, Frank Gorham Jr., 28, and Robert N. Jones, 24, were flown to a maximum security penitentiary in Atlanta.

Watergate Guilt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Samuel Dash, the Senate Watergate committee's chief counsel, says that after 15 months of investigation, "you're damn sure that certain people are guilty of certain things." But it would have been grossly irresponsible for the committee to have spelled out its conclusions as to exactly who may have violated which laws, Dash said.

Some Strikes Ending

NEW YORK (AP) — Movers begin moving again in Pittsburgh and garbage is being collected again in Baltimore. But pickets continued to spread in Ohio. Airlines today and a state employees strike by about 600 strikes involving a quarter-million workers continued to hamper private industry and government across the country—the most the nation has had in the post-World War II era, according to the Federal Mediation Service. In Ohio, the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees began an expanded strike today, adding its 7,000 members to a strike that began more than two weeks ago.

Haig: Nixon Staying

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (AP) — Alexander M. Haig Jr., President Nixon's top White House aide, says a month of overseas summitry has reinforced Nixon's determination to stay on the job and continue "the leadership of the past five years." Interviewed by three reporters Monday at the Western White House, Haig said Nixon returned from trips to the Middle East and the Soviet Union "intellectually and spiritually reinvigorated" despite a taxing schedule that left only three to four hours a day for sleep.

Henley Guilty in Murders

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — The jury found Elmer Wayne Henley guilty of killing six of the 27 young males slain in the Houston mass murder case. Henley's conviction will be appealed. The prosecution is not seeking the death penalty, but has asked the jurors to send Henley to prison for life.

New Greek Junta

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — The army rebels on Cyprus reported today they had arrested 1,200 members of President Makarios' tactical reserve force including its commander. But Makarios was reported alive despite earlier claims by the rebellious National Guard that he had been killed. A rebel broadcast over Radio Cyprus said a new government would be sworn in today and that a curfew continued for the entire island, with only ambulances allowed to move. The United Nations and the British Foreign Office said early today that Makarios had escaped from Nicosia, the capital, to Paphos, 60 miles to the southwest, and met there with the British officer commanding U. N. peacekeeping forces in that district.

Escape From Hijacker

TOKYO (AP) — An American businessman says he suggested the plan by which 55 persons escaped from a hijacked Japanese Air Lines plane at Nagoya, 170 miles southwest of Tokyo. Police seized the hijacker, a young Japanese construction worker, after the 61 passengers and four of the eight crew members got safely off the plane Monday. The hijacker stabbed himself in the neck and chest but was reported out of danger in a hospital. Milton M. Richmond, 48, of Chicago, one of two Americans aboard, said he persuaded the stewardesses to open the rear emergency exits while the hijacker was in the cockpit talking to Nagoya airport officials by radio.

Korea Charges Treason

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Former President Yun Po-sun and three other prominent Koreans went on trial today in a military court on charges of inciting rebellion against the government of President Chung Hee Park. The indictments charged the four—including a history professor, a theology dean and the minister of a church in Seoul—with providing financial aid to a clandestine student group known as the National Democratic Youth-Student Federation. Five leaders of the federation were among 14 persons sentenced to death last week on charges of fomenting mass uprisings to overthrow Park.

Kissinger In's Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee, exploring reports that Henry A. Kissinger kept transcripts of his phone calls, has asked for any such transcripts, committee sources said. The secretary of state has been asked for "any relevant documentation," including any records of his phone calls, for the committee's investigation into Kissinger's role in 1969-71 national security wiretapping, the sources said. The request reportedly was prompted by reports that Kissinger, then presidential assistant, had used a "national security affairs" secretary to listen on an extension phone and transcribe his conversations.

How White House Used IRS On 'Enemies'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee made public today the evidence in its impeachment staff compiled on White House efforts to get the Internal Revenue Service to punish the enemies and help the friends of the Nixon administration.

Most of the material in the 440-page volume already had been made public by the Senate Watergate committee during its hearings last summer and in its subsequent reports. The Judiciary Committee, scheduled to begin debate next week on whether there are grounds for the impeachment of President Nixon, last week began releasing the evidence it has received in closed sessions.

Eight volumes of evidence on the Watergate break-in and cover-up, including one from White House lawyer James D. St. Clair, were made public Friday. St. Clair submitted no material on the IRS portion of the inquiry.

Like the Watergate evidence, the material on the IRS was presented with no attempt to draw any conclusions or point up the significance of any particular item.

The IRS volume contained 27 "points of information" with each supported by one or more documents or excerpts from testimony.

They included affidavits from two former IRS directors who told the Judiciary Committee about pressures from White House aides to force the tax

The evidence also included documents and testimony before the Watergate committee indicating that Caulfield had received confidential IRS information from Acre on the status of investigations of the returns of the Rev. Billy Graham and actor John Wayne.

Walters also obtained from Acre financial information about Lawrence Goldberg, Providence, R.I., when he was under consideration for a position at the President's reelection committee. Also included in the evidence volume was the transcript of a

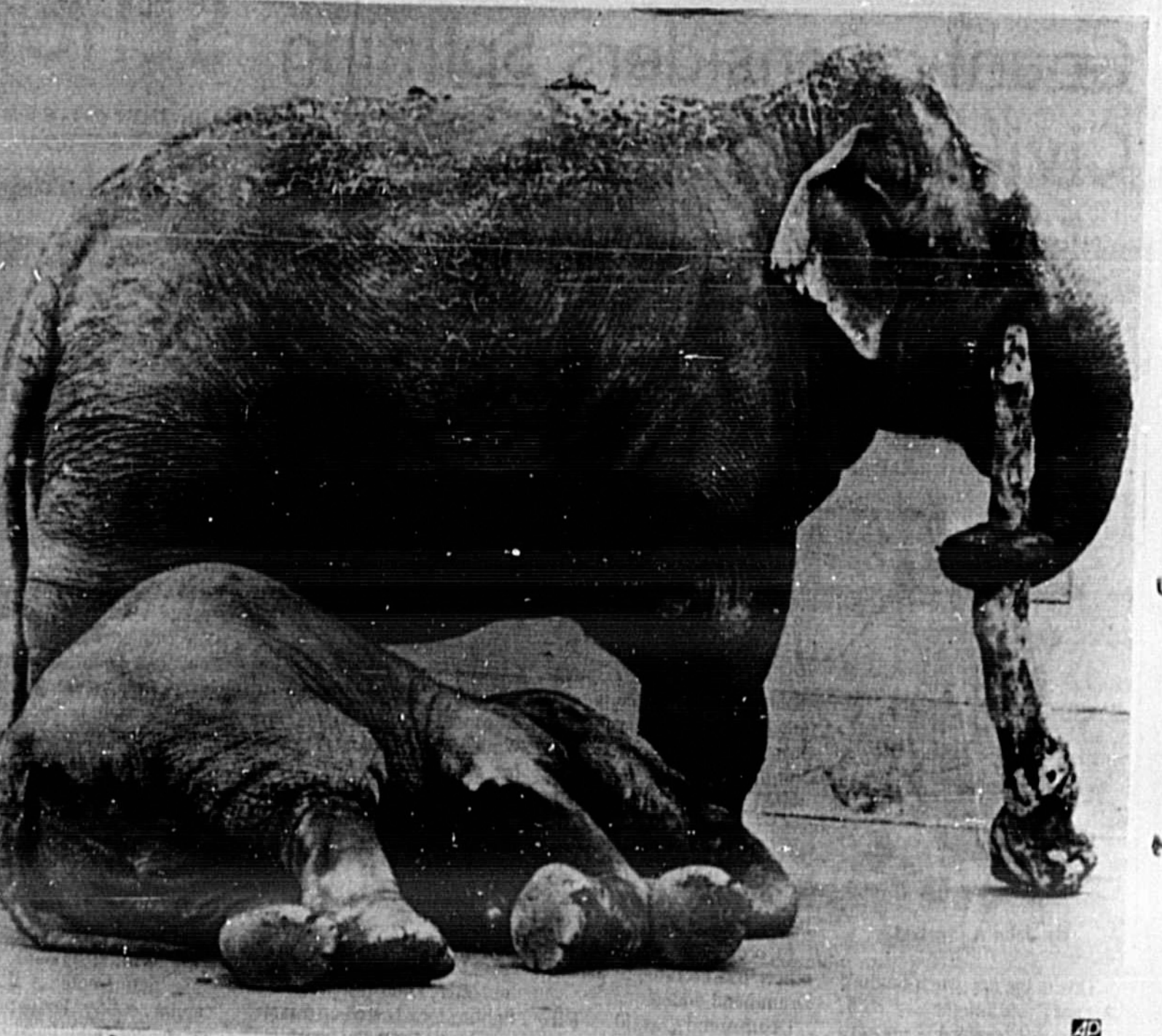

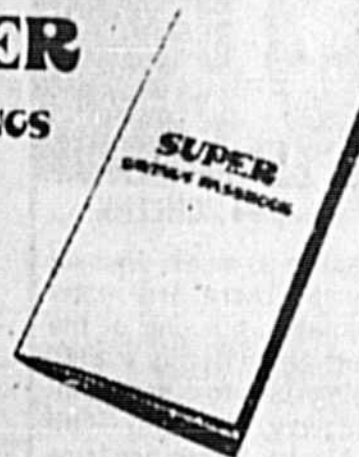

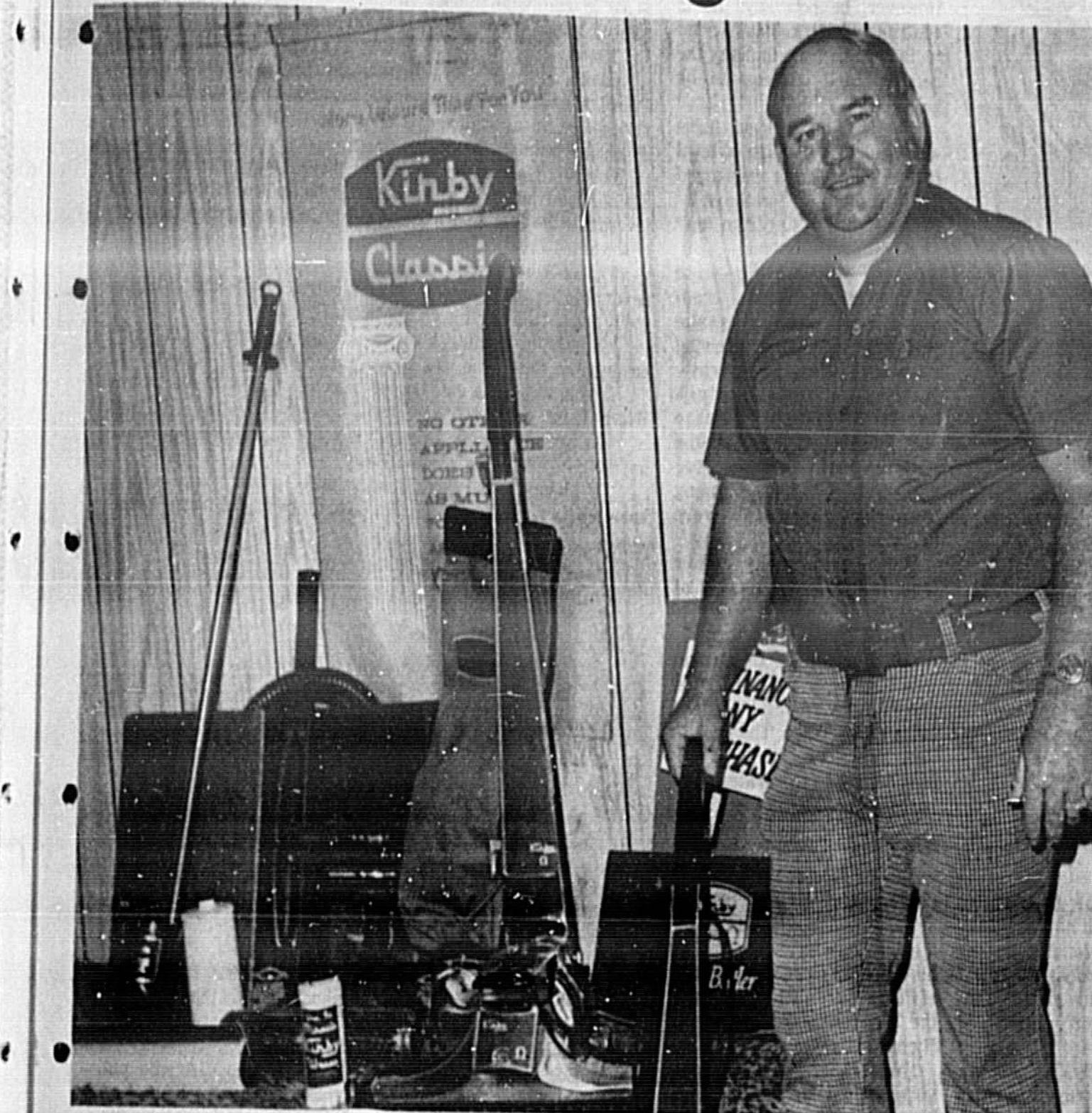

We can expect to hear, momentarily, the shrill cries of outrage at striking policemen, garbage workers and other municipal employees in Baltimore, Md. and Columbus, Ohio.

Magruder's Story Is 'Shocking'

If you can believe what Jeb Stuart Magruder says, the Watergate cover-up has been far more insidious and entailed far more plotting than most of us have believed up to now.

Magruder is a convicted felon, sent to prison for conspiracy to obstruct justice. However, he now says he is contrite and that he has decided to "admit the truth and pay the penalty" and he begs to be believed.

If he is to be believed, there were people in the highest level of the White House who taped his conversations for the sole purpose of "setting him up" and he pays to be believed.

They, according to Magruder, "guilted" conversations — as to make themselves appear as knowing nothing of the Democratic National Headquarters burglary-wiretappingiasco and knowing nothing of the cover-up that began the very early June 17, 1972, morning that the burglars were arrested.

These and many other fascinating aspects of Watergate — if Magruder is now telling the true story — emerge in a book that could well become a useful text for prosecutors trying criminal cases still to come.

The book is "An American Life — One Man's Road to Watergate" (Athens: 328 pages; \$10). Part of Magruder's motive in writing the book was to raise money to support his family in the manner it had become accustomed.

Also, it appears to be an effort to purge his soul of an incredible number of misdeeds — all in the name of the election and survival of Richard Nixon.

This bright and promising young man tells the story of his life, one that saw him jumping from job to job for a long time. As Colson saw it, however, it was the CIA who put Hughes up to blowing the whistle.

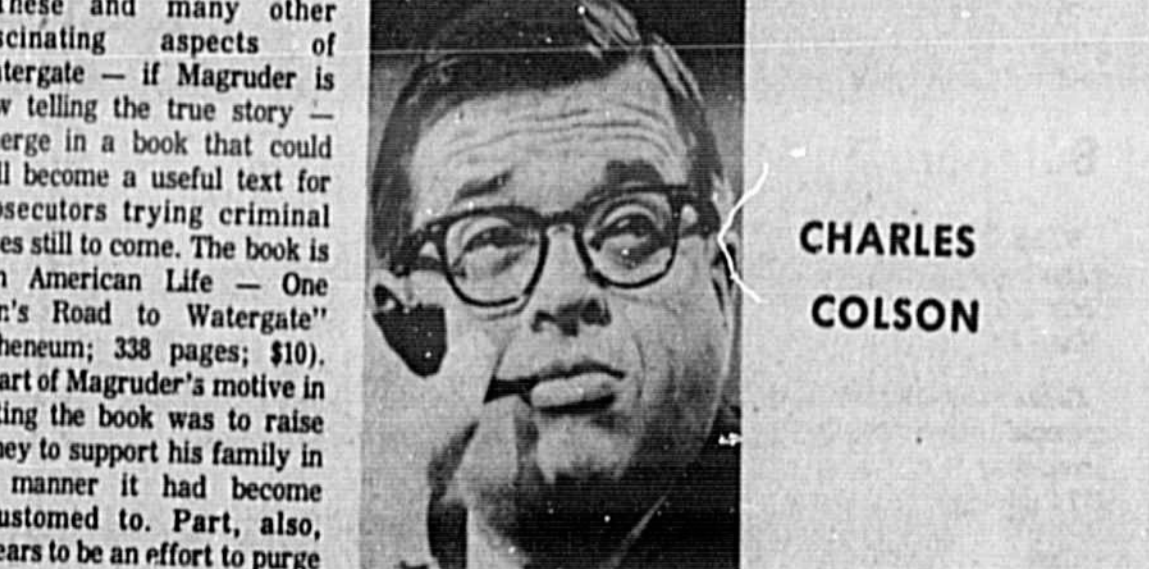

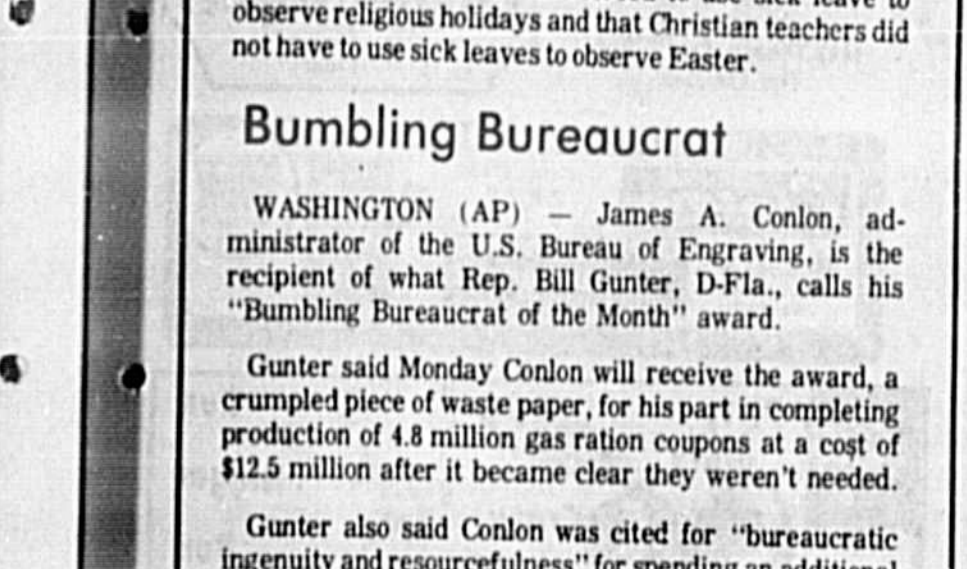

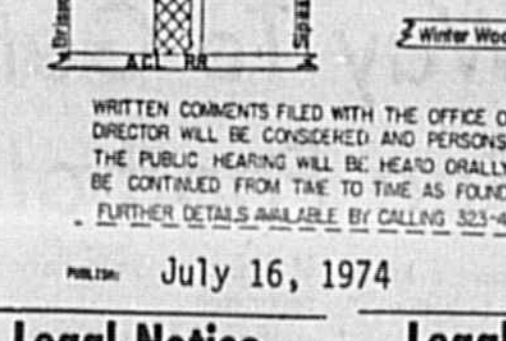
