



Helping Little Business

We hope that the government's effort to "do some-thing for little business," now being pushed around in the defense program, will bear better fruit than the repeated assertions during the depression that little business would be helped. Then, though countless agencies were organized and subsidized to help the small businessmen out of their difficulties, nothing really helpful, so far as we could learn, was ever done.

"There are warning signals flying in Washington that 'little business,' which has for several years tossed in heavy seas, is approaching real hurricane weather," says the Fort Myers News Press, "The depression years have been tough on 'little business' in general, though some of it has shown itself more adaptable to the defense crisis has brought further difficulties to little business.' and may, perhaps, confront it with a fight for existence.

"When the defense effort began, a little more than a year ago, it was natural that most of the contracts went to big industrial establishments. They were the ones who could tarn out the stuff, and turn it out quickly. Only a few months ago did we come around to a concerted effort to apread the defense work so that smaller concerns facilities so urgently needed for defense. That is being pushed strongly today, according to R. L. Mehorney, chief of contracts division, OPM.

"Now we find ourselves short of materials. Aluminum, rubber, copper, zinc, and many similar materials must be rationed. This might easily reach a point, fears Peter R. Nehemkis of the OPM defense contract service, where a third of American industry will be 'faced with the grim reality of guns versus butter. Not less than 10 entire industries whose supplies are being either curtailed or shut off entirely may be faced with the stark prospect of either finding something else to do or shutting down ontirely. For a time, in other words, there may even be more, not fewer unemployed, with windows in small plants making unessentials going dark that lights may blaze brighter in the windows of vital arms and defense plants. "There is a tendency, under pressure of the defense effort, to eliminate the small enterprise entirely. Nehemkis is properly concerned about this prospect; he is right in suggesting that 'if we permit a total blackout of small business . . . we shall have richly cultivated the soil for a fascist dictatorship.' He might have added 'or a communist dictatorship,' for the two are alike in that

neither offers a place for the small enterpriser.

"The defense boards in Washington are aware of this danger, Nehemkls avers, and are trying to be ready with plans either to incorporate such endangered small businesses into prime contractor-sub-contractor relationships, find ways for them to make defense goods, or means of tiding them over so they can resume production after the tiding them over so they can resume production after the
