The curbs on railroad service become effective on May 10—one week from today.

**HIGHWAY TOLL**  
WASHINGTON, May 3. (AP)—President Truman has called for a nationwide drive to reduce the number of fatal accidents on the highways. During the first three months of the year, Mr. Truman said, more than 8,000 men, women and children died in automobile accidents.

**PAPER WHEAT**  
WASHINGTON, May 3. (AP)—UNRRA Director General Fiorella La Guardia has declared he cannot feed people on statistics and paper wheat. La Guardia's statement was made after he was given a report showing so-called "availabilities." The UNRRA chief pointed out that in April, the agency was allocated 450,000 tons of wheat, but that only 339,000 tons were delivered.

**TRANSIT STRIKE**  
LOS ANGELES, May 3. (AP)—Public transportation was paralyzed in Los Angeles this morning by a strike of about 4,000 street car and bus operators. The transport workers are demanding higher wages. Union officials said there will be no picketing and striking employees have been instructed to go home and stay there to avoid any possible violence.

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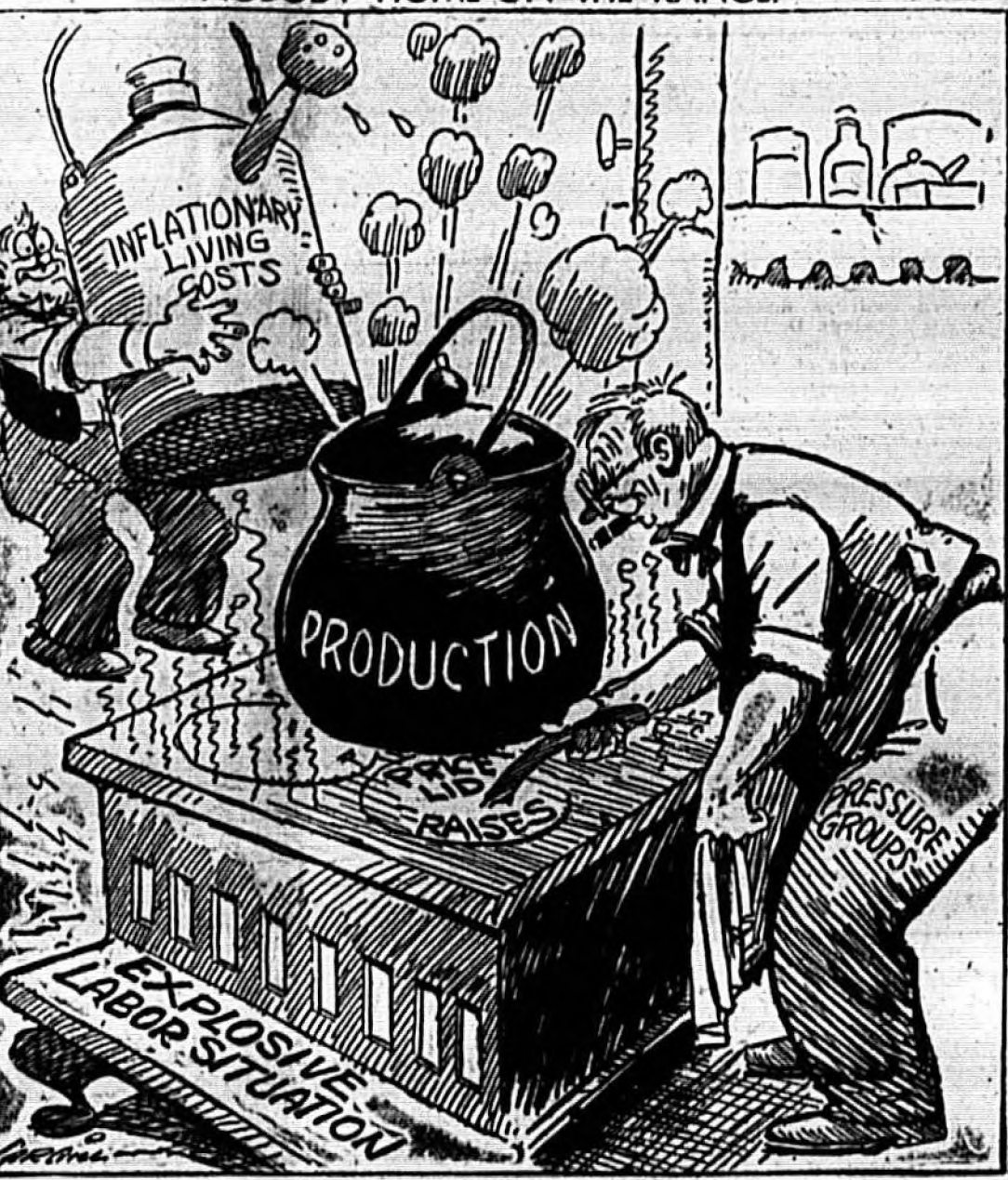

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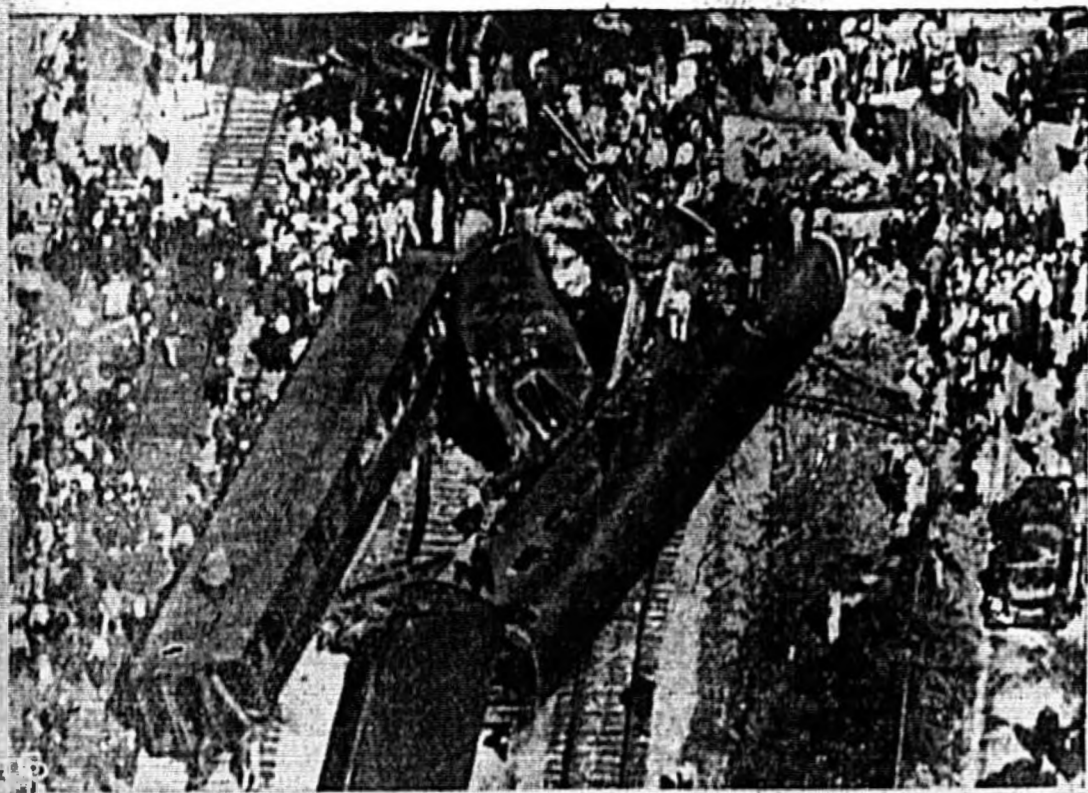

## Congress Is Attacked By PAC Chieftan

### Hillman Says Price Control Action May Throw Nation Into Orgy Of Inflation

ATLANTIC CITY, May 6 (AP)—Chairman Sidney Hillman of the CIO Political Action Committee charges that Congress is betraying the interests of the people. He says it has made a shambles of the Price Control Act and is threatening to plunge the nation into an orgy of inflation.

Hillman's attack is contained in the keynote address prepared for the annual convention of the CIO Clothing Workers of America, which he heads.

The CIO leader says "A wrecking crew in the House of Representatives has done the bidding of the National Association of Manufacturers, the National Real Estate Board and the meat trust. It dallies on the vital housing legislation and a public health program. It has sabotaged the Fair Labor Standards Act."

Furthermore, Hillman says, negroes have been denied full citizenship through filibusters on the fair employment practices and the anti-plot tax acts.

## Hoover Suggests Russia Aid Food Supply In China

### U. S. Envoy Praises Food Staff Set Up By Gen MacArthur

TOKYO, May 6 (AP)—Former President Herbert Hoover today suggested that Russia would help the world food situation greatly by giving foodstuffs to China and Korea. He has proposed that the Soviet Union turn over to the two countries, some of the food which the Russians have obtained in Manchuria.

The former President is in Tokyo on his study of world needs for President Truman. His suggestion on China and Korea came at a news conference which dealt at some length with Japanese food supplies.

Hoover maintained that Japan must have food imports. "Without them," he said, "all Japan will be on a ration little better than that which the Germans gave to Buchenwald and Belsen concentration camps."

Hoover expressed the opinion that the statement on information from General MacArthur's occupation headquarters, he praised MacArthur's food staff as one of the best he had seen. Hoover added that on the Japanese side, the Japanese will rely on their presentation of facts.

## April Sales At Market Sets New All-time Record

### Increase Of 61 Percent Over Sales In April 1945 Attained

April, with \$492,508 in sales at the Sanford State Farmers Market, proved to be the top month in the history of the market, according to Manager H. J. Lehman. The increase over the \$305,669 sales of April, 1945 was \$186,839 or 61 percent.

Unit sales, which during some months of 1946 lagged behind corresponding periods of last year, also showed an increase of from 100,821 in April 1945 to 167,601 this April.

String beans led in sales with 33,508 units bringing a total of \$108,487 or an average price of \$2.99 per bushel. Second in value was oranges with 25,155 boxes bringing \$95,589. Cabbage came third in value with 37,155 of the 50 pound sacks bringing \$70,987.

Tomatoes which averaged \$8.19 a crate, brought \$46,512. Celery at \$2.05 a crate brought \$40,449. Potatoes were sixth on the list and averaged \$2.10 per 50 pound sack to bring \$27,108. Cucumbers at \$5.08 a bushel brought \$20,079. Tangerines at \$2.41 a box brought \$18,340. Peppers, now being locally harvested, brought an average of \$4.61 a bushel to bring \$13,037. Out of state products had a total sale of \$14,009.

Voters will select a United States Senator, a member of the United States House of Representatives, a member of the State Legislature, a county commissioner, a justice of the State Supreme Court and two railroad commissioners.

Park Avenue is the meridian that separates east side from west side voters in Sanford, West Sanford voters will cast their ballots at the old A. C. L. Depot on Commercial Street. East side voters will go to the New Bowling Alley next to the Sanford-Huick Company on Magnolia Avenue.

Due to the election, the regular monthly meeting of the Board of County Commissioners will be held on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock instead of the usual first Tuesday in the month.

It is their duty, he said, to post the results immediately.

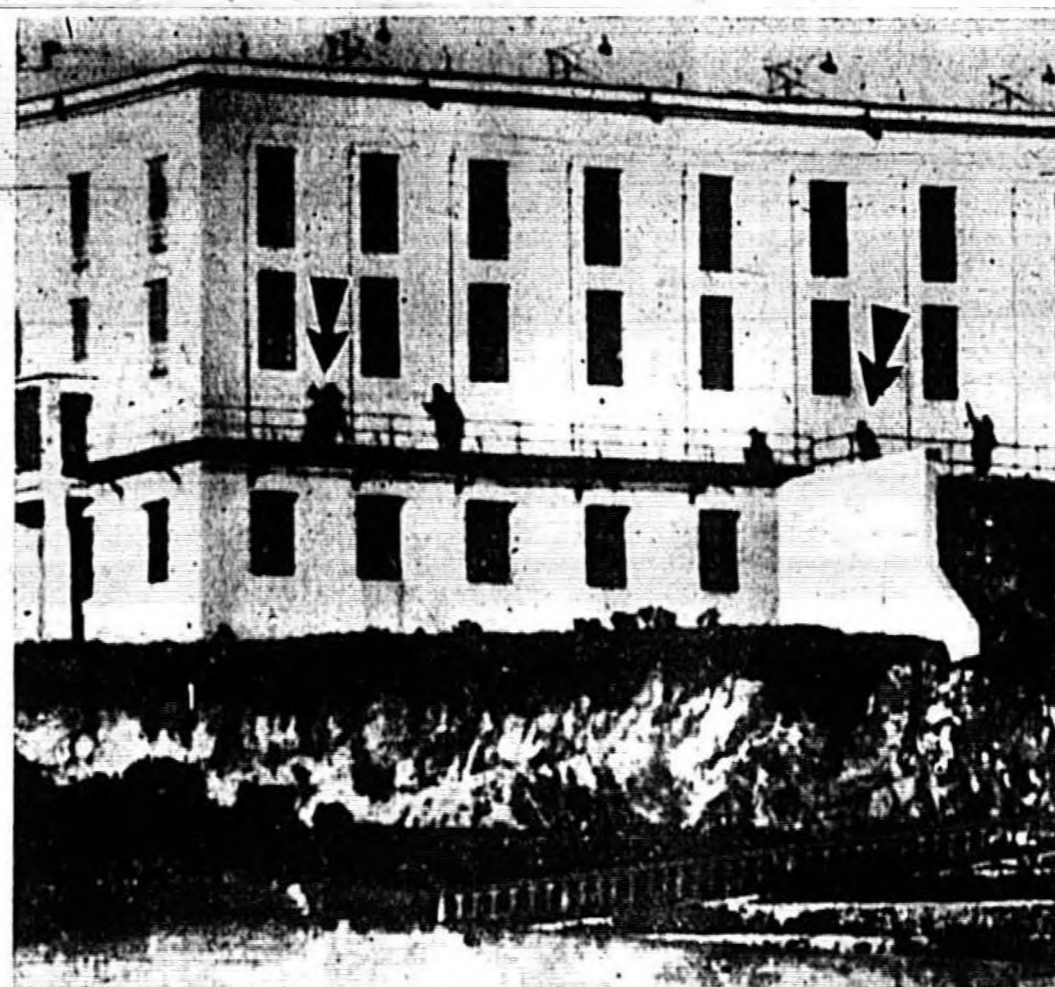
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## GUARDS BATTLING RIOTING PRISONERS ON ROCK

## Coal Strike May Prolong Need For Price Controls

### Bowles Makes State Investigation Group

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles today warned Congress that a continuation of the coal strike may prolong the need for price controls. He told the House committee investigating the shortages that he had hoped to wind up controls in eight or ten months. But, said Bowles, "unless the coal strike is settled, I don't know where we will be."

At the same time, Civilian Production Administrator John Small appeared before the Senate Banking Committee and pointed an accusing finger at consumers. A big factor in many shortages, said Small, is consumer hoarding of scarce items. Such hoarding, he said, is no joke. It intensifies actual shortages and creates artificial shortages. If it could be stopped, or even minimized, he declared, many shortages would be eased or disappear.

Small pleaded for an extension of price controls, declaring that dire trouble could be averted in the labor field if controls are removed. He expressed the belief that if the OPA is allowed to die on June 30, or is seriously weakened, the rise in prices will be quick, steep, and ultimately catastrophic.

## Merger Of Army And Navy Blasted Today By General Vandergrift of U.S.M.C.

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—President Truman today gave Congress a program calling for the expenditure of more than \$7,000,000,000 by the War Department in the next fiscal year. The chief executive said that the estimates contemplate the maintenance of an Army of more than 1,000,000 men and officers on June 30, 1947. This figure compares to the 1,500,000 men planned for June 30 of this year.

The presidential estimates provide \$500,000,000 for government and relief in occupied areas. The program provides also for the expenditure of \$200,000,000 for the atomic service formerly carried on by the Manhattan Project.

The president used his recommendation as Marine General Alexander Vandergrift, a vocal opponent of the proposed Army and Navy merger. The Marine's former commandant told the Senate Naval committee that the Army is determined to reduce the Marine Corps to a position of stunted military ineffectiveness.
