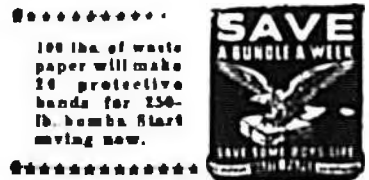

Hitler's Body Is Said Found By Russians

Smoke Blackened And Charred Body Is One Of Four Found Beneath Chancellery

BERLIN, June 6, (AP)—A high Russian military source said today that a body found in Berlin has been identified with fair certainty as that of Adolf Hitler. The smoke blackened and charred body was one of four discovered in an underground fortress beneath the Reich chancellery after the fall of Berlin. Asked why no official announcement was made by Moscow, this source said as long as any element of uncertainty exists the Russians do not wish to state definitely the body has been found.

Yesterday the late Martin Niemöller, self-described "Hitler's own prisoner and personal enemy," said that he believed Hitler may have escaped by U-boat.

The Lutheran pastor added that he vainly tried to join the Nazi navy in 1939 because "my sons were out fighting and dying for me and I think a father should die for his sons."

Story Of Dachau Concentration Camp Related

S-Sgt. Harry Robson In Charge Of Hospital Saving Victims

"Things were plenty hot and exciting" as the 7th Army crossed the Rhine, wrote S-Sgt. Harry Robson of the 16th Evacuation Hospital in a recent letter to his parents, Dr. and Mrs. J.N. Robson of Sanford.

In 11 pages of terse narrative, typed on a "liberated" German typewriter, S-Sgt. Robson presented a vivid description of events leading up to, and following the crossing of the Rhine, and later of the horrors of the notorious Dachau Concentration Camp, where the liberated prisoners went with joy.

"Only one thing I might mention about the Rhine crossing," he wrote "is that we were the second Evacuation Hospital to cross, and that things were plenty hot and exciting during those times. The bridges of the Rhine were all blown out; so we crossed on pontoon float bridges, with our trucks loaded so high with equipment that we must have looked like Gypsies to the German civilians who peered at us from the corners of windows.

"We made several moves and setups as the fighting was on toward Nurnberg. As a rule, when we set up in an area we would receive patients the same afternoon and continue operation until about midnight.

"We would move as close as four miles to the front line, and by the next day the fighting would be 14 miles down the road."

On the night of May 1, they crossed the Danube, went through Munich and entered the concentration camp at Dachau. As the convoy wound up a narrow wind-road to the camp they drove ahead past 50 boxcars and prisoners murdered by the Germans, he stated.

"During all this excitement," he wrote, "it was my misfortune to be the senior non-com in the convoy so Major Jegan called for men and said: 'Get these trucks unloaded in here before supper, there's a kitchen around here somewhere, find out what time we eat, post guards on the camp, and I'll have you later where the barracks' (Continued on Page Eight)

"The patients all are close together they can hardly raise their arms to feed themselves," she declared.

The citation reads: Pfc. Albert W. Raburn, 331 Infantry, United States Army, "For distinguishing himself by heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States on April 9, 1945, near Lauenburg, Germany."

"In the attack, Private Raburn was a member of a four man patrol operating two to four miles in advance of the main body. About 200 yards from the town, Private Raburn saw an enemy signal light. He promptly fired in the direction of the light, then boldly led the patrol in an attack upon the house in which the enemy was hiding. Five prisoners were taken and an enemy ambush attempt was thwarted due to Private Raburn's aggressive action."

"His courageous and heroic actions merit the highest grades and uphold the finest traditions of the military service. He entered the military service from Florida."

Pfc. Raburn received his basic training at Camp Hood, Texas, and was sent overseas in January of this year. He was awarded the Infantry Combat Medal for serving with the Engineers in the crossing of the Rhine. He served with the 88 Division of the 9th Army, the first to make a bridgehead across the Elbe.

Big Four has stripped Germany to its pre-Hitler frontiers and assumed supreme control of the country and its 70,000,000 people under ironclad military rule in place of a central government which they said no longer existed. They set up occupational zones for the United States, Great Britain, Russia and France. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Field Marshal Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, Marshal Gregory Zhukov and Gen. Jean de Lattre de Tassigny, constituting a supreme control commission representing the United States, Britain, Russia and France respectively, proclaimed the Allied action in a declaration signed in Berlin.

The United States will occupy southwestern Germany, Great Britain northwestern Germany, Russia eastern Germany and France western Germany. All four to rule Berlin. Greater Berlin will be occupied by all four powers and governed by inter-Allied authority. There will be four commandants, one for each occupying power, and they will take turn serving as chief commandant. With the declaration, Germany entered what was officially called the occupation period, following the capitulation period.

Gordon Robertson Awarded Gold Star

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6, (Special)—Gordon R. Robertson, USNR, of 946 Maitland Avenue, Altamonte Springs, Fla., has been awarded a Gold Star in lieu of a second Air Medal for distinguishing himself in action against Japanese shipping in the Philippines area. The award was presented by Brigadier General L. W. T. Waller, U. S. M. C., Commander of Marine Garrison Force, Fourth Naval District, during a ceremony held at a Pacific Navy base.

The Navy lieutenant, pilot of a fighter-bomber, scored a direct hit on a Japanese cargo ship. His attack was pressed home in the face of intense enemy anti-aircraft fire, and his citation states that he "performed his assignment in an outstanding manner and materially assisted in the destruction of enemy shipping during the attack."

Lieut. Robertson, 24 years old, has flown a total of 12 combat missions, including strikes against Palau, New Guinea, Truk, the Marianas, the Bonins, and the Philippines. He is credited with the downing of at least one other enemy cargo vessel and with the destruction of numerous airfield facilities. He was awarded the Air Medal for his outstanding work in the bombing of Crete airfield, on Guam, during the invasion of the Marianas in June 1944.

Lieut. Robertson attended the University of Illinois before entering the Navy. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Curran of Altamonte Springs.

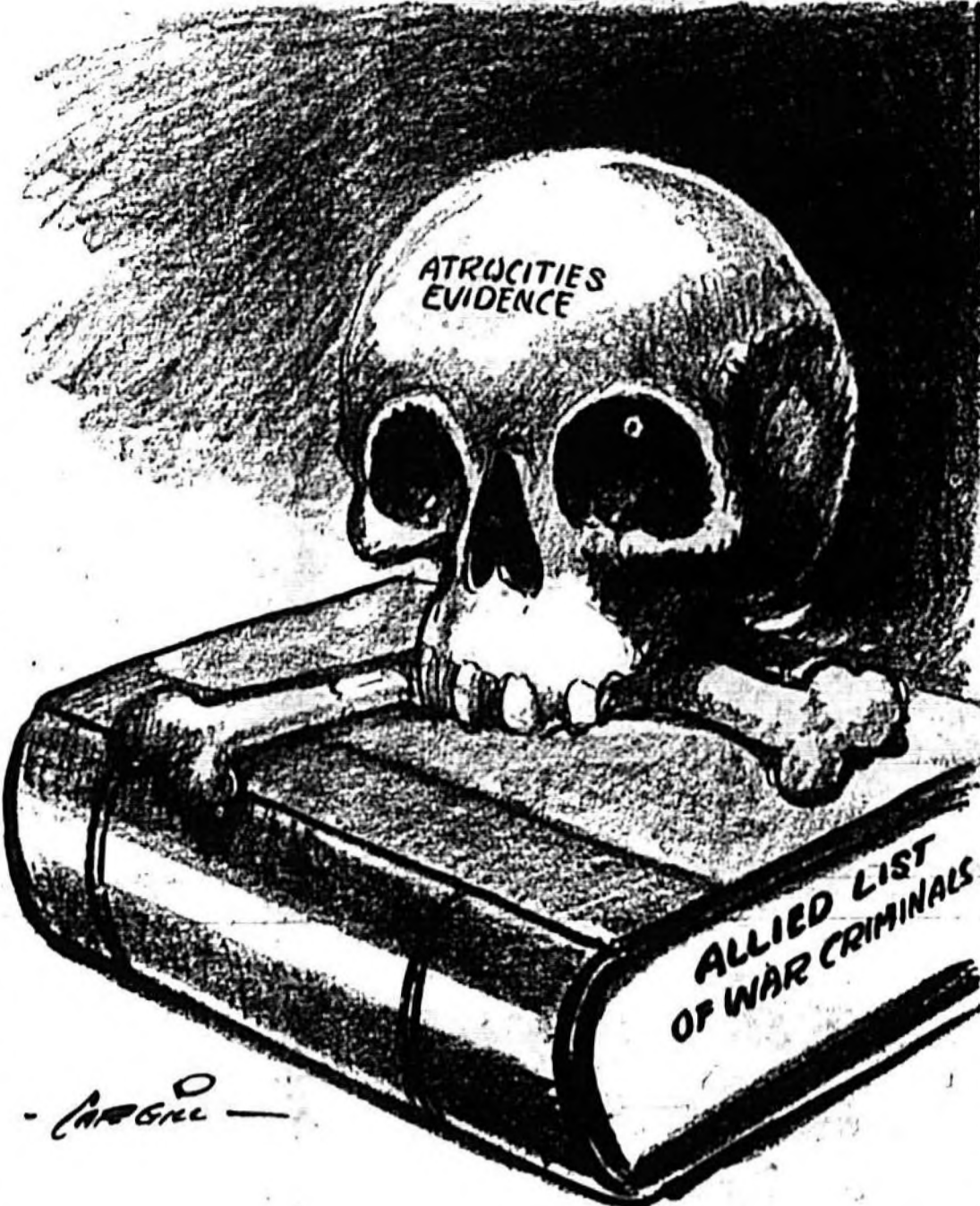

Story Of Dachau Concentration Camp Related

(Continued From Page One)

He then described entering a large warehouse that was stored with everything from books to rifles. "Everybody got interested in everything except in loading trucks." "He had no trouble in getting the guards, all they had to do was pick out ammunition for the gun they had in their hands. They did a good job of keeping away runners of the camp who were running around loose in striped suits. They were so glad to be liberated they were running around in and out of buildings and rooting into everything." "The men then took their personal equipment to the barracks, three buildings each about the size of the Hotel Mayfair, he wrote. "We picked out books and three everything out of the windows, except typewriters, one of which I liberated; then set up our cot."

While we were looking around the motor pool, we heard shouting and blocks away we saw the guards shooting, trying to calm down the Poles who were in the compound. They were so glad to be liberated that there was all kinds of rejoicing being displayed. There is a canal with swift running water in it, then a ten foot strip of land with a high barbed wire fence; then another canal separating the compound from the rest of the camp. "Our infantry guards had crossed over to the 10 foot strip of land which had the fence on it and were trying to keep 25,000 men penned in who were so happy and excited that they were out of their heads. Some of them had been prisoners for a long time; some for six years; so they tried to picture thousands of half dressed skeletons behind a fence on a canal bank, shouting and crying various languages and you will get a slight idea of the sight I saw."

Then we smelled an odor that I cannot describe as we looked about a hundred feet ahead and saw a pile of dead men about 15 feet high and 60 feet around. This was at the doorway to the crematorium. Stepping inside, I saw two large furnaces with grates that roll out for the bodies to be put on, then rolled back in. Opening a door to the left, I found myself just about to walk into a room the size of front room half filled with bodies. "Grif said, 'Step right in,' I said, 'I ain't lost nothing in there,' so about that time I began opening another door and there was another room the same way, half filled with bodies. After that we stepped lively out the way we came in. Around the other side of the building, we went through the gas chamber."

"On May 4 we continued with our work of preparing the barracks for wards. As the Poles cleaned them out we scrubbed and sprayed them. The Poles were so underfed that they had a hard time swinging the heavy mauls but there were about ten men to each maul so they had plenty of time to rest between mauls. Needless to say they like our cigarettes and to pull out our daily ration of candy and eat it in front of them is as mean a trick as eating ice cream

Large brand new radios, linen sheets made in other countries with hand stitching around the seams, darling pillow cases and precious hand towels, and any other adjectives that you might want to use to describe the stuff. As Mr. Perkins would say, I think it's nice—don't you think it's nice?"

"I guess that on that third story which is a quarter of a block wide and a block long that there is or was over a million dollars worth of cloth and dry goods. "The next day, May 6, as we went to work we were glad to notice quarter master men in trucks, picking up the dead SS troops from around the area. You see, until then all bodies were left as they were for some kind of investigation. Also in the morning air it was easy to sense a smell that we knew off hand was the cremator. "Going back to hospital area, we went down to a double ward tent which was receiving. There were rigged up a bunch of showers and each patient was bathed. As most of the patients were too sick to stand they were laid on a table and washed, dried and sprayed with DDT powder. "The next day, May 7, Sgt. Robson was notified by Col. Hill and the Det. Commander that he was N.C.O. who had been put in charge of the hospital. "That afternoon," he wrote, "we heard that the 7th Army had orders to stop firing and it began to look like the war about over. "I just lie there and stare at the trouble the ward men and the nurses have with the patients," he added. "Of course we can't understand the patients and the patients can't understand us. At first they are too weak to eat and are fed dextrose through their veins, and boy have you ever tried to find a vein on a skeleton. You just have to stick where you think the vein is and when you hit it, it is so dried up that it rolls off the point of the needle. Some are given plasma and various other treatment. Their temperatures range from 103 to 105. Some are out of their heads and just yell and get shots are given to put them to sleep."

"Many of them don't even know that they are receiving medical treatment and many of those who do, dislike taking the medicine. They are too sick to know or care about sanitation. Thank goodness, we found a roomful of German gowns, caps, masks and rubber gloves."

"One or more from each ward would die each night; so about every hour I would ride up the roads between the wards with the ambulance driver and collect the bodies. We took them to a latrine where we had pitched for the night. There an autopsy was done on them and then we took

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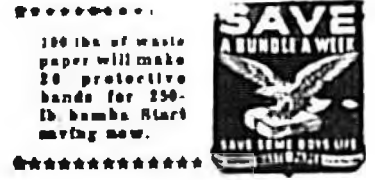
