FED ERRORS AID IN 6 TO 0 DEFEAT BY COCOA OUTFIT

Joiner, Indian Ace, Has Complete Control, Giving Up But 1 Hit

The Feds closed their first half play yesterday afternoon by losing a 6 to 0 verdict at the hands of the Cocoa Indians, who, with Joiner on the hill, took advantage of Fed errors, and inability to hit, and won a six inning game which was halted by a shower.

Joiner allowed but one hit, a clean single by Harrison in the fifth. He walked only three men, and was never in trouble. Buddy Lake, in the meantime, was having difficulty locating the plate, walking six men, more than he has walked in three previous games. Indictment Of Lea In Bank Affair Is Ordered By Judge

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 11.—(AP)—Speaking in open court with the grand jury present Judge Charles Gilbert yesterday instructed Richard M. Atkinson, district attorney general to draw a conspiracy indictment against Col. Luke Lea, publisher, and Luke Lea, jr., in connection with affairs of the closed Liberty Bank & Trust company of Nashville.

The judge's order said it appeared to the court "an indictable offense, to wit, unlawful conspiracy in violation of section 6693 of the code of Tennessee" had been committed "and that Luke Lea and Luke Lea, jr., are probably guilty thereof."

Since no private citizen would agree to act as prosecutor, Judge Gilbert directed Atkinson to file the bill of indictment as ex-officio prosecutor and to comply with the order within five days.

When the grand jury reported yesterday, the foreman told the judge Atkinson had been before the investigators, but that no action had been taken in regard to the Liberty Bank, which closed last November, followed shortly after the suicide of its president, R. E. Donnell.

Upon receipt of the grand jury's report, Judge Gilbert summoned Atkinson into open court, where all the investigators were present, and gave instructions for filing of the bill of indictment.

The attorney general told the court he was ready and willing at all times to perform his duty. He pointed out that no one had appeared to act as prosecutor and said if any person in the courtroom possessed any knowledge of law violation in connection with the Liberty Bank or in any other connection he would prosecute any person whom the facts indicated might be guilty.

Two Are Injured In Hoover Cavalcade Upon Way To Camp

LURAY, Va., July 11.—(AP)—President Hoover arrived last night at his mountain camp here after a newspaper man and his wife, who were members of the party had been injured en route in an automobile accident.

The chief executive was not informed of the crash until he reached camp, as his car was at the head of the cavalcade and that in which Frank Connor, correspondent of the New York Times, was riding at the rear.

Mrs. Connor was given first aid treatment at the scene of the accident and then taken to Washington, suffering with a broken collar-bone and severe shock. Connor was only slightly scratched and bruised. The accident occurred near Fairfax, Va., about half an hour after the five automobiles left the White House for the drive to the Rapidan river retreat of the President.

Moving between 50 and 55 miles an hour, all of the cars had passed a large bus going in the same direction, except Connor's. As he attempted to pass, his car was said to have skidded from the road and then being struck by the bus, it was overturned twice, and thrown more than 25 feet from the road.

Troubles Mounting Upon Heavily Sued Resort Resident

WEST PALM BEACH, July 11.—(AP)—Troubles piled up today on Victor A. Searles, millionaire of New York and Palm Beach.

He was already facing suits for a total of \$250,000 damages here yesterday when his wife, Mabel, Margaret Searles brought suit against him for separate maintenance of herself and child. Her bill was removed from the courthouse quickly by a defense attorney but at the offices of Blackwell, Donnell and Moore, of her counsel here, it was said Mrs. Searles charged her husband had failed to provide for her and her child although he was worth "several million dollars."

Earlier in the day, three local lawyers had brought separate suits against Searles for an aggregate of \$120,000. No declarations were put on record but at the offices of C. D. Abbott, one of the attorneys, who is suing for \$100,000, it was said Abbott's suit grew out of alleged slanderous statements made by Searles against Abbott in another suit. Abbott and Searles both were concerned in the \$600,000 sales of the "Mincer Mile" ocean front property near here last fall to Robert P. McCormick, publisher of the Chicago Tribune, and Abbott is now involved in litigation over divisions of the commission from this deal.

Several days ago, the Palm Beach Mercantile Company sued Searles for \$130,000 damages, claiming he had failed to make payments on three \$18,000 notes.

Members Of Family Die From Poisoning

ALEXANDRIA, La., July 11.—(AP)—Two members of a family of six were dead and three others in a critical condition yesterday from ptomaine poisoning caused, physicians said, by drinking water from a barrel containing a dead snake and from eating tainted meat.

Frank Lemons, 32, the father, died last night, two days after his 7 year old son, Wilbur James, succumbed. Physicians who were treating Mrs. Lemons and two daughters, Lillian, 8, and Freda, 4, said these three might recover.

Investigators learned from Mrs. Lemons that the family drank water from a barrel in which a dead snake had been found and that they recently ate meat which appeared to be tainted.

The youngest member of the family, an infant, died on a battle, along escaped illness.

Smoot Believes No Revision Of Tariff Law Will Be Made

SALT LAKE CITY, July 11.—(AP)—Senator Smoot, chairman of the Senate finance committee and co-author of the Smoot-Hawley tariff act, expressed belief yesterday there will be no revision of the law at the forthcoming session of Congress.

Commenting on a statement by Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the Democratic leader, saying an effort at revision would be made in the next session, Senator Smoot said:

"I desire to call Senator Robinson's attention to the fact that never has a tariff bill been enacted during a session immediately preceding a Presidential election. I do not think for a moment that a revision of the tariff will be made at this coming session of Congress. Under the flexible provision of the present tariff act neither reductions or increases can be secured on specific items, without disturbing our whole financial and business structure."

Referring to protests on the Smoot-Hawley tariff from foreign governments, the finance chairman charged that Senator Thomas, Oklahoma Democrat, had sent a letter to other countries, "inviting foreign countries against the provision of the Smoot-Hawley bill and particularly requesting criticisms as to whether the enactment of the bill would affect their countries."

BEES HAVE LANGUAGE

WASHINGTON, July 11.—(AP)—Communication between bees is carried on largely through their sense of smell and by interpretation of "dances" performed within their hives, says the department of agriculture.

Pigeon Will Be Used In Akron Christening

AKRON, Ohio, July 11.—(AP)—Mr. Herbert Hoover will christen the new Navy dirigible Akron Aug. 8, by opening the door of a cage, releasing white pigeons into the air.

The ceremony will be unique in this lighter-than-air center, blimps built here always having been christened by breaking a bottle of liquid air on the control cabin. Sponsors of airships have always worn gloves to preclude any possibility of receiving a frozen hand while handling the liquid air.

In the case of the first lady it was decided that not even the minor risk should be taken.

Mrs. Hoover is expected to arrive here by special train. The President will not attend.

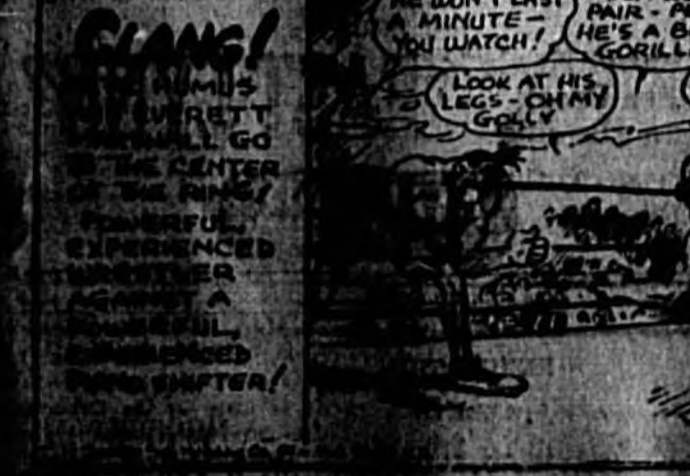
