Spoke Here Monday . Night Sends Greetings

. Dr. Lincoln Hulley, president of Stateon University at DeLand was an honored guest at the lacture given at the High School auditorium last Friday night and spoke for a few minutes on the Liberty Loan, thrilling his audience with his patriotic utterances and showing them the horrors of war in all its phases. He: sends greetings to Seminole and Sanford in the following letter:

To Sanford Citizens: Dear Friends:-

The Liberty Boulds give you a chance to help your country without its costing you anything. On those terms no one should hold back. Germany has already won the war. part of France, part of Russia, and carries her into the Far East. That endangers America. We must reverse that condition or we are lost. All we have is lost. No appointments can be made to these or other positions in the Federal classified civil service unless authorized by the Civil Service Commission under the civil service law.
