SALT LAKE CITY, Oct.

18.—(AP)—A missing United Airlines plane with 19 persons aboard was sighted from the air today 12 miles southwest of Evanston, Wyoming. The huge transcontinental transprt was discovered by Bob Bergensen, a United Airlines pilot, and Bill Williams, an observer, but they could not determine if it was badly damaged or if any of its occupants were still alive.

The palatial liner had been missing for more than 12 hours. Sixteen passengers and a crew of three were aboard when Pilot E. D. Woodgerd radioed at 8:19 P. M. Mountain Time, last night over Rock Springs. Wyoming, "alightly rough, All O. K."
