



Learning English

"Too much of teaching is correction rather than in-struction," says Amanda Ellis, professor at Colorado State Teachers' College, in a report covering a nationwide survey on the teaching of English, The report indicts English teachers, asserting that American youth do not speak understandingly or write well.

Blame for this was placed largely on a too heavy teaching load. Courses of study need to be revised, says the report, to permit a uniform aim from kindergarden through college. Also, word study, given up in many schools, should be re-emphasized as well as the relationship between grammar, vocabulary and sentence struc-

In other words, the country's teachers of English are not satisfied with their product. This is wholesome, and promises well. Certainly there is too much criticism from employers that graduates of the nation's high schools and colleges do not know how to spell, or how to write an acceptable letter. It is important that Young America should be master of his native tongue."

Caribbean Co-Operation

An encouraging bit of international co-operation is the recent creation of a Caribbean Commission which, with a research council and a West India conference, will act as a controlling and advisory body to the four nations with territory in the Caribbean; The United States, France, The Netherlands and Great Britain, The agreement also provides for a permanent secretariat to be established at Port of Spain, Trinidad, to be headed by an American.

This organization is the peace time evolution of a war commission set up by Britain and America to manage economic and nationality problems. It is a little great of international co-operation which may marve as in spiration for other programs of international control for bigger stretches of the earth's surface.
