### Reapportionment Drive Is Losing Steam—Dirksen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some steam appears to be leaking from drives in state legislatures on a constitutional convention on the Supreme Court's one-man-one vote reapportionment decision.

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, telling a news conference a month ago that 22 states had petitioned Congress for a convention, predicted there would be petitions from two more.

The Constitution says Congress shall call a convention on application from two-thirds of the states — 34 of the 50.

But since Dirksen's prediction, the only state whose legislature has taken any significant action is Alaska. Its Senate rejected April 8 a petition-resolution that had passed the House.

A resolution which passed the Iowa House earlier in the year remains locked up in a State of setting out required steps. Democrats control the Iowa Senate and Democratic Gov. Harold E. Hughes is opposed to the resolution.

The convention question is not basically a partisan matter, but Dirksen has more influence with his party's members everywhere than he does with Democrats.

Dirksen long has tried to undo the 1964 Supreme Court ruling that both houses of state legislatures must be apportioned on the basis of population.

He failed in 1965 and again in 1966 to get Senate approval for a proposed constitutional amendment to permit apportionment of one house of a state legislature along lines other than population.

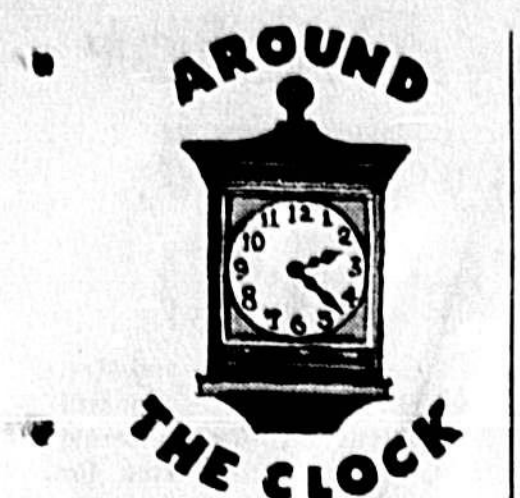

Immediate steps to form private, non-profit corporation from those vitally concerned with the future of downtown Sanford are being taken at the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce. On Monday the task of selecting members for the corporation or committee will begin.

DeWitt T. Matthews Jr., president of the chamber, presided at the luncheon which was a joint endeavor by the chamber and the Sanford Atlantic National Bank. Those attending saw some provocative slides showing what other cities with depressed downtown areas had done to remedy them.

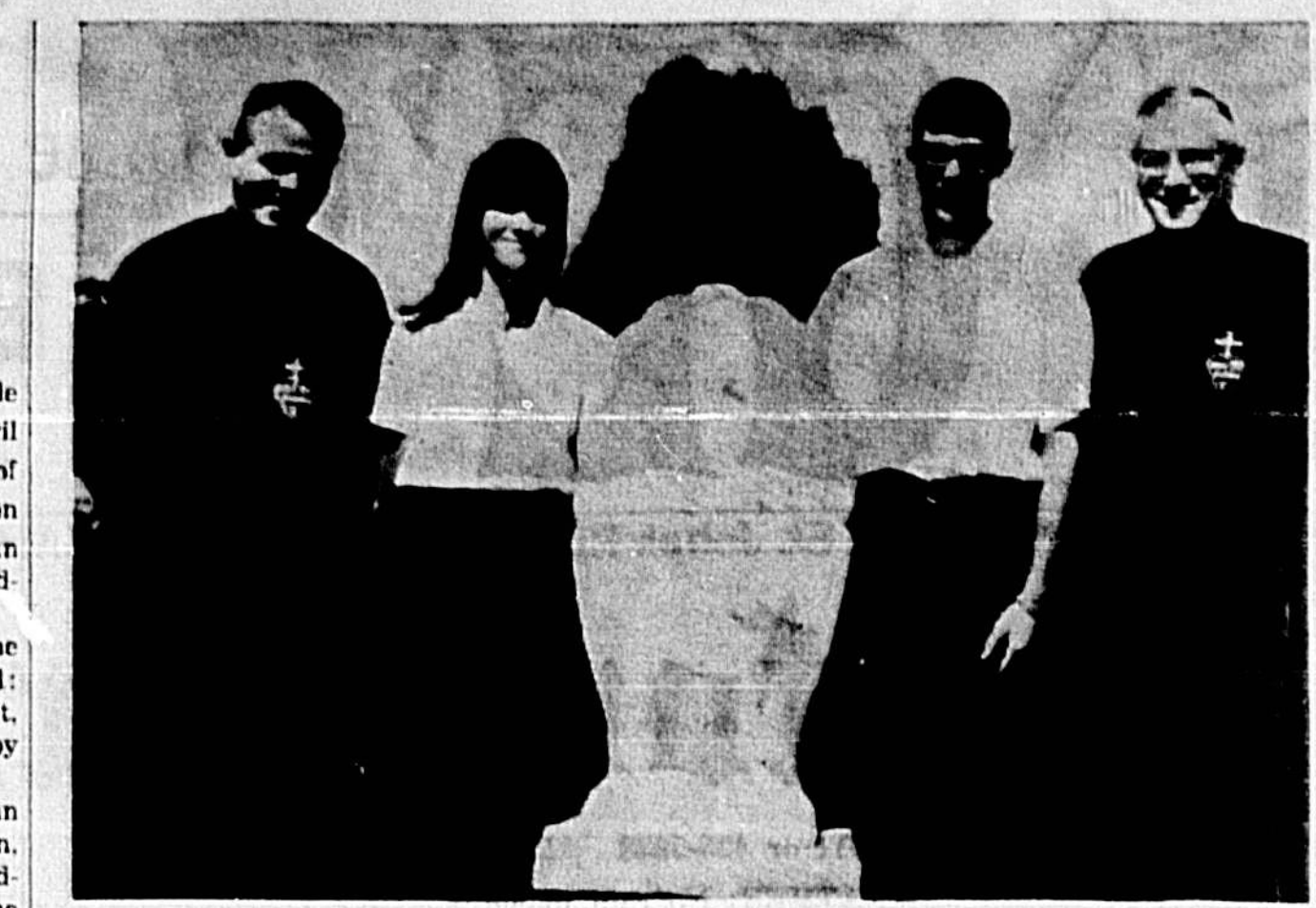

## Dr. Coppolino Starts Life In Penitentiary

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP) — Dr. Carl Coppolino checked into the Florida State Prison Thursday night on a life sentence after his lawyers failed to win his freedom with an "illegal verdict" plea.

The 34-year-old Sarasota anesthesiologist also was denied a new trial Thursday, and was told he is not a legal pauper and will have to shoulder the costs of an appeal himself.

A jury in Naples, Fla., convicted Coppolino of second-degree murder last Friday in the death of his first wife, Carmela, on Aug. 28, 1965.

The defense declared the verdict illegal because the charge-murder with an injection of the paralyzing drug succinylcholine-impaled, premeditated and hence murder in the first degree.

F. Lee Bailey of Boston, Coppolino's chief attorney, asked Circuit Judge Lynn Silvertooth to rule the verdict illegal and set his client free.

Silvertooth refused, then denied a motion for a new trial and refused to hear arguments for bail. This left Coppolino in the custody of the sheriff, who held an order to transfer him to the penitentiary at Raftord.

Immediately following the hearing, Sheriff Ross Roper and two deputies ushered Coppolino to a prison car for the 2½-hour trip.

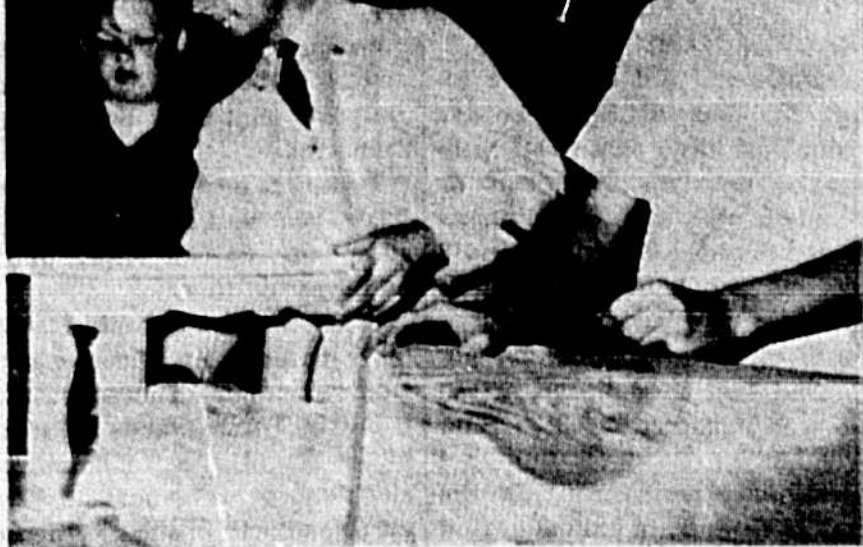
Coppolino smiled wanly as he left the courthouse. His wife, Mary, who testified to his insanity, had a blank expression and said nothing.

Bailey had called the verdict, returned after four weeks of trial, "laughable" and said it demonstrated a compromise among the 12 men jurors. He said it could not stand on appeal. The defense has already filed motions to appeal to District Court at Lakeland.

Silvertooth said he would hear a motion later to release Coppolino on bail while the appeal is pending.

Bailey said the verdict had the effect of exonerating Coppolino on bail while the appeal is pending.

## Sanford Part Of National Youth Survey

Sanford as well as 71 other cities, towns, and villages across the nation has been included in the sample for a national survey of youth to be conducted by the University of Michigan's Institute for Social Research at Ann Arbor, Mich.

The First Presbyterian Church will cooperate in the survey which is expected to start May 15 and end June 15. This first survey of a representative sample of American teenagers will include boys and girls aged 13 to 16 in each of the survey sites.

Some 1,200 to 1,500 teenagers will make up a cross-section of the entire age group population. Interviews will be conducted by 40 specially trained University of Michigan undergraduates or graduate students who will travel the length and breadth of the U. S. to take adolescents about their hopes and fears, their problems and their joys, the things they do that are a credit to their communities, and the things that might get them into trouble. Questions will concern their schools, their friends, their families, their feelings about themselves and their aspirations for the future.

The interviews are scheduled to begin about the first of May and continue through mid-June. Michigan teenagers have been consulted and pre-interviewed to perfect the sample questions. To insure standard conditions, all interviews will be conducted in pre-arranged interview stations. Interviewers will call for the teenagers and transport them back home in about two hours.

Results of the survey will be made available to youth agencies, educators, and others who need information to help teenagers grow up in America. A special report will be sent to each of the youngsters.

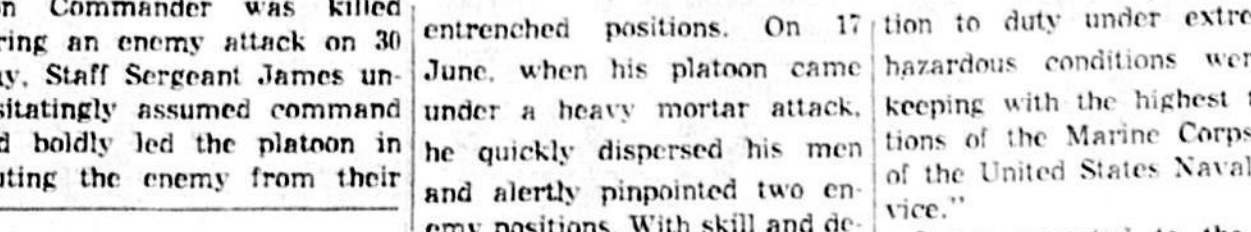
Information about the survey will be revealed. Only data on groups of teenagers will be reported, according to the program director, Dr. Martin G. Brumberg, of the Research Center for Group Dynamics.

**Yardner's Corner**

The dark colored part of your garden soil — its organic matter content — has a golden potential for growing lush, nutritious vegetables and beautiful flowers. Like gold — this organic matter is hard to come by and easily lost, especially in Florida's sandy soils and hot climate.

Soil organic matter or humus is important for several reasons. It is the nutrient reservoir for the highest quality food element, nitrogen. It also serves as a food for soil bacteria that fix the nitrogen of the air into forms which are readily converted into available plant food. It helps bind together loose sands which are subject to erosion in this area. In North Florida where there is clay-type soils, it makes heavy clay more open and porous.

Humus increases the water-holding capacity of soils and allows water and air to circulate freely in heavy soils such as loams or clays. It helps prevent erosion, tends to prevent leaching losses, increases soil fertility by making inorganic elements of the soil more readily available, and increases the base exchange capacity of the soil.

In Florida, organic matter decomposes rapidly, either in the soil or as a mulch on top of it. For this reason, you have to add organic matter to your soil each year for best results. In your garden, you can maintain your soil's organic content more nearly constant, by a systematic use of cover crops and green manure than by any other method. A crop of green manure plowed under can add one to two tons of dry matter per acre.

Water goes into the atmosphere by evaporation from open bodies of water and from land surfaces. Vegetation helps this process. Once into the air, water vapor, water collects into clouds to be transported and condensed into precipitation to return to the earth. That which falls on the land surface is the potential for our drinkable water supply. A great deal of this water runs off into our creeks and rivers and back to the atmosphere, constantly renews and revitalizes the supply.

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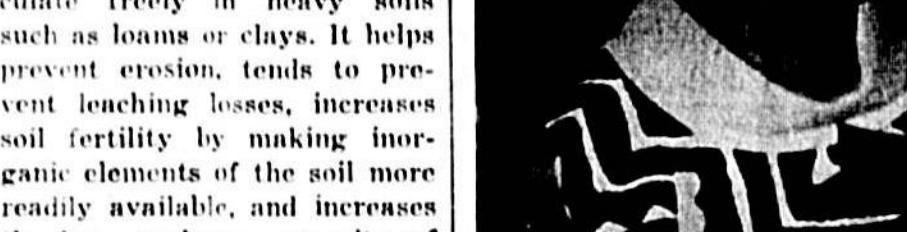

Commissioner of Agriculture TALLAHASSEE — (Special to The Sanford Herald) — The Florida Department of Agriculture is greatly concerned about adulterated processed meat and meat products which are being shipped into Florida from other states.

During recent weeks, Florida Department of Agriculture inspectors have stopped the sale of thousands of pounds of adulterated beef and pork raw materials, all of which were found to have been adulterated with mutton.

This clearly is an act of mislabeling on the part of the processor.

In view of the recurrence of shipments of adulterated meat and meat products from other states into Florida, I have requested U. S. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to take corrective action.

The Florida firms which purchased these raw materials did so in good faith. They had no reason to suspect the products were not what they were labeled. Consequently, these Florida firms are being penalized for the wrong doing of someone else.

Each package of the adulterated meat products were stamped with the words, "The meat or meat product contained herein has been U. S. inspected and passed by the Florida Department of Agriculture."

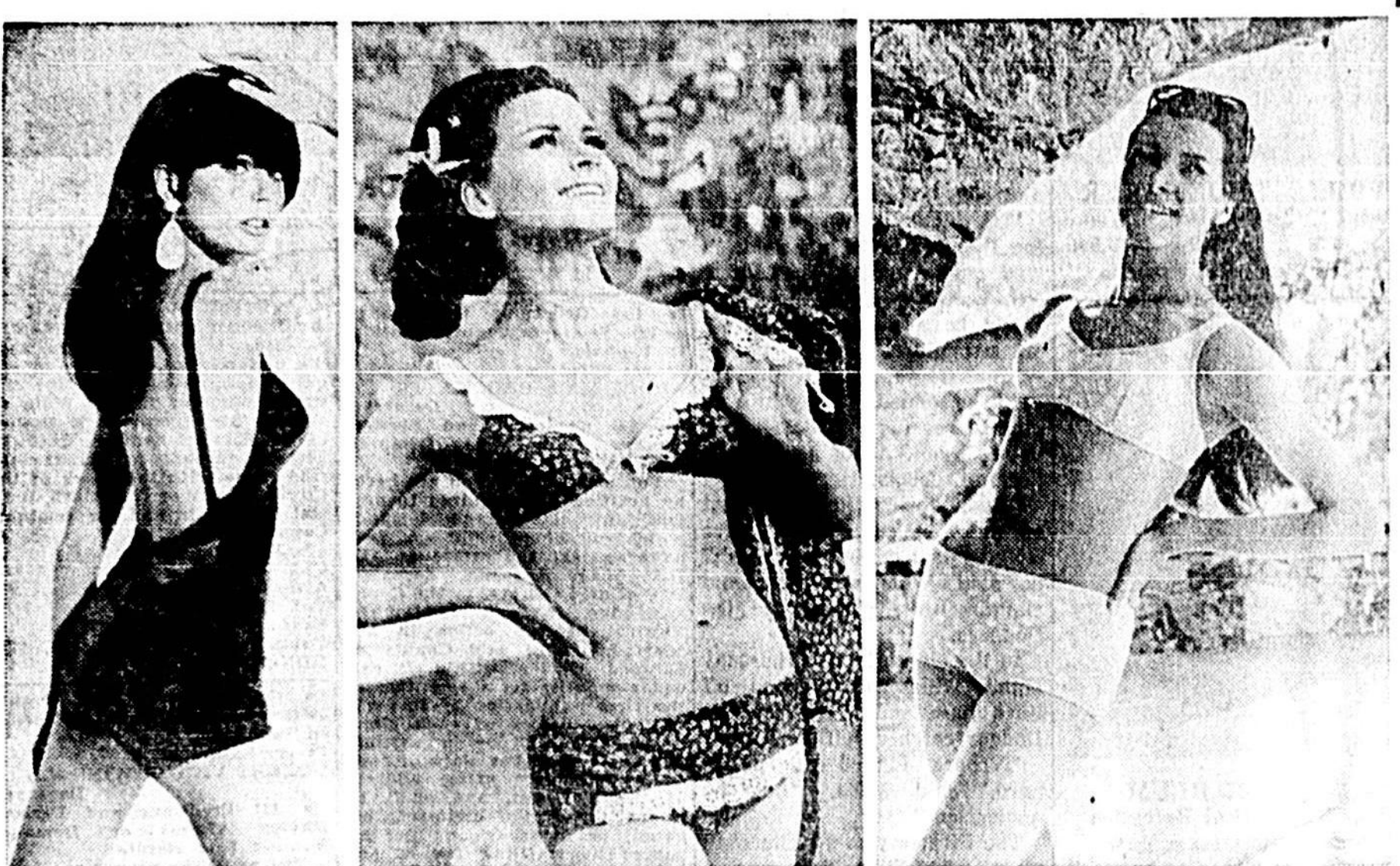

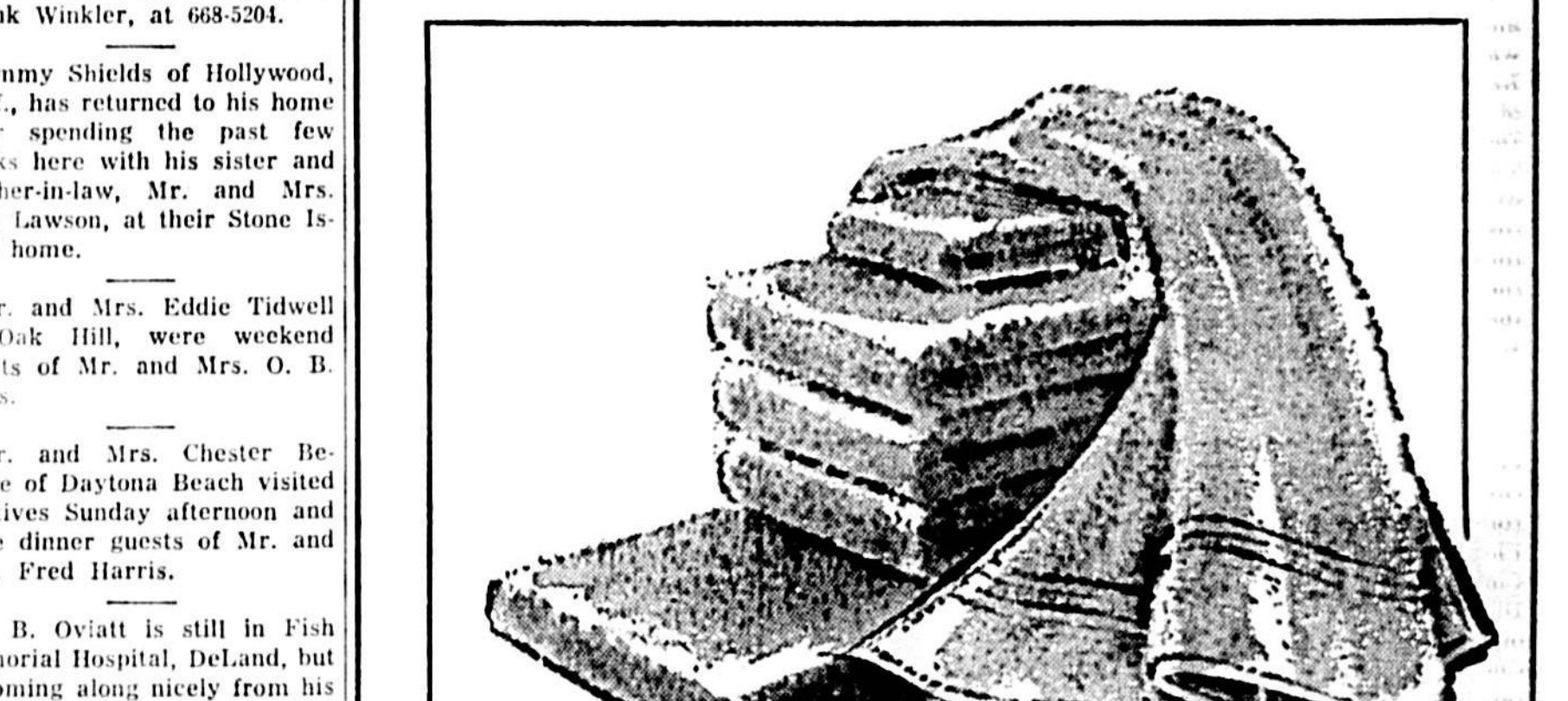

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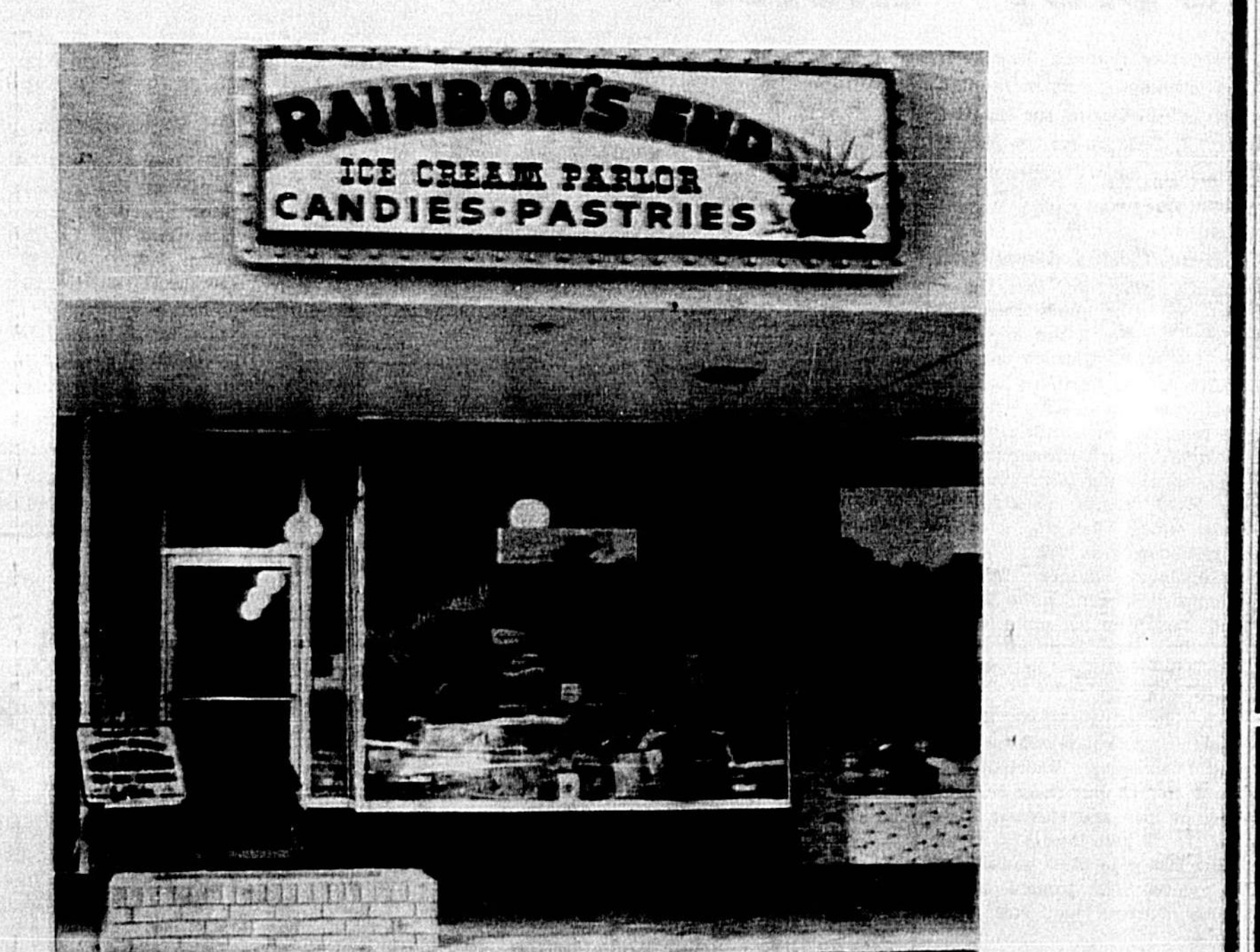

## Moving The Capitol

A great deal of heat has been generated in Tallahassee in the past few days over the goal of moving the State Capitol to Orlando.

Leading the opposition has been State Sen. Mallory Horne, one of the most adroit political figures in Florida.

Horne, a man honored and respected by his associates as a fine and loyal Democrat, shook many of them awake by announcing publicly he was going to vote for Sen. Goldwater and urging his fellow Democrats in Florida to do likewise.

He refused to run for re-election to the House in November of that year and sat, quietly by, buying himself a civic work as board chairman of the Tallahassee hospital and his law practice.

Orlando, even with a Miami State Senator to hold their facade, never had a chance to swing the deal.

The capital of Florida may one day be moved. It is unlikely to happen while Mallory Horne is active. And Sen. Horne is a young man.

## Analysis Of The News

WASHINGTON (AP) - It all seemed so simple, starting out and it wound up in a gorgeous political snafu.

The 26 Republican senators have what they call a Republican Policy Committee, made up of 15 of them, including Sen. Jacob K. Javits of New York.

About five or six weeks ago he had an idea which the committee thought sounded all right.

This was it: that the committee's staff should make a study of the war in Vietnam for the benefit of all the Senate Republicans who, like the Democrats, are not all agreed on the war.

The hope was that through this study the Senate Republicans might be able to reach some kind of agreement about Vietnam and President Johnson's handling of the war.

If they could do that—or, better yet, if there could be some agreement on what position the Republicans as a party should take on the war—they would have a big advantage over the divided Democrats.

This would be a bit of a blessing for the Republicans, if they could do it with the presidential election year coming up.

But when the study was completed, it raised a very sensible question: What to do with it? There couldn't be any agreement among the Republicans

until they had seen it, and they hadn't seen it yet.

So the chairman of the Senate Republican Policy Committee, Bourke B. Hickenlooper of Iowa, distributed it to the Senate Republican caucus.

The study listed in its 91 pages some of the confusions and contradictions of the war and then got to the water's edge? That we must rally behind the President? Does bipartisanship mean that Democratic mistakes are Republican responsibilities?

This was a can of worms. If there ever was one, and the reaction of the Republicans reading this study could be predicted before they ever saw it, depending on which view they took. And it turned out that way.

The study was not supposed to be released publicly until the Republican senators had a chance to discuss it. But the material was red hot. And Hickenlooper feared the whole thing or parts of it might be leaked before there was discussion.

So he decided last Friday to release the complete study papers. The study, whose purpose was to encourage some Republican agreement on Vietnam, wound up accomplishing the opposite.

Republicans exploded for and against the war or Johnson's handling of it, with each expressing the view he held before the study was made.

News of the study so upset Sen. Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, the Republican Senate leader recovering from pneumonia, that he rushed from his hospital bed to the Capitol to rally the Republican senators behind Johnson. Dirksen has been a solid Johnson supporter on the war all along.

Some were persuaded and said they would stand foursquare behind the President. Others weren't. Sen. George D. Aiken of Vermont was intensely critical of the administration. The Republicans' Senate dove, Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon, thought the study supported his position, and so on.

Aiken admitted, "There is almost as much divergence of view among prominent Republicans as among prominent Democrats."

As if to show the divergence among Democrats, Sen. John Stennis of Mississippi rebuked the Republicans, calling for unity behind Johnson and warning the war should not be made a political football. At the same time an unrelenting Democratic critic of the war, Sen. J.W. Fulbright of Arkansas, praised the study.

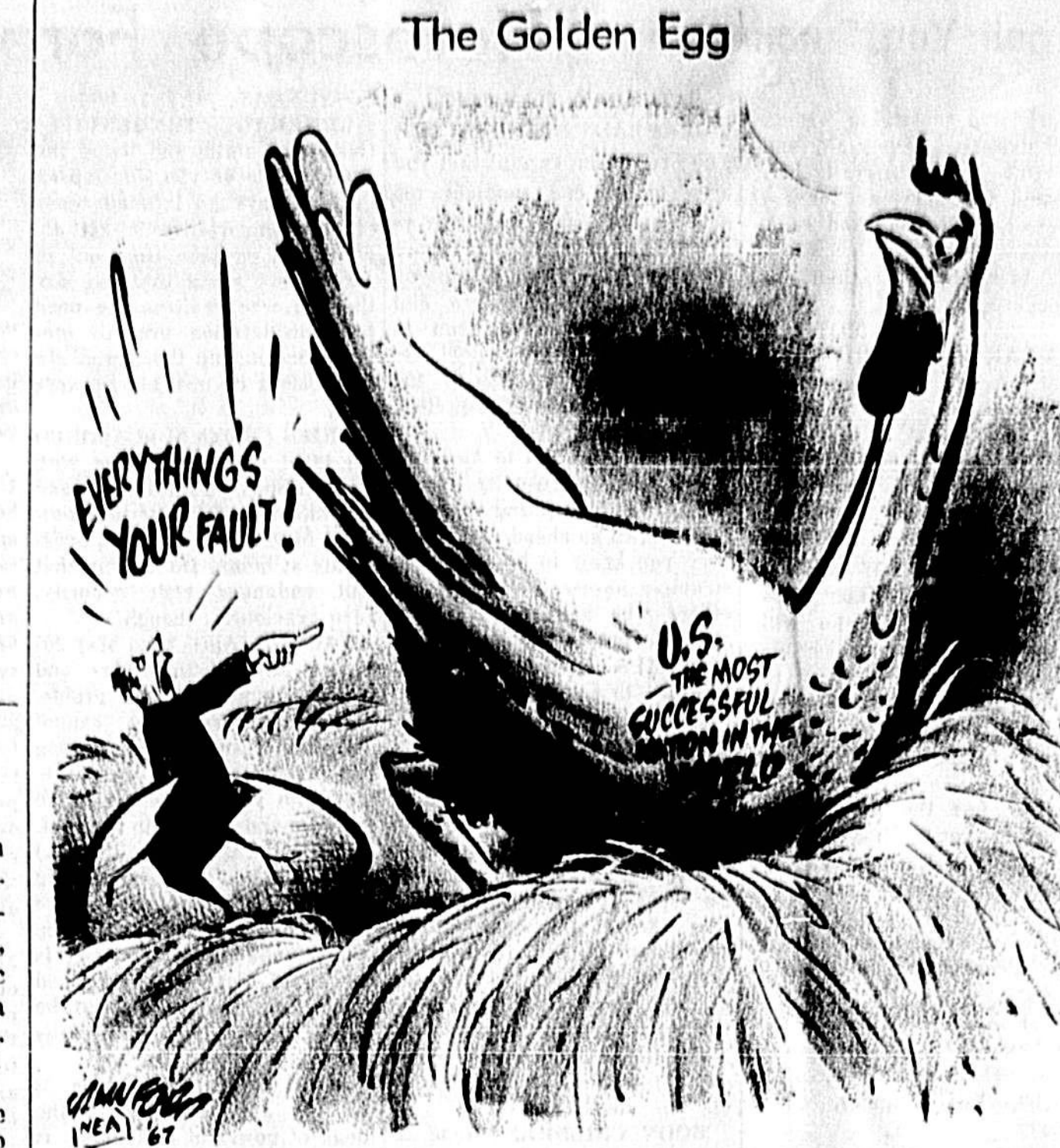
