discourage the shipment of fruits
and other perishable matter. The
rate on this class of mail is very
high, in some cases being more
than the cost of the goods.
It was stated that five extra
clerks have been employed to help
care for the Christmas business
and to assist Santa Claus to reach
the boys and girls of Sanford on
scheduled time. Two of these clerks
are engaged in writing insurance
on outgoing packages. The others
are handling the incoming mail.
Most Packages Insured
Mr. Hall stated that most of the
packages being mailed by Sanford
people this year were being insur-
ed. He said that only about 50 per
cent of last year's mailing went
out insured and that fully 90 per
cent carried insurance this year.
Practically every package going
through the office calls for a re-
ceipt.
Postal clerks say that if all the
packages were lost in transit, all
the money in the state of Florida
would be necessary to pay the
claims of Sanford people. Another
bit of evidence that better march-
andise is being sent.

Santa Claus Reported To Be On Way With A Heavy Load Of Presents For All

(By The Associated Press) Santa Claus is chuckling with glee as he prepares for his yearly visit to the chimneys of the world, because reports to him have indicated that this will be the best Christmas since the Great War.

Old Nick apparently has not been affected by the controversy on the relative merits of the airship. The latest statement from Lapland, transmitted via Copenhagen, said that he would hold to tradition and use his reindeer and sleigh for his annual voyage around the globe.

The sleigh will carry its greatest burden, because of an indicated increase in the baby population almost everywhere, but Old Santa announced he would take off promptly. He started "hitching up" well in advance of former year.

Brooklyn, with its glittering lights, actors and actresses and city throngs, has been giving Christmas benefit performances. Several of the New York newspapers sponsored most of the shows. Debutantes and society leaders have been conducting bazaars and amateur theatricals. From these sources alone, officials estimate approximately \$1,000,000 would be raised.

This amount will only be a drop in the cheer-spreading bucket. The city department of welfare will have its usual program of dinners and entertainment, while contributions from hundreds of individuals and charitable organizations all combine to give New York one of

its typically pre-war Christmases. Last year, Wall Street distributed \$40,000,000 in Christmas bonuses among its employees. Stockholders received millions in the form of extra and increased dividends and stock. What happened then is expected to be repeated on a large scale.

Chicago alone had a total in Christmas savings funds of approximately \$25,000,000. Reports from the other cities showed that the issuance of these deposits early was felt in the shopping districts.

Hundreds of cities and towns will have municipal Christmas trees. Chicago will take the lead in carol singing when sixteen hundred members of the board of trade and others join in broadcasting through thirty-five stations.

In Kansas City, the mayor will have a Christmas tree for the kids and one of the newspapers has ar-

anged for Mr. Kringle to use the old-fashioned reindeer and sled when he passes through.

Down in Texas, where many children never have seen snow, Houston will place its Christmas tree in the city hall square and provide a background of artificial snow. Here, Santa was asked to discard his airship and use the reindeer and sled instead.

Denver's carol singers will gather in the civic center's Greek amphitheater, brilliantly lighted and festooned with holly wreaths and spruce boughs, to usher in the Christmas tide. Later, they will march through the streets.

Indianapolis has turned over its municipal Christmas activities to the fire department and in each of the city's thirty-two stations there will be a tree. Santa will spend some time there, for he has agreed to slide down the pole in each station and personally deliver his gifts to the children.

Florida, the country's boom state and the real estate salesmen's paradise, is ready for a Christmas commensurate with the large amount of business being transacted.

Throughout Dixie cities, large and small, the spirit is reported to have had the effect of bringing to the hearts of men the associa-

tion of its meaning with the origin of their creed.

In Berlin, twelve theatres, including the Municipal Opera, are giving matinee and evening performances of fairy tales several times a week. More than 1,000,000 Christmas trees were cut in the Harz Mountains, despite the luxury tax.

Next to the Christmas tree a sheaf of oats for the sparrows symbolizes the Christmas spirit and in a tree or on top of a pole in front of almost every house the grain is tied up for the birds to pick. On Christmas eve, all domestic animals are given an extra ration of oats or a special tuft of hay.

Another ceremony is the noon day meal when servants and masters eat together in the kitchen, dipping their bread in the same kettle where the Christmas meat is being cooked.

Florida One Of Four States That Have No Forestry Laws

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Dec. 22.—(AP)—Florida is one of four states of the union which have not as yet adopted a state law relating to forestry, Chief Forester Greeley declared in his annual report to the secretary of agriculture.

South Carolina, Mississippi and Arkansas are the other three, Mr. Greeley declared.

These four states, the chief forester said, are among the largest timbered sections of the country.

Notable progress in forestry work has been made in other parts of the country, the report stated, particularly in Georgia, Idaho, and Oklahoma, while it was stated, Minnesota, North Carolina and Illinois have strengthened their activities.

Gas Shortage Prevails At West Palm Beach; Situation Not Serious

WEST PALM BEACH, Dec. 22.—(P)—Autoists were becoming somewhat hysterical and were seeking to purchase large quantities of gasoline here today as a result of the gasoline shortage which developed over the weekend. Though the situation as it stands, according to officials, is nothing to be alarmed at, some of the stations of the city were without gasoline. More than 20 carloads of fuel are expected here immediately and their arrival will eliminate the shortage entirely. R. B. Paddison, of the citizens' traffic committee, is in touch with Vice President Roydenbaugh of the Florida East Coast Railway to seek quick action on movement of gasoline cars into West Palm Beach. Meanwhile all traffic is continuing without apparent abatement and business is being carried on without delay, it was declared.

Barge Line Is Soon To Be In Operation

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. Dec. 22.—(P)—About 20 car loads of merchandise will arrive in West Palm Beach in the next few days from Jacksonville by way of the first string of barges of the East Coast Barge Line. Announcement of the arrival in the near future of those representing the big, new barges was made today by enterprise in this city. These are the first barges to arrive and, according to officials of the barge line, will be the pioneers that will lead the way in relieving the embargo situation which now not only affects freight but express as well. Twelve barges are now under construction and will be started over the "water trail" from Jacksonville to West Palm Beach as soon as they are completed.

McChord, who resigned. The president also submitted to the Senate the nomination of Thomas F. Woodlock of New York, who is serving as an interstate Commerce Commissioner under recess appointment. The Senate last spring declined to approve Woodlock's nomination.

Meeting Florida's Transportation Needs

These new lines will make possible the development of large areas of land, and will open up new traffic routes. The Atlantic Coast Line is enlarging its other facilities in Florida as rapidly as conditions permit. Marked progress toward relieving the traffic congestion is being made by the co-operation of most shippers and receivers of freight in loading and unloading cars promptly. Similar co-operation by everybody using its facilities will aid the Coast Line in its efforts to restore normal service.

DEAF CAN HEAR IN NEW THEATRE

Impaired Hearing New No Bar to Enjoyment of Theatre Guild's Plays as Handicap Is Overcome

One of the first hardships encountered by the hard of hearing has always been the loss of social entertainment such as the theatre. Impaired hearing has more and more forced the individual to lead a somewhat solitary life, cut off from the arts and recreations of music and the drama. The first definite and lasting step to restore the theatre to the hard of hearing has been made by the Theatre Guild in the new Guild Theatre in New York through the use of vacuum tube amplifiers.

Twelve seats in an excellent part of the orchestra are equipped for the benefit of individuals whose hearing is impaired. They have only to apply for seats in this section, obtain small ear receivers at the box office, and connect the ear receivers with inconspicuous boxes on the rear of the row of seats next in front. The system employed is an adaptation of the Public Address System, made available by the Western Electric Company, whose engineers installed it.

Two microphones at the front of the stage pick up every sound; and the sounds are amplified by means of vacuum tubes under the stage. The magnified sounds are conveyed by wires to the special seats, where they reach the earphones of the hard of hearing theatregoers.

One of the striking facts about the system is that it is so thoroughly inconspicuous. The ear receivers are small and light without a headband, and they need not be connected at all until the lights have dimmed and the play begins. Thus the persons of impaired hearing are, to all intents and purposes, exactly on a par with the rest of the audience.

The new Guild Theatre opened last year with Shaw's play "Caesar and Cleopatra." It has since sheltered Shaw's "Arms and the Man," and now "The Glass Slipper," by M. M. Parkes. These plays have all been recognized as more than passing entertainment, and they are representative of the best of the Guild as a non-commercial

organization. Thus, persons of impaired hearing are to have opened to them first of all what is most worth while in the theatre, and they will have an opportunity to enjoy the most important as well as the most popular of new productions. The effectiveness of the Public Address System for this purpose was tested some time ago at a trial installation in the National Theatre for a theatre party of the New York League for the Hard of Hearing. The success of this test was so marked that it established beyond question the usefulness of the system and its desirability from the standpoint of the hard of hearing.

STATE SOCIETY TO START WORK ON FORESTRY AID

Director To Assume Duty Jan. 1; Highways, Parks To Receive Much Attention From Beautifying Program

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Dec. 22.—(P)—Active work by the Florida Beautification and Forestry society will get under way shortly after the beginning of the new

year, according to an announcement by the executive committee. The appointment of James O. Hazard as executive secretary to direct the work of the organization was announced at the same time. Mr. Hazard, who will take up the work on Jan. 1, 1926, will have his headquarters in Gainesville. Mr. Hazard is a leader of long standing in forestry work of the nation. He is a graduate of the Yale school of forestry, was for three years assistant forester in New Jersey, and has done considerable work as a consulting forester for large estates in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. He has had 11 years in forestry and related work, and is now farming and doing consulting forestry work in Pennsylvania.

While he was assistant forester in New Jersey, Mr. Hazard wrote a number of bulletins on forestry that are popular, practical and much used. The Florida Beautification and Forestry Society has for its object the beautification of highways, parks and "places everywhere," as well as promoting the conservation of Florida's forests and reforestation. The society was organized this summer, following a gift of \$25,000 by a benevolent and public-spirited citizen of the state for the purpose of defraying expenses of the society. Membership is open to all Florida citizens who are interested in beautification and forestry work. There is no membership fee. Articles of incorporation of the society were adopted at the last meeting of the board of directors, held recently, and the society plans to get a charter as a non-profit organization in the near future. Dr. A. A. Murphree, president of the University of Florida, is president of the society. Other members of the board of directors are: Dr. Wilmon Newell, dean of the College of Agriculture, University of Florida; Major W. L. Floyd, professor of horticulture at the university; Lenthall Wyman, assistant civilducator of the United States Department of Agriculture; B. F. Williamson, in charge of tung-oil development at

Gainesville; H. Harold Caryman, Glen St. M. Barnett, Mt. Dora. A number of the outstanding professional, civic and industrial leaders of the state are vice-presidents.

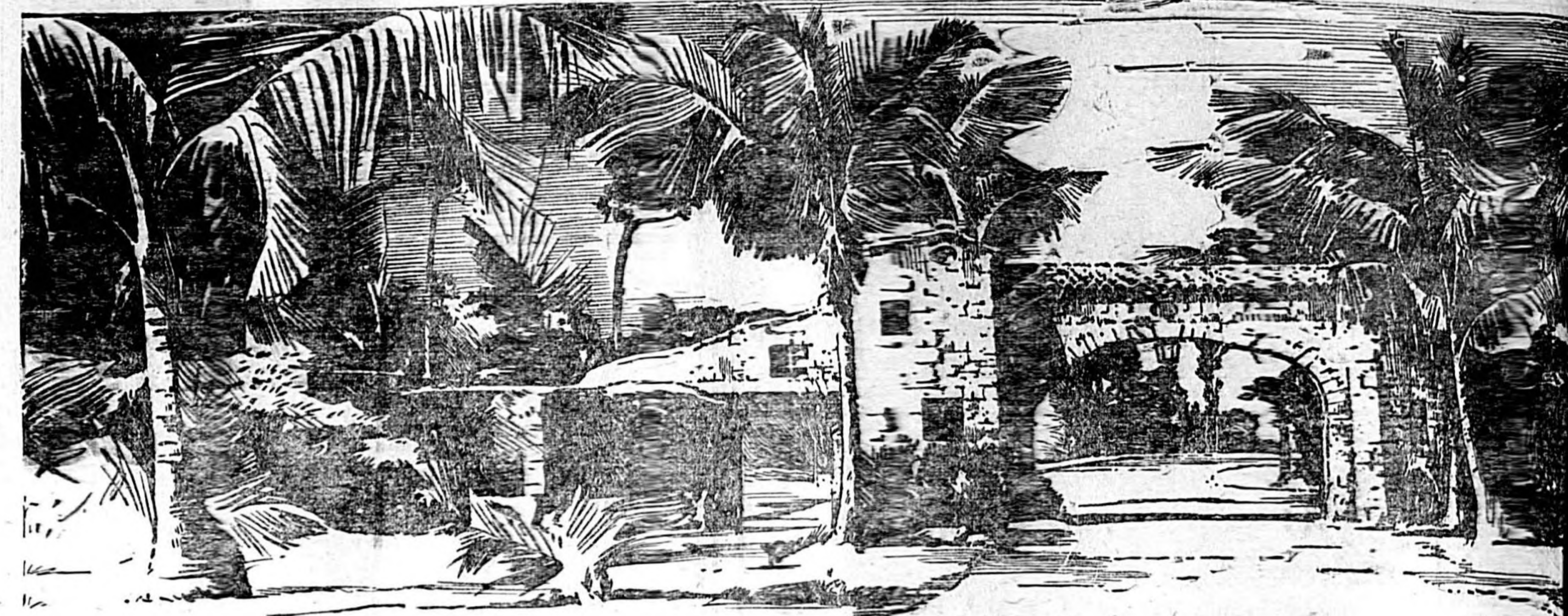

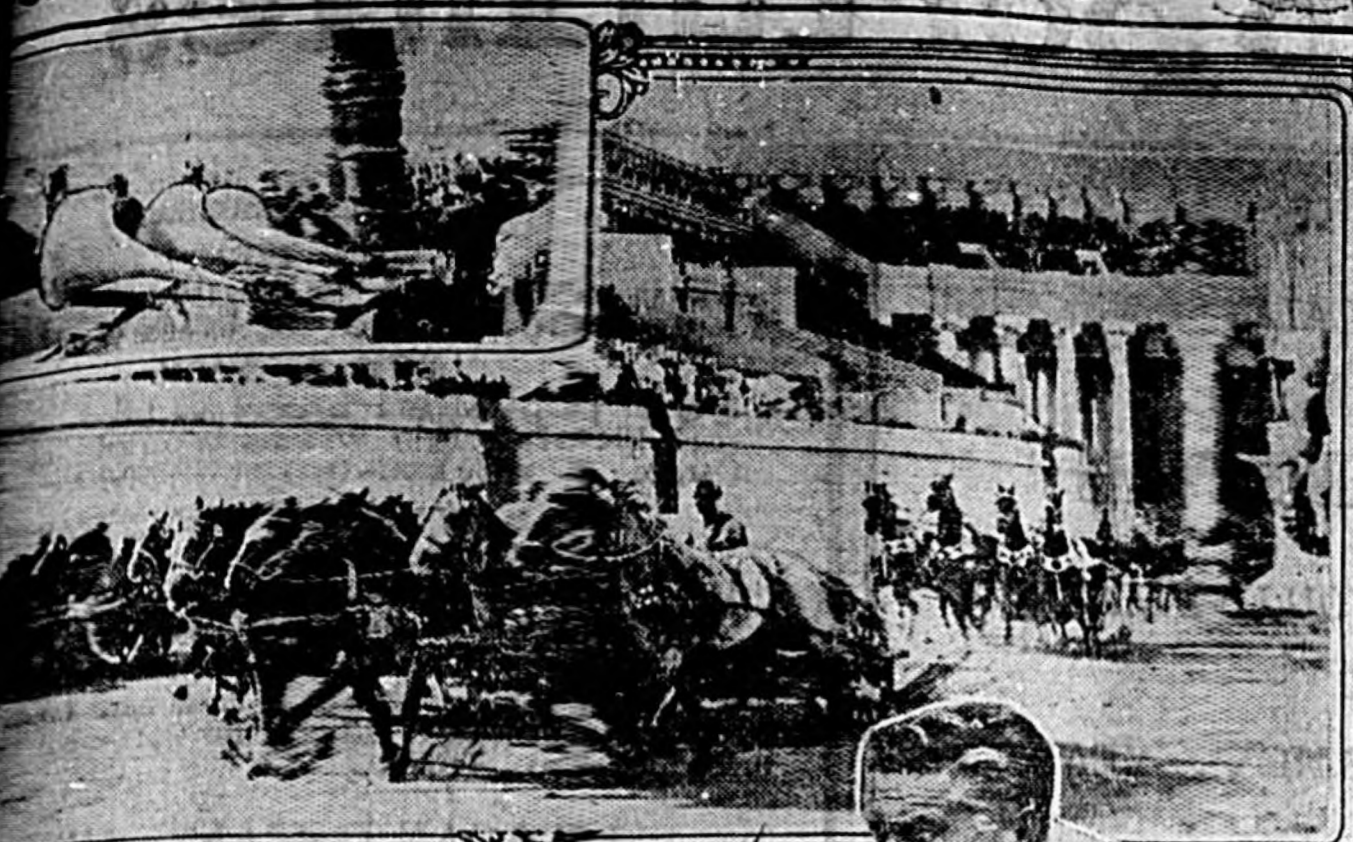

U. S. To Probe Alleged Manipulation Of Price Of Rubber By England

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Investigation of an alleged manipulation by the British colonial government of the price of crude rubber and other raw materials was ordered today by the House. A resolution requesting the House commerce committee to conduct the inquiry was adopted without a roll call after Representative Hull of Tennessee, former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, had charged Great Britain with "bad faith" in the matter. "The British government is laughing out loud at us," Mr. Hull said. "It is openly proclaiming that it intends to collect \$4,000,000,000 from us for rubber products to pay its war debt. "Europe is laughing up its sleeve at the way we are being held up for rubber." The resolution was introduced by Representative Tilson of Connecticut, the Republican leader had a conference with Secretary Hoover.

Satterwhite Refuses To Call Extra Session

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 22.—(AP)—Lee Satterwhite, speaker of the Texas house of representatives, today declined to call a special session of the legislature. TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Hearings will be conducted by the Florida Railroad Commission at Miami and Jacksonville on whether or not rates, rules and regulations should be applied on less than carload shipments of perishable freight in refrigerator cars between points within Florida, and to ascertain whether other rates should be adopted covering intra-plant, intra-terminal and inter-terminal switching within the limits of Miami. The Jacksonville hearing has been set for Jan. 11. That at Miami will be on Jan. 8.

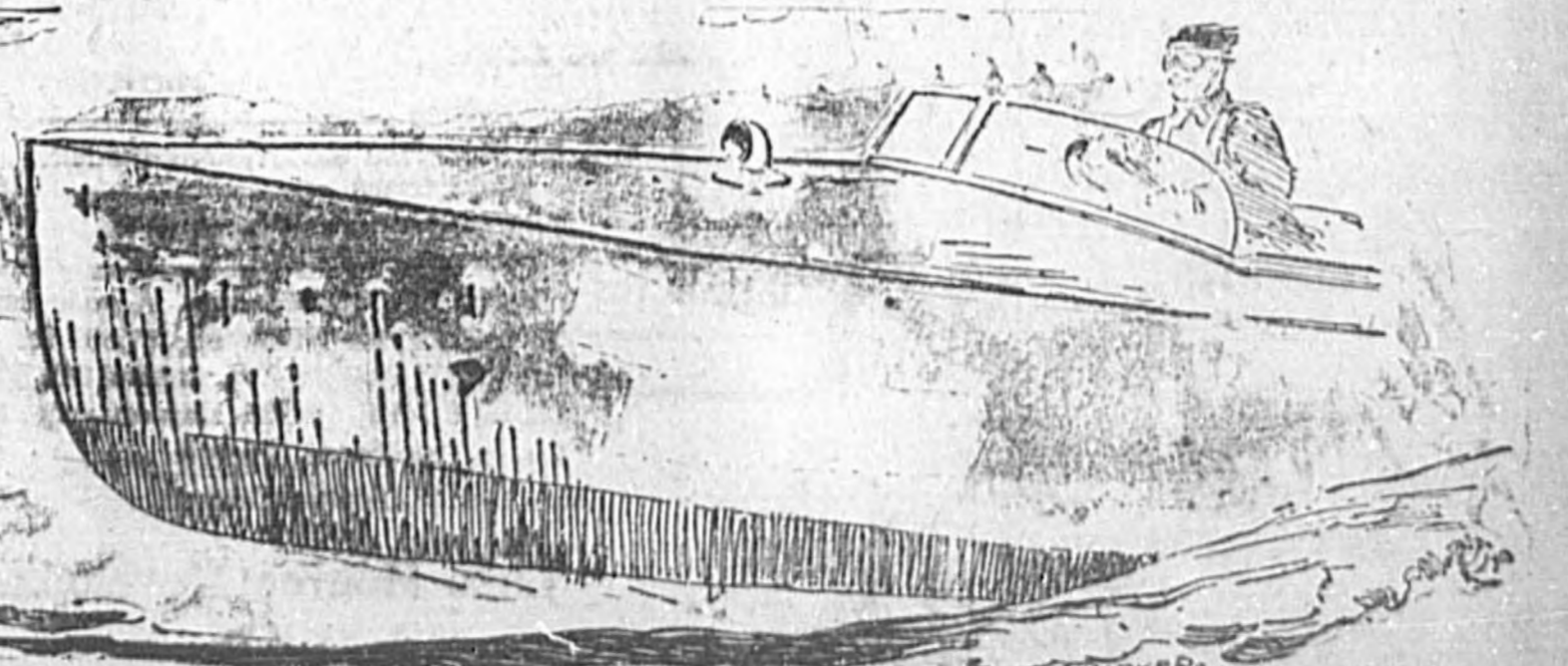

Sanford Investment Opportunities

Real Estate Brokers Causing Delay In Issuance Of New State Licenses

ORLANDO, Fla. Dec. 22.—(AP)—Much delay in the issuance of licenses for real estate brokers and salesmen and a great deal of unnecessary work is being caused in the office of the Florida Real Estate Commission, by the unfamiliarity of the applicants with the proper procedure for procuring the legal certificates for operation. This statement was issued here by Walter W. Rose, chairman of the commission with offices in this city.

The commission is being flooded with checks of various amounts, which must be returned, and numerous other mistakes are made, the chairman stated. He called attention to the fact that the commission does NOT issue the license for real estate brokers and salesmen but only issues the registration certificate, which is a prerequisite for obtaining the license from the county tax collector.

If those desiring either real estate brokers or salesmen's license will familiarize themselves with the simple process of applying for their licenses and follow the method minutely, declared Mr. Rose, the office of the commission will be relieved of much unnecessary work and the delivery of the certificate will be greatly expedited thus enabling the applicant to obtain a license of the county tax collector with little or no delay.

The chairman has outlined the procedure of application as follows: "First secure your application blank, either from the office of the Florida Real Estate Commission in Orlando, or from the office of the county judge where you reside, if they chance to have any old forms left on hand. New forms are being printed but until they are off the press, the forms issued under the old real estate brokers

registration board, are being used. "After filling out your blank mail it to the office of the Florida Real Estate Commission in Orlando, enclosing a certified check or money order for EXACTLY three dollars.


"Be sure to send exactly three dollars no more or no less otherwise the application will be returned to you with your check.

"These three dollars covers your registration fee. The commission will issue you a registration certificate, which you will show to your county tax collector. Your county tax collector will issue a broker's or salesman's license upon payment of ten dollars for state license and five dollars for county license, if a broker and if a salesman, five dollars for state and two dollars and fifty cents for a county license."

Mr. Rose warns everyone to take note of the fact that the tax collector cannot issue the occupational license until the applicant exhibits his registration certificate secured from the commission in Orlando. He also urges special note of the fact that the fee to be sent into the commission for the certificate of registration is exactly three dollars, which is the only fee that the commission collects.
