Suspect arrested for house fire deaths

EATONVILLE. Fla. - Investigators arrested an Orlando man Thursday for the murders of two sisters killed in a house fire started by a molotov cocktail he threw into their bedroom, a sheriff's spokesman said.

Raymond Burton, 29, was charged with two counts of first-degree murder for the deaths of Constance Marshall, 19, and Jackie Marshall. 11, said Joe Solomons of the Orange County Sheriff's Dept.

Burton was also charged with four counts of attempted murder involving the girls' mother, father and two brothers, who escaped the fire unharmed.

Burton was being held in Orange County Jail without bond.

Solomons said Burton turned himself into Orlando police early Thursday, saying he was a suspect in the fire. Police held him on four outstanding warrants and searched his home where investigators found evidence linking Burton to the fire.

Solomons said several bottles filled with flammable fluid were found outside the girls' bedroom. Burton allegedly started the fire by throwing one of the molotov cocktails through their bedroom window

Mother charged after child drowns

PENSACOLA - A woman charged with a miademeanor in California four years ago after her 2-year-old daughter drowned was charged with felony child neglect after a second child drowned this week, police said Thursday.

Linda Claire Key. 31. of Pomona, Calif., was arrested Wednesday and released on \$15,000 bond after being charged in connection with the drowning of her son. 2-year-old David Thomas Key.

Key and her two children were in Pensacola visiting her mother when the incident occurred Saturday. According to the warrant, the boy had been playing in the back yard and threw a ball over a privacy fence.

Key said that when she returned from retrieving the ball she could not find her son. The warrant said Key "made no effort to call for her son or search for him." but instead sat in a lounge chair for up to 15 minutes.

She then decided to go for a swim and found the boy face-down in the pool. The youngster was taken by helicopter to a local hospital and died Monday.

Parties battle over insurance counsel

TALLAHASSEE - A bitterly divided House battled along party lines Thursday over creating a public counsel to represent consumers in hearings on health and automobile insurance rate increases.

Republicans vowed to continue the fight on Friday, claiming the bill (CS-CS-HB 855) is a political attack on Republican Treasurer and Insurance Commissioner Tom Gallagher. Gallagher succeeded Democrat Bill Gunter, who was Insurance Commissioner for 12 years before resigning to make an unsuccessful run for the U.S. Senate.

"We didn't do this when there was a Democrat in there, so I guess we understand this." said -

Republicans united almost unanimously behind House Minority Leader Rep. Dale Patchett's, R-Vero Beach, amendment that would have wiped out the proposed counsel. That amendment failed 48-67, with all but three of the 47 Republicans voting in favor.

Supporters of the bill said the counsel is needed to restore the public's faith in the state's attempts to keep insurance rates down. The position would be similar to Jack Shreve, who represents consumers in utility rate increase cases before the Public Service Commission.

Haitian Center sues Immigration Service

MIAMI - Lawyers for the Haitian Refugee Center sued the Immigration and Naturalization Service Thursday, claiming the agency has been illegally transporting refugees to remote areas of the country.

The class-action lawsuit asks for a temporary restraining order and a preliminary injunction against the INS, said Ira Kurzban, who has represented the refugee center since 1977.

INS has been transferring Haitian refugees from the Krome Avenue Detention Center after a lockdown and room search uncovered a cache of homemade weapons INS regional director Perry Rivkind said were being horded for an alleged Mother's Day riot.

Rivkind had identified 24 refugees as alleged instigators and had them and other detainees tranferred to other facilities.

Court rules on state abortion case

Florida teens can have abortions without prior parental notification

TALLAHASSEE - The U.S. Supreme Court cleared the way Thursday for a 15-year-old girl to have an abortion without parental consent in an order that also leaves other Florida teenagers free to seek the same option.

The U.S. Supreme Court, meeting in its regular Thursday conference, lifted a temporary order issued by Justice Anthony Kennedy that had barred the girl from having the abortion.

Barring any further court ac-

tion, the Supreme Court's three-sentence order cleared the way for the girl, known only as T.W. in court documents, to have the abortion, and left Florida at least temporarily without any law to prevent teenagers from seeking abortions on their own.

The action drew a quick response from the state Attorney General's office, which filed a motion with the Florida Supreme Court seeking a speedy review of the state law in question, or an order to preserve the status quo of the law.

Attorney General Bob Butterworth asked the Florida Supreme Court to "expedite these proceedings or in the alternative enter a stay of the mandate" issued last week by the Florida 5th District Court of Appeal.

Last Friday, the appeals court ruled that Florida's abortion consent law was unconstitutional. The law requires minors to get parental permission or the approval of a judge before having an abortion.

It was not clear, however, whether the ruling left minors throughout Florida free to obtain abortions independently, or only applied to those living in the 5th

district, an area that covers 13 counties in east central Florida.

Because the 4th District Court of Appeals previously denied an abortion in a different case, the 5th DCA's ruling may apply only in the district, Butterworth said.

But in his motion, Butterworth said he believed the 5th DCA ruling applied statewide. because the 4th DCA ruling did not address the question of constitutionality.

'Absent an immediate decision by this court. it appears that (the law) is currently unenforceable and will be unenforceable pending this court's decision on the merits," Butterworth wrote.

Salt water fishing fee survives vote

TALLAHASSEE - Efforts to impose a salt water fishing fee came within one vote of defeat in a key Senate committee Thursday, but survived in a form targeting charter boat owners instead of individual fishermen.

The Finance and Tax Committee voted 7-6 to accept an amendment offered by Chairman Tim Deratany, R-Indialantic, designed to salve fears the new fee would hurt the elderly and poor who depend on fishing for sustenance.

But the panel delayed a final vote on the bill until next Tuesday, giving proponents and opponents time to scramble for support.

A final vote was also delayed

on a second bill to increase fees for various types of hunting and freshwater fishing after it also appeared in danger of failing.

Senate leaders are counting on both bills passing to help fund next year's state budget.

The swing vote on Deratany's salt water amendment was cast by Majority Leader Jack Gordon, D-Miami Beach, who sits as an ex-officio member of every Senate committee, said Sen. Vince Bruner, D-Fort Walton Beach, leader of the fight against the measure.

Gordon earlier in the debate argued in favor of Bruner's position. But Bruner said Senate President Bob Crawford sent Gordon to keep the fee alive.

"I thought I had Jack coming here to vote with me." Bruner

said later. "I had my votes lined up to kill it. If we had moved the bill really quick, it would be gone.

Gordon left the meeting soon after the vote and was not available for comment.

As originally proposed by Natural Resources Chairman Tom McPherson, D-Fort Lauderdale, the bill (CS-SB 9, 1 & 248) would impose a \$10 fee for a 10-day salt water license and a \$12 fee for a one year license for state residents. Non-residents would pay \$15 for a seven-day permit and \$30 for one year.

The bill would raise \$16.8 million to protect marine re-sources and fish stocks, conduct research, build artificial reefs. and boost marine law enforce-

Martinez, leaders discuss budget

TALLAHASSEE - Gov. Bob Martinez met with legislative leaders for about two hours Thursday in an effort to resolve disagreements over proposed new fees and spending in rival House and Senate versions of the state budget.

Martinez, House Speaker Tom **Gustafson and Senate President** Bob Crawford made no firm decisions, but the discussions in Martinez' office lacked the squabbling that attended similar discussions with past legislative leaders

A House and Scnate conference committee has a little more than two weeks to reach a budget compromise acceptable to the governor.

"I think there's plenty of time. and if there's good will and everybody sits down around the table we can get it done." Martinez told reporters following the meeting.

The major disagreements involve numerous new fees and tax increases being developed by lawmakers. Martinez said he is still opposed to any major new taxes, but said he supports a

proposed salt water fishing tee and might support increased fees for hunters and freshwater fishing

Gustafson spent much of the meeting pressing his proposal to spend at least as much on drop out prevention and other programs intended to keep kids from winding up in prison, as the \$200 million it will cost to build the nearly 9,000 new prison beds in the House and Senate budgets.

"If we don't take care of our kids, they will become our enemy," Gustafson said.





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EDITORIALS A sobering scenario

Suppose, for the sake of argument, the Chancellor Heimut Kohl succeeds in eliminating the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's 4,600 initilefield nuclear warheads from Western Europe. Mikhail Gorbachev has long espoused a denuclearized Europe, so "let's assume he agrees to remove the Warsaw Pact's short-range nuclear systems from Eastern Europe as well.

Under such circumstances, the military balance on the Continent would turn chiefly on the relative strengths of the conventional armies of the opposing alliances. This means that Moscow's 2-to-1 advantage in main battle tanks and other armored forces would be the decisive factor in the event of a conflict.

War in Europe seems an extraordinarily remote possibility today. And indeed it is, due to the stable strategic balance that now exists. The chance of hostilities appears even more distant at a moment when Western reporters and photographers have just been invited to witness 31 Soviet tanks being loaded onto rail cars in Hungary for shipments castward.

To carry our scenario to a logical end, however, imagine that Mr. Gorbachev's reform efforts ultimately sour and he is "replaced by somebody who will be far more hostile than he's been in terms of his attitude toward the West." as Defense Secretary Dick Chency predicts. What happens if the risk of war suddenly oscalates and the Atlantic alliance has removed all of its short-range, gound-based nuclear weapons from West Germany but the USSR has retained its vasily superior conventional forces?

NATO's last supreme commander. Gen. Bernard Rogers, has estimated that: without nuclear defenses to hold them back, the Warsaw Pact's tank divisions, equipped with thousands of portable bridges, would overrun Western Europe in a matter of days. To deter such a blitzkrieg. NATO has relied for decades on a range of nuclear systems, from artillery shells and short-range missiles to intercontinental ballistic launchers in silos on American soil.

This combination of forces supports the NATO doctrine of flexible response, which provides for the use of nuclear arms at the lowest possible level (such as artillery shells) to repulse a Warsaw Pact assault, with graduated escalation to higher levels only if necessary to stave off defeat. Chancellor Kohl is proposing to abolish the bottom rung of the flexible response ladder.

If he succeeds, the United States would face a harrowing choice if fighting erupted in Europe. As Soviet conventional forces voverwhelmed NATO's smaller armies, the president would have to decide whether to use long-range nuclear systems, such as bombers or ICMBs, to save Bonn, Frankfurt and Munich. The inescapable risk in such a move would be that the Kremlin would respond with the use of strategic warheads, perhaps to take out Washington and New York. Thus, the battle in Central Europe could quickly escalate into global nuclear war.

Iran-contra trials have only just begun

WASHINGTON - The conviction of Oliver-North on three of twelve counts relating to his involvement in the fran-contra affair is only the litst act of what will be a long-drawn-out process.

Judge Gerhard Gessell will now hold a hearing on a long standing detense motion to throw out the entire prosecution on the grounds that it violates the immunity given North during the congressional fran-contra hearings

Gessell refused to hear the motion before the trial, saying it would be moot if the jury acquitted North. If Gessell refuses to throw out the verdict - and that is not certain - then the appeals will begin. It is a process that could take years

North has many potential avenues of appeal. including Gessell's refusal to force former President Reagan to testify. North may also contend that the jury was tainted because several members lied during the selection process. This possibility has been bolstered by the admission that one jury member was a heavy crack user, although she claims not to have used drugs during the trial.

Now that the North trial is over, special prosecutor Lawrence Walsh must get busy again. Next on the agenda are the trials of North's boss, former National Security Director John Poindexter, and North's civilian

"partners," former Gen. Richard Secord and arms dealer Albert Hakim. The Poindexter trial is set for September

So far Poludexter has refused to cooperate with the prosecution. and it is not clear what defense he is going to offer. But it could put Walsh on the spot.

North's defense was that he simply followed orders from late CIA director William Casey, and from Poindexter, and that he assumed they had received their orders from Ronald Reagan. The jury clearly believed him. acquitting him of every count where he said he was following orders.

In post-trial in terviews the jurors

said they found him guilty on two counts creating a talse chronology and destroying

So far the trail only leads to Casey and Poindexter, But what happens if Poindexter, like North, uses the defense, "I was ordered to do it"? The only one who could have ordered him was Ronald Reagan. If this is Poindexter's defense, Walsh may have to decide whether or not to go after Recipion or others in his administration.

But Walsh has a more immediate choice to make. Sources close to his office say he is considering trying to compel North to testify before a grand jury against Poindexter, Secord. Hakim and others. North has never been brought in front of a grand jury, but he could now be pressured as part of a deal in exchange for tentent sentencing. He faces a maximum of 10 years in jail and a \$750,000 fine.

Documents entered into evidence during the trial make it clear that neither the Tower Commission nor the congressional fran-contra committee were told the full story of who ordered weapons sales and fund diversions to the contras.

Untalan had been VOA engineer of the year and an all-around whiz kid. But he fell out of favor because of his complaints that the agency wasted money and time.

LONDON - There is more of a connection between Oliver North and Manuel Noriega than the alphabetical proximity of their names or their military backgrounds. Yes, a world of difference, too, between the boyish Marine lieutenant-colonel and the thuggish Panamanian general, but a linked lesson in the danger of deviousness that needs to be pondered. My colleagues on the editorial page of The Wall Street Journal don't get it. The other day, they drew a sharp contrast between their version of the good guys in Washington, who want to confront Noriega over his theft of the Panamanian election, and the "aimless" drifters who, in the wake of North's trial, still want to probe further the backdoor financing of the contras. In the Journal's editorial view, "General Noriega, alter watching Congress vote year after year to kill the contras' opposition to an even cruder dictatorship in Nicaragua, thumbed his nose at the U.S...." Weakness and division at home, the Journal suggests, invite defiance abroad. "If the government cannot act, then it is leaving U.S. Interest in a condition of risk. immediately in Panama but elsewhere eventually." Like the Journal, I saw little point in putting North on trial and little advantage in reopening the Iran-contra inquiry. As a broad proposi-tion, unity is obviously better than division and action preferable to paralysis. No one would dispute that. What the Journal misses, however, is the more important point that an administration which tolerates lying, evasion and defiance of law by its own staff members is terribly weakened when confronting a dictator who chooses to ignore election results or laws that inconvenience him. Lawlessness at home invites defiance abroad just as much as weakness of purpose does. The analogy from Nicaragua is not the one the Journal suggests. The lesson is that when the executive branch of the U.S. government evades the laws passed by Congress, when it brushes aside the verdict of the World Court on its illegal mining of Nicaraguan harbors, then it cannot be surprised when the head of a client government decides to ignore the election returns. Nations, like people, learn by example. The oldest law in politics is "what goes around, comes around." Oliver North and Manuel Noriega are simply the latest proof. Time was, when North was the rage of the Reagan White House, the can-do National Security Council aide who would work endless hours and take awesome risks to keep the President's cherished "freedom fighters," the contras. going, after Congress had voted to cut off their allowance.

In a dangerous world. American Presidents will inevitably have to do business with unsavory characters when the national interest requires. But Presidents need to understand there is always a cost to be reckoned when they're tempted to cut corners. However, investors then began to push prices higher once they saw that the bulk of the index's gain came from the volatile energy and food sectors. Minus those costs, the CPI rose only 0.2 percent.

Lester Mandell has courted the county and Longwood officials for several years to buy the plant, but has not been successful, largely due to the \$21 million price, city and county officials said.

County officials would not comment on the permit, but note the pollution levels allowed under the permit are higher than will be allowed for the Yankee Lake plant which discharges into a wetland adjacent to the St. Johns River. The Sanlando plant discharges into a canal leading to Sweetwater Creek which flows into the Wekiva River, under several levels of protection by the state.

De Aguilar said although the emission levels are higher for the Saniando plant than the Yankee Lake plant, by the time the effluent passes through Sweetwater Creek into the Wektva, it will "approach" the water quality of the river.

Art Davis, Yankee Lake critic and former county commission candidate, said the plant should be connected into the county's Yankee Lake plant.

"Although I've fought the Yankee Lake plant, I'd much rather see it treat that extra sewage than have it go into the Wekiva."

Oil spill dominates Exxon meeting

PARSIPPANY, N.J. - The head of Exxon Corp., brushing aside criticism that the firm is a corporate criminal, rejected calls for his resignation over the Alaska oil spill.

Chairman Lawrence Rawl, facing shareholders Thursday at the company's annual meeting, also said that Exxon has ordered random drug and alcohol tests for employees in sensitive jobs, "including me."

He pledged the company would complete its cleanup of Alaska's Prince William Sound by September or earlier.

'The answer is no. I won't (resign)." Rawl told about 1,700 shareholders who submitted to tight security to enter a packed room for a nearly 4 15-hour annual meeting dominated by debate over the nation's worst oil spill. "It's anti-productive to even consider that."

Protesters chanting "Make Exxon pay" greeted shareholders outside the hotel. 30 miles west of Exxon's Manhattan headquarters, where the meeting was held. Some stood on stilts so stockholders could read signs with slogans such as 'Exxon is organized crime" and "Exxon is human error."

Police killer dies in electric chair

JACKSON, Ga. - A man convicted of murdering a small-town police chief on the victim's second-to-last night on the job 13 years ago was put to death in Georgia's electric chair.

Henry Willis III was pronounced dead at 11:20 p.m. Thursday, about four hours after the time origionally scheduled for the electrocution. His execution was delayed by the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals pending an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, which denied a stay.

Willis was escorted into the death chamber by six guards shortly after 11 p.m. as a large electrical generator roared outside. He sat straight and stiff in the wooden chair, showing little emotion.

Farmer said Willis, convicted of killing Ray City Plice Chief James Giddens in 1976, received the death penalty because he was black.

"He understands what brought him to this situation the day he was born ... to the day the prosecutor used racism to convlet him." the lawyer said. "He asked me to be strong and to continue to fight for others and 1 am.

'He has expressed remome from the day I've known him." Farmer said. "If he could bring that night back, he would. He would forfeit his own life rather than take that individual's life."

Jury refuses to indict mercy killer

CHICAGO - Saying he had "suffered enough," a judge ordered psychological counseling for a father who unplugged his comstose son's life-support system and kept hospital workers at bay with a gun until the little boy died in his arms.

The sentence came after a grand jury refused Thursday to issue a murder indictment against Rudy Linares, who was charged with first degree murder in the death last month of his 15-month-old son.

Linares, 23, of Cicero, was indicted for and pleaded guilty to unlawful use of a weapon in the April 26 incident. Accompanied to court by his wife. Tamara, he waived his right to speak and was sentenced to one year conditional discharge and ordered to undergo psychological counseling.

"As far as punishment is concerned, I think you have suffered enough," Judge Robert P. Bastone told the defendant.

Samuel Linares had been comatose since Aug. 2, 1988, when he sufficiated on a piece of a balloon that burst while he was blowing it up during a birthday celebration.

Visiting his son April 26, the sobbing Linares held hospital staff and police at bay with a .357-magnum until his boy died. then surrendered without a struggle.

Wright wants quick hearing

WASHINGTON - Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, struggling to minimize political damage from ethics charges against him, urged the House ethics committee to hear his case quickly and bring it to an end.

The committee announced it will hear arguments Tuesday from Wright's attorneys on motions to diamiss key elements of the charges against him.

Wright, expressing confidence he will prevail in that effort. said Thursday he has hopes the committee then will proceed to a hearing on the remaining charges "to resolve this matter quickly and let the Congress get on with the important business of the nation." Wright's appeal came amid indications even some of his fellow Democrats feel the Texan - who became speaker in 1987 — cannot survive politically. The matter was discussed by several members Wednesday in a private meeting described by some participants as "grim."

Senate approves budget plan

WASHINGTON - The Senate gave final congressional approval to a \$1.165 trillion fiscal 1990 budget plan that cuts defense spending and increases domestic programs under an agreement with President Bush.

The 63-37 vote Thursday followed by a day House passage of the budget plan 241-185.

Chairman James Sasser, D-Tenn., of the Senate Budget Committee, who helped negotiate the heavily criticized plan, said. "It does not represent the kind of bold deficit reduction that many of our colleagues, including myself, would have preferred."

"It is merely a prelude to the difficult decisions that lie ahead for us all," he said.

"It's quite obvious no one has a better plan," said Sen. Pete Domenici of New Mexico, ranking Republican on the budget panel, in support of the package. "I honestly believe that without this, we

would have no budget."

Sen. Paul Simon. D-Ill., called the budget "a massive piece of compromise" but said he would support it even though its economic assumptions about interest rates are unrealistically low.

Thursday's action marked the speediest passage of a budget plan this decade. Earlier budgets were delayed by repeated clashes on spending priorities between President Ronald Reagan and Congress

The plan for the fiscal year starting Oct. I does not require Bush's signature because it is a resolution of non-binding spending and revenue outlines for congressional appropriators and tax writers.

The plan cuts the deficit by \$28 billion to \$99.7 billion for fiscal 1990, just below the \$100 billion deficit limit required by the Gramm-Rudman balanced-budget law.

Critics say the blueprint uses too many accounting gimmicks to achieve the cut in the deficit, making the challenge of meeting fiscal 1991 deficit reduction

goals more difficult. "This is a budget that is bad for America," said Sen. William Armstrong. R-Colo., an opponent. "I think we should have tried to do better."

But lawmakers who drafted the pact with the White House said it was the best deal they could get, given Bush's anti-tax stand and the reluctance of congressional Democrats to slash domestic programs. And they said it would set a proper cooperative framework for more difficult talks on a fiscal 1991 plan.

The budget outline requires raising revenues of \$14.2 billion next year, of which \$5.3 billion must be taxes. The remaining revenues are to come from federal asset sales - most of which Congress has rejected in the past higher user fees for federal services and increased IRS enforcement.

A cornerstone of the budget plan - the requirement for \$5.3 billion in tax revenues - also may be the hardest for Congress and the president to resolve.

Disagreement over vets funding bill

WASHINGTON - The Senate disagreed with the House over the level of emergency spending to help alleviate a veterans health care funding crisis, passing a bill containing far less money than the House version.

The Senate Thursday gave the Department of Veterans Affairs funding only until June 15 - a figure department officials estimated at around \$75 million. Earlier in the day, the House,

bogged down in its own

legislative gridlock over the supplemental spending bill, passed a \$1.2 billion appropriation to provide the veterans agency enough funds to last through the end of the current fiscal year, Sept. 30. The House then adjourned until Monday.

The VA has said it might have to lay off personnel and cut back services unless additional funds were made available quickly.

But Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Robert Byrd. D-W.Va., rejected the another shot at increasing the

House action, fearing that if the VA got all its money now. congressional Democrats would lose any leverage they may have had with President Bush to fund programs they want added to a larger supplemental spending bill still pending in the House.

So Byrd opted to give the VA only enough funds to operate through June 15, assuring that another emergency spending bill for the agency will be needed by June and giving Congress

mize and mcope supplemental spending bill beyond what Bush has sought.

"The amendment gives the VA the funding needed during that period in order to meet the needs of veterans," Byrd said. "It will also give us time to consider all of the other items of a dire emergency nature sought by the president and the Congress.

The \$1.2 billion House bill. passed on a voice vote, included \$340 million for veterans health care actvices.

Study shows seas rising as globe warms

WASHINGTON - Scientists provided evidence that the world's oceans are rising about one-tenth of an inch annually and said it may be an early sign of global warming caused by man-made pollutants.

University of Toronto researchers said their study of measurements from 470 sites around the world show "a nearly globally uniform" sea level rise during this century that "might be characteristic of one caused by climatic warming."

Though the study did not examine sca levels after 1970, one of the researchers, Mark Tushingham, said Thursday he expects oceans still are rising at a similar rate. "There is no reason why it should be otherwise," he said.

In the past, some observers have used tide gauge records to conclude the global sca level has risen 4 to 8 Inches since 1900. But that position has been attacked by many scientists because there are few gauges in southern occans and the degree of change varies widely among areas of the world.

It is known carbon dioxide and other gases generated by cars, forest burning and other human activities trap solar heat like a greenhouse, and scientists generally expect higher pollution levels to increase the "greenhouse effect" making Earth warmer. There is debate on whether the effect has begun, however.


Reporting in the journal Science, the Canadian researchers presented calculations they said may prompt scientists to soften their "well-founded reluctance" to interpret rising sea levels as a sign of global warming.

California vote bans assault guns

SACRAMENTO, Calif. California lawmakers voted to ban the sale of ansault guns. saying they are sending a message to Congress and the president that public safety is more important than the right to own military-type weapons.

But Richard E. Gardiner, in charge of lobbying state tislatures for the National Rifle Association, said it sends a message that "the state of California is not interested in doing anything about crime." "It's a clear message that the government of California no detests its own citizens that it wants to make criminals out of them," Gardiner said.

Most areas lose in military spending

WASHINGTON - Nearly three out of four Americans live in communities that pay more in taxes to support the Pentagon than they get back in defense spending, a study said. The study released Thursday, "Bankrupting America."

found that 321 of the nation's 435 congressional districts are net loss areas in the trade-off between defense spending and military taxes. In 1980, 302 congressional districts were net losers while

133 were net gain winners.

Of all congressional districts, the 10th in Virginia - where the Pentagon sits - had the largest net gain, more than \$3 billion in fiscal 1987. The heaviest net loss district was the 7th in Houston, which had a net loss of \$1.2 billion.

The study by the Employment Research Associates in Lansing. Mich., is one in a series the group has produced to examine the impact of defense spending on the economy.

James Anderson, the study's author, said the imbalance between spending and taxes has worsened for many areas in the 1980s and he pointed to Texas as "the most dramatic, single change," with the state moving from being a net gain state - receiving more money in defense spending than it paid as its share of the Peniagon budget - to a net loss state.

Critics denounce nuclear plant decision

WASHINGTON - Critics of New Hampshire's Scabrook nuclear plant criticized a decision by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission effectively approving a low-power testing license for the facility.

The NRC's decision Thursday ended regulatory delays that have kept the completed plant idle for three years.

The vote to allow low-power operations prompted vehement criticism from a host of Massachusetts officials, who said nearby towns could not be safely evacuated in the case of a radiation accident.

'Rushing ahead with a low-power license before all the critical issues concerning emergency prepardedness have been resolved only further crodes public confidence in the commission's ability to protect the lives and welfare of residents living near the plant," said Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass.

Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis said he would continue pressing his evacuation concerns through the courts.

Both houses of the Legislature approved the bill Thursday, and a spokesman for Republican Gov. George Deukmejian said he will sign it.

The NRA said it would probably contest the measures' consti-tutionality in court, and added that the group's membership will likely soar because of the gun bill, the first major ban on firearms in California since machine guns were outlawed in 1934.

"This is going to galvanize gun owners around the country like never before," said Gardiner.

"We won here and we'll win incourt," said a jubilant Roberti. 'We're not going to allow our kids to be target practice anymore for the nuts who have these guns." Roberti said California's action

sends a message to Congress. the president and other state legislatures that "the NRA can he heat" and that public safety overrides some personal rights.

The Legislature's action came almost four months after drifter Patrick Purdy used an AK-47 assault rifle - one of the scon-to-be-banned guns - to kill five children and wound 30 other people at Cleveland Elementary School Jan. 17.

Attorney General John Van de Kamp said "the bill would not passed were it not for that have' terrible incident and the loss of those five innocent children."



BUFFALO, N.Y. - WIItresses told a state Senate hearing Thursday of the need tor testing high school athletes for anabolic steroids and educating students about the dangers of using the drug.

Without question, there appears to be a problem in the high school athlete that seems to be increasing, and that includes a significant number of non-competitive high school bodybuilders." Dr. E. James Swenson dr., assistant prolessor of sports medicine at the University of Rochester, told the Senate Committee on Tourism, Recreation and Sports Development. "Therefore in the high



In 1929, President Calvin Coolidge visited the tree and made a speech. A bronze plaque describing The Senator was placed on the tree. The plaque was stolen in 1945.

The Senator's age was de-termined in 1946 by the American Forestry Association when examiners drilled a amall hole through the center of the tree to





Methodists campaign for children

Women in the 9 millionmember United Methodist Church are turning a percontal concern - children - Into a new

cause The Women's Division of the denomination's Board of Global Ministries has launched a new five-year program in cooperation with the Children's Defense Fund atmed at "making a difference in the lives of our nation's children."

'Concern for children and youth has always been a part of the agenda of United Methodist Women," said Sally Ernst, pres-ident of the division.

"However, this concern has reached new heights in the closing years of the 1980s." she added. "It is a fact that more children than ever before are at

risk. More children are victims of abuse. More children need good day care.

According to Marian Wright Edelman, president of the Children's Defense Fund - the nation's premier advocacy group on behalf of children - poverty among children is growing in all ethnic sectors of society.

The poverty rate of white children, according to Edelman. has increased by a third since the beginning of the 1980s. Nearly half of the nation's black children live in poverty and one in three Hispanic children are ряюг.

"If we do not mobilize to prevent and reduce child poverty, by the year 2000 one in four of all American children -16 million - will be poor," she said. "This is 3 million more than in 1987." than in 1987.

But it is not only poverty that concerns the two groups. According to Ernst, unwanted

pregnancies, prostitution, abuse, drugs, homelessness and inadequate education are all problems faced by children - and many of those cut across color lines and income levels.

'Child abuse is a national problem that must be widely addressed," Ernst said. "Ideally, It is far better to prevent abuse than to deal with it after it occurs."

Under the new five-year program, local units of United Methodist Women are being urged to study the problems of children in their own communities and take action in one particular area.

They are also being urged to work with other churches and community groups on the projects, which might involve education, political action, lobbying or other means of promoting change.

At a recent session of the women's division's Section on Christian Social Relations, teenage editors from "Children's Express." a news service for young people, told the Methodist women what is on their minds and agenda.

Lela Corman, 16, told the women that the average age of a pregnant teenager is 13 and she said improved sex education is needed for young people. "The earlier you teach kids about being responsible, the less teenage pregnancy you have," she said.

Chad Peterman, 15, asked for the same kind of support and education concerning AIDS.

Station operator defeats Exxon over gas discount

PENSACOLA - A born-again Christian gas station operator who won a fight with Exxon over a controversial sign offering discounts to those "whom Jesus loves" said Tuesday he is now fighting city half.

Jerry Harrison, owner of Cordova Mall Exxon, was arrested Monday and charged with maintaining an illegal portable sign and violating the electric code by using an extension cord to provide power to light the nign.

Harrison said Tuesday he plans to contest the misdemeanor charges when he appears in court May 30. He can be fined up to \$500 a day and sentenced to 60 days in jail. officials said.

If a man can't stand up and

not very much of a man, is he?" said Harrison, who sees his latest battle as "just a trick of the devil to get me to take the sign down."

The brouhaha began in November 1987 when Harrison, who had a portable sign at his corner gas station, began offering dis-counts to "Christians only." Harrison said he did it because Jesus had turned around his life.

The Anti-Defamation League of B'nat B'rith complained and Houston-based Exxon threatened legal action. Harrison changed the wording and began offering discounts "to those whom Jesus loves."

His lawyer argued it was not discriminatory because Jesus 'loves everybody.'

Exxon said the change was not enough and the anti-defamation league complained to the state fight for what he believes in, he's attorney general's office. In portable.

January 1988 the state said the sign did not violate a statute prohibiling discriminatory ads. Harrison said Exxon "backed off an left me alone."

Les Rogers, a spokesman for Exxon in Houston, said Tuesday that the company dropped the matter after the state of Florida found no violation. But he said Exxon continued urging Harrison to remove the sign.

Six months ago the area where Harrison's station is located was annexed into the city, which sent out notices to 70 businesses teiling them their portable signs violated a 1986 ordinance.

'I'm just taking a stand to see If I can get them to change their minds, to waiver the law," ' said Harrison, adding, "I didn't ask to get annexed into the city."

Book: Vatican lied about pope's death

LONDON - Pope John Paul I did not die suddenly and unexpectedly from a heart attack as the Vatican announced, but had a lonely and agonized death that could have been prevented,

The Sunday Times said, quoting a new book. John Paul I, known as "the smiling pope," died the night of Sept. 28, 1978, after a reign of 33 days at age 65. 'A Thief in the Night," by John Cornwell,

discounts earlier theories that the pope was murdered but suggests a lack of compassion within the Vatican.

The Times printed excerpts from the book. which is to be released May 25.

Cornwell wrote that the pope was formented by the conviction that he was unfit for the papal throne - a feeling shared by many in the Vatican and was allowed we to the prayed for, untended and uncared for by those closest to him. The truth is much more shameful even than if the pope had been murdered. That would have been the work of several criminals or madmen. where in fact the whole of the Vatican is responsible for the death of John Paul L." Cornwell

Cornwell based his conclusion on his findings that the pope was convinced the conclave of cardinals that elected him had made a miniake. and that he was seriously ill before he died.

The official Vatican explanation that the pope's death was from a sudden and unexpected heart attack and he had been in perfect health was a lie. Conwell and.

Vatican sources told Cornwell that from the day of his election, John Paul I had worried he was "usurping" the papal throne and, near the end, he was praying "a thousand times a day" for his own death

Cornwell said the pope had been taking a medication for a serious blood-clotting condition.

There is evidence that, not through lorgetfulness, he deliberately stopped taking this medication because he could no longer continue as pope," he said.



Favalora, the former bishop of the Diocese of Alexandria, La., succeeda Bishop W. Thomas Larkin, 66, as the third bishop of the diocese. Larkin retired after 10 years as bishop because of health reasons.

The colorful ceremony was attended by 33 bishoph, 200 priests and representatives of each of the parishes in the diocese. An estimated 1,700 people attended the two-hour mass and installation, which was by invitation only.

"I will look forward to a wholesome dialogue with you and to our common labors," he said. "I consider my first priority to minister among you."

We must take the time to remember and learn

Back then it was 10 cents a copy. But 1 was willing to pay \$3.50 for this 1943 issue of Life magazine when I saw it on sale recently in a collectibles store.

The past has always held a fascination for me. It can remind us where we have gone wrong inour lives. With our love of what we call progress, we have often been too quick to abandon what was good in our past. Only much later do we realize our mistake.

Witness the return of the trolley. Dallas, L.A., St. Louis. Chicago and Baltimore are only some of the ettes that have new street-car systems planned or under construction.

It isn't only that we can learn from the past. Recalling old times can be like finding a long-lost diary. It evokes memories, both pleasurable and sad. It is so with recalling the war years.

In this 1943 Life is a five-page picture spread of First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt visiting U.S. troops in the South Pacific. Surely, here was one of the greatwomen of the world.

"She spoke to every woundedman she saw, smiled at each. signed her name on countless bandages and scraps of paper-She promised to telephone wives and mothers on her return, and began fulfilling these promises the day she set foot again on American soil."

On the island of Guadaleanal there is a cemetery. she wrote after her visit there, and as you



look on the crosses row on row. you think of the women's hearts. huried here as well.

"Should a girl date while her serviceman-sweetheart is away at the war?" asks Life. It must have been a serious question for many then. This is the answer from late: "It is all right to go out with another man if your sweetheart doesn't object, or if he's a Tricad of the family. But at all times be loyal to your man at camp.

I showed this to a young woman who grew up after the sexual revolution and the liberation of women. "How sweet," she said, that I could tell that what she meant was. "How dumb."

What particularly attracted my attention to this 46-year-old inagazine was an editorial on time, One of Life's editors had recently found himself in Arabia waiting for the automobile convoy that was to take him 800 miles across the desert to visit King Ibn Saud

When days went by and still no convoy arrayed. the editor

sought out an Arabian official to inquire. The official said not to worry,

"The King has said the convoy will appear. It will appear. 'When?' you ask. I will try my best to answer that. Perhaps it will come tomorrow. Or then again, perhaps next week. That ts, of course, God willing."

Americans in general, the editorial reflected, seem to feel time is their most important possession. In Arabia, far from securing precious, time is not regarded as valuable at all. The editorial says. "An Arab almost never hurries."

The editorial hoped that if countries like ours could teach the leisurely nations the 'advantages associated with a sharp sense of time." we inight learn in return the "spiritual advantages associated with a dreamy sense of time.

It hasn't happened. Other countries may have been converted to our sense of fast time. We have not slowed down our mad rush to earthly rewards.

Maybe the worst part of our race with the clock is that we don't have time for the things that really matter.



stress and how do you get it? treatments offered by pain Can it cause heart attacks and other ailments?

DEAR READER: Stress is a state of mind. It isn't something able to provide the name of one, you get. like chicken pox. In general, people feel stressed

If they perceive that they are in danger or under extreme pressure - and are relatively powcriess to do anything about it.

Typically, stress produces behavioral changes, such as pression and insomnia. It also causes physical changes: Inereased heart rate, hypertension, peptic ulcers and bowel disturbances.

Stress catt provide an excuse for people to use mind-altering drugs, notably alcohol.

Not all individuals are affected equally by stress; what is stressful for one person may be business-as-usual for another. Although we all have our stress threshold, this threshold varies from person to person.

Since stress is a PERCEPTION not a disease - researchers have been unable to find a consistent relation between stress and disease. Undoubledly, emotional tension, by influence ing many of the body's internal chemicals, can predispose some susceptible people to ill health. For example, the untreated,

stressed hypertensive patient is probably more likely to develop heart disease or stroke.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband is an amputee because of a motorcycle accident. He's in constant pain in spite of repeat surgery without any satisfaction. What about the pain clinics you mention in your column would they help? DEAR READER: Pain clinics



Sabers rattle in Afghanistan

MANAMA, Bahrain - A senior Kremlin diplomatte trouble-shooter was in Tehran Friday to discuss the latest developments in neighboring Afghanistan, as Pakistan and the Soviet-backed government in Kabul traded warnings of war. officials and diplomats said.

Yuli Vorontsov, a deputy foreign minister who Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev last year appointed ambassador to Kabul, told reporters in Kabul before departing Thursday for Tehran that the situation in Alghanistan has changed because of U.S., Pakistani and Saudi Arabian Interference.

Vorontsoy's Teliran visit comes amid a statemate in fighting between government forces and U.S.-armed Alghan rebels.

Vorontsoy's talks in Iran were expected to

include sessions with Tehran-based Shifte Moslem Alghan rebel leaders, still bitter at being left out of a predominantly Sunni Moslem Alghan interim government.

Political observers said Vorontsov may try to exploit the bitterness of the Iran-based rebels and promote a dialogue with the government in Kabul leading to eventual power-sharing in the form of of a national unity government.

Pakistan-based Sunni rebels repeatedly have rejected such a proposal and said they will accept nothing less than the total capitulation of Afghan President Najibullah.

Vorontsoy did not elaborate on his charges that the United States, Pakistan and Saudi Arabia were continuing to aid the Afghan rebels. But Afghanistan and Pakistan traded what experts described as "warnings of war!"

Police using water cannons and batons dispersed the unruly crowd Thursday, which protested Soviet troop presence in Poland, said witnesses and PAP, the official news agency.

At least 27 people, 20 of them police officers, were injured in unrest that spread to other parts of the city, officials said.

Cars were destroyed and benches overturned as the students put up low barricades and threw stones and bottles at police in repeated skirmishes throughout the city that also
