### Nixon Proposes Increase Atomic Fuel Cost Hike Opposed

By JOHN B. LENNIE, Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — A Nixon administration proposal to hike the price of atomic fuel has drawn stiff congressional opposition on grounds it could raise electric bills for everyone who owns a light bulb and lead to a private monopoly of the atomic energy.

The complex issue concerns the administration's proposed 10 per cent increase for uranium enrichment services, presently performed exclusively by the Atomic Energy Commission.

"You'll see the price go up on every kilowatt of power in the United States," Chairman Carl Albert, D-Calif., said today at a hearing of the Senate House Select Atomic Energy Committee.

"Not only is the inflationary impact on the consumer in itself horrid, it sets a horrible example for every other industry," said Sen. Albert, D-Tenn.

The AEC argued the cost hike would justify establishment of a model plant to provide private industry with the know-how to enrich uranium.

The Atomic Energy Commission, which already has approved the hike, added the price boost will be justified on grounds of increased costs.

Hoffstad and others charged the model plant concept eventually would lead to the private takeover of the three government-owned plants now performing the task.

The three plants are located at Paducah, Ky., Portsmouth, Ohio, and Oak Ridge, Tenn. One of these presumably would be used to instruct industry technicians.

### SR426 Improvement Promised This Fall

By FRED VAN PELT OVIEDO — Neglected road-wise for many years, little Oviedo is about to move over to the winning side of the ledger.

Two highways leading into this southeast Seminole County community have been widened and improved by the state — 320 and 426, both from the south — within recent years.

Next on the work agenda is 426 to the north, to Geneva. C. A. (Bill) Benedict, DeLand resident engineer of the State Dept. of Transportation, announced yesterday noon that his office will ask for bids in September or October for the widening and paving of SR 426 between Oviedo and Geneva.

This highway recently was improved between Oviedo and Goldenrod, SR 320, on which Florida Technological University fronts three miles south of Oviedo, also has been improved.

Only road through Oviedo now needing improvement is SR 419, from Five Points to Chuluota and beyond.

Benedict made his announcement at a meeting of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce long range planning committee, of which Vernon Mize is chairman. Also attending were county commissioners and Oviedo city councilmen.

Major discussion was held on improving SR 419 between Five Points and Oviedo. Benedict said that improving of the present right-of-way is included in the 1972-73 budget and acquisition of right-of-way for widening and alignment is included in the 1973-74 budget.

Consensus was that improvement of the present right-of-way would delay widening and alignment for another 10 years.

County Commissioner Greg Drummond recommended that "we should make up our minds now what projects we want and go after them," rather than merely discuss what is needed and should be done.

County Commissioner Robert Parker recommended that the county improve Red Bug Road, for FTU students' use, until such time as the state can take it over as an arterial highway.

It also was brought out that \$300,000 will be required to improve the interchange at SR 436 and I-4, primarily for the purchase of right-of-way.

### Pretty Ex-Mayor Winning Battle Fly-Slapper Slaps 'City Hall'

By MARION BETHUA Thomas Jefferson once said that "as long as the press is free and men can read, all is safe."

This was recently illustrated yesterday, according to Mrs. Irene Van Epoual, controversial ex-mayor of North Orlando, who has been "fighting city hall" in a battle to eliminate breeding of stable flies at Seminole Turf Club.

Mrs. Van Epoual told The Sanford Herald that Ron Harrell, who produces graphic arts at WDBO television, had become interested in the problem as a direct result of news stories upon the problem which were carried by The

Herald. Harrell mentioned the article in Dick Weaver and Ben Averig, at the TV station. As a result, a taped interview with Mrs. Van Epoual and County Commissioner Chairman John Alexander was presented by the station on the news resume last night.

Mrs. Van Epoual said that the television station had considered the "citizens' campaign against the health detriments at the Turf Club vicious." She continued that the landfill adjacent to the track, which was the object of raw garbage being dumped by the food services establishment and employer, has "been forced by the county to permanently close."

The problem, far from resolved, still is presumably under daily surveillance by the County Health Department, against whom most of Mrs. Epoual's criticism of the director, Dr. Frank Loebe, was directed.

After much derogatory commentary of the press at a meeting yesterday of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce and the Sanford Industrial Commission in which a suggestion that the press be excluded from meetings and another comment that "we worked the press over pretty good," it would seem that the power of the citizens, aroused by a free press, "lights the one little candle, instead of cursing the darkness."

### Youth's Death Probed

A 16-year-old Sanford youth was found dead this morning at his home in Southport Fla. at just west of the city by a friend who had stopped by to take him to summer school.

The dead youth was identified by Sheriff Lt. Roy Rice, as Stanley Bryson Sales, who attended Seminole High School. Sales was found around 7:15 a.m. this morning in a bath room at his home with a gaping wound in his head. Found in the bathroom sink was a .32 caliber pistol.

Sheriff's investigators were still on the scene located just off SR 464 several hours after the discovery of "Sales' body."

Coroner Robert E. Carroll pronounced the youth dead and the body was taken to the Seminole Memorial Hospital morgue, according to Sheriff's Captain J. Q. Galloway, an autopsy will be performed.

# Youth: Remember Now Thy Creator

Many in our generation who have embraced the Christian religion have begun to wonder whether their Christian beliefs are really very important. There has been a tendency to say that living the Christian life is obviously important but when it comes to believing we are not so sure. So many seem to be saying that what a man does is crucial and not necessarily what a man believes. We have emphasized the sermon on the Mount as against what we call "theology" — failing to realize that this sermon is a statement of beliefs and their validity in turn depends upon what we believe about the Person who is doing the talking.

This distinction we try to make between life and belief is to be questioned. Belief is essential to life. The old Anglo-Saxon word "believe" literally means "what may be true by." Belief is that conviction that conditions decisions, motivates action, makes me what I am and impels me to do what I end up doing.

Jesus emphasized the importance of belief as well as action in his first public exhortation. In the first Chapter of Mark's Gospel, Jesus is described as coming into Galilee preaching the Gospel of the Kingdom. He said, "The time is fulfilled, and the Kingdom of God is at hand; repent ye and believe the Gospel" (Mark 1:15). I suggest that Jesus was saying that God had done what he had set out to do concerning man's redemption. The culmination of this effort was in Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection. To appropriate this action for sin and wrong doing comes almost simultaneously but even for this to have meaning it is related to God's action in Christ. The validity of our repentance depends upon our faith in God through Christ to forgive us.

The message of our Lord is still pertinent today. God has provided for our redemption. Christ is the center of our faith. The Bible is the recorded revelation of God's purposes and promises to men. We must read it with faith in its inspired meaning. The church is God's establishment for implementing his purpose in the world. We must renew faith in the value of our efforts together with God's help.

May God help us to repent, to believe, and to act like Christians should because of the resources of his strength and wisdom.

# Leaders Consider NCC Problems

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Leaders of 23 Protestant and Orthodox denominations met here this weekend to consider how the gravely ailing National Council of Churches (NCC) may be replaced or reconstituted.

Four alternative proposals for drastic overhaul of the nation's largest ecumenical organization will be discussed by 250 denominational representatives who constitute the NCC's policymaking general board.

A final decision on the fate of the controversial council probably will be postponed until the general board's fall meeting at Phoenix, Ariz., Sept. 11 and 12.

The talks here, continuing through Saturday and Sunday, may show the general direction the NCC is apt to go.

That it will go somewhere — the drain, if nowhere else — is a fact generally acknowledged by NCC officials. As now constituted, the 20-year-old council is dependent on financial contributions from its 33 member denominations. Those contributions have been falling steadily — partly because denominations themselves are strapped for money and partly because the NCC's liberal stands on race, Vietnam and other issues have made it intensely unpopular with conservative elements of its constituent denominations.

Sharp cuts in staff and budget and a \$4 million reserve fund have kept the NCC in business to far, but its warrent supporters agree it cannot last much longer in its present form.

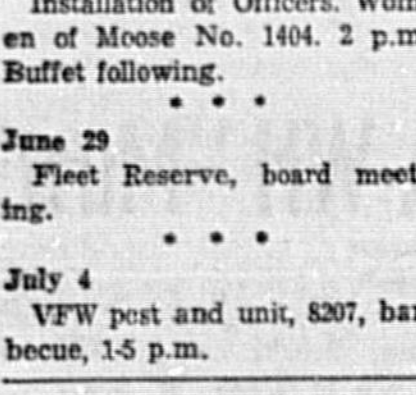

MEN'S FASHIONS from the American Enka designer collection, all made of polyester and nylon knits, start with Howard Davis' long, lean jumpsuit with matching jacket. The jacket features a bold, squared away neck, big, covered buttons, and patch pockets. Bill Smith threw out the old molds in designing his sweater-tunic suit. The tunic hugs the body over a soft turtle neck sweater. The waist is accented with a crafted "S" signature belt. Matching leggings tuck with big easy folds into nailhead boots. Next

comes Davis' body hugging bright purple cat/pso shirt, with sleeves swelled and gathered at the wrists, and purple striped slacks in ribbed polyester. Smith follows with a nylon wrap shirt that stretches across the torso for a soft, fluid effect, and ties at the waist. The shirt is coordinated with double knit polyester slacks. Finally, Smith goes western with a seamed and shaped jacket and smooth, slim slacks.

American Enka and Pair-Tex Mills had it mind then they asked two bright young designers to create fashions for men in Enka's polyester and Enka-Lure nylon knits. The designers came up with not only exciting new fashions, but a new way of thinking about the way men should dress. They threw out all the old notions about strict tailoring and stiff fabrics and let the knits themselves give them inspiration. Result is the kind of clothes that reflect contemporary life—clothes that travel and get around or drape at leisure with maximum ease. They designed tunis suits, tunic-pant sportswear and accessories to go with them, in a variety of brand new mood of freedom and individuality, all within a masculine context.

Award-winner Bill Smith is typical of the new breed of designer who looks at all of fashion with a fresh eye, and is now exploring the world of polyester and nylon knits for men. An innovator, he designed "body jewelry" for Richelieu, and did away forever with the idea of the neat little string of pearls. Now he feels the time has come to break down some of the old clichés about men's wear.

"In the beginning, clothes were really a uniform—they labeled us. Today we still have uniforms, the policeman, the fireman and so on. Their uniforms tell us who they are. But people don't want to wear labels when they dress; they want to express themselves as individuals. That's why you find the youngsters are going out now and 'doing their own thing'—finding old clothes, putting bits and pieces together in their own way. "Knits give you this feeling that you can get into them very quickly,

and be completely relaxed," he says. Typical of this feeling is his smooth knit zip front tunic that goes over matching pants and has a coordinated turtle neck sweater. He's also designed a leather belt to go with it, and believes that accessories are important for men's fashions. "You have to have a total look," he says. "Everything has to be accessorized properly to make a strong statement."

Howard Davis of Amani New Breed, a design studio with an Afro-American concept that has broadened out to reach an international market, brings a right-now approach to fashions for men. His studio, which develops fashions for either manufacturers or retailers from pattern to finished garment, and helps merchandise them as well, has been instrumental in bringing folk influences to fashion. BRISTOL, Wis. (AP) — Three well-worn scarabooks, a bonnet and a blanket are the only mementos that Jacqueline Benson Feicht has of the brief renown she was accorded as the world's smallest baby 34 years ago.

Medical authorities gave the 12-ounce infant little chance for survival. But after 4 1/2 months in an incubator and forced feeding through a tube to her stomach, Jackie was released from a Chicago hospital. She reached her normal weight and size by the time she was 2 and doctors hailed her survival as a medical miracle.

Interest in Jackie's infancy was renewed last month when Sally B. Giles, Seattle, Calif., wife of Navy Lt. Roger Giles, gave birth to a 1-pound-5-ounce girl. The baby, Laura Elizabeth, was three to four months premature. She died May 28.

Little of her former life in the limelight has rubbed off on Mrs. Feicht, a kindergarten teacher and wife of an English woman who weighed 10 ounces at birth. "But," she added, "she wasn't in a hospital like me so it's not official."

Her husband said Jackie was reared as a "china doll-type child," an attitude which precluded many normal activities.

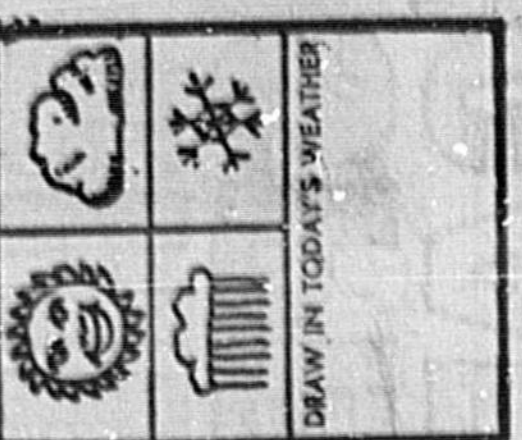

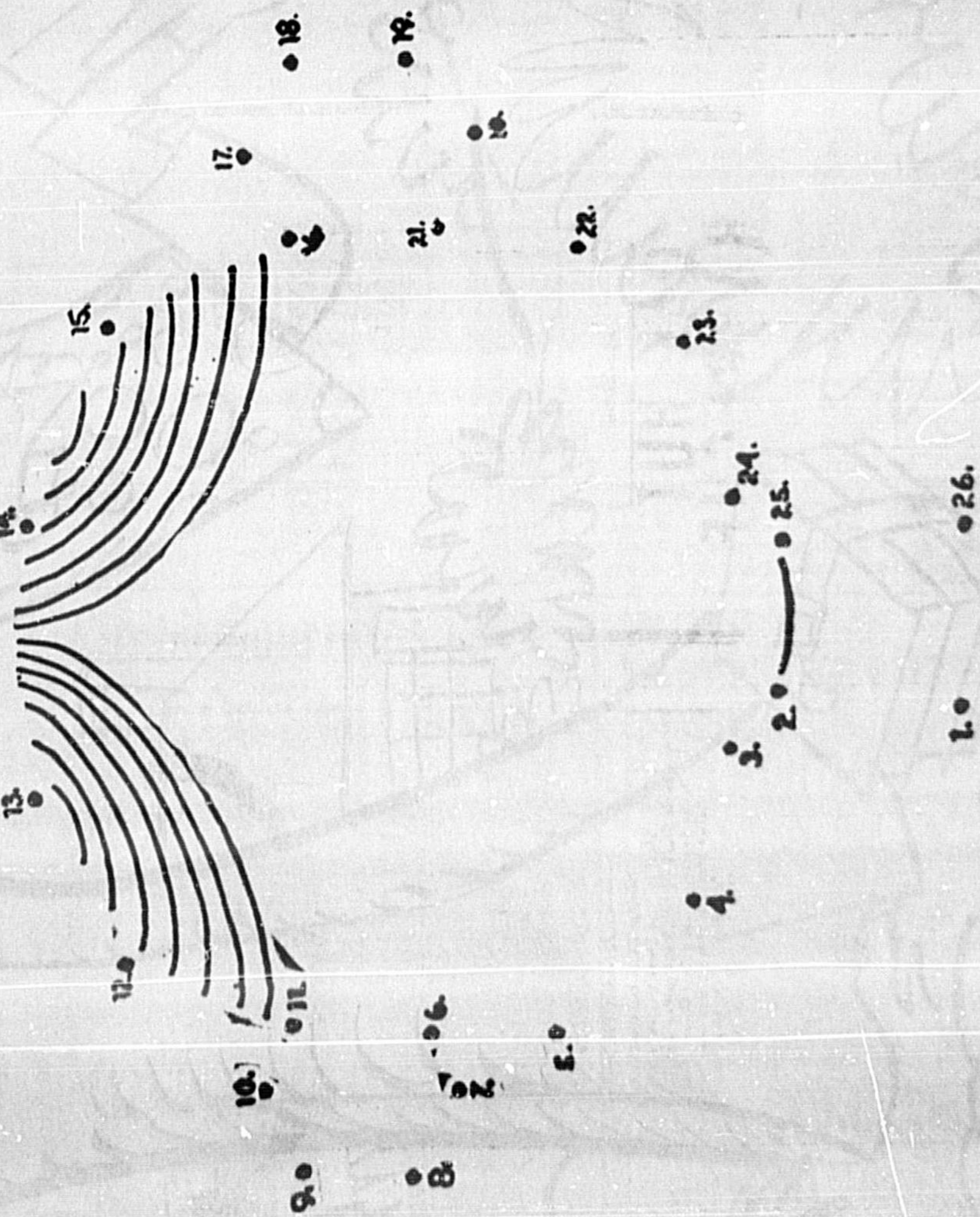

## Civil Rights Action Filed School Board Faces Complaint

A civil rights complaint was filed against the Seminole County School Board over the freedom of choice school plan approved for 1970-71 school year for all county schools.

The complaint was filed with the U.S. Office of Civil Rights in Washington by 25 parents of school children who contend that the freedom of choice plan perpetuates segregation.

The complaint asks that a direct investigation of the "choice" plan be conducted at once.

Amos Jones, Seminole Community Action director, confirmed the action was taken so some immediate relief could be obtained. "What type action we cannot say at this time but it could lead to the filing of a suit," Jones advised.

The director pointed out the high cost of a law suit as being an earlier deterrent to the institution of legal action. "We also had hoped that the School Board would adopt a plan which would meet the civil rights guidelines," Jones continued.

Walter Teague, county school finance officer, said today he was not aware of the civil rights complaint.

The complaint came after the board allowed the school administration to assign students to

Most of the parents are members of the West Side Improvement Association.

A group of some 50 parents of children who were denied their choice appeared before the board last week to protest the action and were offered the chance to speak against the board's decision but were limited to one hour's time.

She charged the board took up issues other than the protest group but had announced that only the group's complaints would be heard.

Mrs. Hunt told The Herald she felt the School Board may have been guilty of a Sunshine Law violation because of the manner in which the meeting was held.

"These other board problems should have been taken up during the next night's meeting, since this was a scheduled regular meeting already announced," she said.

The State Sunshine Law forbids a public body from taking action or items pertaining to the public interest or even discussing the subjects in private.

### Council To Hear Proposals

## Survey Requested Of Area County Eyes Water Study

CASSELBERRY — Tonight the Casseberry city council will hear recommendations and proposals concerning the construction of a long-awaited city maintenance building.

The building will house all city equipment along with a repair shop.

Another item being considered tonight will be a line painting machine. The city has had to rent a similar machine for line painting purposes since they have not possessed their own.

The council is expected to approve the construction of a tennis court at the Secret Lake recreation grounds. Also up for approval will be the police department's vacation schedule.

Included in these areas are Crane's Root basin, Lake Orange basin, and smaller recharge areas east and west of 14 and south of SR 436. The board has asked for additional information concerning the recharge and flood plain flooding as well as the nature of the watershed areas. Commissioners further asked Kimrey if his agency is in a position at this time to conduct a survey.

County Engineer William Bush and County Attorney Harold Johnson are scheduled to give a report upon the flood insurance which could be available to county citizens if the county provides a survey of flood prone areas and further initiates procedures to minimize development in these areas.

The National Flood Insurance would be backed by the federal government in cases of catastrophes, but the likely flood areas first have to be delineated by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers of the state Department of Conservation. Johnson advised the board at a meeting last week that this information must be provided before June 30.

Commissioners requested Bush to contact these agencies relative to a cost estimate and if any other agencies are available to make the survey. Johnson was asked to ascertain premium rates for the insurance.

A discussion will also be held upon the Mental Health Clinic. The Association has provided the commission with a contractual agreement. At a recent meeting the board agreed to partially fund the clinic in the amount of \$5,000 until budget hearings.

Four public hearings are on the agenda. Continued from last week at the petitioner's request is the request for rezoning from A1 to C2 property located at the intersection of SR 436, running westerly on the south side of Winter Woods Boulevard. This has been the object of controversy by the resident of the area who contend that the commercial zoning is superfluous since there are several stores within a short drive.

Also continued is an appeal against the Board of Adjustment in framing a permit to park a trailer on Lake Ann Estates on Lake Howell Lane. The issue stems from an office construction trailer being parked on the site. Johnson was to determine the legal aspects. A request will be heard for vacating and abandoning a portion of Peetree Avenue.

Hearings upon the adoption of various regulations for RM-1 single family mobile homes residential district and for RM-3 single family Mobile Home Park District, will be held.

### 2 Burglaries Investigated

Two burglaries are being investigated by Sanford police and Seminole County Sheriff's officers.

The break-in, occurring during the weekend, resulted in the theft of undetermined amounts of money at Pinescrest Inn on French Avenue and, Cat Lake Beer Garden, 1412 West 12th Street.

## University Has 2,000 Students

Nearly 2,000 students have enrolled in the 16-week Summer Quarter that began at Florida Technological University June 17.

The figure represents total enrollment, including students who will attend on a limited, part-time basis.

Included in the latter group are many area school teachers who register for one or two courses designed to improve their professional capabilities with more current information.

The figures for the current quarter reflect a sizeable increase over the same period last year. Last summer, a total of 785 students had registered at this point.

The total number of registrants this quarter stands at 1,325. Five hundred of that number are part-time students.

University officials now estimate that 1,900 full and part-time students can be expected to register for the fall quarter that starts September 28.
