The 160-room Mayfair Inn has been averaging a record 250 guests per day since it opened on Dec. 1, Mr. Marian said.



#### Armament Paradox

An on-the-spot defense program which would allow European countries to produce the things they need for re-armament against Communism is being considered. The plan seems practical in many ways. It would relieve the strain on American factories, provide employment in some of the dis-tressed countries of Europe, produce the needed weapons more quickly and distribute them with less delay.

The international relationships are complex. In some of the countries which are loyal friends to democracy many of the labor unions are Communist dominated. Sending American money to these countries would mean that some Communists would receive wages paid with American dollars. The labor unions which are Red controlled would have an opportunity to use sabotage and strikes against the production of arms. It is a touch of irony that the guns and tanks Five persons were killed in Flor-degree on Communist labor.

It may be possible to iron out the situation and get European factories moving on the production of defense materials. American authorities intend to make a thorough investigation before aid is given to those factories, however. If a plan can be worked out it would greatly improve the possibility of arming our allies rapidly and at the same time helping to become financially independent.
