Board Offers Lake Kathryn Flood Relief

The Board of County Commissioners today authorized Immediate action to alleviate flood conditions in the Lake Kathryn area by telling the county road department to obtain the necessary equipment to completely open Gee Creek which drains some 4,000 acres of South Seminole.

It was estimated that the cost would run between \$3,000 and \$5,000. But Chairman James Avery declared that even if there were only two people per acre the health and welfare of some 8,000 people is to be considered.

The Commission also approved accepting an easement which will permit the County to cut a draining ditch between Big Bear Lake and Cub Lakes which will eliminate further draining from Big Bear Into Cub through Little Bear Lake. The ditch will go under Bear Lake Road.

"We have 5,000 people on ome 1,200 acres in this area," Avery pointed out, "and all residents are on wells and septie tanks."

South Atlantic **Coast Advised** To Be Alert

MIAMI (UPI) - Hurricano Gladys shows no signs of turning its 125 mile an hour winds from a westerly course, forecasters said today.

"Interests along the South Atlantic Coast should keep in touch with advisories on Hurricane Gladys over this coming weekend," the weather bureau said.

Gladys, the season's seventh tropical storm and fourth hurricane, was moving slowly but should be close enough to the mainland Saturday night to push heavy seas against the coastline that already has been battered by hurricanas Cleo and Dora this year.

"However, present indications are that the leading edge of gale winds will still be 100 or more miles off the United States mainland by Sunday morning," an advisory said.

At 11 a.m. EST, Gladys was centered about 777 miles cast of Miami and about the same distance from the North Carolina coast, near latitude 20.4, longitude 67.5. It was moving toward the west-northwest at 9 MPH.

Weathermen said that a cold front that moved over the northeastern United States was strengthening into & warm high pressure system that would continue to block the huricane from turning more to the north, Furthermore the westerlies - high altitude west - to - east air streams - which sometimes turn tropical storms away from the mainland, were not affecting Gladys.

Even though the hurricane was far north of Puerto Rico, the weather bureau said it would cause rough seas with swells of 6 to 10 feet over the open waters along the north coast of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and the northern leeward islands.

"Swells will also be felt on the northeastern sides of the Sanford Police Chief Roy outer Bahama Islands," the G. Williams was on the scene weather bureau said. for much of the time to be





WASHINGTON (UPI) President Johnson returned to the White House today from a two-day Western tour marked by new disclosures on nuclear controls and weapons defenses - and huge crowd acclaim.

The President's "non-political" journey to five states and a Canadian province ended at 2 a.m. EDT when his "'Air Force One" jet transport touched down at Andrews Air Force Base, Md.

Johnson was in jovial spirit and obviously delighted with the trip to Montana, Washington, Oregon, California, Utah and British Columbia. He was cheered by polls and reports from Democratic leaders in the five states about his election chances.

He didn't even mind the soreness and pain in his fingers which resulted from handshakes with hundreds of supporters - most of them in Sacramento, Calif., where he climaxed his travels Thursday. The only dampener, literally, was the rain which marred his trip Wednesday to Vancouver and the border community of Blaine, Wash. It was there he signed papers implementing the Canadian-American Columbia River



good service. Rigid plastic toys, he continues, can be dangerous and tend to break or fall apart faster.

Beware of sharp corners on toys, for example on trucks, and poor finishes on wood, metal or plastic. They can in-






