Television Night Reruns Now Appearing In Daytime Slots

NEW YORK (UPI)—Old nighttime TV shows never die. They just seem to fade into the daytime schedules.

Monday, NBC-TV began substituting second-hand Loretta Young episodes — old Young, we call these reruns — and repeats of "Yancy Derringer" for "The House on High Street" and "Split Personality." "The House on High Street" was of surprisingly high quality for daytime while "Split Personality" offered us the dubious advantage of watching brand new mediocrity in place of old mediocrity.

There is a tendency to regard

the slag heap of daytime TV as a shocking commentary on the TV industry and an insult to the housewife's intelligence.

I disagree. I believe those who must watch daytime TV, regardless of their reasons, are rather enjoying what they see and are not feeling insulted. The simple fact is that, compared to night audiences, daytime audiences are small. There must be some time-killing hours on TV and, in general, I take that to be the function of the daytime schedule.

After all, not every motion picture means something. Yes, even TV columnists sometimes turn out copy that doesn't make a literary

anthology. Why waste time shouting for higher quality daytime programming when the networks are having trouble enough upgrading their nighttime rosters?

Me? I've made my adjustment to this fact of life. I give the networks their daytime hours for cutting corners and saving dough with reruns. In return for this tolerance, I can expect them to continue improving their nighttime schedules. Improvement of nighttime TV ultimately will improve daytime TV because of the traffic pattern on repeats that has emerged. By and large, that's how it works out.

Open up those cans of laughter, boys, the comedy shows are coming back.

The authoritative trade publication, Television Digest, tells us that 71 hopeful comedy series now are in preparation out of approximately 200 half-hour pilot films being made in Hollywood for possible use next season. There are only 25 new westerns and three private eye series on the list.

The emphasis for 1960-61 is on comedy, action and adventure. Even Jim Aronson, the Matt Dillon of "Gunsmoke," is choosing a comedy format for his production company's initial pilot film.

The Channel Swim: "The Barbarians," a full-hour weekly series set in the Roman Empire era, is being produced by NBC-TV for next fall's night schedule. Jack Palance will star in the series, which is based on a Van Wyck Brooks' best-selling novel.

A half-hour weekly series called "The Great Barnum," based on the life of showman Phineas T. Barnum, is planned for next fall by ABC-TV. The Ringling Brothers Circus will float through the CBS-TV air on Friday, May 23 in a one-hour videotaped special emceed by Bert Parks. ABC-TV's Maverick now is filming the first

of next season's episodes in Hollywood, having completed the current schedule of 26 Walt Disney Presents, now a Friday night feature on ABC-TV, moves into the Sunday evening network schedule in the fall.

St. Pete Police Nab Oviedo Murder Suspect

St. Petersburg police arrested today the man suspected of murdering an Oviedo Negro girl Monday.

Aaron Anderson, a 42 year old Negro, is being held in St. Petersburg on an aggravated assault charge. St. Petersburg police still have to determine whether they will hold Anderson on the aggravated assault charge before turning him over to Sheriff Hobby's

office. Sheriff's offices, the FBI and Highway Patrol Offices over Florida were notified that Anderson was wanted for murder, Sheriff Hobby's office reported today.

Anderson is suspected of murdering 18-year-old Alames Perkins whose body was found just off SR 406 in north Oviedo yesterday. The girl, daughter of Leola Perkins of Franklin St., Oviedo, was found stabbed with a butcher knife, found

lying on the body. The girl was found by Deputy R. W. Alford and Oviedo Constable George Kelly.

The clue to the location of the body came through a phone call to another Oviedo Negro. The caller, from St. Petersburg asked if the missing girl had been found yet and told the location of her body.

Anderson who boarded with the murdered girl's mother, was a farm worker here about a year.

St. Petersburg police were told by a Negro woman, that Anderson also stabbed her last night when she refused to help him. Capt. Walter Tipton of St. Petersburg said that the woman, Eliza Dale, said Anderson admitted raping and killing the girl.

Peace Justice Hugh Duncan of

Seminole County was expecting an autopsy report this morning, telling the cause of death and whether rape had also been committed.

A coroner's inquest is set for 8 p. m. Monday in the courthouse. State's Attorney Tom Waddell and Assistant State's Attorney Anthony Hoseman Jr. of Titusville will question witnesses to legally determine the cause of death.

Anti-Payola Law Proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Communications Commission today proposed legislation which would make "payola" and deceptive broadcasting practices, such as rigged quiz shows, criminal offenses.

The FCC proposal was announced shortly after President Eisenhower, at his news conference, condemned "payola" as an abuse of public morality.

"Payola," currently the topic of a congressional investigation, is a term for side payments to broadcasters for plugging phonograph records or other sponsored products.

The FCC proposals would amend laws to provide fines up to \$5,000 or one year in prison or both for persons engaging in "payola" and deceptive broadcasting practices.

The recommendations were a follow-up of Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers' report to the President on recently disclosed evils in the broadcast industry.

The commission said the abuses had led to "widespread disillusionment on the part of the viewing public." It said that at present "the commission has no jurisdiction over the employees of a broadcast station with respect to this type of activity, nor does it appear that such jurisdiction is warranted."

Bringing law makes it a crime for a radio or TV station to plug records or other products without identifying the sponsor.

The FCC's proposed legislation would extend the law to cover disc jockey and advertisers or record distributors making under-cover payments.

The developments came amid hints by House investigators that they were more than ready to take the eye in a fun-filled Miami Beach convention at which record companies coughed up at least \$117,000 to make disc jockeys "rich and happy."

LAWRENCE, Kan. (UPI) — Just Dubois, Latin American correspondent for the Chicago Tribune, said Wednesday that Cuban Premier Fidel Castro has planted Castro supporters on U. S. college campuses. Delivering the annual William Allen White lecture at the University of Kansas, Dubois also charged that a Communist conspiracy in "bringing all mass media in Latin America."

MIAMI (UPI) — Dade County officers today arrested Edwin Batillo, 37, only 26 minutes after he had taken a month-old baby from his carriage outside a supermarket.

Officers quoted her as saying she took Kathy Arnelle because the infant "looked neglected."

The child's mother, Alice Arnelle, had left Kathy outside while she shopped.

Bystanders saw a woman lift the child from the carriage and drive away in a late-model auto. They furnished police with the car's description and license number, a city-wide radio alert was broadcast, and two patrolmen stopped the woman several blocks away.

The baby was returned to its mother unhurt. Police withheld filing charges pending a conference with the state attorney.

Fire Ant Treatment Aired To Kiwanians

Seminole County still has about 2,500 acres to be treated against fire ants.

Charles Youtsey of the State Plant Board told Sanford Kiwanians Wednesday that 2,548 acres have already been treated in the county. The ants here are found chiefly in the southwest part of the county around Forest City and Longwood.

The ants are found in 23 spots in the county, Youtsey said. Youtsey and George Desin of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture have been fighting the ants with heptachlor, a chemical which kills the insects on contact.

Youtsey and Desin found the ants in October of last year. They came upon a large mound near Sanlando. Imported fire ants first appeared in Seminole County in Longwood, eight years ago.

The two agriculturalists showed

a film about the harm caused by fire ants and how the insects breed. Fire ants damage crops not only from their stings, but from their clogging up farm and construction machinery. They are found in fields, golf courses and cemeteries.

Some suffer nausea and fever and a few who are allergic to the ant bites may die.

Who's Speeding?

LAWTNEY (UPI) — Florida is apparently traffic trap free.

The Peninsula Motor Club said the one here had been eliminated and that the American Automobile Assn. would resume routing tourists through this small Bradford County community on U. S. 301.

Club President Marvin L. Holloway said that with the elimination of the Lawtney trap, Florida is apparently free of such revenue-producing devices in its small towns on strategic highways.

The club charged that last year 40 per cent of Lawtney's revenue came from traffic fines but that only one of the fines was paid by a Bradford County resident.

Sanford's zoning and planning commission will discuss amendments to the city's zoning ordinance tonight.

Jacksonville city planner George W. Simons may present a revised Sanford zoning ordinance at 7:30 p. m. meeting in City Hall. Simons is employed by Sanford as city planner. He may also give the zoning board his recommendations for capital improvements here.

City Manager W. E. Knowles has told the zoning and planning board that since the present zoning ordinance was drawn up in 1944 most of its regulations are obsolete in some way. The amendments suggested by Knowles included:

Set up an area for duplexes only and get a definition of a duplex. Change the coding of Sanford districts to a simpler form

and revise the area requirements for Negro dwellings.

Knowles also said that industrial sites are threatened with elimination when people build houses on sites zoned for industry. Home owners object to industry after they have built on an industrial site, Knowles said.

The city manager advised that people building in a commercial zone should realize that this will devalue their property.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Most of the students in one of Florida State University's normally all-male Air Force ROTC classes took a back seat to the department's one girl student last semester.

Jean Drawdy, a dark-haired major in food and nutrition, gained an A in the course, placing her in the upper 10 per cent of the class among 450 men.

She is the only girl in the history of the organization to enroll in an ROTC course. And she says she plans to take other military courses before she graduates in 1961.

CHICAGO (UPI) — Dr. Leo K. Bishop, vice president of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, said today his wounding by seven Negro teenagers "has not changed my convictions in any way."

Bishop, a white minister, was shot Monday night when the five boys and two girls held him up near his home. He was reported in "fair" condition today.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's capital faced a food shopping headache today when the six largest supermarket chains closed their stores because of a meat cutters' strike.

The chains operate 304 stores and handle 75 per cent of the retail food sales in the Washington area.

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Sieg Named To Seminole School Board

Gov. LeRoy Collins today appointed W. L. Sieg of Geneva to replace C. F. Harrison to the Seminole County School Board.

Harrison, a former resident of Geneva, died Friday.

The board met this morning and approved Collin's recommendation. Sieg was present at the meeting.

In other business today the board decided against leasing the Orange Grove at the Altamonte School and authorized a portion of it to be cleaned out for playground use.

The board also discussed access roads to the new Seminole High School and authorized engineers to continue the study on the proposed plan.

The board also appointed William Stewart as bus driver in the Lyman School area to succeed Mrs. Eleanor Martin who resigned.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Army disclosed today that for the first time, a ballistic missile has been destroyed in the air by another missile.

The announcement said an Honest John artillery rocket was blown up by a Hawk anti-aircraft missile in a successful test at White Sands, N. M., Jan. 29. Motion pictures of the achievement were shown at the Pentagon today.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The President described his four-point plan as comprising "initial but far-reaching and yet readily attainable steps toward a complete ban on nuclear weapons tests."

"They are steps which offer an opportunity to consolidate the important progress made in the negotiations thus far," the President said. "It is our hope that the Soviet Union will join with us in this constructive beginning."

The President declined to say whether the United States would suggest a specific level below which underground tests would not be banned. Some U. S. officials have said it is impossible under the inspection procedures the Russians agree to, to detect with any certainty blasts under the magnitude of 30 kilotons.

The President said the figure was negotiable.

Eisenhower said the United States was presenting its proposal because of its desire "to end the apparent deadlock in the negotiations" at Geneva, where Britain, the United States and Russia have been hagglng on the subject for more than 13 months.

104 Anti-Castro Plotters Get Prison Terms In Crackdown To Halt Revolt

HAVANA (UPI)—A five-man revolutionary tribunal has sentenced 104 "counter-revolutionary plotters" to prison for terms ranging from 3 to 30 years in Premier Fidel Castro's drive on conspiracy against his regime.

Thirty-six of the 140 persons on trial were acquitted on grounds they were merely innocent bystanders on the scene of various clashes between secret police and foes of the Castro regime.

Thirty-year sentences were imposed on the nine survivors of the "invasion." Two other invaders and two soldiers were killed in a clash at the scene of the invasion attempt.

Arturo Caines Milanes, alleged "president" and "vice president" of a proposed counter-revolutionary regime, drew nine years each.

India's Greeting Of Nikita Subdued Compared To Ike's

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—A beaming Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev arrived in New Delhi today for the first stop of his three-week goodwill mission through Southeast Asia.

The greeting for the Soviet Premier was a subdued one compared with the unrestrained welcome given President Eisenhower on his visit last December.

Khrushchev drew an estimated million wildly cheering Indians on his arrival here Dec. 6. Millions also turned out for his public appearance.

The crowds were orderly when Khrushchev arrived at the presidential palace.

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru and President Rajendra Prasad headed the official welcoming party at the airport.

Prosecutor Puts 'Key' Question To Dr. Finch

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Prosecutor Fred N. Whichello put the key question to Dr. R. Bernard Finch.

When the doctor finally wrested the revolver from Barbara Jean Finch that night, the district attorney asked, why didn't he either throw it away or take it and run?

As he has on every occasion, the doctor had the answer.

If he threw it away, his wife might go after it and shoot either him or his mistress, Carole Tregott.

He heard the footsteps of maid Marie Anne Lidholm approaching and he thought she had a rifle. She might shoot him down if she saw him flee. Instead, he fractured his wife's skull with the revolver and tackled Miss Lidholm as she came into the garage.

That's where the cross examination of the 42-year-old surgeon ended Wednesday. Today Whichello takes Finch once more over the actual "accidental" shooting of his wife July 18 outside their West Covina home and their last, deathly conversation.

The trial has to be seen to be believed.

There is the spectacle of the mild, fatherly prosecutor getting down on his seat pants on the courtroom floor and inviting Dr. Finch to show him with a revolver—but tenderly—how he hit his wife on the head.

Finch obliges with cooperative enthusiasm. He calls the man who wants to send him to the gas chamber "Mr. Whichello." There is respect in his tone of a younger man for an older and wiser one.

He tells Whichello he can't demonstrate how he acted his wife's hair because the prosecutor is almost bald.

Finch said the other day: "I don't gamble."

That may be true so far as money goes. But Finch is gambling everything that the jury will believe his story of complete innocence with its host of inconsistencies and coincidences.

Whichello pounded at some of those points Wednesday.

F.N.C. said he feared Marie Anne was coming with a rifle he had showed her how to use. The doctor said if the maid saw him loading over his wife with a gun, she would almost certainly shoot him.

"I didn't want any gunplay," he explained.

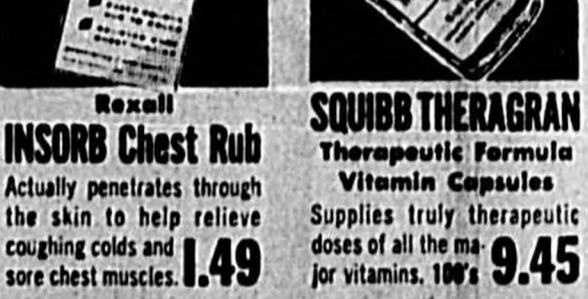

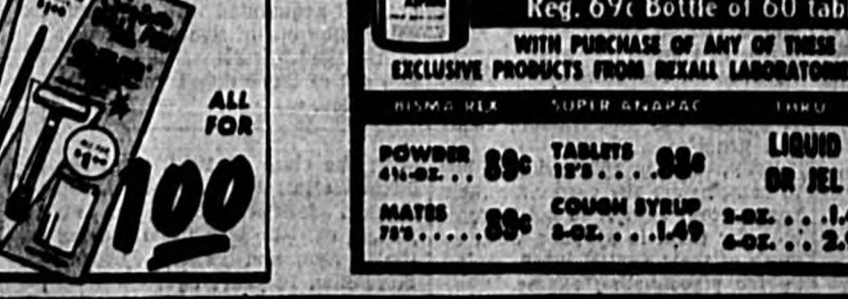

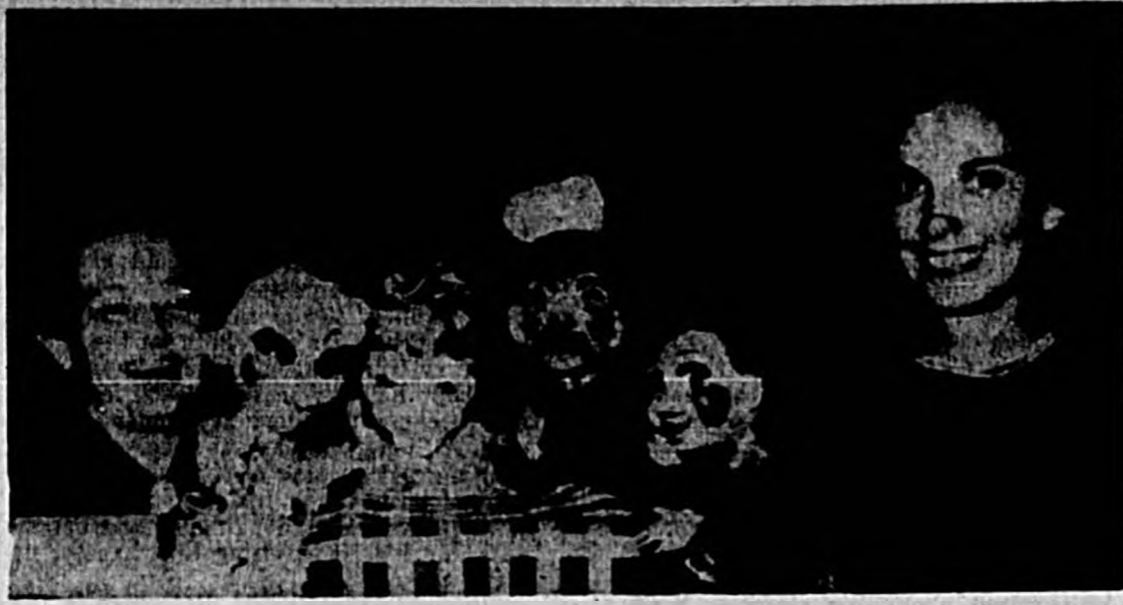

Speed Shows Climax Starts Friday

With \$125,000 in prize money to be won, and with the fastest cars ever to use as weapons, America's top stock car drivers will go all out for gold and glory starting tomorrow on NASCAR's Daytona International Speedway.

The wind-up of Speed Weeks will cover three days, beginning today, with two 100-mile races on the Grand National cars. Each will carry a \$5,000 purse and the first twenty-five finishers in each race will qualify for the 500-mile Sweepstakes on Sunday.

Handicapped between the 100-milers and the Sweepstakes marathon is the 200-mile test for modified and sportsman cars on Saturday. High finishers in this always popular event will split prize money of \$25,000.

The 500-mile Sweepstakes, the

inaugural of which was won by Lee Petty ofandleman, N. C. last year with an average speed of 123.91 miles per hour, has

drawn the fastest field, both men and mechanics, in the history of stock car racing. Upwards of 50 cars—54 of them

being the latest 1960 Detroit models—are registered, and the fastest sixty will go to the post. Times in early qualifying races and trials have been sensational, and there isn't a driver on the grounds who doesn't feel that an average speed of 140, or better, will be needed to bring off victory and the \$50,000 first place money.

The two pole positions, earned in 25-mile races two weeks ago before a national television audience, belong to Cotton Owens of Spartanburg, S. C. and Jack Smith of Atlanta, Ga. Owens, in a 1960 Pontiac, won his heat at an average speed of 145.202, and Smith took his with a 148.127 average in the same make and model.

The fastest lap of the year belongs to Glen (Fireball) Roberts of Daytona Beach, who turned the 2 1/2 mile asphalt trioval in a blistering 1:32.161. To average that speed Roberts had to move at close to 180 down the backstretch.

Guessing the winner is hazardous business, for the 500-mile Sweepstakes field is studded with drivers who have the coolest heads and hottest feet in the business. And they all will go to the starting line with cars tuned as fine as the hand of man can

tune them. The drivers and mechanics have been working on the cars for weeks, and will continue to adjust them until time to take to the track.

Among the top stars of the roaring road on hand for the climax of Speed Weeks are Curtis Turner, Bob Welborn, Bobby Johns, Jim Reed, Joe Weatherly, Tommy Irwin, Tiny Lund, Darrell Dale, Bob Burdick, Joe Lee Johnson, Buck Baker, Banjo Matthews, and Marvin Panch.

When men like these start around the turns and down the straight-aways, picking the winner is not only impossible, but foolish.

No less star-loaded is the field for the modified-sportsman 250-miler. Banjo Matthews, last year's winner, is on hand, and so are Park Brown, 1959 runner-up to Matthews, Pee Wee Jones, Joe Weatherly, Fireball Roberts, Glen Wood, and Jimmy Thompson.

There will be a consolation race for drivers who do not qualify in Friday's 100-milers, with the first eight finishers rounding out the 500-mile Sweepstakes field.

NASCAR President Bill France expects a crowd in excess of 20,000 to be in the stands and infield for Sunday's race.

Congress Gets Suggestions To Safeguard Air Travel

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The recent wave of airline disasters has brought a flood of public suggestions to Congress for making air travel safer and thwarting would-be bomb-planters on planes.

The office of Sen. A. S. Mike Mansfield (D-Ohio), chairman of the Senate Aviation Subcommittee which investigated air safety, said it received about 1,000 letters from all parts of the nation.

Written included businessmen, insurance, pilots, physicians, engineers—and many everyday air travelers disturbed by the rising airline accident rate.

A brief survey of the congressional mail showed a broad variety of suggestions; some intelligent and thoughtful, some impractical, but all sincere.

The best ideas have been culled and relayed to the Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) for possible study. All will get a response.

Other congressional news: Foreign aid: The President's formal request for \$4,175,000,000 in military assistance.

foreign aid during the next fiscal year is ready to go to Congress sometime this week. Administration officials reported the message urges appropriation of the full amount to continue military and economic support of non-Communist nations around the world. The request for the fiscal year starting July 1 will be for about \$2,175,000,000 in economic aid and the rest in military assistance.

Postal: A House Appropriations subcommittee reported that the Post Office Department planned to have the first fully automatic post office in this country in operation early this fall at Providence, R. I. Testimony of post office officials made public today also disclosed the department planned 10 "major priority" modernization projects across the nation at a cost of \$40,177,000.

Scholarship Loan Examinations For Teachers, Nurses Set Mar. 15

Exam competition to get 9000 a year state teacher and nursing scholarship loans will be held March 15. Senior high, college and nursing students should register with their principal, dean of education or nursing school director to apply for the loans. All other applicants should register with the county school superintendent's office by Feb. 19.

In the state are eligible to compete if they have lived in Florida for one year. If an applicant is under 21, his parents must be Florida residents. Each person who gets a general scholarship loan for teacher preparation must agree to teach in a Florida public school, following graduation, for at least as many years as he has received scholarship help. Persons who get state nursing scholarship loans must agree to start practicing nursing in Florida immediately after graduation and continue for at least the time specified by their scholarship.

Actor Chokes On Tomato Piece

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI)—Brian Donlevy choked on a piece of tomato and fell unconscious to the floor of a restaurant Tuesday night before the food was sliced and his breathing resumed.

Donlevy was administered oxygen by a nurse five units and then taken in an ambulance to a hospital where his condition was reported as good.

The veteran actor was celebrating his 57th birthday with friends when the half-slice of tomato became lodged in his throat.

Del Kolshorn, one of Donlevy's guests, said the actor gulped some water after failing to dislodge the tomato by coughing. He then turned blue and toppled to the floor unconscious.

Kolshorn said Donlevy continued to cough while on the floor until the piece of tomato was removed. Donlevy regained consciousness.

Georgia Dealers Say They Won't Sell Florida Fish

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Game and Fish Commission said Wednesday as Georgia fish dealers said they will not handle, purchase or sell fresh water fish caught in Florida.

The sale of fresh water fish is illegal in Florida. The commission is trying to stamp out the sale of game fish in Georgia.

Director A. D. Aldrich said, "If the Georgia outlet for Florida game fish are sealed off, the illegal traffic in such fish will tend to become unprofitable. This is bound to reduce the volume of illegal traffic in Florida fish."

Mystery Sub Hunt Intensified

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—The air force barred civil air traffic from the Nuevo Gulf area today, and it appeared the navy might be preparing an all-out attack on what it believes to be a submarine cornered there.

The air force ban was not explained. The navy previously had closed the gulf to private shipping for "tactical reasons."

Navy Secretary Gaston Clement told newsmen last night the navy could order "armored reprisals" against the submarine if it refused to leave the gulf because it had penetrated "interior Argentine waters."

When he was asked whether this meant the navy might bombard the submarine, Clement replied: "That is the spirit of the communique."

Naval sources at Puerto Madero said the submarine — if there is one — probably would have to surface within 72 hours. The navy apparently hopes to catch it on the surface, since the gulf is too deep for effective operation with anti-sub equipment now available.

Israeli, Syrian Farmers Exchange Plowshare For Guns In Dispute

In a demilitarized valley three miles wide and 10 miles long near the southern end of the Sea of Galilee, Israeli and Syrian farmers have killed their axes and plows by side since 1951.

An irrigation ditch divided them and the Israelis claimed that ditch had become the recognized, if not the final, boundary between the two sides.

Last week the report took over from the plowshares, and along the ridges of the red brown hills on either side, Israeli and Syrian farmers have killed their axes and plows by side since 1951.

The Israeli claimed that the Syrian flag was stationing troops in the Arab village of Tawfik which lies within the demilitarized zone, and that farmers working the Arab lands actually were U.A.R. troops in disguise.

The Arabs claimed the troops were there to protect the farmers against a long series of Israeli encroachments, during which Israel gradually was taking over the whole of the valley.

Then, a week and a half ago, the Syrian shelled the nearby Jewish village of Beit Katsir, and in retaliation Israeli troops rased Tawfik.

That there was not a full scale war may be credited to two forces, one of which usually receives too little credit in its attempts to preserve world peace.

That force is the United Nations whose armistice observers operate on both sides of the line, and therefore can pinpoint responsibility for aggression, and whose emergency force of 5,000 men stands along the southern Israeli-U.A.R. border from Gaza to the tip of the Akaba Peninsula.

Another factor preventing a large-scale fight now is the fact that neither Israel nor the U.A.R. wants a war.

Israel charges that stepped-up U.A.R. hostility is politically motivated.

On the other hand, the Arabs charge that Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion deliberately builds up incidents to focus world attention and sympathy on Israel.

Sailor Accused Of Beating Girl To Death To View Scene Of Crime

BOSTON (UPI)—A handsome Dutch radio operator, charged with the shipboard slaying of a pretty Chicago divorcee, today may get his first look at an island he never knew existed until last fall.

The battered, nearly nude body of 23-year-old Lynn Kaufman washed ashore on tiny Spectacle Island in Boston Harbor Sept. 19, the day after she was reported missing from a Dutch ship by radio.

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Gripping, Moving Moments Noted In 'To The Sound Of Trumpets'

By FRED BANTZIG, NEW YORK (UPI)—"To the Sound of Trumpets," Tuesday night's CBS-TV Playhouse 90 drama, was filled with clinkers in acting, plot and technical details. It dragged at times and was often repetitious.

And yet, despite all this, John Gay's original script offered some curiously gripping, moving moments. I suppose this is because he tackled a big topic: One man's responsibility to his fellow man.

In the play, a World War I British captain on his way to deserting his army rediscovered the meaning of life after falling in love with an American girl. The girl, a volunteer nurse who had a romantic view of war and a hubby at the front, arrived in Paris with the captain and was thrilled at the idea of being able to hear German artillery. She didn't give a thought to what the artillery was doing, you see. Naturally, her romanticism revived the spark of humanity in her lover and she, in turn, acquired a toned-down, more representative view of war and life.

She finally went back to her hubby and the captain went back to the war. Both realized that ours is not to reason why ours is but to do or die. The obviousness of it all detracted from the play's impact.

Directed by Buzz Kulik, the production went through some awkward moments before getting down to business. The pace slowed effectively as Stephen Boyd, the captain, and Dolores Hart, the nurse, met, fell in love and parted. They played a restaurant scene in which they realized their need for one another in an especially tender style. Before that, however, Boyd tended to act with too much intensity. Miss Hart was consistently excellent. In smaller roles, Dan O'Herlihy, Robert Coote, Sam Jaffe and Judith Anderson were fine. Boris Karloff, appearing again in a sinister role, behaved at times as though he was satirizing old Boris Karloff movies.

A TV show that sets out to salute the swingin' years—the years in which big bands were big business—loses me when it offers Guy Lombardo instead of either Benny Goodman, Artie Shaw, Duke Ellington or Charley Barnet. Lombardo belongs on a show of his own, Dad.

But what disturbed me more than some of the musical representatives on Tuesday night's NBC-TV Startime special was the sound of the music. It was pallid. Only the Woody Herman crew performed with some of drive that characterized the top the excitement, bite and hungry bands of that era. The program, called "The Swingin' Years"—and not "To the Sound of Trumpets"—had a gee-whis appreciation of that big band era but not enough youthful spirit, mood or depth.

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Ike-Inspected Polaris Zeroes In CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—A Navy Polaris prototype missile, which President Eisenhower had inspected, ran its success string to six Wednesday night.

The missile's classified details were revealed to the President during his three-hour tour of the missile test center Wednesday. It was one of five rockets he saw. Six hours later, the 28-foot-tall bottle-shaped missile, forerunner of a rocket to be launched from submerged submarines, flew 900 miles down the Atlantic missile range to hit squarely on target just north of Puerto Rico.

DeGaulle's New Sweeping Reforms Hailed As Death Blow To Opponents

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles DeGaulle's sweeping reforms of army, police and civil powers in Algeria were hailed today as the virtual deathblow to extremist fighting opposition to his "self-determination" plan for the revolt-torn African territory. Former Premier Guy Mollet, secretary general of the opposition Socialist Party, was one of the first to applaud DeGaulle's drastic crackdown.

"The problem is settled — we are now headed for self-determination sooner or later," Mollet said in an interview published in the pro-DeGaulle newspaper Combat. Mollet himself headed one of the governments that toppled because of the Algerian problem. On one visit to Algiers four years ago, he was pelted with over-ripe tomatoes by angry French settlers.

Sub-Zero Cold Grips Midwest

A sub-zero cold wave today lashed the grip on the weather-battered Midwest, still digging out from a destructive storm that killed more than 20 persons on its parading trip from California to the Great Lakes.

For the second consecutive day, the temperature dropped to below zero in parts of Minnesota and North Dakota. Readings near zero were common throughout the Midwest in the wake of winter's deadliest storm.

A United Press International scout plane 34 deaths since the storm passed out of the Pacific coast and lashed California with torrential rains and 40-foot ocean waves. There were 18 dead in Wisconsin, the hardest hit state.

Bad crops were near collapse and snow plows broke down from the long battle against a snowfall that reached 26 inches in some communities.

Milwaukee, lashed by the second worst storm in its history, called for volunteers to dig out fire hydrants buried by 15-foot drifts. City officials were fearful the hydrants couldn't be found in time if a fire broke out.

Lawyers in southeast Wisconsin maneuvered dozens of pleas for help in getting sick and injured persons to hospitals.

Small foreign cars all but disappeared under the mountainous drifts. One snow plow dug into what appeared to be a mound of snow and badly damaged a small sports car.

Most main highways in the storm's track were reopened Thursday, but hundreds of rural roads remained snow-clogged.

The storm, which caused damage estimated in the millions of dollars, blew itself out over Canada. Only a few snow flurries were expected today in Michigan and parts of New England and New York state.

Ike May Arbitrate Watch Dispute

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower has been asked to arbitrate a dispute between the Peninsular and Watch Co. and its employees over sale of 500 watches, Arabian carpets and Oriental wood carvings in military post exchanges in the Panama Canal Zone.

The two agencies have debated the problem for months. This week they sent separate policy recommendations to the White House.

White Youth To Attend A & M In Protest Move

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A white, 21-year-old student at Florida State University said today his decision to enroll in a Negro college was not a hasty one.

Al Brewer, a senior physics major, Thursday disclosed plans to enter Florida A & M University for Negroes here next summer. The youth will graduate from FSU in June, has vigorously protested segregated education.

City Offices Get Face Lifting

City offices started getting a face lifting this week. Early in the week, the police station and jail was given a fresh coat of paint and city work crews are now painting various offices in City Hall.

Dominican Action To Be Probed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A committee of the Organization of American States has voted to refer to the Inter-American Peace Commission Venezuela's charge that the Dominican Republic has violated human rights.

ATLANTA (UPI) — A Baptist deacon pleaded guilty today to rigging a bomb in his preacher's car and was sentenced to three to five years in prison for attempted murder.

Fair Prize Awards Total \$741

Commemorative ribbons and \$741 in prizes will be awarded at the Seminole County Fair.

In the boys' 4-H Club exhibits there will be 63 cash prizes, ranging from \$6 for most first prizes to \$1 for all but one of the fifth prizes. Each creditable 4-H club community exhibit will get a \$10 premium.

Fifty-one cash prizes will be given for the largest fruits or vegetables of 17 types. The largest examples will be awarded \$1 prizes, and the third largest in each class \$2 cents.

Blue ribbon winners in the poultry exhibition will get \$1.15. Red ribbon winners will get \$1.25 and white ribbon winners 75 cents. Blue, red and white ribbon winners in the rabbit show will get from \$2 to 75 cents.

Seventy-five prizes from \$1 for first prize to 75 cents for third prize will be given for the best cakes, cookies and candy entered by 4-H club girls. Thirty-three awards in the needle work and crafts section.

The best and second-best table linens, textile paintings, bedroom furnishings, quilts and bedspreads, knitting, rugs and crafts exhibited in the women's department will receive 138 awards ranging from \$2 to 25 cents. Blue and red ribbons also will be given in the division.

Pictorial art and ceramic educational division exhibits prizes range from \$1.50 to 50 cents. Individual Cub Scout projects will receive 45 prizes, from 15 cents for third place exhibits to 15 cents in the Boy Scout troop exhibits, each creditable troop exhibit will receive \$5.

Board Stands By Refund Ruling

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Utilities Commission today stuck by an earlier ruling ordering the Houston Gas Corp. to refund several thousand dollars in overcharges made at Daytona Beach for sale of manufactured gas.

The commission refused to reconsider the earlier order which directed the company to repay to its customers the difference between a 50 cents minimum charge levied since last July.

Houston contended the charges were increased with authority of the commission.

\$24,657 Street Project Completed

Knowles said work was completed on Mellonville Ave. from 20th to 25th St.; Second St. from Mellonville to Sanford Ave.; Ninth St. from Sanford to Park Ave.; E. Third St. from French to Perkinson Aves. and Perkinson Ave. from First to Third St.

The program started in early 1960 and was completed last month.

Longwood Votes To Draw Interest On Bond Money

Longwood will invest \$35,000 of its recent \$70,000 bond issue in 90 day U. S. government notes.

The Town Council last night decided that the money won't be needed for 90 days and agreed to get the interest on it.

The investment will bring the town about \$350. Councilman H. C. Carlson said the bond issue ordinance permits investment of the \$70,000 in U. S. government notes for a period up to 18 months.

The securities are negotiable and can be sold immediately if money is needed.

Carlson said the town won't need the money to pay off contractors of the street and water improvements for 90 days. The \$200 feet of street paving will be done and 30 days allowed Longwood to pay its bills.

Robert Stanton of O'Neal and Associates, engineers, gave a cost estimate on the paving and the water improvements.

The \$200 feet of street paving will be on Grant Ave. from Widmore to Georgia Ave., Palmerton Ave. from Grant west to the railroad, and Wilma Ave. from Molnar Ave. to Church St. The water improvements will be on Church St. from Grant Ave. to Lakeview

Tax Agents Seek Share Of Payola

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Internal Revenue Service is out to get its "share" of payola.

Agents are giving extra attention to the income tax returns of disc jockeys and others who may have been "forgetting" to tell Uncle Sam about their sideline sources of income.

IRS headquarters assigned an agent from its intelligence division to attend payola hearings before the House legislative oversight subcommittee this week. The House group has been questioning disc jockeys about under-the-table payments of gifts from record companies.

Whether in cash, new cars, vacations, trips or anything else of value, such income is as fully taxable as salary.

Anderson will be taken directly from here to Raiford prison, the Sheriff's office reported. An autopsy report from an Orlando doctor to Justice of Peace Hugh Ducan revealed that there was no evidence of sexual assault in the killing of Alta Mae Perkins Monday. The 16-year-old Oviedo girl died from internal hemorrhage caused by knife stabs, the report said.

Deputies George Kelley and James Moore were sent to bring Anderson back.

Magnolia Much Too Heady For Zoning Chief

Magnolia, according to Webster, is a tree or shrub. But to County Zoning Director Robert Brown it's just one big headache.

After spending two years working out a comprehensive zoning plan, Brown and his crew are now engaged in an equally difficult task—a complete index of all streets in the county. And Magnolia crops up 26 times.

The purpose of the index is to pinpoint all the streets in the county and to have their names and location listed and of Brown's fingertips.

Long-range plans will call for changes in many of the street names to avoid needless duplication and old postal officials insist "Magnolia" is one of the big headaches. The index disclosed," Brown said.

There are Magnolia Drives, Avenues, Lanes, and Squares. Magnolia streets can be found from Altamonte Springs to Christmas, from Longwood to Sanford.

Other street names that are common in the county is Sanford Ave., or St., which appears 25 times in the index; Seminole Blvd., which is in the index 15 times; Lake Ave., Drive or Blvd., which appears 26 times; Oak Palm and Palmerton Aves., which appear more than 26 times.

"That we plan to do when we finish compiling all the data is eventually change many of the names, substituting names that are not so common as these," Brown said.

The zoning director added that no changes will be made without first discussing the problems with residents of the areas and with the board of county commissioners which has the final word.

Another problem Brown faces is that there are many streets and areas that have been known throughout the county by "popular" names and not by their proper names.

Brown said he will work close with county postmasters in recommending name changes and also with postmasters from Orange County who are concerned with postal routes in Seminole.

"This has been a serious problem for the postal service for a long time and we hope to correct this in the not too distant future," Brown emphasized.

Work on the index is almost complete and more than 100 pages of street names have been listed.
