The mercury plunged to the zero mark in the Great Plains his morning and the weatherman posted coid wave warnings for Iowa, Missouri, Oklahoma and portions of Kansas and Nebraska. Readings below zero were regis-tered in North Dakota and Minne-sota. The icebox of the country was Grand Forks, N. D., with 12 degrees below zero. The cold wave added to the miseries of winter - weary resi-dents of the Great Plains and Midwest states trying to clean up mountainous drifts left by the deadly storm.
