

Sensation Caused By Graft Charge In Mussolini Politics

ROME, Aug. 6- (INS)- A ROME, Aug. 6.— (INS)—A nation wide sensation was caused today by the political eclipse of former Mayor Ernesto Belloni, of Milan, former financial adviser of the Italian government and a leading member of the Fascist party. Although Belloni was exonerated of grave charges made in connection with the alleged disappearance of a portion of a loan of \$10,006,000 obtained by the municipality of Milan from a New York bank two years ago, he was York bank two years ago, he was ousted from the Fascist party and will not be allowed to hold public

An investigating committee had been sifting charges against Belloni for some weeks. After that findings were published, Premier Mussolini deplored the whole affair, especially the publicity and the "ammunition" it gave to foea of the Fascist party and the Fascist regime in Italy. Belloni was exonerated of the charge of sequestrating any part of the loan. Mention was made, however, of the fact that his personal fortune had increased during his tenure as mayor of Milan.




