A Hero For A Day

When Harry Manning, hero of the rescue last winter of the crew of the S. S. Florida, arrived in New York, he was hailed like a Roman gladiator after a victory. Nothing was too good for the brave seaman who risked his life in the middle of the Atlantic. Picture the marine pageant up the Hudson River where every ferry boat and dinghy in the harbor had collected to pay homage; recall the ceremonies at the dock, speech-making and all that; remember the triumphal march up Broadway as spoils of ticker tape were unrolled as a gesture of civic appreciativeness of heroism and, finally, recollect Jimmy Walker's reception at City Hall when he gave Officer Manning the keys to the city.

Commendable indeed was the ovation if it expressed a sincere appreciation for gallantry. Acts of bravery at sea lend themselves particularly to the stimulation of public emotion and ordinarily the sincerity of New York's populace would not have been doubted in this case unless subsequent events had not taken place. Let us see how Long America's metropolis remembers its distinguished and honored guests.

Recently the same hero Manning appeared in a New York City court to testify that a friend, arrested for speeding, had been hurrying him to the hospital. Strangely enough, the friend was fined and Mr. Manning remarked: "Five months ago Mayor Walker gave me the keys to the city. But I guess they are so good here." Quick to honor heroes and quick to forget them seems to be New York's code. And this appears to be due to the emphasis placed by the inhabitants upon the arrival of all personages who are in the spotlight, probably because it affords a holiday occasion for thousands of employees to participate in the ovation.

But at all events, the fickleness of public opinion in regard to heroes is clearly shown in the case of Harry Manning. It is well, when celebrations are being held for distinguished people to remember that the sham will soon be gone and that the idols will become real again.

Co-Operation

Here in Sanford where the preponderance of agriculture interests prevails, any expression of opinion upon co-operative marketing is of interest. Upon this subject the Tallahassee Daily Democrat writes as follows:

"Whatever else may be said for the recent farm relief measure it has certainly stimulated the organization of co-operative marketing associations, which bids fair to be of considerable value. Whether or not such organizations get the help they expect under the terms of the new law, they will be able to accomplish a great deal of good."

The stimulus is seen in a number of instances in Florida recently, one of which, the naval stores operators' prospective co-operative, in the vicinity of Tallahassee.

"Collective marketing has been proved decidedly successful wherever it has been given real support by given groups. Much has been said of the raisin growers association in California, perhaps the first co-operative which was a distinct success. Not only do such organizations hold prices high enough to be remunerative for producers but they do much to prevent waste of products."

"Incidentally, despite the usually higher price secured for producers, it is exceedingly doubtful if the ultimate consumers pay any more for products marketed through such organizations as they would if the goods were sold by the individuals. Much lost motion has been taken up, storage and transportation charges have been greatly reduced, lessening the most of handling between the producer and the ultimate consumer."

"Co-operatives also are in a position to seek out new markets, or to create markets in many instances, and thus provide for the profitable expansion of an industry whose products it handles."

"Looked at from any angle co-operatives, properly conducted of course and most of them are, not only are good things for the members but are of distinct benefit to the community at large, including the ultimate consumer class. If they get assistance from the new farm board, well and good. But even if they are unable to do that, if they persist in the co-operative marketing plan, it will accomplish a great deal of good. The stimulus, therefore, of the new bill is worth while for that reason, if for no other."

FIFTY-THREE YEARS IN PRISON

In the year that Abraham Lincoln conducted his campaign for the presidency after having received his first nomination, into a home known as that of the Putnam family in Massachusetts was born a boy child. The 17-year-old boy had attained the allotted age of three score and ten years in the Charleston penitentiary. Not only had he been in prison for 53 years but he had been in solitary confinement. Then they took him out of that confinement, out of that imprisonment, and placed him on the penitentiary farm.

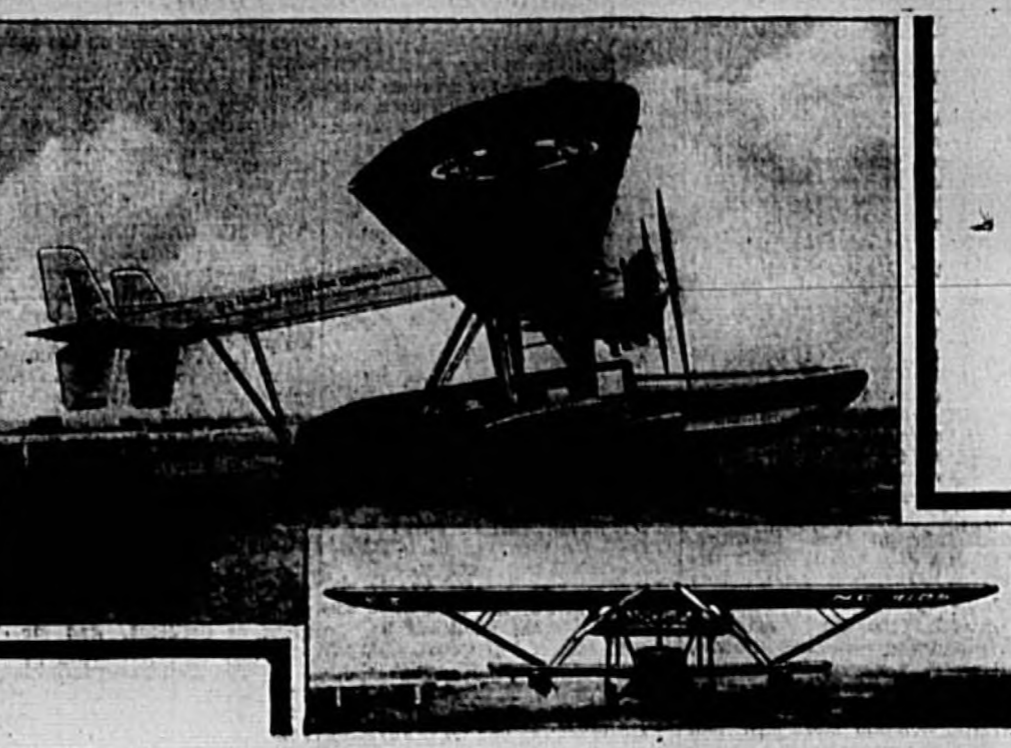
