Airport, environmentalists balance interests

SANFORD — If the board of directors of the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) approves it next month, construction could begin on a new runway and hangar at the Orlando-Sanford Airport.

Environmentalists, however, are not happy with the destruction of wetlands that will occur as a result.

According to Rod Pakzadian, an engineer for the water management district, he and biologist Tony Miller have reviewed the plans and believe everything is "in order" for the permitting.

"The staff has reviewed it and it looks good," said Pakzadian.

Sam Kendall, a member of the Audubon Con-

servation Team, said the construction would affect the water quality, the wildlife habitats and the quality of life of those living in the area.

The wetlands, he contends, protect the biodiversity of the area and the preservation of those lands will reduce the threats of flooding in the area.

In addition, Kendall said, the airport authority has already displaced an eagle which had

been proposed.

"That was done for safety reasons, it was ordered by the FAA," said Miller.

The biologist noted that 3.9 acres of "good quality" wetlands will be filled for the runway itself. 4.6 additional acres will be taken for a "clear zone" that will be needed so the tower will

'Most Wanted' captured in county

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Ramon Torres had hoped to put his past behind him, but it caught up with him.

The 28-year-old New Yorker has been working in Altamonte Springs prior to his arrest on Thursday.

He had come to Florida from Rochester where he was wanted in connection with the November 1996 firebombing of an occupied apartment complex.

According to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Torres is "one of New York State's Most Wanted fugitives."

There were no deaths, but

Sanford will give free cemetery plot to veterans in need

SANFORD — The city will continue offering free burial plots for veterans, but only based on need. The decision was made Tuesday during a meeting of the Sanford City Commission.

The matter came up during discussion of a proposal for cemetery expansion. The Cemetery Advisory Committee had suggested the city develop land known as the Crawford property, which would provide the city with an additional 1,840 spaces. The city reportedly has room for only 200 regular spaces on present property, which are expected to be sold within the next two years.

For many years the city has been offering free burial plots for veterans. City Manager Bill Simmons reported the demand for the free plots was lower than one might expect. There were 9 inquiries from Sanford

residents in 1993, 10 in 1994, 12 in 1995, 6 in 1996 and only 2 in 1997. He added that the offer has been made to spouses of veterans as well.

The Cemetery Advisory Committee (CAC) had suggested discontinuing the free space offers for veterans, considering the free service is now provided at a veterans cemetery in Bushnell.

Commission members however, disagreed with the CAC recommendations. "I think it would be a disservice to our veterans if we discontinued this service," said Commissioner Velma Williams.

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein suggested the city should provide the plots for veterans,

"but only in cases where they could provide proof of a low income."

"I'm all for it," said Commissioner Brady Leppard, "whether there is a financial need or not

SEMINOLE COUNTY — Graduating high school seniors often undertake pranks during their final days of school. Apparently James W. Lickteig, 18, a senior at Lake Howell High School wanted to express his joy at graduation this week. His prank however, backfired.

Lickteig was arrested by Seminole County Sheriff's deputies shortly after midnight last week. The arrest came as the result of an alarm system setting off at Lake Howell High School indicating an intruder at the school property.

When deputies arrived they reported seeing a person on the roof of the school. Assistance was obtained from Casselberry Police who provided a K-9 unit and the air unit helicopter, Alert-2.

With an infra-red camera, officers in Alert-2 were able to spot the subject on the roof and, with a loudspeaker, ordered the subject to surrender. The person refused to acknowledge the officers however, and was seen lying in the fetal position in an attempt to conceal himself.

Following the refusal to obey the officers' commands, deputies found it necessary to use a bucket/ladder truck from Seminole County Fire Rescue, to gain entry. The subject, identified as Lickteig, was apprehended immediately.

Upon investigation, it was determined that the 18-year old was a senior at Lake Howell High School, and had report-



Workshop for educators offers tuition waiver

Zero tolerance: More teens arrested

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Nine additional arrests were made Wednesday night as part of the "zero tolerance" policy that the Seminole County Sheriff's Office has adopted.

At approximately 11 p.m., deputies with the Sheriff's Office arrested 8 youths for possession of alcohol by person

under the age of 21. One was arrested for violating his community control. The arrests were made at Shad Lane in Geneva.

Earlier Wednesday, deputies arrested 48 teen-agers at two Altamonte Springs hotels that were having post-graduation parties. The majority were arrested for alcohol possession

and approximately 9 were arrested for marijuana possession. One teen at the Geneva party received the additional charge of escaping.

Li Jack Cash, public information officer for the Sheriff's Office, said that some of the teen-agers commented that parties and underage drinking have been done since "time immortal." "It is a tradition that is long overdue to be stopped," said Cash.

The Sheriff's Office has said

that "zero tolerance," a new philosophy to curb the alcohol and drug abuse by teen-agers, is not a one time thing. Last Friday, 17 arrests were made at a checkpoint. And Cash said that there is another checkpoint scheduled tonight on the east side of Sanford. "Zero tolerance means zero tolerance," said Sheriff Don Ealinger at a press conference last week.

"If we can save one life, then it is worth it," said Cash.

a need, the burial plot should be offered by the city.

Mayor Larry Dale said he believed individual families should handle their own needs for veterans. "I don't think we should put the burden of paying for a burial plot on the taxpayers."

Commissioner Kerry Lyons said he agreed with Eckstein that they should be provided free of charge, but only in cases where there is a financial need for assistance.

Eventually, City Manager Bill Simmons said he believed the discussion resulted in a consensus vote that the city should continue providing the free spaces for veterans, but only on a special hardship situation. "We'll discontinue offering the spaces on a blanket basis," he added.

Regarding the proposed development of the Crawford property, questions arose regarding the amount of money which might be required to turn the land into a suitable cemetery area. While it was said that the Crawford property had been purchased by the city for use in cemetery expansion, research is to be done on the costs of the project, to be brought back for further commission discussion.

Parks and Recreation Director Mike Kirby is also to investigate costs for cemetery plots in other cities which own cemeteries, and report back to the commission. It was suggested that perhaps the costs in Sanford are lower than average and might be increased in order to continue financing perpetual maintenance.

Li Jack Cash, public information officer for the Seminole County Sheriff's office said that Torres is currently an inmate at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility. He did not know when, or if, Torres would be returned to New York.

According to Nikki Fynney of FDLE, the U.S. Marshal Service received a tip 3 weeks ago that Torres was living in Altamonte Springs. Marshals worked with the Sheriff's Office to make the arrest.

"He has been living and working here for some time," she said. "I don't know how long."

He was the last suspect to be arrested in connection with the firebombing.

be able to see the airplanes on the runway. In addition, 1.3 acres of "low quality" land will be converted to a retention pond.

The airport authority has agreed to purchase 42.5 "mitigation credits" to compensate for the land they intend to use for the runway project.

The credits, purchased at \$18,000 each, will be used to purchase, improve and preserve wetlands in the Lake Harney area.

Kendall said he wanted the SJRWMD to be sure there is not a "net loss of wetlands."

Falkzadian and Miller believe there will be a "fair trade" of lands after the credits are implemented.

"There were additional credits purchased to compensate for the removal of the eagle's habitat," Miller explained.

The June 9 meeting of the SJRWMD board in Palatka will include a public hearing on the matter of the Orlando-Sanford Airport runway. Those who want to comment will have only that chance to address the board, unless they do so in writing.

Letters on the subject may be addressed to the board. These must be received by the board no later than June 3.

If the board approved the application, the permit to do the work will be issued at that time.

Florida cracks down on smuggled fruit, vegetables

TALLAHASSEE-Smuggled fruits and vegetables from foreign countries are entering Florida and endangering the state's \$6.1 billion farm crop because of pests and diseases associated with them, Florida Agriculture Commissioner Bob Crawford announced this week.

Some of the commodities, such as most citrus products from Asia, are banned outright from entering the United States. Others, including a large number of tropical fruits from Central and South America, are only allowed to enter the country if they have undergone special treatment, such as fumigation or hot water treatment.

During the past two weeks, officials in Crawford's office and their counterparts with the U.S. Department of Agriculture have established the Florida Inspection-Smuggling Team (FIST) and conducted sweeps of specialty food stores in Miami, Tampa and Orlando.

They have confiscated dozens of items, including pack-

ages of Dried Mandarin Peel and Dried Pomeelo Peel from Hong Kong, Dried Red Pepper from China and Kaffir Lime Leaves from Thailand.

In addition, inspectors have seized papayas from Costa Rica, avocados believed to be from Mexico, and star fruit from an as of yet undetermined country.

The creation of the anti-smuggling team and subsequent sweep were prompted by the discovery at a Miami market earlier this year of a bag of dried lime leaves infested with citrus canker. The product had come from Thailand.

"The concerns with these types of products is that we have no quality control, and it only takes one bag not treated properly during packaging to pose a threat to Florida agriculture," said Crawford, noting that his Department currently is fighting outbreaks of both citrus canker and Mediterranean fruit fly in Miami.

Last summer, the Department successfully eliminated the largest blight infestation to hit Florida in decades. It began in Tampa and spread to

four other countries.

The anti-smuggling team will continue to visit markets throughout the state, but it is concentrating on how, where and by whom the illegal products are entering the country and being distributed to stores in Florida.

Crawford said the discovery of such products on store shelves underscores the need for the establishment of an emergency eradication fund by the Florida Legislature this spring. Crawford has called for the creation of such a trust fund to be paid for by unclaimed gasoline tax refunds owed to farmers and matching funds from the state. It would amount to some \$12 million a year.

During the last 10 years, Florida has spent an estimated \$180 million to eradicate plant pests and diseases, such as citrus canker and citrus greening. As a result of these two plagues, the citrus industry in Florida, the economic lifeblood of the state, has been severely damaged. Infested fruits or vegetables bring into the state.





25-year-old Geneva church gets a new name and a new format

GENEVA - The First Church of the Nazarene in Geneva will soon become The Living Word Church of the Nazarene. The church board voted to make the change based on the Bible verse of Hebrews 4:12 which says, "For whatever God says to us is full of living power; it is sharper than the sharpest dagger, cutting swift and deep into our innermost thoughts and desires with all their parts, exposing us for what we really are." (Living Bible version)

"We want to take our church into the 21st century by placing emphasis on the Bible, not on man's doctrine or political ideas," said Pastor Bill Baumer, who has been ministering at the church for the past year and a half. "We want people to take God's Word seriously and apply it to their lives because we believe that the solution to every problem we face is found within its pages."

The Living Word Church of the Nazarene sits on 9 acres of land, and is located on Hwy. 48 in Geneva. They sponsor a youth program called "Big House", which meets every Saturday night for Am. food, and an informal Bible study. It is open to any teen in the community, and has several teens

participating from other area churches. They also have a Young Couples meeting twice a month, which visits area restaurants and incorporates devotionals into the evening out.

Sunday worship services start at 10:45 a.m., and Wednesday night Christian Growth Class starts at 7:30 p.m., emphasizing studies on strengthening faith and character.

They will also soon be launching their Personal Involvement Ministry outreach program, in which the members of the congregation will get personally involved in their community by hosting dinners and assisting the less fortunate in various projects. "We want our church members to share their faith, but we also want them to go beyond that into practical forms of ministry, actually helping others who need it", Pastor Baumer stated. "Our church motto is: 'A positive place to grow' and we welcome anyone who would like to become involved, regardless of

When it's time to paint your home

The Reason to Paint. Peeling is rarely caused by bad paint. The same paint that peels in some spots will stick tenaciously for 40 to 50 years in other spots. Latex paints are the industry standard for most exterior house painting and they continue to improve. Long-term testing has shown that 100 percent acrylic latex lasts longest. Still, some pros still like oil-based paints because they carry a slightly better sheen and brush out more smoothly.

Finally, a caution. Scraping and sanding paint that contains lead can release hazardous lead dust. If your home was built before 1979 lead in paint was banned in 1978, contact your local health department for detection and safe handling instructions.

The secret to paint longevity is to inspect and repair peeling areas annually. Annual maintenance stops localized peeling and keeps it from spreading. The cost of whole-house repainting will be lower when that time comes, because you've kept the exterior in good condition. It won't require much prep time. The paint that's in good condition on your home will last longer, because with longer painting cycles it won't build up as fast.

Stopping Moisture. Wet wood causes paint to peel.

Moisture from high humidity or rain works its way into wood and causes the fibers to swell. The expanding fibers stretch the paint film until it cracks. Once the film is cracked, more water from rain and lawn sprinklers readily seeps through it, soaks the wood and breaks the paint bond.

Wood joints at windows and door sills are particularly susceptible. Water sits in the corners, is slow to dry and eventually breaks through the paint barrier. The end grain of window and door frames, once exposed, sucks up water like a sponge, swells and further cracks the paint. Peeling at wood joints could largely be prevented by sealing the end grain with primer. Or, the second best solution is to rely on flexible caulk to seal joints.

Sills and other horizontal surfaces peel because water runoff is slow and in the meantime can work its way through

any crack in the paint. Heat from sunlight also drives the moisture into the wood.

When paint begins to peel off your sills, one likely culprit is a clogged or leaky gutter. The best prevention is to clean your gutters frequently.

Rain often soaks siding boards and trim near the ground. Maintain your gutters, keep bushes trimmed back from the house to promote drying and fix peeling areas as soon as they appear.

Spot peeling can also occur as a result of condensation from the inside. Usually the cause is high humidity in a room like a bathroom coupled with air leaks through the wall or the absence of a vapor barrier. Look for paint that peels around only one window or that peels from siding in a pattern that outlines a single room. The problem can usually be solved by running a ventilating fan regularly, plugging air leaks around windows with caulk and repainting interior walls.

Most Common Causes of Paint Not Sticking

1. Skipping the cleaning step, so that dirt, mildew and caulking cause poor adhesion.
2. Painting in temperatures below 50 degrees F.
3. Rushing curing times. Humidity or cool conditions

can lengthen them.

4. Painting wet wood. Wait until the wood looks and feels dry.

5. Using spray equipment without back-brushing. Most pros use spray equipment for speed. But, sprayers can't ensure a good bond, so a second painter should always follow closely behind the sprayer to brush the paint into the surface. You also need a back-brush if you are painting with a roller.

6. Unexpected hazards, such as insects, automatic lawn sprinkler systems, direct hot sunlight, high winds and other local conditions can suddenly pop up and ruin a nice job.

7. Choosing the wrong paint. Generally on the exterior, you can safely cover oil paint with latex, but not vice versa. In addition, stick with the same brand of primers and topcoats aren't compatible.

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

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
