

President Seeks Unfairness Is Tax On Sugar To Charge Hurdled Regulate Prices In Court Fight

Believes Plan Would Not Increase Cost To Average User Both Sides Accuse Opponents Of Using Untruthful Tales

WASHINGTON, Mar. 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt proposed to Congress yesterday the enactment of a sugar quota system financed by a tax on raw sugar.

The tax, the President said in a special message, should be set at less than three fourths of one cent a pound on sugar, raw value.

Income from the tax, estimated at \$100,000,000 annually, would be used to pay the cost of the sugar program, which the President proposed.

"I am definitely advised," Mr. Roosevelt said, "that such a tax would not increase the average cost of sugar to consumers."

Mr. Roosevelt recommended that a new control system be evolved by the Federal Reserve Board, which would be made for preventing child labor and establishing a minimum wage standard.

The Jones-Costigan Act, which expired last December, but was extended in principle through this year, authorizes the secretary of Agriculture to allot the estimated annual sugar consumption of the country among beet and cane domestic producers and such "off-shore" producers as those in Hawaii, the Philippines, and similar territories.

The act originally became law by an amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act. Certain provisions, principally that imposing a processing tax, became inoperative when the AAA was ruled unconstitutional and benefit payments to producers ceased.

The President said the excise tax would amount to "approximately one hundred million dollars per annum to the Treasury of the United States, which would make the total revenue from sugar more nearly commensurate with that obtained during the period 1922-1929."

"Quota," the President said, "influences the price of sugar through the control of supply; consequently, under a quota regulation of the supply of sugar, a tax may be levied without causing any adverse effect, over a period of time, on the price paid to consumers."

The President asked special safeguards, in any legislation, for the rights of small producers to have them "an equitable share of the benefits offered by the program."

This recommendation was made in its report on the investigation of the nation's food industries.

"In a study of handlers, manufacturers and processors of agricultural products, the Commission has observed the existence in various industries of a high degree of monopolistic control which, in some cases, has been derived by methods contrary to letter or spirit of law."

Rock troops, tanks and heavy artillery were thrown into the action in an assault at two points on strong Government fortifications in front of the highway.

Fighting continued three weeks on the Jarama front, where insurgents sought complete encirclement of Madrid and to sever an important communications line.

The insurgent command at Naval Carnero estimated 3,000 Government soldiers had been killed in Jarama fighting and said Madrid's hospitals housed at least 11,000 wounded.

C. C. Collins, head consul, said the drive is staged to honor the anniversary of President Dr. E. Bradshaw as an officer in the organization.

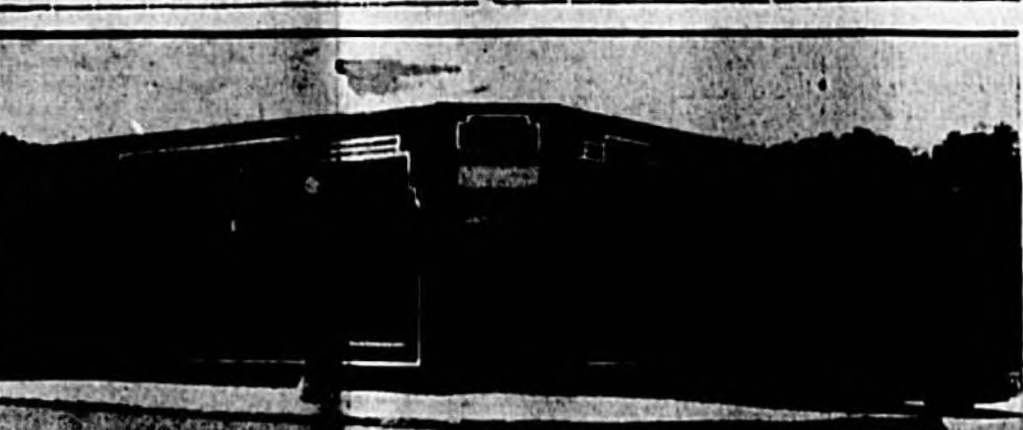
In March of 1936, Mr. Collins said, 24,000 members were added, 400 of these being Floridians. The state at present boasts 10,000 Woodmen, he reported.

County Pensions To Cost \$5,000, Estimates Show

Seven Millions Will Be Distributed By State Welfare Unit

This sum covers the County's share of the pensions for three months. Similar amounts are authorized quarterly.

In a State Board of Social Welfare Bulletin received today by Mrs. J. V. Ridge, County social welfare director, it was estimated that the total cost for aid to the aged, blind and mothers with dependent children will run \$6,922,500 in Florida.

The State will contribute \$1,710,000. The Federal Government will donate \$2,999,000. This fund will be distributed to 21,000 persons, of which about 70 are in Seminole County.

Mrs. Ridge said the State Department reported there are 23,700 dependent children in Florida who will receive \$2,244,000; 1,200 blind are to get \$210,000; aged persons will take \$3,780,000.

Stabilization Of Poultry Market Sought Locally

Poultrymen To Make Effort To Halt Downward Prices

All poultrymen in Seminole County and those in neighboring counties supplying poultry products to Sanford markets were invited today to assemble at Seminole High School tomorrow night at 8 o'clock to discuss plans for a poultrymen's association.

Alex R. Johnson, vocational agriculture instructor at the school, said the meet is sponsored by the local chapter of Future Farmers of America and is designed to seek a stabilization of prices.

Mr. Johnson pointed out that the present continual drop in prices of eggs is looked upon as a "crisis to the poultry industry," and that immediate steps must be taken to halt the plunge.

He especially urged that the small-volume producer attend the session Thursday night, explaining that it is this class in the industry which tends to lower prices.

Mr. Johnson said that five or six large producers supplying the entire market could easily agree on a standard price, thereby creating a stabilized price range. On the other hand, he said, it is more difficult because of numerical volume to effect an agreement among 100 smaller producers who in the long run supply the major markets.

It was estimated that there are more than 150 producers of poultry products in this County.

The Territorial Sons and Daughters also issued the following abbreviated historical facts about the State:

Florida discovered by Ponce de Leon in 1513; St. Augustine settled in 1565; State purchased by U. S. from Spain in 1819 for \$5,000,000; Andrew Jackson, first military governor in 1822; first territorial governor, William Duval, 1822 to 1834, first State governor, William D. Moseley, 1845 to 1849; and the second was William K. Cole.

Florida seceded from the Union in 1861 and was readmitted in 1868; State has four constitutions—1845, 1865, 1868 and 1885.

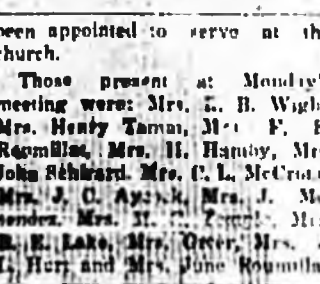

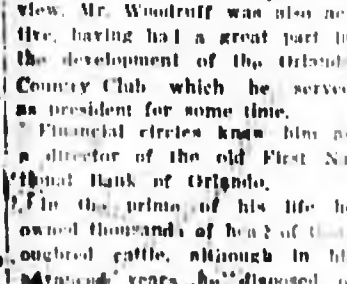
Much credit for Orlando's natural beautification program is due to have been laid at Mr. Woodruff's door.

Wallace Warns Of Barren Land; Is Huger Omen

Agricultural Chief Says Stomach To Feel Effect Soon

ST. LOUIS, Mar. 3.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace told the North American Wildlife Conference yesterday that "barren landscapes" are beginning to warn us of the widespread disaster that will follow if we continue the wasteful, careless and unprofitable exploitation of our land and its resources.

In an interview before the conference opened, J. M. "Ding" Darling, former chief of the U. S. Biological Survey and temporary chairman of the General Wildlife Federation, said destruction of natural waterways and forests is making the United States in a "biological desert."

"In a short time we'll begin to feel it in our stomachs," the famous orator added, "and empty stomachs are a greater menace to America than sit-down strikes."

Wallace declared the problem was one of land utilization, asserting, "The conditions which favor wildlife and promote wilderness areas are identical with those that alleviate the effects of drought, provide flood control, prevent soil erosion and provide for the preservation of our fertile soil."

"The land utilization program," the secretary continued, "is, in fact, based on the fundamental principle that in the United States there is enough land to meet generously every national need and every requirement of agriculture, industry and recreation."

Darling, asserting "water should be as productive, here for here, as long as it is," said, "Our lakes and streams, even our coastal waters along both the Atlantic and the Pacific, now are largely sterile."

He said lack of food for fish in the marine waters annually kills more of the fishy tribes than are produced by hatcheries.

The World of Stamps

By QUINTON JAMES

Velasquez, the great Spanish painter, and Isabella, the queen who backed Columbus on his voyage of discovery, are pictured on two new stamps from the government presses at Madrid.

The portrait of the artist and his autograph (Diego de Silva Velasquez) decorate a 50-centavo stamp printed in blue. The queen's head appears on a 30-cent stamp.

Born in Seville, Velasquez (1599-1660) became attached to the court of Philip IV. He painted religious, historical and court subjects and is considered the head of the Spanish school of painting. Today his pictures are treasured in famous galleries of Europe and the United States. He helped lay the foundations of modern painting.

Isabella the Catholic (1451-1504) was queen of Castile and Leon. She was known for her clear intellect, resolute energy and unselfish patriotism. And her character exerted a great moral influence over the Castilian court which had been pretty had until she came. She was very pious and had strong religious convictions.

But her greatest claim to fame is that she listened to Columbus' plans and financed his adventurous voyages, offering to pawn her jewels if the treasury funds fell short.

Many overprints on current issues have also been coming out of Spain.

A young London collector walked into a North London post office to buy a 2 1/2-penny stamp of the George V Jubilee design. He thought the color—normally

ultramarine—seemed to be an off-shade, so he bought the entire sheet and others of the same hue for about \$25.

Thereupon, so the story goes, he sold the lot to a syndicate for \$85 apiece, making a net profit of about \$7,500. Since then the price of this variety has risen considerably. In a recent Bond street sale it was quoted at \$250.

The only U. S. letter sheet listed in the catalog until this year was the Scott Grant issue of 1894. Now another has been recognized and added.

It was printed in 1861 and bears the 5-cent Washington head impression of the type then used on envelopes. The stamp's color is pink and the sheet is of blue paper in both letter and note paper size. First issued in August, 1861, this letter sheet was withdrawn in April, 1864.

The Windmill of Dybbol, one of Denmark's famed landmarks, supplies the design for a charity issue from that country. The national flag appears in the background, and the only inscriptions are "Denmark" and "Dybbol Mole."

Revised baseball rules. The playing rules of the game, as chosen by the professional clubs of the country, comprise seven volumes which include 82 sections. In all games of a series of the ball shall be furnished by the visiting club, but when single games only are played, the ball shall be furnished by the home club and, in all cases it shall become the property of the winning club as a trophy of victory. Bases must be set on each corner of a square, whose sides are respectively 90 yards. A ball delivered and sent over home plate at the height called for by the batsman, shall be considered a fair ball or strike. All balls delivered which are not sent over home plate at the preceding height are called unfair balls and every ball delivered which is delivered must be called and when three balls have been called, the pitcher shall call "three strikes" and the batsman shall be delivered to receive the ball or low. Poul balls caught or held after touching the ground but once place the batsman out. As we haven't gone daily all of a sudden. 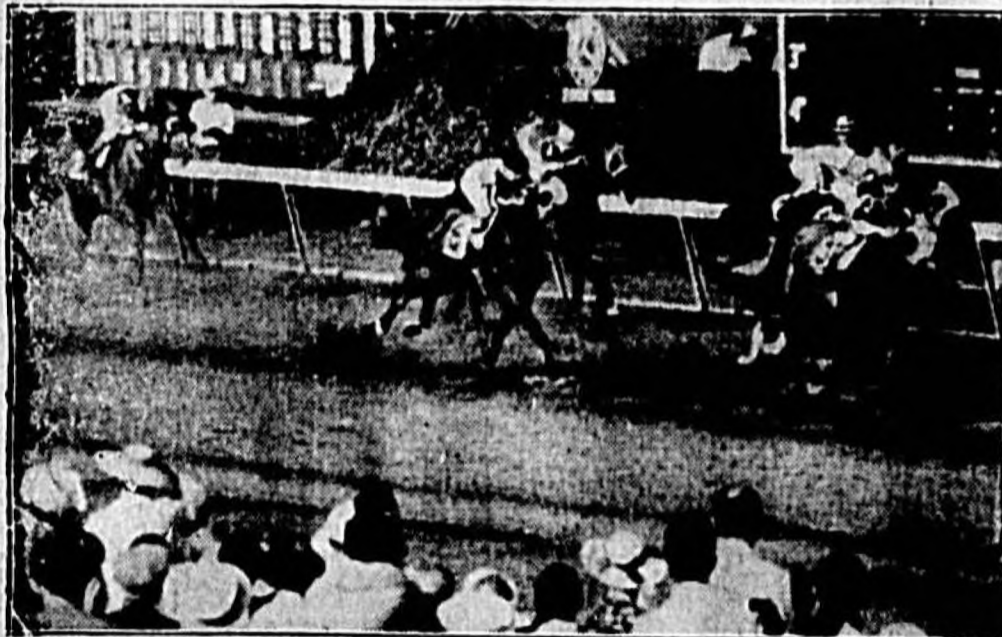
