## Two victims in shooting identified

SANFORD - The investigation continues in to a double shooting that took place early Monday morning as Semmole County sheaff's deputies try to make sense of the few available clues

The shooting occurred shortly after midnight in a rural part of the county just east of the Winter Springs city limits off el State Road 434

According to Ed McDonough, public information officer for the Seminole County sheriff's office. Luts Albert Guzman and his sister Evelyn-Guzman, were in their south Seminole County home when as many as five Hispanic men broke into the home and forced them into their car-

After driving a short distance to a secluded area on Railroad Avenue, the two were forced into the trunk of their Honda Accord and shot several Times

Lius Guzman, 25, was killed, but Evelyp, 29. was only wounded.

After the assailants drove away in another vehicle, she was able to clumb out of the trunk. McDonough said, and walk a half mile or so to a Mobil gas station at the intersection of State Road 434 and Tuskawilla Road to telephone for help.

According to reports, the Winter Springs Police Department arrived and determined the meident had occurred outside their purisdiction and sheriff's deputies were called.

Before being taken to Orlando Regional Medical Center for treatment of her wounds. Guzman was able to direct the leputies to the location where See Shooting, Page 5A

#### Money allegedly laundered

FORT LAUDERDALE - Four members of an alleged organized crime group were accused of laundering more than \$1.1 million in drug proceeds through three adult entertainment clubs and a gas station.

The four men face racketeering charges in a 14-count indictment returned Monday by a federal grand jury in Fort Lauderdale.

According to the indictment, an eight-month investigation focused on the criminal activities of the New York-based Colombo organized crime family of the La Cosa Nostra in South Florida.

The indictment named Thomas Farese, 53, of Jupiter, a "capo," one of the highest rankings given to an individual who supervises and controls a group known as a "crew." The other defendants were Frank Derosa, 68, of Fort Lauderdale, William Cresta, 61, of Lauderdale-by-the-Sea, and Ido Fumero, 39, of

#### Topping with freon may soon be legal

TALLAHASSEE - Florida motorists may no longer face a costly requirement to have auto air conditioner leaks fixed before a mechanic can top the system with Freon.

The state's Environmental Regulation Commission is expected to lift the requirement Wednesday and bring the state in line with most of the nation.

"This looks like backsliding." said Stephen Humphrey, a commission member also slated to be dean of the University of Florida's proposed environmental college. "But it's not going to be consequential to the environment.'

The benefits of the leak-fix requirement were small compared to the effect of a Jan. 1 ban on manufacturing or importing Freon, he said.

Freon is being phased out as part of an international effort to save the ozone layer, which shields Earth from harmful radiation. The federal government has approved several substitute refrigerants.

#### Baby rats don't do well in space

CAPE CANAVERAL - Oh, rats.

Preliminary analysis of a biology experiment involving rats on board space shuttle Endeavour shows that grown rodents survive well in space, while babies don't.

'We've never flown rats at that (young) age," said Dr. Bill Heetderks, who specializes in biomedical engineering at the National Institutes of Health and served as one of the team leaders for the experiment.

The six adult rats returned in good condition Saturday, but there were deaths among groups of rats born four, seven and 14 days before Endeavour's launch on a nine-day science mission Jan. 11.

Because all 10 in one group of four-day old baby rats died. physicians at first thought they had been rejected by their

"The current thinking, the early theory is that they were not able to hang onto the nipples" in weightlessness, Dr. Heetderks said Monday.

## Failed talks scuttle Egyptian show; good friendship is able to save it

ST. PETERSBURG - The artifacts were crated in Cairo, Egypt, and ready for shipping. In Florida, museum officials renovated a dozen galleries, ordered display cases and prepared labels detailing the "Splendors of Ancient Egypt.

But neither side signed a final

And ultimately, negotiations broke down between the Egyptian government and the Florida International Museum, leaving the museum scrambling for another exhibit and both sides pointing fingers for the collapse in discussions.

"I would be the first person to tell you that I do not understand 10 for a six-month run.

the Middle Eastern, Arab, Islamic mind," Florida International Museum executive director James Broughton said Monday, as he detailed the failed negotiations that began last February and cost the fledgling museum at least \$300,000.

"Frankly, I have not just lost an exhibition from there, but (lost) a place that I consider a second country for me. There have been some very strained relationships with some very, very dear longtime friends over this. That hurts as much as anything.

a display of 72 Egyptian treasures from the Egyptian Museum in Cairo, was slated to open in St. Petersburg on Jan.

It was promoted as a grand follow-up to the museum's 1995 inaugural show, "Treasures of the Czars," a display of artworks associated with the Romanov dynasty (1613-1917) that drew more than a half-million visitors

to this Gulf Coast city. But one week before the Egyptian exhibit was slated to open, officials there officially put it on indefinite hold. For starters. they said, several members of the Egyptian cabinet were dismissed that week, including the Minister of Culture, who was working with the St. Petersburg museum.

"Splendors of Ancient Egypt," Also, a noted Egyptologist. Nemat Fuad, filed a court case in Egypt trying to scuttle the display. He claimed such tours can harm the priceless anti-

quities by exposing them is inadequate security and in-

surance. But the negotiations actually had begun breaking down months before, and the biggest sticking points were money and

exposure, Broughton said. All Hassan, head of the Pharaonic Department at the Higher Council of Antiquities, told The Associated Press in Cairo that Florida officials were the ones responsible.

He said they initially had agreed to a five-state tour that would bring \$10 million to the country. Later, he said, that was changed to just Florida, prompting a dispute in Egypt on whether it was worth sending the exhibit overseas for only \$2 million.

### Repeal of law makes it easier for seniors-only parks

for the elderly to form seniorsonly mobile home parks or preserve existing parks. But some experts say such action could prompt a barrage of discrimination lawsuits from people who are denied accommoda-

The repeal of a number of regulations in the 1988 Federal Housing Act was sweet music to retirees at Lantana Cascades mobile home park and thousands like it nationwide.

Before President Clinton signed the repeals late last year,

LANTANA - It's now easier mobile homes had 59 pages of federal regulations to satisfy to keep their seniors-only communitles.

> They had to hire a full-time nurse, fix hand railings on walkways, erect clubhouses or pay someone to read to the elderly. Or they had to open their doors to families with children and undestrables

Seniors protested that the regulations added to their housing costs. About 50 retirees at Lantana Cascades joined 3.000 other mobile home owners

in Tampa last August in a protest.

A year-and-a-half later, Clinton repealed the regulations.

"When Clinton signed that bill, he basically saved the retirement communities in the United States," said Charity Cicardo, executive director of the Tallahassee-based Federation of Mobile Home Owners of Florida.

But the repeal could have an unintended effect: People who can't get into seniors-only communities may fight their

battles in court. Experts say it's too early to tell just what impact the retooled law will have on housing practices nationwide.

"Losers in this may be families with children, but call me in six months," said Clarence Ellington, director of Palm Beach County's Office of Equal Opportunity.

Up to 75 discrimination lawsuits have been filed against adult communities, said Morris Gray, director of fair housing enforcement for the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development in Atlanta.



### Campaigning strategy

The State of Florida Commission on Ethics meets this Thursday in Tallahassee. It is scheduled to hear eight complaints which have been filed against elected officials or department heads at various government levels.

One, from the Orlando area, involves a legislator receiving skybox tickets for a basketball playoff game from a county commission chairman. One, filed in Tallahassee, regards a lobbyist providing a city commissioner with a ticket to a charitable dinner.

The other charges regard nepotism in government jobs, and unreported conflicts of interest in dealing with government matters.

None of the charges of violation of ethics or professional standards has come from the local area. We hope none will.

However, even though local elections won't begin until September, and official qualifying time is still months off, we see indications that there will be many charges and counter-charges filed between candidates before this is over in November.

As has been said in these Editorial comments in the past, we believe people seeking office, whether new candidates or those up for re-election, should campaign on their own merits. Yet, through the years, we have seen candidates spending all of their time and energy in degrading their opponents.

Naturally, there has to be some of this in order for a candidate to make a comparison with his or her opponent. But the aim should not be merely to report on what a candidate believes the opponent may have done wrong. but what this candidate would do to make it

This isn't anything new. Even in the Lincoln/Douglas debates back in 1858, "Honest Abe spent many of his public appearances lashing out at Stephen Douglas in a campaign for an Illinois Senate seat. Lincoln lost.

In 1860, he again ran against Douglas, this time in the presidential race. By campaigning on his own merits and suggestions on how he would run the government, he came out a

What is unfortunate, is that many politicians are going to continue slamming their opponents. They will pick apart any situation they see which they may believe would be in their favor.

The public therefore, is going to be faced with sifting out the real issues. It may be difficult at times to distinguish between allegations and truth.

We urge all political candidates to tell the people what they stand for and why they should be elected rather than why their opponents should not be elected.

If this suggestion fails however, and history has proven that it will, we must then urge the general public, the people who will be casting their ballots, to look at and listen to what is being said by the various candidates, then ask yourself why and under what conditions it was said. This will help voters make a better choice at the polls this fall. We could not ask

# Clinton winning on balanced budget

crash .. it looks as though there won't be a balanced budget deal. Both Republicans and the White House are getting ready to spin the failure their way, and President Clinton seems to have once again gained the upper hand.

White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta thinks that the Republicans' budget strategy has "blown up in their faces" and has empowered Clinton to deliver a "confrontational" State of the Union message in which he portrays himself as the advocate of a balanced budget, while the GOP insists on "demanding more" -- tax cuts and "cuts" in Medicare and Medicaid.

What's more, Panetta thinks that GOP plans to selectively cut and fund federal programs for the rest of this fiscal year also will backfire on the GOP politically.

If things go as Panetta anticipates, it will represent an ironic turnaround in budget politics. For a full year, it was Republicans who insisted that they were sent to Washington to balance the budget and that they'd do so in seven years with numbers vetted by the Congressional Budget Office.

Clinton spent almost all of 1995 resisting every element of that plan. His original budget proposed not a cent of real deficit reduction, merely a slow decline of the deficit as a percentage of the gross domestic product. Then he floated a 10-year budget plan scored by the White House, then a seven-year plan scored by a mish mash of economists, and finally he submitted to the basic GOP terms. Now, armed with a

CBO letter stating his proposal achieves a budget surplus of precisely \$1 billion in 2002, the White House is proclaiming it is the champion of budget balance, while the GOP is pressing beyond that for tax cuts necessitating the dismantling of the entitlement status of Medicare and Medicaid.

This amounts to grand theft of an issue, made all the more larcenous by the fact that more than half of Clinton's proposed deficit reduction -

deliver a "victory speech" -- Clinton would use the opportunity to "contrast his goals with those of the Republicans." The message, he said in a press briefing, will convey "his commitment to a greater sense of community and pulling-together" as opposed to the Republicans' philosophy of "winner-take-

Panetta said that if no budget agreement can be reached soon, the White House would propose an "exit strategy" consisting either of renewed negotiations on still-pending appropriations bills or passage of a "clean" continuing resolution to

keep the government operating through Oct. 1. So, indications are that as the game of budgetary "chicken" continues, more vetoes and partial shutdowns of the government are possible, with even the threat of a debt default. If good sense won't free us from this nonsense and force a compromise, maybe the stock market

But in the public mind, the highest rankir g woman is still a wife. It's the first lady who stands in the center of the stage or, or you might say, the target.

That does not mean that Justice O'Connor is looking for a promotion to the East Wing of the White House, Indeed, after watching what's happened to Hillary Clinton. Liddy Dole has decided that she'd be better off sticking with the Red Cross.

In the latest AK-47 attacks, Hillary has been accused of being "a congenital liar," a sleazy lawyer and a political liability. An all-around Gal Demon. At the rate things are going, she'll have to make her own videotape in self-

A majority of Americans who don't know what, let alone where, Whitewater is, think she is hiding "something." Just half the public in one poll now approves of the way she is handling the job of first lady. Although I doubt they could define the "job."

Of course, the joke was always on them. For despite their pristine handwriting, their exhaustively researched theme papers and their state spelling bee champion-ships, we all knew who the future masters of the universe really were the boys with the slingshots and the untucked shirts.

But that was before Lisa Simpson, the brainiest secondgrader to ever hit the small screen.

For those who have spent the past six years touring the

outer galaxies, Lisa is a character on "The Simpsons," Fox TV's prime-time cartoon show. She is a kid who is mocked by her classmates because she reads at a ninthgrade level. Who once handcrafted all 75 characters from "Oliver Twist" for a school project. And who has been voted most likely to be resented and most likely to be presi-That's not to say that she is an apple-

has been delayed for several months while the two lowest biddens moved through the system of contesting the process and of an independent

hearing officer. NEC and Siemens ROLM have made presentations before the board and before hearing officers each making their own claims and counterclaims regarding the amount of services they can offer and the quality of equipment

they can provide. Though the NEC was the lowest bidder in the original request for proposal put out by the district. Siemens-ROLM was awarded the contract because they are able to offer, district staffers said, better long-term service and more expandable equipment. In the long run, they said, the Siemens-ROLM system would save the district money.

A hearing officer in Tallahassee, who reviewed the proposals, ruled the board's decision was "arbitrary and illegal." Still, his decision is nothing more than an evaluation and the board is free to act in any way they see fit.

A work session-hearing last week involving presentations by both Siemens-ROLM and NEC provided the board with additional information about the moves now. systems and services of each company.

The board will make a final decision this evening and the telecommunications system at the district office could be in place by the end of the month as each company stands prepared

to install their own system as

soon as the decision is made. Meanwhile, parents of students in Oviedo and Winter Springs are readying themselves for the decision of the board regarding the realignment of the school attendance zones to fill the schools in those two communities which will open during

The judge said that without DiLisio's trial testimony. "There simply is no corroborating evidence in the trial record that is sufficient to austain the verdict." DiLisio's new testimony "is credible and is corroborated by other evidence to a significant

Dillisio, a Pensacola auto restorer, told the judge that coercion by police and his abusive father caused him to fabricate the testimony against the Outlaws biker he had idolized as a teen-ager.

DiLisio said God directed him to seek redeption and restitution for his false testimony. He did not return phone messages left on his answering machine at his Pensacola home.

Judge Eaton noted that

detectives investigating the Harberts' murder "induced DiLisio to cooperate" by offering to drop a number of juvenile charges against him during his troubled icen-age years. Police also arranged for DiLisio to be hypnotized.

He was scared," the judge wrote. "He went along with the police in an effort to please them and his father."

James Russ, a Spaziano lawyer in Orlando, referred calls to Gregg Thomas, the other lead counsel, at the Tampa office of the Holland & Knight law firm. Thomas was not immediately available for comment, his secretary said.

#### State of the Union address

WASHINGTON — With a year of political combat against Republicans behind him and a year of tough campaigning ahead. President Clinton says he'll include a pitch for bipartisan solutions to the nation's problems in tonight's State of the Union address.

"We have differences, but we should attempt to resolve 'hose differences and we should attempt, where we can't resolve them, to set them aside and do what we can do," Clinton told reporters Monday.

But that may not be what Republicans are ready to hear.
"It'll probably be a signal that the race is on. He'll probably bring out his campaign agenda for '96, be my guess," said Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, the front-runner for the GOP nomination to replace Clinton in the White House.

#### First lady faces questioning

WASHINGTON — Hillary Rodham Clinton faces extensive questioning by Whitewater prosecutors under an unprecedented grand jury subpoens summoning the first lady to the federal courthouse on Friday.

Mrs. Clinton will be asked about "the discovery and content" of long-sought billing records outlining her work for a savings and loan owned by the Clintons' Whitewater business partners, the White House announced Monday.

Trying to determine whether anyone hid the documents from investigators. Whitewater prosecutor Kenneth Starr also subpoensed three White House aides and two of the Clintons' personal attorneys.

Mrs. Clinton's grand jury appearance will cap a tumultuous three weeks in the Whitewater affair marked by the mysterious appearance of records first subpoenaed two years ago of her legal work for Madison Guaranty Savings and Loan.

#### **Budget bettle**

WASHINGTON — Unless the debt limit is raised by the end of February, the government will default for the first time on its financial obligations, including Social Security and other benefits for millions of Americans, the Clinton administration

But congressional Republicans dismissed the warning Monday from Treasury Secretary Robert Rubin and said there would be no immediate action to increase the government's \$4.9 trillion borrowing authority.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich questioned Rubin's credibility and said he wanted to hear instead from President Clinton.

"Secretary Rubin doesn't have, frankly, very much standing up here right now to tell us when the debt ceiling is expired, because the fact is each time he has told us, it has disappeared again," Gingrich, R-Ga., said.

#### Report: George Burns near death

NEW YORK — George Burns is too weak to eat, near death and the gravity of his condition is being hushed up, columnist Cindy Adams reported today.

The comedian, who turned 100 on Saturday, "is not eating. He is not taking solid foods. Not that he doesn't want to. He is not able," Adams reported.

"The possibility is he will be placed on intravenous feeding shortly. There has been a debate among his closest as to whether this should be done. The truth of his condition is being kept quiet." she wrote.

"He is barely remaining alive."

The comedian's manager, Irving Pein, anid Saturday that, Burns was weak and "not eating much."

The columnist, wife of comedian Joey Adams, also reported that Burns is confined to bed and hardly responded to Fein and old friend Barry Merkin, who visited him on his birthday.

Adams wrote that Burns understands how sick he is: "He knows it's now next-to-closing."

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# Abortion foes protest bill

WASHINGTON — Ten of thousands of anti-abortion marchers vowed to continue the fight to protect the unborn, even as the Supreme Court dealt a new setback to their cause.

"If you believe it's wrong, you can't give up," Dolores Miller of Seaside Park, N.J., said Monday at the annual abortion protest marking the 23rd anniversary of the Supreme Court decision to legalize most abortions.

"There is no justification for killing any person, born or preborn," said Nellie Gray, president of the March for Life Fund, which has organized protests of the court's 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision every year since.

It turned out that the vociferous crowd — estimated at 60,000 by the National Park Service and 125,000 by organizers — had even more reason

to protest.

The Supreme Court, without comment, on Monday refused to let Pennsylvania set strict reporting rules for certain Medicaid-funded abortions.

Chanting, singing and yelling as they walked from just south of the White House past the Capitol to the Supreme Court building, marchers also pleaded with President Clinton to sign a pending anti-abortion bill.

The measure, which has passed both the House and Senate, would outlaw a rare procedure used late in pregnancy. The bill marks Congress' first attempt to prohibit an abortion procedure since the court's 1973 decision.

But Clinton's threatened election-year veto made him a target of many at a pre-march raily. The crowd roared with cheers at the sound of his name.

"Sadly, not only does President Bill Clinton support this violence against women and children, he demands that taxpayers pay for it." said Rep. Chris Smith, R-N.J., co-chairman of the House Pro-Life Caucus.

"Re-elect Bill Clinton as president and state-sponsored violence will not only continue, but increase," he said.

Rep. Robert Dornan, a Republican presidential hopeful from California and author of the pending bill, told the crowd that the GOP's task "above and beyond everything is to get a pro-life person into the job as executive leader of the free world."

Other Republican members of Congress also challenged Clinton to sign the bill.

At the White House,

spokesman Mike McCurry said the president hoped "very divisive issues such as choice sign can be addressed by the American people in a way that minimizes hostility and violence abortand maximizes understanding pr

and common ground."

Nationally, abortion remains one of the most deeply emotional and divisive public and political issues, despite the predominance of tax and budget matters on the campaign-trail debate in recent weeks.

Marchers came to Washington in chartered buses from across the country and carried various handmade and mass-produced signs that said "Stop Abortion Now" and "The Natural Choice is Life."

One cartoon-style, homemade

discussing what they would have become had they not been aborted.

Pro-choice' advocates also celebrated the anniversary, but warned that their opponents had launched a "full-scale assault" in state legislatures to limit women's right to end pregnancies.

The laws "are designed to confuse, delay and coerce women into bearing unwanted children," said Kate Michelman, president of the National Abortion and Reproductive Rights Action League.

In the Pennsylvania case, the justices refused to let the state restrict access to Medicaid-paid

abortions for women whose pregnancies resulted from rape or incest or whose lives would be

endangered by giving birth.

The law would have allowed those abortions only when the rape or incest had been reported to the police or when a doctor with no financial stake in the procedure certified that only abortion would have the woman's life.

Thousands of teen-agers also marched, and many said abortion has become the "easy way out" of a jam, at the expense of human life.

"You just have to take responsibility for what you get yourself into," said Sarah John, a high school senior from Windham Ohio.

# This Australian classroom is 600 miles from side to side

BROKEN HILL, Australia — Kindergarten teacher Judy Woodhill starts off her class with a cheery greeting: "Good morning. Paddington Bears. Are you well this morning?"

"Good morning — over!" a dozen voices reply, crackling with static as they boom from the loudspeakers in Woodhili's classroom, the Outback radio base station of Broken Hill's School of the Air.

The class motto is "The Sky is the Roof of Our School," appropriately enough, because the school's 87 primary students live on isolated ranches spread over 193,000 square miles of red-dirt desert and scrubland in western New South Wales state.

Out on each ranch, each pupil checks in daily by radio — "Good morning, Jake in Pineview"; "Good morning, Ben at Fowler's Gap" — before they get down to the day's on-air lesson.

The radio contact breaks the isolation of these children scattered through the Outback, building friendships among them as well as providing

long-distance education.

Today, Woodhill has her students color the oceans blue on world maps they received in the mail. Then she reads them a story about a boy who sells newspapers from the Bondi streetear in Sydney — punc-

tuated with dramatic pauses.

and questions about what they think will happen next.

Each daily radio lesson lasts only a half-hour. Each child spends at least four more hours on homework, taught and supervised by a parent or a tutor hired by the ranch owner.

Broken Hill's program has about 30 tutors serving as onsite teachers. About 10 of them used to be teachers in big cities.

The School of the Air students "come out well on top of the state average" on the New South Wales basic school tests, administrator Geoff Brown says. "They're not in a situation where there's one teacher and 30 students."

Hiring a tutor allows the parents to concentrate on the ranch or farm work, which can be from dawn to dusk in busy seasons.

Even the students are sometimes "absent" during floods, droughts or sheep-shearing time.

Their homework and art pro-

jects are mailed to Broken Hill to be graded and evaluated, which also gives teachers a chance to compliment the children's work over the air — when the whole class can hear.

The teachers also visit each of their School of the Air students once a year, staying a day or more to instruct and evaluate the pupil and counsel the tutor. And if the family comes to Broken Hill for supplies, the kids come along and temporarily join the regular class in town.

Students also gather each year mail.

in Broken Hill for a class reu-

New South Wales has 13 "distance education" schools teaching by correspondence, radio or visits by roving teachers. About 640 students get

lessons by radio.

Elsewhere in Australia, radio classes enroll 300 primary students in Western Australia state, 135 in South Australia, 1,655 in Queensland and 360 in the Northern Territory.

The programs are completely government supported. Even the radio equipment is provided on loan to the Outback families by the school system.

Schools of the Air evolved from the radio network set up in the 1930s among Outback ranches and towns by the Flying Doctor services. The Alice Springs school was founded in 1951; the Broken Hill school in 1956.

The primary students on Outback ranches actually make up only 40 percent of Australia's "distance" students.

The other 60 percent are pupils living on fishing boats or yachts; children traveling with parents who are on sabbatical or moving to new jobs in another part of the country; teen-agers in jail; adults in isolated regions; people who are bedridden by illness or injuries; and even some students oversess who stay in touch with their teacher and classmates by radio and mail.



According to Miller, there are still 4,000 children in the State of Florida missing. She hopes to assist in making these numbers dwindle or fade.

Another part of ther work is to actually get involved in the community and not just talk about it. "We've set up tables at various places for a weekend," she said. "We fingerprint the children and talk to them about self protection. I also go to civic groups like the Lions Chub and talk about legislation they can promote. I sing and speak at the National Missing Children's conventions or at health and safety fairs."

Miller will perform a song at the upcoming pageant she is involved with called "Hold On."

"I dedicate this song to all the missing children," she said. "The song is taken from the Broadway musical 'The Secret Garden.' The song is about the nanny telling the children to hold on. That's what I want the missing children to know. They should hold on and we will find them.

Another recent community endeavor, according to Miller, was to encourage homedwellers to turn on their porch lights for a 24-hour period. "It was a way of saying we are lighting the way home for missing children."

## Daylilies add versatility to landscape

Davities are by far one of the most versatile plants that you can include in your landscape. They are easy to grow, hardy, well in a great variety of soil types, tolerate dry conditions, will grow in full sum or partial shade, are basically free from pests and diseases, easy to propagate and if you want color. daylilles come in a rainbow of colors for you to choose.

Botanically, daylilies are included in the illy family and belong to the genus Hemerocallis. The plants are native to China and Japan, but in Florida, they are grown extensively because of their adaptability to a wide range of conditions and their variety of flower colors.

Daylilles can be used as foundation plantings to break the monotony of the green shrubbery. They can be used in terraces, as ground cover, underneath trees, on slopes or in borders.

Just looking through a nursery catalog I was impressed by the number of available varieties and the extraordinary combinations of flower colors that are available with this plant. The varieties Aztec, with orange flowers, and Wilson Yellow are very popular in Central Florida. But if you really want to appreciate the variety of colors that his plant has to offer, you will have to go to a dayilly nursery and find something that will really please your eyes. Buy your plants in full bloom to make sure that you get the flower color you want. Lightcolored varieties need full sun to show their best colors, but dark-colored varieties grow best in partial shade. The blooming season is from February to October, and the month of May is considered the peak of the

Plants can grow for 3-5 years before division is necessary to keep the plants from overcrowding. To plant, dig a hole larger than the root mass with a trowel and make a mound of soil in the center of the hole and set the daylily on top of the mound, spreading the roots out to the sides of the mound. When filling the hole, make sure that the crown is at ground level. It is very important to keep a good level of soil moisture to establish the plants in the bed. Mulching is recommended to maintain soil moisture and control weeds.

Posts: Davilles are relatively free from pests and diseases, but occasionally, plants can be affected by thrips, aphids, spider mites or nematodes.

Propagation: Daylilles are propagated asexually by division of parent clumps to maintain the integrity of the variety. Division is done immediately after the end of the flowering season by digging the whole plant and

politids of a 6-6-6 fertilizer per the roots and separating the sure that ( the same soil level. Daylilies can also be propagated by seeds but it takes two years from seed to flowering and the variation of the scedlings is usually great. Seeds are harvested when the pods turn brown and start to split. Seeds germinate in 10-14 days and require very little attention but must be kept moist during the germination process.

Daylilles can also develop small plants on the flower stems: these plants are called proliferations. Each one of these plants can be removed and rooted to form a new plant.

Daylilies can be easily hybridized by removing pollen grains from the male parent and placing them on the stigma of the flower used as fernale parent with the aid of a camel-hair brush. Before pollination. remove the anthers of the flower used as the female parent to avoid self pollination.

### Understanding herpes transmission

transmit the herpes virus to another person if I have never had an outbreak? I am a gay male and my partner recently contracted the virus. despite the fact that I never had a sore. We both have occasional fever blisters, however no contact is made at that time. My last fever blister outbreak was two months ago, and my partner had an outbreak about a month ago. We both also had a fever prior to the outbreaks. Is it possible to carry and transmit the herpes virus and not know it? Is it possible to touch a sore and transfer the virus by hand? What can be done about it?

**DEAR READER: Herpes infections** are customarily transmitted only during the active stage of the disease; that is, when the blisters are appearing. In between attacks, the affliction is not contagious. Active herpes infection is often triggered by stress, fatigue, fever, exposure to sunlight, and other factors.

It is possible to carry the herpes virus and not be aware of it until the blisters break out. On the other hand, the infection is not likely to be transmitted by an unknowing person.

The virus can be transmitted by hand, thus handwashing - at the time of the active infection — is mandatory. Many herpes infections can be cured or substantially modified by using prescription anti-viral drugs, such as Zovirax or Famvir.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have facials on a regular basis with a Russian woman who told me she has tested positive for TB. She said all Russians test positive for TB. Her facial room is small and closed in, and I understand TB can be passed only by coughing, sneezing and talking. Can I safely continue receiving facials from this woman? Should she wear a mask?

DEAR READER: You raise a troubling and interesting point.

Tuberculosis skin tests do not detect the presence of active infection. Rather, they indicate that a person did (or did not) at one time harbor the TB becteria.

In the presence of a positive skin reaction, a doctor must obtain further testing, such as chest X-rays and sputurn analyses, to determine if an active infection is present. If this additional testing fails to confirm an active infection, the situation is merely monitored.

If infection is present, it is treated with anti-TB drugs, such as rifampin. The exception to this rule is the person whose skin test suddenly converts



from negative to positive: The presumed infection is usually treated, even if the other tests are normal. Similarly, children with positive akin tests often undergo similar drug ther-

apy, as a preventative. In many parts of the world, especially in underdeveloped areas. TB is epi-

demic. People come into contact with the infection (because of poor sanitation and public health practices), develop (a minor case of TB), heal it (without treatment), and become skintest positive. Such people pose no threat to others, as long as their infection is not reactivated. (The skin test does not distinguish between these people and those patients whose tuberculosis is active and communicable, as proved by the tests I mentioned.)

To be on the safe side, she should wear a mask or - better yet - undergo the additional testing that I mentioned. For her own continuing good health, I hope she'll choose the latter option.


