Yet this program, not expected to be completed until 1970 if the legislature and voters approve, does not take us into consideration.

Both of our legislators in Tallahassee have indicated there may be tough-sledding for the \$300 million bond program unless other by-passed cities and, counties also get relief.

A project that would give Seminole County a small piece of the \$300 million pie would be a causeway over Lake Monroe.

There is no doubt that such a project would bring tourist traffic back onto U.S. 17-92 from Winter Park to DeLand and prevent many businesses from facing a financial crisis.

Rather than four-lane Highway 17-92 from Orange City to the St. Johns River bridge, wouldn't it be more feasible to build the causeway and tie into Interstate 4 at the interchange south of Orange City?

Of course there is nothing in the Governor's program to four-lane U.S. 17-92 in that section of Volusia County. But it has been proposed.

A causeway over Lake Monroe would do many of the things the Governor is seeking.

It would protect property investments in Orange, Seminole and Volusia Counties; it would benefit almost all of our communities; it would attract industry and tourism. We don't think it is asking too

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Additional U. S. troops were on alert today to move into the Dominican Republic if needed to reinforce the 4,200 Marines and paratroopers already there to evacuate Americans and other foreign nationals.

High Washington officials continued to insist that the mission was mainly to protect. American lives in the rebellion-torn capital of Santo Domingo.

But they obviously were concerned about the prospect of Castro-dominated Communists taking over the rebel novement.

Officials said there was onsiderable Communist paricipation in the revolt, but pointed out other factions were involved as well.

Three known Communist organizations have been identified with the rebels-the Popular Socialist party, the Movimiento Popular Domincano and the pro-Castro 14th of June party,

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Sen. John J. Williams (R-Del.) issued his annual report card on the nation's tax colectors.

The marks ranged from bad" to "excellent." Overall, the Senator was leased with the class. He reported to the Senate that between 1954 and 1964, total tax delinquencles delined around \$450 millionfrom \$1,614,494,000 to \$1,-

173,911,000. During the same period Williams added, the number of delinquent taxpayers dropped from 1,725,474 to 839,225.

Williams' approval did not xtend to all the offices of the Internal Revenue Service. He cited increases in delinquent employment taxes in several bureaus compared to 1954.

He singled out Jacksonville, Fla., where delinquent taxes rose to an all-time high of \$50.334.000, compared with \$47,883,000 in 1954.

Williams said this increase was caused entirely by a 100 per cent rise in delinquent employment taxes.

"We must not overlook the fact that these employment taxes represent money which is withheld by the employer from the employe's paycheck," Williams said.

"These withheld taxes do not belong to the employer but are held in escrow by him, and he has no right to divert this money to his own ute."

Williams handed out "excellent marks" to the offices in Augusta, Me., and Parkersburg, W. Va.

For the first time in six years, no major labor dispute is pending in the railroad industry.

The biggest and longest dispute of all-the question of the need for firemen on diesel locomotives-was resolved under federal arbitration last year.

In May 1964, there were 37.235 firemen in freight and yard service. Today, even with some new hires, there are 22.100.

Virtually all of the 15,000 men removed "have landed on their feet," reports J. E. Wolfe, chief negotiator for the railroads. Less than 11 percent of them, he says, are on the unemployment rolls.

Some 5,000 men with less than two years' service received an average

of \$1,000 in separation pay. Of another 10.345 men with two to 10 years' service, who were to keep their jobs until offered_comparable ones, about 4,000 opted to

take severance averaging \$5,600. The bulk of the firemen-21,390 -were to keep their jobs until promoted, retired or otherwise removed by natural attrition. Of these, 5,900 have left as a result of attrition or promotion.

Thanks to reasoning and reasonableness (though the latter was sometimes difficult to discover) on the part of both management and unions, the track has been cleared for technological progress on the railroads while the security of the men involved has been protected.
