Road work updates

2nd Street resurfacing
The Sanford Public Works department has a contractor working on East 2nd Street between Lakeview and Mellonville avenues. The work began Friday, Nov. 9 and will continue for approximately two weeks.

The process involves in-place recycling the existing base and asphalt surface to create a newer, stronger base and placing a new asphalt surface. At no time will the road be closed, but will be restricted to a single lane in the work area during the day.

Highway 17-92 lane closures

The inside, northbound lane on U.S. Highway 17-92, approximately one mile north of the U.S. Highway 17-92 and I-4 interchange, will be closed Nov. 12 through Nov. 16 during the hours of 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. This lane closure is expected to occur Monday through Saturday, for the next two months. The inside, southbound lane will also be closed at the same location once the morning rush hour is over. Both lanes are opened by 5:30 p.m.

Lane closures are necessary to help facilitate truck traffic that will be hauling dirt and debris from the newly constructed retention pond for the I-4 bridge replacement project.

Mental health agency defies city codes

Mayor says organization is 'thumbing its nose' by ignoring building permits, licenses

SANFORD — Two weeks after Seminole County code officials refused to allow dogs and cats to move into the animal shelter because the facility failed to meet building codes, a mental health agency continues to treat patients, though its own building has yet to receive many of the same permits from the city of Sanford.

Officials with Seminole Community Mental Health Center have been in discussions with the city for three months regarding the agency's move from 25th

Street and Park Avenue to the former Lakeview Nursing Home at 919 E. 2nd Street.

The two sides don't agree on what the permitted uses of the facility can be. Jay Marder, Sanford's director of planning and engineering, has denied SCMHC's application for an occupational license because he said it would violate Ordinance 3502.

The agency's executive director, Jim Berko, disagrees with Marder's decision. He's not only appealing the decision to the City Commission, but he began operations at the 2nd Street facility on Oct. 15 without an occupational license or a Certificate of Occupancy. The building also has yet to pass final inspection for building or fire codes. Those were the same issues county officials used to delay

the opening of the animal shelter.

City Commission will hear SCMHC's appeal on the permitted uses issue, but Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard said Berko should be ready to explain why the agency has failed to meet basic code requirements.

"The city will afford them every opportunity to plead their case, but the bottom line is you just can't thumb your nose at the city and disregard codes and ordinances," Lessard said.

In an Oct. 16 letter to the agency's attorney, Laurie J. Levin of Baker & Hostetler,

Academy gives citizens a view from officers' prospective

SANFORD — Ever wonder what exactly the sheriff's office employees do day in and day out? Fifty Seminole residents are learning first-hand through a 14-week Community Law Enforcement Academy program.

"They get a little bit of everything — from corrections to law enforcement to communications," said Capt. Billy Lee Jr.

Last Wednesday night was special operations night as the deputies unveiled the department's crisis intervention motor home, Hummer vehicle and armored rescue vehicle. Designed to educate in the concepts and procedures of law enforcement, the program is also becoming a precursor to other programs, Lee said.

Many of the academy's participants move on to volunteer for other law enforcement activities like Citizens on Patrol and search and rescue operations.

"It's been a tremendous

resource for us," Lee said.

The academy meets each week, usually Wednesday, for three hours. A wide range of activities keeps everyone interested, but some of the favorites include the opportunity to go the shooting range and scheduling ride-a-longs with deputies.

"Everybody in Seminole County should come and do this," said Joel Weimer of Longwood. "We really have a proactive sheriff in this county."

According to Weimer and his wife Jana, they've learned the job

many deputies carry out isn't all blue lights and sirens.

Linda Reynolds of the Seminole County Regional/Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce is another member of the academy.

"It sounded really interesting. I wanted to learn more about my community, and this is part of it," said Reynolds on why she signed up for the class.

"I can shoot now," she exclaimed. "I have not done that before, and that was a huge

Safety building has a 'mold problem'

County sues contractor to repair 3-year-old, \$13 million facility

SANFORD — On Nov. 9, 1998, the county public safety and sheriff's office complex opened at 190 Bush Boulevard with Sheriff Don Eslinger referring to it as a "new chapter."

Three years later, that new chapter is turning out to be more like a Nixon biography on Watergate — full of holes and severely damaged by leaks.

Ten months after the complex opened, county administrative services director Jaime Croteau said a problem with water intrusion was evident. Improper flashing around the windows and roof have caused water damage to drywall and exterior brick work, she said.

"We are in litigation because of the water intrusion issues," Croteau said. "We definitely have a mold problem."

Today, walls in the \$14 million complex grow mold and the county is blaming contractor DiPrima Construction Corp. of Satellite Beach, construction manager Fluor Enterprises Inc. of South Carolina, architect Spillis Candela and Partners Inc. of Miami and bonding company United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company for the leaky building.

In conjunction with the county litigation, DiPrima Construction has also filed a third-party lawsuit against its subcontractors for the county project.

Sunland residents meet with McLain

SANFORD — Sunland Estates' residents, concerned with problems they believe were caused by their new neighbor Wyndham Place apartments, were assured Wednesday night that their district county commissioner would stand by them.

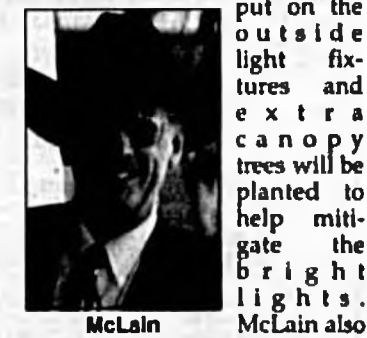
Commissioner Daryl McLain, along with an entourage of county staff, addressed the concerns of the residents at a meeting that also included city of Sanford staff and representatives from the apartments' developer.

The county residents are trying to resolve problems they cite as being caused by the apartment complex that is just inside the city limits.

A few problems voiced by the residents include lights from the apartments shining into their homes, damage to fences, dangerous U-turns being made at the neighborhood entrance and poor stormwater drainage in the neighborhood caused by the new construction.

"Some mistakes have been made — no doubt about it — and they'll correct them," McLain said. "I don't run from problems. I like to get in the middle and resolve them."

McLain said shields will be

put on the outside light fixtures and extra canopy trees will be planted to help mitigate the bright lights. McLain also said he

hoped some one-cent sales tax money and stormwater money could alleviate problems associated with drainage.

An old drainage pipe running underneath the apartment from Woodson Avenue was discovered several weeks ago. Mark Flomerfelt, manager of the county's stormwater division, said the county will work

Halloween frat party is sad lesson in racism

Poor Auburn University. My alma mater — already struggling with slashed state funding, meddling, megalomaniacal trustees and a demoralized faculty — now has a racial controversy on its hands. In late October, members of two white fraternities, Delta Sigma Phi and Beta Theta Pi, celebrated Halloween with elaborate, racist tableaux.

Some dressed as Ku Klux Klan members lynching blacks (fraternity members in blackface). Other white frat boys donned blackface, Afro wigs, heavy gold necklaces and shirts inscribed with the Greek letters Omega Psi Phi to mock members of Auburn's oldest black fraternity.

Who said Sept. 11 changed everything? Couldn't those beer-soaked lads have satisfied their need for sick humor by lynching an imaginary Osama bin Laden?

The racist costumes might have remained the frat boys' secret but for the Internet. The faux-KKKers had hired a photographer, who posted the photos on a Web site so the merry pranksters could easily order snapshots online. Needless to say, news of the Web site spread quickly. Imagine the surprise of black students who came across the smiling faces of their white schoolmates, dressed in Klan regalia with a Confederate flag in the backdrop, revelling in the fantasy of lynching black Americans.

This incident offers a striking lesson on the continuing racial divide across the American landscape — a reminder of how far we've come and how far we still must go to close the gap. To its credit, the university responded quickly, suspending the fraternities. Interim President William Walker lambasted the costumes as "shocking and outrageous" and promised a thorough investigation.

That would not have happened 25 years ago, when the Kappa Alpha fraternity still held an annual Old South Day parade down a main street of the Alabama university town, with its members dressed in Confederate uniforms, girls dressed in hoop skirts and black hired help dressed as, ah, unpaid help. And it certainly would not have happened 40 years ago, when the university had just gotten around to admitting its first black student. Forty years later, an African-American is president of Auburn's Student Government Association.

But the incident is also a striking reminder of the reasons why traditionally white universities have a hard time recruiting African-American students. It's not that black kids are too dumb to get in, as many critics of campus diversity efforts seem to think.

Instead, black students show a healthy skepticism toward attending college on a campus where they would have to endure overt racism of the sort displayed by the dolts of Delta Sigma Phi and Beta Theta Pi. And many black parents are understandably reluctant to pay tens of thousands of dollars to subject their children to such humiliation. What is funny about lynching?

Before the two fraternities can be reinstated on Auburn's campus, the university should require their members to attend a searing exhibit of photographs of actual lynchings, which will be mounted in Atlanta next May at the Martin Luther King Jr. National Historical Site. The photographs show a not-so-long-ago era when white adults and children gathered in a carnival-like atmosphere to witness the lawless executions of black men and women.

Requiring the fraternity members to visit that exhibit would work some actual education into their matriculation through Auburn University.

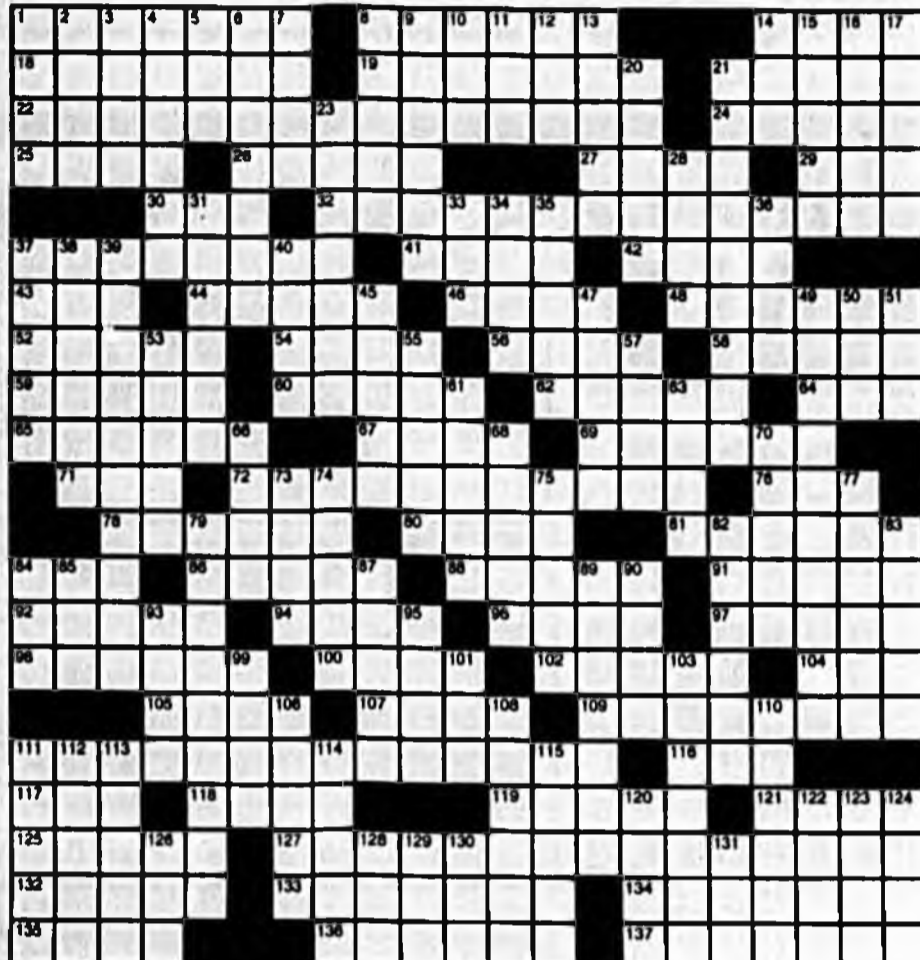

Marder informed SCMHC "represents a patent violation of the City's Codes related to land use approvals, zoning, building and life safety and licensing."

Marder noted that a city code inspector "found building and construction work either completed or in progress without the SCMHC having applied for or obtained required building permits (and having the appropriate building and safety inspections accomplished) all required by state law and city codes."

In an Oct. 11 memo to Marder, city building official Dan Florian stated a Certificate of Occupancy would have to be issued "prior to any use of the premises."

Florian's memo indicates construction work was performed without permits, including building interior walls, ceilings and doors; and demolishing and repairing plumbing. Florian also said the building has not been certified for meeting state codes for electrical fixtures; fire sprinklers; and compliance with Florida Accessibility Codes, the Americans with Disabilities Act and state energy codes.

Florian recommended that "No one should occupy premises until all Life Safety issues and permits have been resolved."

One of those life safety issues deals with the facility's automatic fire sprinkler system. Sanford Fire Marshall Mike McGibeny wrote an Oct. 11 memo to Marder and indicated the building may not be equipped with the appropriate sprinkler system.

"When the facility was a nursing home, the federal government required a certain type of system, a 13R, residential," McGibeny said. That system may

meet the codes for SCMHC's new uses, but McGibeny doesn't know because the center has not provided him with the appropriate information.

"They need to tell us what they're going to do before we can make a determination about whether the sprinkler system meets code," McGibeny said. "They haven't completed a plans review session or anything. We haven't even re-inspected the alarm system."

Fire Inspector Tim Robles rejected a submission for a plans review on Oct. 24, nine days after the agency moved into the building, because the appropriate information was not supplied and the city had not approved a site plan.

Repeated phone calls to Berko, Levin and SCMHC's Associate Executive Director Debbie Driskell were unreturned.

In correspondence with the city, Berko and Levin focus on the disagreement about whether the 2nd Street facility should be classified as a Community Resources Facility (CRF). The agency already operates a residential mental health facility for voluntary and involuntary patients on Bay Avenue, adjacent to the 2nd Street location. Marder contends that the Bay Avenue facilities are CRFs under the definitions outlined in Ordinance 3502, and therefore, the 2nd Street facility can not operate as a CRF because it is within 1,500 feet of the Bay Avenue buildings.

Levin argues in a Sept. 26 letter that the Bay Avenue operations were not classified as CRFs on Jan. 20, 2000, the date Ordinance 3502 was enacted, and should remain without CRF designation. She also points out

that SCMHC's former Park Avenue site was not listed as a CRF.

However, the agency is expanding its services from what was offered at the Park Avenue location, where SCMHC operated administrative offices, and a medication clinic and mental health day treatment services for patients with, as Berko described in a letter to Marder, "major mental illnesses (i.e. schizophrenia, bipolar, major anxiety disorders and depression)." The agency wants to continue those services at the 2nd Street location, and add a 45-bed residential mental health program for dually diagnosed patients. Dually diagnosed patients have a primary diagnosis of mental illness and a co-occurring disorder ranging from physical problems to substance abuse.

Those uses, Marder says, classify the new facility as a CRF. Levin countered in her Sept. 26 letter that while the 2nd Street facility does fit portions of the CRF definition, the operation "falls squarely within the definition of a Residential Care Facility as the program will provide for the physical and emotional needs of 15 or more non-dangerous, mentally ill persons in a family-like setting and is not in the nature of a nursing home, boarding house of Community Residential Home."

City Commission will determine if the 2nd Street facility is a CRF during the public hearing portion of Monday's commission meeting, which begins at 7 p.m. in City Hall.

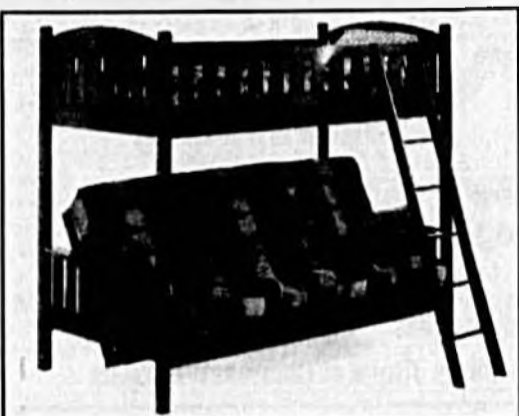

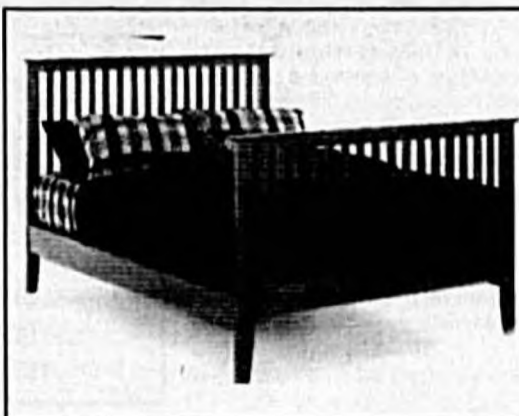

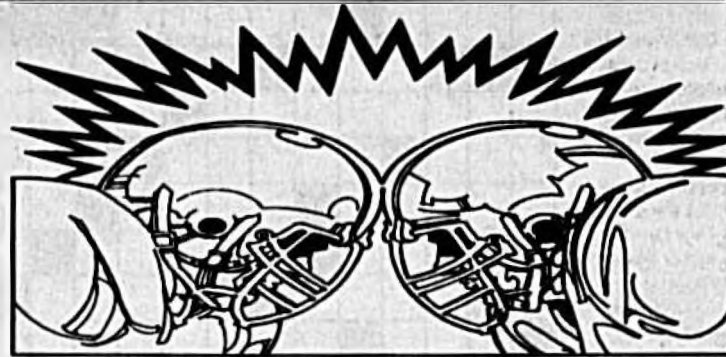

 "We tried to work through the issue with the contractor, construction manager and architect," said County Manager Kevin Grace. "Basically nobody was willing to accept that it was their fault and step forward. We just know we're not at fault because we paid good money to get the building constructed."
 Unfortunately for the county, the litigation court date is not until September 2002. At the end of the month, some third floor operations will be moved to a

trailer in the parking lot so workers can attempt to remedy the problem at an expense to the county of \$1.5 million. According to Grace, the county is anticipating the courts will reimburse it for the expenses.
 "We just don't think we can wait any longer," Croteau said. Remaining on third floor during construction will be the emergency 911 call center and the county's Emergency Operations Center. According to Croteau, the more facilities they can move out of the third floor

the faster workers can finish the job, which is currently expected to be completed in July.
 People have referred to the structure as a "sick building," but Croteau said that is not an accurate statement. She said bi-monthly indoor air quality tests have shown the building to be safe.
 "You are going to have people concerned because they can visually see the mold," Croteau said.
 Joe DiPrima, president of DiPrima Construction, said it

would have been nice if this issue could have been resolved amicably. He even offered to rework a couple areas of the building to see if the problem could be located.
 "The true information is we responded and said we would do a sample area to see if we could fix the problem," he said. "The county never responded."

 to clean that pipe out and get it connected with the drainage system at U.S. Highway 17/92.
 "A lot of the problems in your neighborhood are due to the age of the pipes," Flomerfelt said.
 In the next year, the county will evaluate its older neighborhoods and retrofit the drainage pipes in those areas based on need. McLain said he will push for Sunland Estates to be put high on the list.
 In the meantime, McLain said a French pipe, an extra berm or

flattening out the Sunland residents backyards will help keep stormwater from pooling in their backyards.
 "If you didn't have ponding in your backyard before you shouldn't have it now," he said.
 As for the traffic congestion caused by drivers making U-turns at the neighborhood entrance, county and city officials said there is little they can do to remedy the situation as the Florida Department of Transportation is in charge of the road. Russ Gibson, planner with

the city, assured residents the city and county will be approach FDOT on the matter.
 McLain also praised the developer, Wilson Company, for attending the meeting and willing to work on the residents' concerns.

"There's always inconveniences when there is development," McLain said. "Hopefully it's close to being over."

Veterans Day, formerly Armistice Day, is celebrated every Nov. 11, the anniversary of the Armistice signed by the Allies and Germans in 1918, ending World War I.

In 1938, Congress passed a bill making each Nov. 11 a day dedicated to the cause of world peace — and the day was known as Armistice Day. However, in May 1954, an Act of Congress changed the holiday's name to Veterans Day to remember all who had fought in various American wars.

Although Veterans Day is not a legal holiday, many communities and schools remember the day by hosting celebrations. At Goldsboro Elementary School, children participated in an interactive Veterans Day program

Residents prepare for another battle over apartments near UCF

SANFORD — Residents from Carillon and University Estates neighborhoods are expected to attend Tuesday's county commission to fight another student apartment development near the University of Central Florida.

More than three dozen attended the Local Planning Agency (LPA) meeting that denied a rezoning from University Community to Planned Unit Development for 45-plus acres at the northwest corner of McCulloch Road and Old Lockwood Road. The LPA denied the proposed apartments because board members believe the complex is not compatible with the existing neighborhoods.

The proposed Portofino/Phillip Emmer 252-unit apartment complex would be the county's fifth hotly debated student housing project in the area. Tivoli, Northgate and Riverwinds apartments already serve hundreds of UCF students.

A fourth proposed complex at the Westland property on Alafaya Trail was denied by the commission, but the courts handed the case back to commis-

sion stating the county didn't have enough rationale to justify it being turned down, said District Commissioner Grant Maloy.

"It (Portofino project) is a tough one," said Maloy. "I know the people across the street (in Orange County) are against it. The property has had a high-use designation for 30 years."

According to county principal planner Kathy Fall, in the late 60's the county designated the area around UCF, at that time Florida Technical College, as University Commons.

The UC designation would allow for many high-intense uses including apartments, hotels and offices, she said.

"In the 80's instead of the college growing, single family residential grew," Fall said. "The property that was actually zoned for UC actually went to residen-

cial." What eventually happened is most of the zoned UC properties were zoned down from high intense purposes to single-family residential. Years later as the UCF student population began to explode, developers are finding there is little room to build student housing.

"I bet a lot of those developers wouldn't have built those single-family houses today," Maloy said. "In retrospect I think it's been a very poor decision to downgrade those properties."

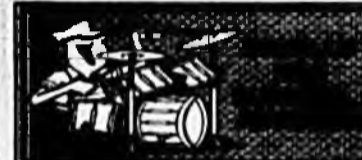
Representing the homeowners association of Carillon and University Estates Tuesday will be Sanford attorney Lonnie Groot. He said one of his main arguments will be that the proposed structure is adjacent to the Econlockhatchee River protection area.

"More than just the immediate homeowners are impacted by this," he said. "I don't think the taxpayers paid millions and millions of dollars to protect that area to have an apartment complex across the street."

"We spent a lot of time on the wall," Coffee said. "We tapped so much we got calluses on our knuckles. The guards caught on. If you had calluses, you were automatically guilty, so we began tapping with stones."

Prisoners tapped to express fears, calm nerves and boost spirits.

"That was our lifeline," Coffee said. "Every single night, before you went to sleep, you would tap 'GN' and 'GBA' to the person on your right and left — Good night, and God bless America."

"We took good care of each other," Coffee said. "That's what we need today. Now is the time to fulfill the banner 'United we stand.'"

Faith in America

"Keeping the faith in our country was tough some-

times," Coffee said. "Every anti-war statement by an American celebrity, every anti-war rally, the assassinations of Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy — our captors made us very aware of these things. It was hard believing in the goodness of America."

"But I began to realize that the people outside the walls of the Hanoi Hilton, the men and women of Vietnam, were no better off than I was inside the prison walls," Coffee added. "I knew I would eventually return to the freedom of the United States, but the Vietnam people would continue to be prisoners in their own country."

Coffee said the same message applies today as the nation fights terrorism.

"A healthy skepticism is OK," Coffee said, "but we must never lose sight of the great things this country has

done for people all over the world. We make mistakes, but we also do tremendous good."

Faith in God

"On the wall of the first cell I was put into someone had written 'God = Strength,'" Coffee said. "We are never totally alone. That was key to my survival."

During his incarceration, Coffee said he performed his own church service based on his memory of the proceedings at All Souls.

"I would go through the entire service in my mind, saying the Latin and doing all the things as if I were actually at the church," Coffee

said. "I even did the rosary by memory."

Coffee's faith in God provided not only spiritual and mental comfort, but for several months brought physical comfort, as well. At one point, his captors used a Vietnamese priest to pressure Coffee to write anti-America propaganda.

"It was obvious he was in a tight spot," Coffee said. "They were trying to get me to speak out against my country, but he was being asked to use the Catholic religion to persuade me to do it."

At the end of the meeting, the priest gave Coffee a small, plastic rosary.

"I got to keep it for about a

year and a half before they took it away," Coffee said. "The cross was very small, maybe an inch, inch and a half. I discovered that that cross would open just about every pair of cuffs they put me into."

"When they would shackle your feet into bed and cuff your hands behind your back, it was difficult to sleep," he explained. "I would use the cross to unlock the cuffs so I could relax my shoulders and get some sleep. My buddy in the next cell would bang on the wall if the guard was approaching so I could put my hands behind my back again."

Coffee's message of faith was well received by the audience gathered for the Vigilante dedication. Following his message many stayed after to thank him or share Sanford memories.

Faith to Endure

Former prisoner of war delivers keys to surviving crises

SANFORD — As prisoner of war, Captain Jerry Coffee knows a thing or two about faith.

The retired naval aviator was shot down in an RA-5C Vigilante reconnaissance jet in Feb. 3, 1966 and spent seven years in the Hanoi Hilton, the infamous Vietnamese prison camp. Not a day went by that he didn't rely on faith to help him survive.

"Quite simply, it was the key to my survival," Coffee said.

Coffee was in Sanford Oct. 29 to dedicate the Vigilante Room at the Orlando/Sanford International airport in honor of Sanford's naval aviation heritage. The event was also an opportunity to raise awareness about the naval memorial planned for the airport.

For Coffee it was a homecoming. He was assigned to Naval Air Station Sanford in May 1963 to train pilots for the Vigilante. His wife, Bea, and their children stayed in Sanford when he was reassigned in December

1965 to the USS Kitty Hawk, and they remained in town until Coffee was released Feb. 16, 1973.

"One of the best decision Bea ever made was to stay here," Coffee said. "Our children couldn't have been raised in a better place."

About 85 people, many of them former colleagues of Coffee, turned out for the dedication, and enjoyed Coffee's reminiscing of their flying days in Sanford.

"I have so many great memories from Sanford," Coffee said, recalling the antics of old Navy buddies, lunches at Jim Spencer's restaurant and roasted oysters at a fish camp on the coast. "Sanford has special meaning to me and my family."

Sanford was also the place where the seeds of his post-military career first began to sprout. Coffee retired from the military in 1985 and became a motivational speaker. The core of his speeches were formed during an impromptu speaking engagement at All Souls Catholic Church.

"My first Sunday back in Sanford after I was released,

our family went to mass at All Souls, just like we had every Sunday before I left for Vietnam," Coffee said. "The priest gave a very warm welcome for my return, and it was appropriate that I say something. What I said that morning became the seeds for my speeches."

Those seeds were faith — faith in yourself, faith in each other, faith in America and faith in God.

"I thought there would be a shelf life to my speeches," Coffee admitted. "But it seems to reach people every time."

Faith in yourself

Coffee knew the people in Sanford — family, friends, even strangers — kept him in their prayers. He said he "felt every single prayer and thought," which boosted his spirits and resolve to survive.

"During my time in captivity, I derived my strength through faith, faith not just to survive, but to go beyond survival and return home with dignity," Coffee said. "We all face tough times in our lives, and there are times when we become prisoners of woe — oh, woe is me. You have to believe in yourself, and some-

times you just have to gut it out."

"My prayers at first were shallow, 'Please let us win this war soon so I can go home,'" Coffee added. "But then those prayers began to change from 'Why me?' to 'Show me God what you're preparing me for.'"

Faith in each other

Though they were forbidden to communicate, Coffee and his fellow prisoners talked by tapping on the cell walls in code.

Scouts learn about ancient civilizations

It was a civilization whose glory was eclipsed by that of Egypt. Indeed, for hundreds of years, it was a civilization hidden from historians. But parts of this civilization lived on, adopted and adapted by civilizations that came after. The civilization was Sumer; the people were the Sumerians.

Sumerians lived in what later became Mesopotamia. They built the first wheel and developed the first written language. They wrote the first story, the Epic of Gilgamesh. One of their kings, Ur-Namma, wrote the first laws.

Girl Scouts from the Stardust Service Unit in Lake Mary held their annual camporee the first weekend in November. They learned about the Sumerians and got a chance to own a piece of history. Each girl was able to make a necklace with a 5000-year-old Sumerian bead.

At one point in history, the Celts covered most of Europe. Then they were squeezed out to the islands. The only place that the Celts survived was Ireland, Wales and Scotland. The girls made Celtic brooches, a work of adornment that started out as a practical way to keep clothes from falling off.

The Anasazi were an amazing tribe native to the Southwest. They built cities in the cliffs and created an astonishing array of pottery for many centuries. At the camporee, the girls were able to actually pick up and hold Anasazi pottery sherds (that's the way all the archeologist spell it) and try to discern what kind they were using ID sets. Then the girls

Painted pots using designs the Anasazi might have used.

Vikings and other Germanic tribes created their own form of writing by "borrowing" some writing from the Romans, who, of course, borrowed from the Greek. The girls learned to write their names in Germanic Runic Futhark. The word Futhark comes

from the first few letters of the Runic written language, f, u, th, a, r and k. "It's pretty cool looking," one girl said. For a real challenge, some of the more adventurous girls tried their hand at writing in Mayan. The Mayan, as well as the Olmec, the Aztecs and the Mixtecs, used a pictographic system of writing that makes many languages look like child's play. Symbols could mean more than one thing depending on where in the glyph the symbol was.

People have always had to find a way to have food, shelter and clothing. But, people being people, games of all kinds have been around for thousands of years. The girls learned about indoor games by making their own Brandubh game. Brandubh was the Celtic precursor to chess. The girls also learned to play Senat; an Egyptian game that was the precursor to backgammon, but less complicated.

The girls also tried a few outdoor games. Trigon was a Roman ball game that involved throwing a slightly larger than baseball size ball with your non-dominant

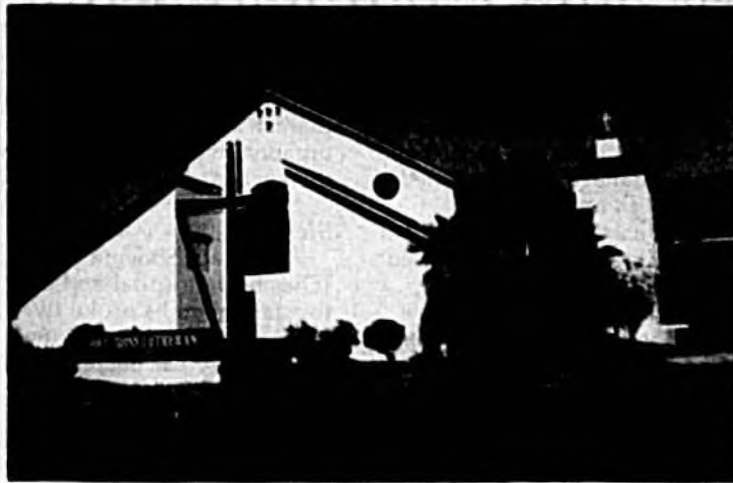
