of their houses, it was learned Sunday. F. H. Black who has had four acres of probably the nearest mature celerery in the county has seen the water completely cover this acreage and the place now looks like a lake rather than a farm. He moved out of his home on last Friday, the water having come up into the house until residence there was impossible. Several other houses were even worse submerged than that of Mr. Black.

A great deal of damage, it is said, is being done along the shores of Lake Monroe to the crops already set out and to a number of private residences. Just north of First Street on French Avenue the water has reached to the back doors of a number of residences and the yard of George G. Herring is about two feet under water.

In the eastern part of Sanford, considerable water is standing in the yard of J. S. Wilson, and adjoining field, near the residence of Roy Syme is partly under water.

Geneva Bridge Closed.

The draw of the Geneva bridge has been turned for several days so that no traffic may be possible across it. Water is standing over the fill both at the east and west ends of the bridge, making travel across that area impossible. The most damage is being done on the east end of the bridge where the water is said to be several feet over the fill, or roadway. Travel between Sanford and Geneva must be routed via Ovelde.

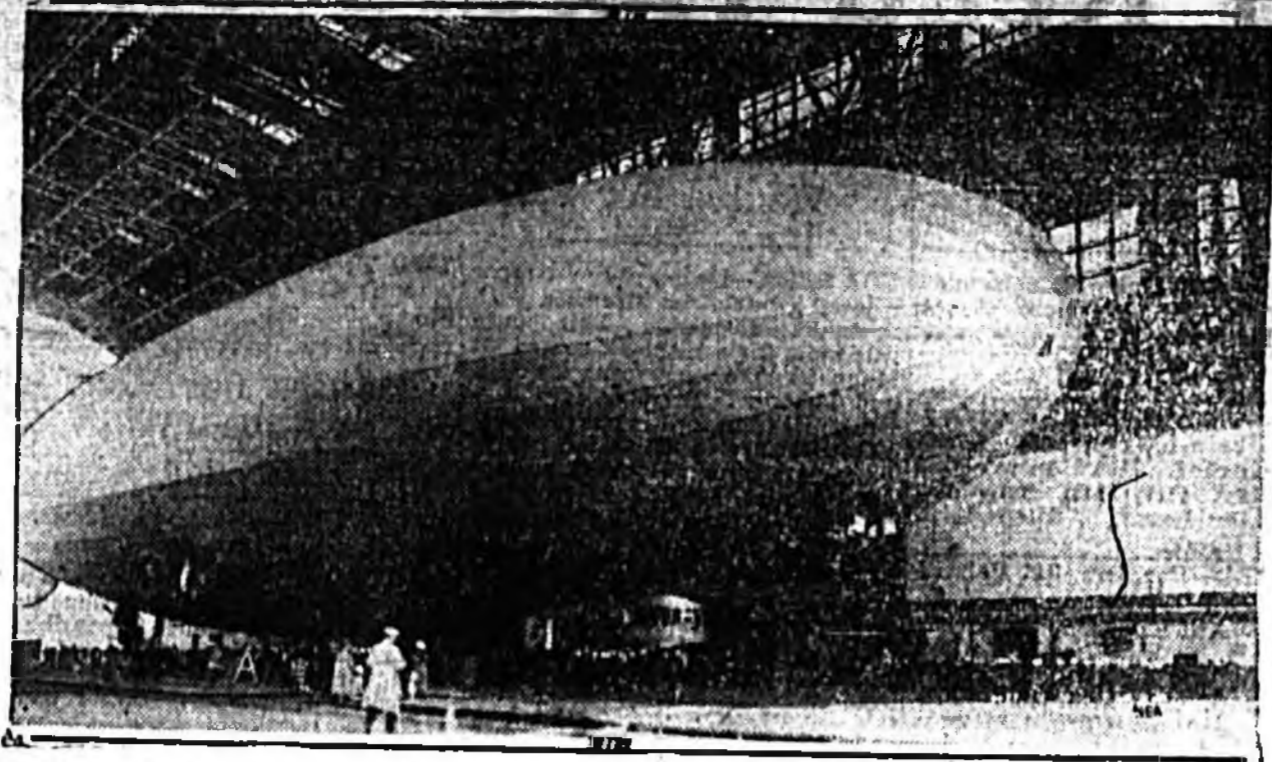

Tennessee Will Give Manchurians Repulsed On Shanhaikwan Front

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 20.—A fierce battle raged yesterday on the Shanhaikwan front, Manchurian forces are making continued but repulsed attacks on Peking government troops. Wu Lei Fu forces remain on the defensive about Chingnan, where reinforcements are expected to arrive to participate in an enveloping move which is expected to bear important results.

Reports from Jehol say that Yu Siang's "Ironclads" are making good progress against the Manchurians in the vicinity of Liaing Shuen Feng.

Manchurian lines beyond Shanhaikwan are under a heavy bombardment from the sea.

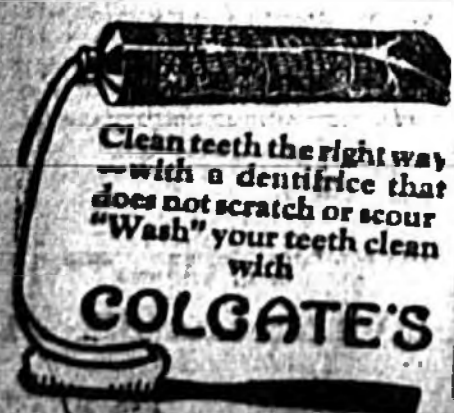

Urges Men To Teach Their Brides

"Every man knows that his financial success depends largely upon his wife's wisdom in spending money, yet how many men teach their brides how to budget their household expenses?" asks Dorothy Dix.

The answer should probably be that very few men teach their brides how to budget their household expenses because very few men know how to budget any kind of expenses. They spend as it comes and use about as much science in the management of their expenses as is shown in any game of "heads I win, tails you lose."

Budget-keeping should be taught in the schools, taught in the primary and grammar schools and stressed through the high schools and the colleges. A girl should have no right to accept the management of a man's home until she has had some training in the care of money, and comprehends the importance of a "sinking fund."

By the same earnest, a man should have no right to undertake the support of a wife and the financing of a home until he has learned to live within his income, and has formed habits of thrift that differentiates between the true and the false values of life.

The "bride" who wastes and misuses the family money is not as blameable as the "bridegroom" who wastes and misuses it. He is supposed to know more about how hard money comes, and is also supposed to know the necessity of laying aside savings for future investments and future needs.

Unfortunately marriage is only regarded as a business partnership, as well as a state of bliss, by the few men and women who have had careful training in their father's homes or in the hard knocks of business life. Most of the difficulties that bring about separation and divorce arise from the idiotic start that young people make in the management of their joint fortunes.

The failure to understand that money is not "India rubber," capable of being stretched to cover every buying whim, and the lack of heart-to-heart talks and faithfully kept agreements to live within a stated budget make up the beginnings of the early quarreling. Divorce court judges everywhere have long classed "financial misunderstandings" as the most numerous cause in the long lists of reasons given for domestic infelicity.

Dorothy Dix would have men teach their brides how to keep a household budget. Better still, men contemplating marriage should discover if their brides-to-be are going to have intelligence enough to keep a family budget, and then before the knot is tied arrive at an agreement with this "dearest girl" that business management in the coming home is to be her special job.

Many a ruined home would now be a place of peace and happiness, if in the honeymoon days a sensible, business start had been made.

HENRY FORD has lost interest in the Muscle Shoals power project. He has arranged other means for developing power. Political agencies of government functioned too slowly for this rapid business man. "A simple affair of business which would have been decided by anyone within a week has become a complicated political affair," Henry, perhaps, didn't approach it through the right avenues. Witness the transfer of the Naval Oil Reserves from the Navy to the Interior Department as a Cabinet function and the immediate consummation of a deal with private interests, supposedly potent in the outcome of the Republican National Convention in 1920.—Louisville Courier-Journal.

Taxes would be assessed and assessments and valuations equated without a single change in present laws if there were men in office all along the line who properly evaluated manhood.

With laws that were made with selfish and dishonest purposes in mind, and with men to administer those laws who have neither the deep-seated desire or courage to make those laws serve all the people alike and faithfully, society can not be otherwise than in a torn and disturbed condition.

God-fearing, God-loving men—men who love their fellow men and who take pride in serving them, is the needed blessing of this hour. Men of moral fibre and of a courage that reflects the soul of the Christian man, could lift this world to heights it has never before realized.

Ability and Hard Work.
Mr. President Why So Many?

THE WORLD recognizes ability, soon forgets hatreds of war.

In the White House the President received and warmly congratulated Dr. Eckener, tall blond German that brought over the ZR 3. Dr. Eckener and the able German air sailors that came with him were entertained at a formal luncheon at the Navy Building by high United States officials and Dr. Haer, Secretary of the German Embassy.

THE GERMAN nation received a terrific blow in that war, but not of Kaiser's, and that orobly was worth the price. Ability of hard work overcome everything in the end, and the Germans possess both to the highest degree.

COMMANDER C. B. Tincker, United States Navy, retired, and therefore free to speak plainly says Japan has launched an intensive programme of airplane construction. Even Japanese school children are asked to contribute to building flying machines.

With seventeen flying machine factories working day and night, Japan's energy ought to interest President Coolidge and those that share with him responsibility for national defense.

WHY Mr. President, does Japan want so MANY flying machines? Is there any connection between the building of those flying machines, modern fighting engines, and Japanese immigration at our immigration laws?

POLITE REQUEST to President Coolidge and Postmaster General New:

Please make the Transportation of Air Mail a triple-headed service, something like Cerberus, watch dog of the infernal regions. He was a most efficient watch dog.

NON-VOTERS

It will be well enough if this country, some of the enthusiastic drive against the non-voters into the days and months which are coming after the November election has been held and makes a step of it, rather than a sort of.

Interest in this particular matter appears to be at a higher pitch, the country over, than we remember ever having known it before.

A cynic would cite the announcement of the president of a luncheon club at Aurora, Illinois, that the names of all persons who fail to vote at the ensuing election will be published in the newspapers.

Of course this raises the question of the right of a luncheon club or anyone else, to do any such thing, but it doesn't lead one to discount the interest of that particular club in getting out the vote.

At the present time there is no law by which a citizen may be compelled to vote, hence the question as to whether or not he should vote is purely an ethical one.

The posting of the name of the member of a club who has been guilty of violating the rules of the club, or has been delinquent in the payment of his dues is proper so long as the posting is done within the premises of the club and is authorized by the constitution of the club and by laws.

In so post it citizenship as well elsewhere would be libelous. The posting of the name of a voter who fails to do his duty at the polls can only be done under authority of law, except it be done at the risk of the poster.

It might be a very good thing to pass a law that would give election officials power to do that very thing.

But at that it would only be possible to reach the limited number of non-voters, whose names appear on the registration lists. It would be an unreturnable and costly task to attempt to apply it to those who are not registered and would likewise involve the necessity of ascertaining whether or not they were legally entitled to vote.

Every reasonable method of persuasion and education should be brought to bear on the non-voter to induce them to register and vote. But when it comes to the use of compulsion, or the infliction of penalties, the law should be invoked. If there is no such law, it is the worse of the letter as the case may be.

In the meantime, all who are guilty of violating the rules of the club, or have been delinquent in the payment of their dues, should be carefully failing to meet such up to the demands of good citizenship by paying their dues and by voting at the polls.

In so post it citizenship as well elsewhere would be libelous.

Although yesterday's rain handicapped the workout of the Tar team tremendously, both squads reported promptly to Coach Duyck at the accustomed time for practice and were run through one of the stiffest periods yet given. It is hoped that this afternoon will be dry so that the team may have an opportunity to give a final try-out to the fast work planned for the Piedmont game.

Armstrong, promising freshman who formerly starred on the Deerfield Academy team in Massachusetts, received injuries in the last game last Friday and will not be able to take part in the Piedmont battle it is feared.

Homer Parker, veteran tackle, who sustained an injury in the game with the Tar Babes, may also be eliminated from the Georgia game. If so, it will be more than difficult to fill his place in the Tar line. Coach Duyck hopes that he will be in condition for the line-up against the Newberry College team of South Carolina which stacks up against the Tars on Nov. 6.

Judging from the outcome of the Varsity football game it is more than likely that Coach Duyck will combine the freshman backfield and the Varsity line for the encounter with Piedmont tomorrow afternoon. Although Piedmont's line-up is in all probability the stronger aggregation, the Tars have not given up all hope of defeating the invaders.

Today's telegram from Piedmont's student body contained the words "Semper Fidelis," and although Rollins cannot use her motto, "Let there be light," since there is no sun and too much rain, Tar spirit for the conflict with the big Georgia team is overflowing. An hour's pep meeting is being held every evening in Knowles Hall and cheer leaders, Fred Hughes and Eva Thompson, assisted by Foss Walker, are getting the "leather-jungled" Rollins rooters in such agitation that they will hang a green cap on their left ear and give 99 rabs for the team on every occasion.

Texas "Longhorns" Will Face Strong Team in "Gators"

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Oct. 21.—The University of Florida football squad, 21 strong, will leave here today for Austin, Texas, where Saturday they engage in the first of three inter-sectional games. The University of Texas, a slight favorite over the "fighting Gators," will be the Floridians' foe in the big Saturday battle.

"Tiny" should prove to be a valuable cog in the "Gator machine, and will be given many opportunities to show Florida fans his style of play before the end of the season. He is 21 years old and weighs 195 pounds. His home is in Miami, where he was a hero on the Miami High school team.

SAM CORNWALL: Sam needs no introduction to football enthusiasts in the State. He played four years for Duval High School, and was a member of the 1922 freshman team that won the southern championship. This is his second year of varsity football and he seems to improve with age. His best game was against the Army last year when he was playing against Garbish, an All-American center. He is a bulwark of strength in the middle of the line. He weighs 180 pounds, is 5 feet 10 1/2 inches tall and is 21 years old.

Warren ("Speck") Lightsey, the blond giant from Bartow, won a name for himself among Florida football fans during his High School year in his home town team. He came to the University in 1922 and was a member of the championship freshman eleven of that year. With the freshmen he played as half, but was shifted to end last year on the varsity. He is adept in the art of receiving forward passes and diagnosing the plays of the opposing teams, and is also good at running down punts. He is having trouble with a knee at this time and was a to play only a few minutes in the Georgia Tech game. However, he soon will be in his winning stride again, and help Florida to maintain her record on southern gridirons. Lightsey is 21, is 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 175 pounds.

GEORGE HERRIN: George Herrin is a brother of Joe Herrin and he seems to show the same fight and spirit that caused Joe to be hailed as the most dangerous little man in football last year. In his High School days George won a reputation for himself with the Plant City team, and probably would have had a regular berth with the Freshman eleven of last year had he not been forced out of the game for the remainder of the season in one of the early season scrimmages. He is a back field man of no mean ability and goes through the line with the twisting and turning of an eel. He

will make a good man for the pony backfield. George is handicapped somewhat on account of his size, weighing only 150 pounds, but this will not interfere with him any more than it does with his brother Joe, who has been of great assistance to the "Gator" team.

EDGAR JONES one of the most popular athletes at the University of Florida has an unusual athletic record. He began his career as an athlete at Duval High School, where he took part in all branches of sport, and was a member of the football team that won the High School championship of the South. Coming to the University he made the freshman team with ease and starred on the eleven that won the southern championship in 1922. Following his year on the "varsity with ease, Jones made the varsity with ease, becoming one of the brightest stars in the football firmament of the South. Especially good was his work against Alabama last fall when the "Gators" spoiled the hopes of the Crimson Tide for the S. I. C. title. In addition to his football achievements, Jones was captain, manager and center of the basketball team.

JOHN A MURPHREE is a perfect example of the rewards of persistence. After establishing a brilliant record as quarterback on the Gainesville High team, he entered the University of Florida. Although handicapped by being rather small, weighing 158 pounds, he went out for the team his first year and struggled valiantly for two years but failed to make a letter. Still unwilling to give up, he answered the 1923 call to practice. Overcoming the handicap of size by marvelous headwork he managed to get into games enough to win a letter. Now after two games have been played and one month's training completed he bids fair to direct the mighty machine through a good season.

"GOLDIE" GOLDSTEIN, first right guard of the "fighting Gators," is starting his second year on the varsity with every prospect of adding to the glory of his past performance. Last year he earned a place on the mythical All-South eleven. In every game he was a bulwark of defence and few gains were made through him. His work in the Army game brought favorable comment from the West Point coaches. His height is five feet eleven and one-half inches and he meets his opponent on every play with every ounce of his 195 pounds. "Goldie" is going strong again this year, and indications are that he again will be hailed as an all-southern man when the sport writers render their decisions this fall. If no serious injuries occur to keep him out of the game. Previous to his varsity experience he played with the Duval champions of 1921 and the famous Florida freshman team of 1922. He is now twenty years old.

"HORSE" SMITH is one of the sturdiest players on Florida's squad. Regardless of how the game fares or what may happen he plays hard and consistently every minute. He is 21 years old and has been playing football ever since grammar school days when he played on pickup teams around Jacksonville, his home. For three years he filled the position of right tackle on the Duval High School team. He played in every game his "rat" year at Florida and was captain of the championship freshman team of 1922. Last year he was first string tackle on the varsity. All this experience together with his natural ability gives him a football head equaled by few. He is six feet one inch tall and weighs 185 pounds.

ARCHIE LIVINGSTONE is a star from the 1923 freshman team.

He came to the University of Florida from Georgia Military Academy where he played sensational football. He made the freshman team easily and was a mainstay in the backfield throughout the season. His greatest playing probably was done in Pensacola against the Auburn freshmen. He is already showing good form and promise of being a valuable player. Livingstone would have probably been given a chance in the Georgia Tech game but he was unable to play at that time on account of illness. He is 19 years old, weighs 165 pounds and is five feet eight inches in height.

EZRA RAASCH, who stands five feet ten and one-half inches and weighs 185 pounds, went out for football at Florida with the handicap of no previous experience but he has learned much in two years on the varsity squad. He is a fighter with a powerful physique and his competitors will have to work hard to keep him from making right guard this season. He is 22 and comes from Leesburg.

DICK ROSE is another from the great Duval eleven of 1922 who won a place on the Baby Gators team of the following year. This is his second year on the varsity squad and last season he showed up well every time he got in the game. He played end and is a sure tackler, and will be called upon many times to help carry the colors of the Orange and Blue down the field to the goal before the end of the season. He weighs 183, is 6 ft. 11 1/2 inches tall and 22 years old.

"LITTLE JOE" HERRIN, flashy end of the University of Florida "Gators, although standing but five feet seven and weighing 150 pounds is one of the most valued and aggressive players of Coach Van Fleet's grid machine. "Little Joe," who is now playing his fourth season with the Florida eleven, is a fast man on the offensive and a sure tackler when the ball is in the possession of the opposing team. Herrin entered the University four years ago a seasoned football veteran, having served four seasons with the best High School team of Plant City.

CARLTON CRENSHAW, a blond headed giant who stands six feet one in his stocking feet and who tips the beam at 175 pounds, in spite of his size is one of the speediest ends that ever graced the University's gridiron. Crenshaw, better known to his teammates as "raskers," is a good natured, likable lad but when carrying the ball or fighting on the defensive is a fast thinking hard hitting demon. Although only 20 years of age Crenshaw is now serving his second year with the "Gators, having played on the Freshman team last year. He played three years with the Duval High school team before entering the University.

WILLIAM FARIS ("STONE BRUISE") ANDERSON is one of the few substitutes on the 1922 University of Florida "rat" team who has stuck to the game. He made all the trips that year as a substitute center. With his home in Orlando, he won his spurs on the Orlando High School team, playing four years, first as guard, then as center and his last two years there alternating between tackle and fullback. His position on the "Varsity is guard. Not limiting himself to football, Anderson has competed in the southeastern pentathlon. He throws the 50 pound weight and engages in other field and track events. He weighs 175 pounds, is 5 feet 9 1/2 inches tall, and 20 years of age.

MARION KINCAID, star halfback on the 1923-24 freshman team, who last year broke out on the "Varsity in the Varsity-Freshman game for a sixty yard end run, is back on the line fighting this year for a position on the

Varsity machine. Kincaid had four years experience in football before coming to the University, one of which was at a military academy, and the other three at Orlando High school. His first two years Kincaid was at the end position, later switching to halfback. He weighs only 150 pounds, but will prove of value to the team because of his broken field running and his speed. He is 21 years old, and 5 feet seven inches in height.

Notwithstanding the fact that he had never played football before coming to the University of Florida last year, Tom Kirk soon showed, early last year, that he was the proper man to hold down the position of left guard on the Freshman team, which place was occupied by him in most of the games played by the Freshman team in 1923. He was only out of three games and in each instance his absence was caused by injuries that kept him on the sidelines. This year Kirk is out for the same position on the "Varsity and bids fair to prove strong competition to the others trying out for the same place on the team. His age is 21, his weight 190 pounds and he is 5 feet 11 inches tall.

Coming to the University last year from Duval High school of Jacksonville, Otto Ziehe soon showed that he was capable of holding down left end on the Freshman team last year, playing at this position in many of the games engaged in by the team. This year Ziehe is out for an end position on the "Varsity, and, in the workouts looks good, and he should develop into a first class player before he severs connections with the University. He is 19 years of age, 6 feet 2 inches in height, and tips the scale at 175 pounds.

Stewart is the largest man on the squad, measuring 6 feet 4 inches, and weighing 222 pounds. Stewart's only weakness is declared to be lack of coordination, and when this is overcome he will be a dangerous man.

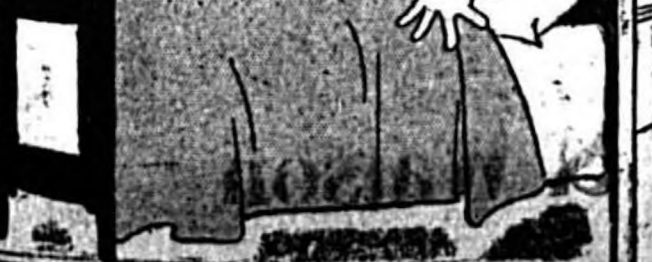

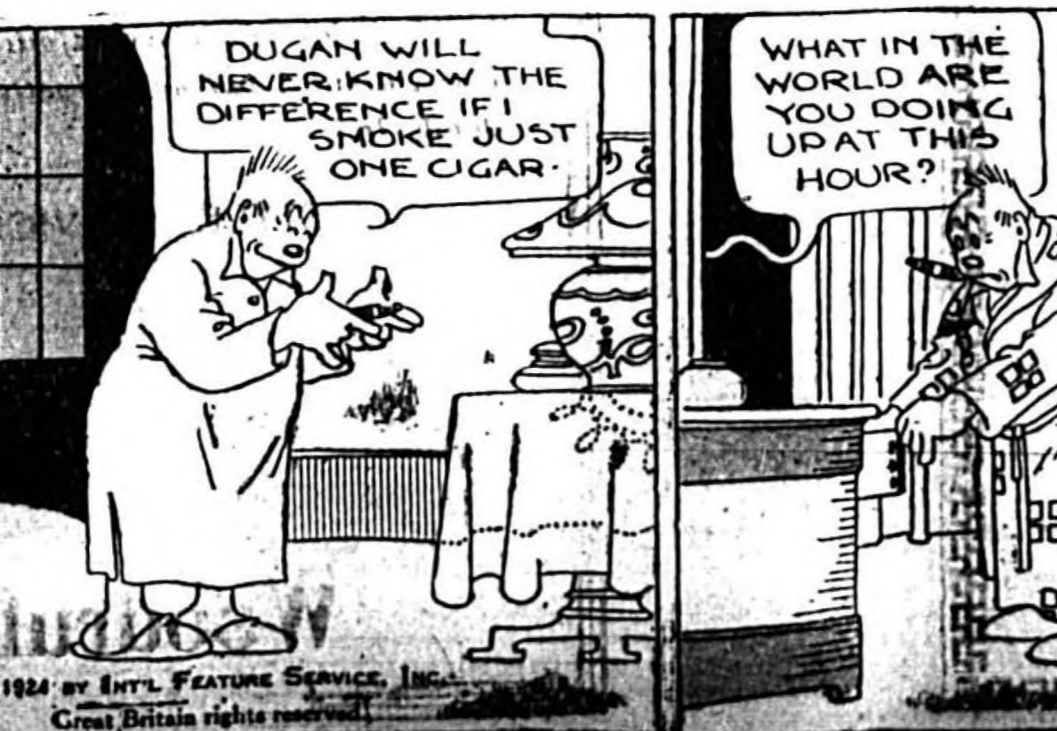

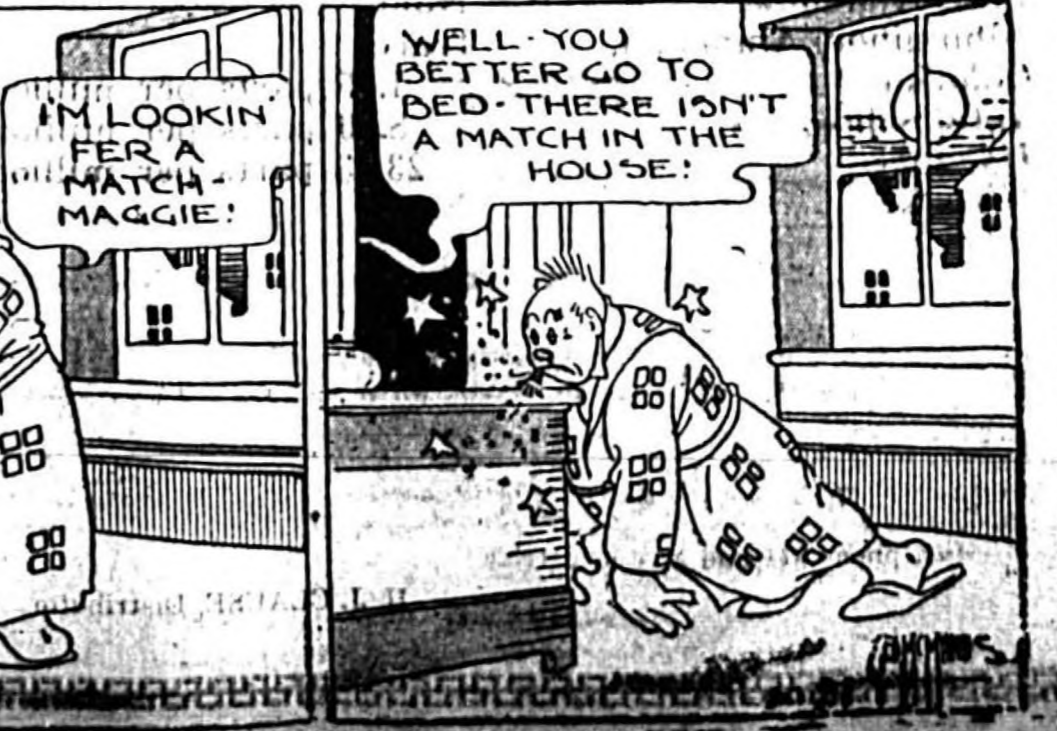
