

Poetic Destiny: Diamond 'Goes Home'

It is poetic justice, or at least poetic destiny that takes the great Hope diamond back to Washington, D. C., which was its home for so many years.

This munificent gift by Harry Winston, gem merchant extraordinary, to the Federal Museum is more than a spectacular coup for the Smithsonian's new Hall of Gems and Minerals. Thousands of Americans, in every strata of Society and society, who knew Evelyn Walsh McLean will regard the Winston gift as a wonderful memorial to the unique, fascinating and generous woman who wore the Hope diamond day and night for more than 25 years.

Only two Americans have ever owned this gem, one of the world's most famous — Evelyn, who died in 1947, and Mr. Winston, who purchased it from her estate. For years, the Hope diamond was Evelyn's multimillion-dollar trademark.

During those years, she was the undisputed hostess with the most in the nation's capital, through whose drawing room doors the most famous and distinguished persons in the world flowed in regiments. A woman of amazing vitality, humor, curiosity and prodigious generosity, she always said that she presided not so much over a salon as a saloon. But those who aspired to stay on Evelyn's guest list quickly

learned that the surest way to be eliminated forever was to take not a glass but a drop too much. And I once saw her quietly ask one of the most famous and powerful men in America to leave her house because she felt that he had, in a space of five minutes, managed to insult both Sen. Arthur Vandenberg and Sen. Alben S. Barkley, not yet the Veep.

On the night of a gala party, say a dinner for 150 guests at her famous home, Friendship, Evelyn resembled the blazing Christmas tree in Rockefeller Center, New York, that annually delights millions of Americans. Or, more likely, the Christmas tree resembles her.

She was a small woman — I don't believe she ever weighed more than 110 pounds — and on those occasions she was wont to wear not only the Hope diamond, 44 1/2 carats of deep-blue fire set in a circle of marquise diamonds and suspended on a diamond chain, but also the Star of the East, a stunning blue-white diamond of 100 carats, also suspended on smaller diamonds.

I have seen her wear these diamonds and bracelets, against the background of a black sequin dress. The combination should have been overpowering. But, take my word for it — on her, they looked good. No, marvelous.

Publicly, she was famous for her gems and her hospitality. But

thousands of obscure people know and literally worshipped her for her unending kindness. No one will ever know how many persons she fed and clothed during the depression.

During World War II, her home was constantly filled with men blinded in the war, and with amputees who had lost arms and/or legs. Such men, who were too ill to leave the Army's Walter Reed hospital, could look forward twice a week toward parties, given by

Evelyn, who brought along a lively orchestra and food for everyone. GIs were invariably curious about the Hope diamond. At a party at her home or in the hospital ward, she would take it out,

During the next two to four hours, everyone present would have a go at wearing the Hope diamond.

Now the diamond is going home to Washington. Many who go to see it in its new home will think

not so much of the gem itself, as of the extraordinary woman who once owned it.

Public Warned To Avoid Voodoo Dolls Of Haiti

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The public was warned today to keep hands off Haitian voodoo dolls which carry a built-in jinx. The U.S. Public Health Service says the dolls, sold in this country as novelties, can hex adults with a poison ivy-like rash. It said beans used as eyes on the doll could kill an infant who swallowed one. The service said it began warning the West Indian novelties after 20 Atlanta high school students broke out in a rash after the dolls were used as party favors. Heads of the Haitian dolls, it was found, are made of cashew nuts. Tests showed the shells contained a liquid similar to the oil in poison ivy leaves. Volunteers broke out in blisters 25 to 50 minutes after touching the heads. Bites of the dolls were believed to be deadly jequirity beans, the PHS said. They are considered lethal for infants and capable of making adults quite ill. The service said the Haitian embassy here has promised to ask its government to bar further exports of the dolls. Voodooism is a religion practiced largely among the peoples of Haiti and the West Indies, and consists largely of sorcery. Certain charms, such as the voodoo dolls, are used in the rites. The PHS has no authority to take the dolls off the counters of retail stores, according to Mrs. Tula Broadway, public information officer, but she said state authorities who do have power to do so have been notified. The doll is on a long stick, intended primarily for use as beverage swizzle sticks. The doll has a small straw hat with tassels on the shell head. The government statement said similar but smaller dolls made from coffee beans, were not dangerous.

Whitneys Leaving Social Register; Others Get Gate

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Whitneys seemed today to be following in the footsteps of the Astors and the Vanderbilts—OUT of the New York Social Register. For the first time in its 73-year history the society's Who's Who has dropped a member of the social elite. Whitneys can without being requested to do so. The 1958 register, just off the presses, gave the gate to Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney. The register's mysterious 'advisory committee' apparently hounded the mining tycoon turned film producer because he did not voice his second wife to marry Mrs. Mary Hofstad, a divorcee he met when she was playing a role in one of his movies. Whitney's cousin, U.S. Ambassador to Britain John Hay Whitney, asked the register to discontinue his listing several years ago because he felt it was an demagogue. But the Whitney coupstill makes up a sizeable bloc in the little black volume, compared to the three Astor listings and three Vanderbilt listings that have managed to survive divorce, scandal and other Social Register bugaboo. There was many a shock in the register for sensitive socialists Barbara Hutton apparently gave the kiss of death to the listing of young author Philip Van Rensselaer, descendant of one of New York's oldest Dutch clans. Barbara, who was dropped years ago, travelled all over Europe and Mexico last year with Philip, and it was widely reported that they were thinking of marriage despite the fact that he was 20 years her junior. Rosemary Warburton, who has been vying with Mrs. Thomas Bancroft Jr. for the title of No. 1 New York hostess, failed to get back into the register by marrying one of its listees, poet Hugh Chisholm Jr., son of a Maine paper manufacturing family.

Bulganin, Seriously Ill, Hospitalized

MOSCOW (UPI)—Marshal Nikolai Bulganin who was replaced as premier last April is seriously ill and undergoing medical treatment in Moscow, reliable sources said today. Nature of his illness was not disclosed. The 63-year-old Bulgarian also was reported ill last June and in 1955 when he was unable to receive a visiting Finnish delegation. Premier Nikita Khrushchev disclosed last summer Bulganin had undergone an operation in a Moscow hospital. His 1955 illness was announced by the official Soviet news agency Tass, the first time such an announcement had been made about a Soviet official since Josef Stalin suffered a stroke in March 1953. After his June illness it was announced that Bulganin had taken up the post of chairman of the economic council of the remote and minor Stavropol area. This was followed by his elimination from the Presidium of the Communist Party's Central Committee. Last week Khrushchev denounced Bulganin as a member of the Malenkov-Molotov "anti-party group" which opposed Khrushchev's economic plans. This led observers to conclude Bulganin had been removed from his job in Stavropol. Thursday Pravda, the official Communist newspaper, made the serious charge that Bulganin and the other members of the disgraced group "put the brakes on development of the Soviet Union."

Lost Tot Chooses Santa Over Police

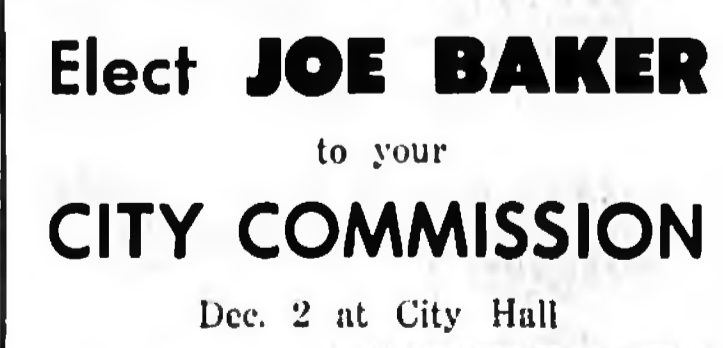

Church and synagogue services throughout the country will stress three facts about the holiday which the faithful insist:

1. Its historic purpose is religious — to express gratitude to God for the blessings bestowed upon this nation.
2. A spirit of thankfulness is particularly appropriate now, because America has become an oasis of abundance in a world-wide desert of want.
3. The most fitting way to give thanks is by sharing this abundance with the ragged, hungry and homeless millions of other lands.

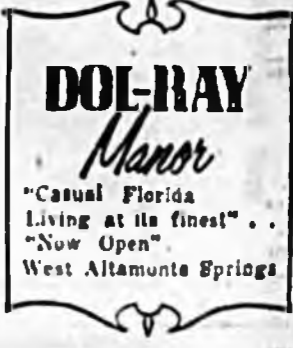
Each of the three faiths will suggest a specific way in which the sharing can be done.

Protestant churches will collect special offerings for the "share our surplus" program of Church World Service, the overseas relief agency of the National Council of Churches.

Catholics are asked to contribute 10 million pounds of "good used clothing" through their churches. It will be shipped overseas by Catholic Relief Services, a branch of the National Catholic Welfare conference.

The United Jewish Appeal, sponsored by the Synagogue Council of America, will seek funds for refugees and other impoverished groups abroad.

Religious agencies are the principal channels by which Americans send "person to person" aid abroad. This year they will handle more than 80 per cent of all voluntary U.S. overseas relief.

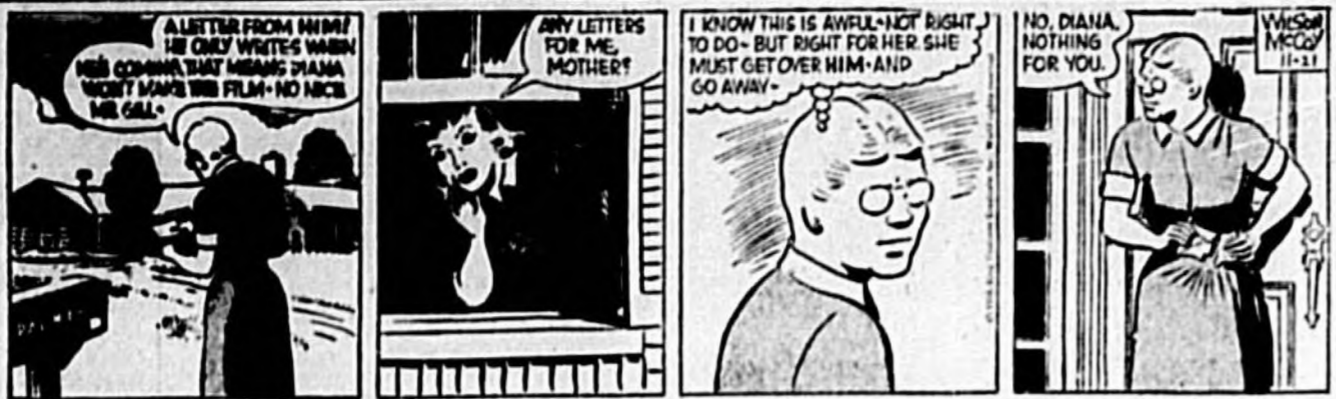

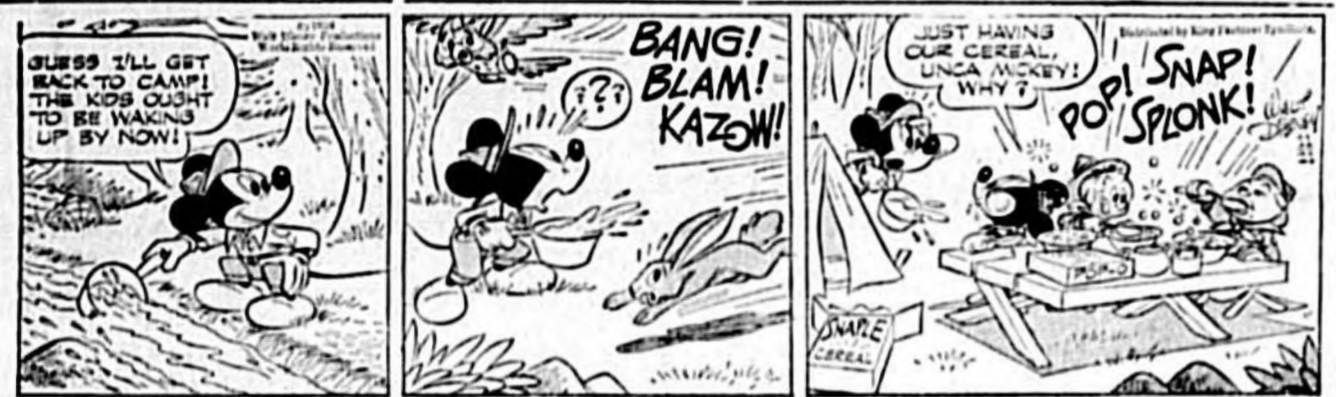

Body Of Baby Is Found In Pet Cemetery

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A nationwide search was pressed today for a construction worker police believed the father of a baby whose body was found buried in a pet cemetery in Frederick, Md.

Larry Lord Motherwell, 42, the man in question, took his 14-month old mongoloid daughter from a Takoma Park, Md., nursing home in 1953. She was his daughter by his first wife, who was found drowned in her apartment here in 1953 in what police ruled an accidental death.

Police said Motherwell also was wanted for questioning about the mysterious disappearance of a wealthy former Washington resident, Mrs. Pearl Ada Putney, 72, who was last seen Aug. 15 leaving a motel in Marysville, Calif.

Motherwell was reported to have aided Mrs. Putney in management of a \$50,000 inheritance, mostly in securities, which also is unaccounted for. She also may have had as much as \$19,000 of cash on her person.

Police said they dug up a coffin containing the decomposed body believed to be that of a female child 12 to 18 months of age. Motherwell told a friend at about the time he took his daughter from the nursing home that his dog had died and he wanted to bury it in a pet cemetery, police said.

Witnesses told police the box in which the body was found was buried in June 1954. Witnesses to the burial believed they were sharing Motherwell's grief over the death of a dog which he said had saved his life behind enemy lines in the Korean War. Police said it had been established Motherwell never was in military service, but had been convicted twice of impersonating an officer.

No warrant has been issued against Motherwell because it has not yet been established that the body found in Frederick was that of his child. Nor has it been definitely established that the missing Mrs. Putney met with foul play. The second Mrs. Motherwell

It said constitutional amendments already have been prepared to proclaim the boy heir apparent to the Iranian throne. The move would end the crisis which forced the Shah to divorce Soraya earlier this year, because she was childless.

The newspaper said the Shah will go to Switzerland after visiting Italy next week, and would be with his daughter Princess Shahrez when she gives birth in a maternity home near Lausanne. Shahrez is the daughter of the Shah's former wife Princess Fawzia, sister of former King Farouk of Egypt.

Bomb Call Clears Courthouse, Jail

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI)—Some 500 persons were evacuated from the Broward County Courthouse Wednesday after authorities received an anonymous telephone call that a bomb had been placed in the four-story building.

About 100 prisoners housed in the county jail on the fourth floor were taken from their cells and ordered into the ground floor lobby.

They were returned to their cells about 45 minutes later after a search failed to turn up any bombs.
