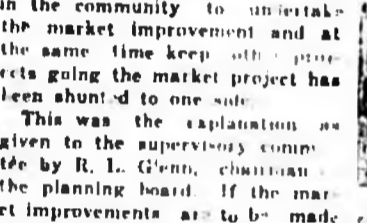

The Cup That Cheers

Sometime ago, we were lurching with a friend in a restaurant, and when the waiter asked what kind of tea we wanted, we replied casually, "Oh, any kind, what's the difference?" We'll never forget the horrified expression of our friend who exploded indignantly, "Barbarian! There are as many different varieties of tea as there are kinds of flowers. You might just as well say that there's really no difference between a sunflower and a Tallman rose." It seems that there are three main divisions of tea, classed by the method of curing. There is black tea, tea that is fermented; green or unfermented; and the semi-fermented which is known as oolong. Oolong tea comes largely from the Island of Formosa, and some of it is brought from China where it gets its name, "Ou-Loung," which means, "green dragon."

Another name with an interesting origin is orange pekoe. It comes from the Chinese, "Pak-ho," which means silver hair, so called because the first China tea had a leaf of silver with tiny hair. In Ceylon and India, the orange tint of these hairs caused the prefix of orange to pekoe. Orange Pekoe is not a certain brand or quality of tea as is sometimes thought but only denotes a particular size of black leaf tea. This size leaf is put up by many companies and in many different grades of tea. So the mere name, Orange Pekoe, does not guarantee a fine drink.

In India, the various teas are divided under the names of the districts from which they come, and Darjeeling is considered superior. Ceylon, Java, and Sumatra as well as India produce black teas. From China, comes the China congous, or black "English breakfast" teas, and also, the green China tea which is rolled into different shapes, called imperial, hyson, and gunpowder. And from Japan, we also get much green tea.

The charms of tea have been celebrated by so many writers that tea has somehow taken on a literary flavour of its own. The opprobrium of being an effeminate drink has been attached to it, but that this conception is erroneous can be refuted by the roster of famous tea-tippers who were anything but "sissie." Chief of these is Samuel Johnson who termed himself, "a hardened and shameless tea drinker who for twenty years diluted his meals only with the infusion of this fascinating plant, who with tea amused the evening, with tea solaced the midnight, and with tea welcomed the morning." And coming down to the twentieth century, a modern American tea-fancier who would not exactly be regarded as emasculated is the ex-heavyweight champion, Gene Tunney.

O. O. McIntyre is impressed with the prodigious meal the Brits make of tea, and lists an array of Gruyere sandwiches, anchovies, jelly, bread and butter, scones, and crumpets that have made tea-table talk obsolete because "everybody is too busy teaguing."

Some of the glamour that hangs about tea arises from the fact that it is a native of India, the cradle of romance, where diamonds are as big as ostrich eggs, elephants trumpet to the rising sun, and anything happen. An interesting angle for the housewife in choosing tea is that the tiny buds and small leaves usually make a superior quality of drink while the larger leaves which present a better appearance, make a poorer tea. So it seems that this tea worship is quite elaborate, and woe unto the waiter who brings a black Ceylon to a tippler who asks for Formosa Oolong, or to the store-keeper who suggests that the gentleman will find little difference between the basket-fired Japan green and the Chinese gunpowder. The real tea connoisseur prides himself on being able to tell by the aroma, the bouquet, and the body not only what country in which the plant grew, but in what province, the length of time the leaves were withered, and even into what shape they were rolled!

Thunder In The East

With Italy well embarked upon her buccaneering adventure in Ethiopia, the European powers trying desperately to reach some effective means of putting an end to the struggle, and the world at large helplessly watching the conflagration spread, there come disturbing sounds of "thunder in the East" about the naval parity question. The New York Herald Tribune sees the hegemony of the eastern portion of Asia and the Islands which lie to the southeast as the ultimate goal of Japan in her insistence upon equality in naval tonnage.

"Japan's truculence in insisting rigidly and stubbornly that the principle of parity be accepted at the opening of the naval conference in London is not so disturbing as is the success of Japan in putting the naval cart before the political horse. Abstract parity—or equality of the naval strength—has no meaning except in the light of the political forces which motivate Japan's demand for a Navy equal to Britain's or America's. Adequate discussion of the political aspects of the naval problem is, however, still distasteful to Japan.

"The Japanese have consistently overlooked or obscured the fact that the Washington conference of 1921 covered not only the limitation of naval armaments but also the settlement of political disputes affecting the Pacific and the Asiatic mainland. At the conference a number of accords were reached which, while not directly linked together by treaty, were nevertheless, accepted only because they formed part of a general program. The limitation of naval fortifications in the western Pacific was a political concession to Japan. The nine-power treaty, which, among other things, pledged the signatories to respect the political and territorial integrity of China, was a vital part of the general accord.

"Japan has flagrantly violated that treaty. She is now embarked on a policy of aggression in Asia. If, as seems almost certain, her ultimate aim is the hegemony of the eastern portion of that continent and the Islands which lie to the southeast, this is a matter of vital concern to Britain and the United States and directly affects their naval policies.

"In other words, it is no more possible now than in 1921 to disentangle the naval problem from international politics. A Navy is an arm of diplomacy. There is—or should be—a direct connection between Navy and foreign policy.

If Japan is bent on a policy of rule or ruin the Western powers will be better off without a Treaty of Naval Limitations than with one which, while granting Japan equality of tonnage, would, in fact, assure Japanese supremacy in the western Pacific from Unalaska to Australia.

JERSEY CITY, Dec. 17.—What is believed to be the first radio broadcast from a courtroom in the history of the New Jersey courts will be made on Dec. 20, when James W. Gerard, former Ambassador to Germany, will address a class of 250 new citizens in the Hudson County Naturalization Court, Judge Thomas H. Brown, of the Court of Common Pleas, announced today.

Booklets telling all and sundry about the many advantages Florida has to offer in the way of business opportunities and recreational facilities are being sent out by many localities.

The Seminole County booklet is now on the press, with the promise of delivery of 10,000 copies in a few days, and residents are asked to call at the office of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and procure copies when available, or to send to the Chamber of Commerce the names and addresses of persons to whom they wish the booklets sent, and they will be mailed out. Postage on the Seminole County booklets, S. D. Higleyman reports, is one and one-half cents.

Miami and Miami Beach lead, as usual, in the number of booklets, each of those tourist cities issuing more than 100,000. The Miami Herald reports that more than 50,000 booklets on Miami Beach have been sent to individuals and travel bureaus throughout the United States. It was announced by Mrs. Agnes M. Purnell, newly appointed secretary of the Miami Beach Chamber of Commerce.

Most of the remaining 25,000 booklets on hand will be sent to individuals in the North who are requesting literature through advertisements appearing in Northern Newspapers.

Phone Call Appreciation
 "Excuse it please, party's hung up, sorry." How often we get just that answer when we go to the phone, sometimes breathless, others we have knocked over a chair or bumped our shin, but small matter to the one who put in the call.

This happens so often in many instances where women are busy that I have decided to commit a little missionary errand in behalf of senders and receivers of phone calls.

Yes, this is a resolution as it might be called to affect those who call a number and if the "hello" reply is not heard within anywhere from 11 to 25 steps to the phone by the one putting in the call, up goes the receiver and central is left "with the bag to hold." Then there is another class of callers that must irritate the very finest texture of central's humor, the type that changes his mind immediately they take the receiver off the hook to make a call, or make the call and then immediately hang up, again central "holds the bag."

In the former class many of us have wide experience, in the latter group experience is formed by being "stood by" when calls of that character were made.

Board Announces New Curriculum At State College

Emphasis Placed On General Education

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 17.—Revision of the curriculum of Florida State College for Women in the freshman and sophomore years with emphasis placed on a program of general education has been made by the college faculty senate composed of representatives from every department of the college headed by President Edward Conrad.

The college objectives for the students as explained by President Conrad follow:
 1. To achieve and maintain a state of health that will contribute to successful living.
 2. To develop the ability to express her ideas clearly and correctly in both spoken and written English.
 3. To have a reading knowledge of one foreign language.
 4. To have an acquaintance with the historic and contemporary organization of society.
 5. To have a reasonable understanding of her physical and biological environment.
 6. To understand and appreciate the factors that enter the effective family life.
 7. To have an appreciation of literature and other forms of art.
 8. To gain an introduction to the best philosophical thought as it relates to successful living.
 9. To have an understanding of her own mental make-up and the personality of those with whom she must live.

In order that all regular students attending Florida State College for Women benefit by the general education which the required courses are intended to provide, the senate ruled that the requirements are to be effective in all divisions of the college with the exception of the School of Music. This ruling takes in the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Education, and the School of Home Economics. Two-year students in the School of Education will conform as far as possible to the general plan, and will conform entirely when they continue the work for any degree.

Under the new plan a student in the first two years will take fewer courses with more class periods in those subjects than under the plan now in existence. For a survey course she will attend a class five hours a week, and for an elective course four hours a week. A student may have as many as 17 hours of classes a week. By having more class periods per course a week, a course will be completed as a unit of work at the end of a semester and not at the close of the school year as is the case in most of the courses now offered.

Before graduation a student will be required to pass a comprehensive examination on "family life," for which are to be worked out by a committee of the faculty representing the departments of economics, home economics, hygiene, psychology, and sociology under the chairmanship of Dr. Margaret R. Sandels, dean of the School of Home Economics.

State Licenses On Slot Machines Must Be Paid, Says Lee

TAMPA, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Comptroller J. M. Lee, who described them all as "damnable things with hellward tendencies" last night announced a campaign against slot machines operated without license from the state.

Administration of the slot machine law was placed upon the comptroller's office by the Legislature. The comptroller approves license permits and sends them to the county tax collectors to issue the license and collect the state's fee of \$30 annually on each machine. Approximately 7,000 permits have been issued out of a maximum of 10,000 allowed by law in the entire state.

Prohibition In Air To Be Continued

CHICAGO, Dec. 17.—(AP)—Americans favor prohibition in the clouds, at least, it was indicated by a poll.

C. B. Smith, president of one of the major transport concerns (American Airlines, Inc.), announced that patrons had voted on the subject. He added: "The result indicates that public opinion is against serving cocktails on airplanes. We will continue our existing policy of not serving any form of intoxicating liquor."

most unnecessary bank panic in all our history." He called the New Deal unemployment relief organization "typical of the whole gamut of waste, folly, ineffectiveness, politics and destruction of self-government."

"The inevitable and driving purpose of any bureaucracy," he said, "is to use its powers to secure its jobs. The sudden appropriations to cities, counties and states singularly suited to elections. And this is not the only method of making politics out of human misery."

"When in the face of a decrease in the unemployed, the cost of relief rises from \$1,100,000,000 to an appropriation of \$4,800,000,000 in a single year, it is certainly reason for searching inquiry. . . . Every community has been forced to become a conspiracy to get their share from the federal grab bag."

and consent of Democratic politicians." He asserted the Administration's "hoarding" was shown by the "flooding" of those in distress from the FERA or PWA or its subsidiaries to EPW, then to SERA, then to CWA, partly to FRSC, then back to SERA, and over to PWA.

"It has been a sort of rainmaker's cabalistic dance." Attacking the President's Atlanta statement, Hoover said: "I have always believed that the newspapers are one of the mechanisms of civilization. They did not quit. . . . I saw no headlines that the farmers had ceased to till the fields. Most of you did not detect that the delivery of food to your doors had stopped. . . . We still had to jump out of the way of 23,000,000 automobiles. . . . And the Supreme Court seems to be functioning yet."

"If civilization came to a dead stop the press missed a great piece of news that day." Hoover said the bank panic was precipitated by the realization that Democratic campaign promises were to be "violated" and that currency "tampered with."

"After the election of the New Deal we began a retreat," he said. "Only in the United States was there an interruption. . . . he other countries went forward. They adapted no new deal. Apparently they did not hear that the mechanics of civilization came to a dead stop on Mar. 3, 1933."

"The President justifies the 1-2 billion rise in debt by the New Deal by suggesting it is offset by nearly 4-1-2 billions of recoverable assets. . . . He received more than \$220,000,000 of these recoverable assets from my administration; or, alternatively, they have realized these assets and spent the money."

He quoted Roosevelt as saying the debt increase under the Hoover administration was "a little less than four billions," and added: "The little less was \$400,000,000."

"With these corrections the internal Foods. He urged business, in a magazine article, to "gang up" against Administration policies but he found it advisable later to withdraw the expression and explain that he only meant "get together."

It would be easy to draw hasty conclusions from all of this, with no facts to support them. For one thing, the degree to which all business, big and little, is against the President has not been established. The Democrats contend that they will have much business and banking support next year, particularly from communities largely dependent on agriculture.

Another thing to be borne in mind is that the mere existence of important financial backing for the Republicans does not prove that the election is to be "bought," or that any illegal or immoral methods are to be indulged in. The legitimate expenses of a national campaign are tremendous, and both parties spend plenty of money when they have it.

All that can be done now is to note the facts as they exist and wonder what may come out of them.

It indicates some mild excess of assets and at the same time great restraint on the part of the New Deal."

Saying "I believe I can without egotism claim to have had some special experience in relief," Hoover suggested the following relief plans:

1. "Stop these wasteful federal public works projects; confine them to projects which meet the needs of the nation. . . . 2. "Decentralize the administration of all other forms of relief. Turn them back to the states and local communities. . . . In joint co-operation with governors, mayors and county authorities, enlist again the voluntary services of American men and women on a non-partisan basis. . . . Allot to the states less than one-half the present funds being spent in the relief. Require the local authorities to find from their local funds at least 5 percent as a check on waste. Discharge most of the federal officials. . . . The unemployed will be better cared for than they are today. . . . 3. "Do it now. That would go far to assure a clean election. . . . 4. . . . True relief must come from honest, productive jobs, not from public funds. Those jobs would return quickly if the currency were stabilized and the torrent of unnecessary expenditures were stopped and the budget were balanced."

Hoover asked young Americans to study their country and debate every phase of its government. "What you decide," he said, "will be final for your country, for you have your votes."

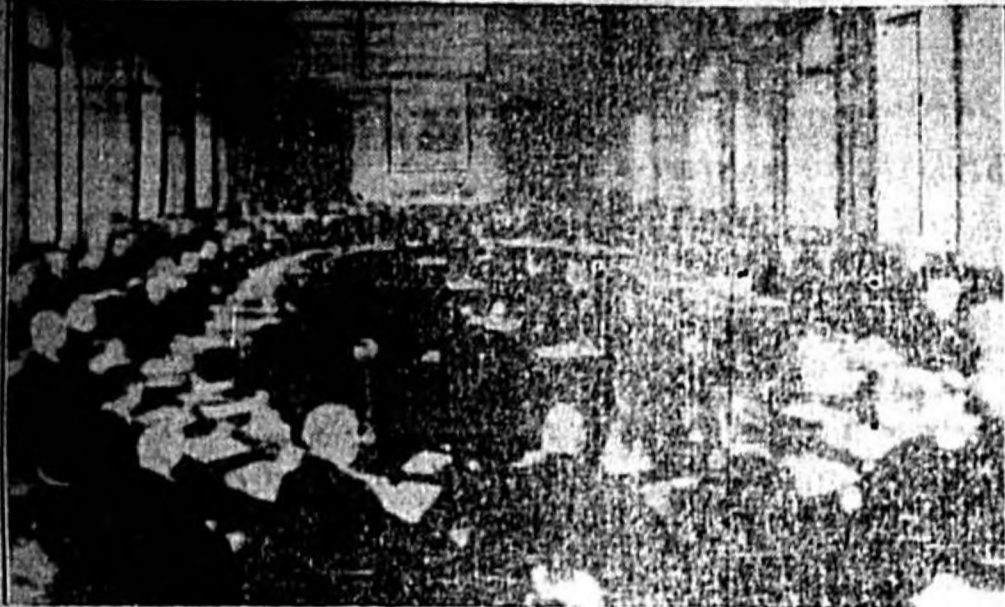

Panel Of Six Jurors Drawn To Try Brady

Morning Session Was Taken Up In Questioning Dozen Men Called For Service

Legislator Held For Embezzlement

Negro Sentenced To 2 Years For Murder Of His Wife

The state rested its case against E. K. Brady about 3 o'clock this afternoon. The defendant was on the stand at press time.

E. E. Brady, member of the State Legislature from Seminole County, went on trial in Circuit Court today on an indictment by the Grand Jury charging him with embezzlement.

Nearly all the morning was spent in examining jurors, and a panel of six men was finally chosen shortly before the noon recess. Testimony was to be introduced at the afternoon session.

The defendant is represented by Attorney E. F. Housholder, assisted by Attorney Geo. A. DeCotto, while the state is represented by Assistant State Attorney L. F. Boyle.

These jurors were finally chosen to try the action: Chris S. Thompson of Sanford, W. G. Weltman of Oviedo, T. L. Shrawsbury of Gardonia Farms; E. H. Geiger of Geneva, J. A. Brown of Sanford, and L. E. Stevens of Lake Monroe.

C. L. Flowers was excused by the court, the juror stating he had formed an opinion. The state accused J. C. Muse on his own statement that he would rather not serve, having at one time been employed by the defendant.

The defense accused C. L. Allen, A. M. Stewart and B. H. Smith, Attorney Housholder stating that he excused them on the request of his client.

The first juror selected, Mr. Thompson, replied to questioning by defense counsel Housholder said he did not take the Sanford Herald and had not therefore read of the Brady case, and the attorney stated that he, too, does not take the Herald. All of those examined for jury service were asked as to whether they had read of the case.

United States Debt Is Now \$30,555,000,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The national debt reached \$30,555,000,000 today, passing the thirty billion mark for the first time in history. The new high was reached by the mid-December financing operations which added \$25,500,000 to the debt. The debt was near the figure estimated by President Roosevelt for the end of the fiscal year next June—\$30,722,000,000.

"When Winter Comes" reads the caption over a blizzard scene on the front cover, but below this view of stinging cold is the warm face of Old Sol surrounded by pictures of a man taking his seat in a chair on a pretty lawn, of another man driving a speed boat on Lake Monroe and of another fishing, with the view of a hunter, with a wolf in the background, as seen from the other side of the lake.

After reading the "When Winter Comes" caption at the top of the cover the glances drift to the bottom, and there is read: "Come to Seminole County, Sanford, Florida.—Rest, Play, Golf, Fish, Hunt in our glorious climate, Dec. average 60 degrees, yearly 75 degrees."

It is an attractive cover in color and, in the opinion of S. D. Hightleyman, chairman of the committee which prepared the booklet, is one that should intrigue the interest of any person in whose hands the advertising literature might fall.

The back of the booklet contains two maps, one of Florida showing Sanford as being in the center of everything worthwhile in this state, with distances shown from Sanford to other points of interest. The other map is of Seminole County, showing all lakes, towns and connecting roads.

Counsel's Advice Rejected By Boy Held For Murder

Insists On Pleading Guilty In Spite Of Alleged 'Good' Case

Declared by Court attaches to be a "most unusual proceeding," Virgil Gray, 16, indicted for murder, told the court this morning that he wished to plead guilty to manslaughter despite the advice of Geo. W. Schofield, for 16 years state's attorney in the fifth circuit, who was in court stated that in all his experiences he had never known of a defendant in a criminal action entering a guilty plea against the advice of his attorney.

Virgil Gray was in court with his father, C. C. Gray, jointly indicted with for murder, and the Court was advised that the State would not press the case against the elder and accept a plea of guilty to manslaughter by the boy.

Attorney Garland W. Spencer was appointed by the Court at the time the Gracys were arraigned to represent them in their trial, and he informed the Court that he had been working hard on the case for 10 days and felt that "we have a good case of self defense." "I have argued with the boy and his father and other members of the family, advising them to let the case go to trial," the attorney continued, "but I cannot change their minds in the matter."

The Court passed the case for the time being, and later during one of the recesses took the lad into his private office, along with Attorney Spencer, and talked with him for 10 minutes. There was no indication as to the result of that conference.

In open court the boy told Judge M. B. Smith that he fully realized what he was doing in insisting that he enter a plea of guilty to manslaughter, even though his attorney had advised him that by pleading guilty a stigma of guilt would attach to his name through life.

The Grand Jury indictment charged Virgil Gray and C. C. Gray, his father, with having caused the death of Odell Bumbalough last July 15.

Market Roads Appropriation Will Be Paved, For Canal May Says Pynchon Be Asked For

State WPA Director New PWA Setup Now Is Uncertain About Building Platform For Car Loadings Planned By President To Continue Projects Started

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said yesterday a Public Works bill involving probably somewhat less than \$200,000,000 would be submitted at the next session of Congress.

His statement was the first of administration plans for continuing emergency expenditures. The Chief Executive said he was not yet ready to discuss the amount that would be recommended for relief.

The Public Works bill, Mr. Roosevelt said, would not be a lump sum as in recent appropriations but would be for specific projects, chiefly those already underway.

He disclosed his plan for a public works measure when questioned at his regular press conference about future appropriations for the Florida ship canal. The Chief Executive said he considered that project a major public work which should be passed upon by Congress and that it would be included in the proposed bill. This Public Works program, the President said, probably will not reach as high a figure as \$500,000,000.

Informed of the President's statement, Senator Fletcher (D-Fla.), an advocate of the waterway, said he expected more funds to be provided before Congress convenes. He expressed confidence that Congress would get the appropriation later.

Construction of the mammoth canal was begun with a \$5,000,000 presidential allocation from the \$2,250,000,000 works appropriation. This probably will be spent by the time Congress convenes whether to give the project its sanction.

No indication was given, however, of the specific amount to be sought in the Public Works bill. Nor did Fletcher say how much he expected in another presidential allotment. Army engineers have estimated they can use \$20,000,000 during the first year of construction and \$25,000,000 a year thereafter until completion.

Lindbergh Kidnap Case Not Solved, Hoffman Believes

TRENTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman had today that he is satisfied the Lindbergh baby kidnap murder case has not been fully solved, but that he has "never expressed any element of doubt as to Bruno Hauptmann's guilt."

"Hauptmann stands guilty as convicted by the courts," said the governor.

Asked if he believed the ultimate solution of the case had been reached, he said "in my opinion, it has not. No state official is warranted in thinking that it has and in saying that the books are closed you can't quote me, however, as saying there is any element of doubt as to Hauptmann's guilt. The courts have passed on that."

The announcement that Tittsworth asked and gained a leave came last night after widespread rumors he was going to be suspended.

Schools Of Seminole County Get \$6,867 In State Funds; \$500,038 State Allocation

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Treasurer Knott today credited allocations totaling \$500,038 to the public schools of Florida. This brought the amount already allocated this year to 1,275,000 compared with \$538,803 at the same period last year. Seminole County's share of the half million dollar allocation for the schools was \$6,867.82.

The half-million dollar distribution included \$100,000 transferred from the motor vehicle expense fund, which amount represented economies and savings in the administration of the motor vehicle department and \$150,000 from the general revenue fund, which latter represents increased collections under Comptroller Lee's direction and economies in state government expenditures and \$250,000 from the sale of tags.

The distribution is in line with the publicly expressed policies of Governor Smith and Comptroller Lee that every effort of the state government be directed to making available a minimum of \$9,000,000 of state aid for the schools this year and \$10,500,000 if humanly possible. The schools received \$5,467,924 state aid last term.

CARACAS, Venezuela, Dec. 18.—(AP)—General Juan Vicente Gomez, 78, president of Venezuela and the nation's dictator for more than a quarter of a century, died during the night. The national assembly immediately made General Alvarez Lopez Cordero, minister of war, provisional president.

General Lopez will hold office until Congress assembles to elect a successor to Gomez. He issued a proclamation to the public expressing the nation's sorrow and asking maintenance of peace and order. The capital was quiet.

Gomez's death often had been rumored during the past five years. In each case repatriation movements have been formulated among thousands of Venezuelan exiles scattered through America and Europe. Gomez was his place of power by a revolution, overthrowing Cipriano Castro in 1908 and kept his place by defeating a dozen other revolutionary movements directed against him.

Masaryk Quits, Benes Is Chosen President Of Czechoslovakia

PRAHA, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Edvard Benes was elected second president of the Republic of Czechoslovakia by the national assembly today to succeed Dr. Thomas G. Masaryk who resigned last Saturday at the age of 85. Benes, protégé of the first president and foreign minister during much of Masaryk's 17 year term, received 310 votes to 24 for Proffeser the Czech agrarian party, who withdrew yesterday from the presidential race. There were 76 blank ballots.

"In the first clashes we lost four officers and nine soldiers. Three officers were wounded.

"The losses of Ethiopians amount to several scores killed or wounded. Enemy losses have not yet been ascertained but are believed to be considerable.

"Simultaneously with the battle news came a report from Paris that well-informed sources indicated France is considering dropping its veto in the League of Nations plan to force the Franco-British plan for peace. It was suggested members of the League might drop their sanctions against Italy should Ethiopia turn down the peace plan.

"The enemies' operation gave rise to a battle which still is in progress and in which our aviation and detachments of armed tanks are participating actively.

"In the first clashes we lost four officers and nine soldiers. Three officers were wounded.

"The losses of Ethiopians amount to several scores killed or wounded. Enemy losses have not yet been ascertained but are believed to be considerable.

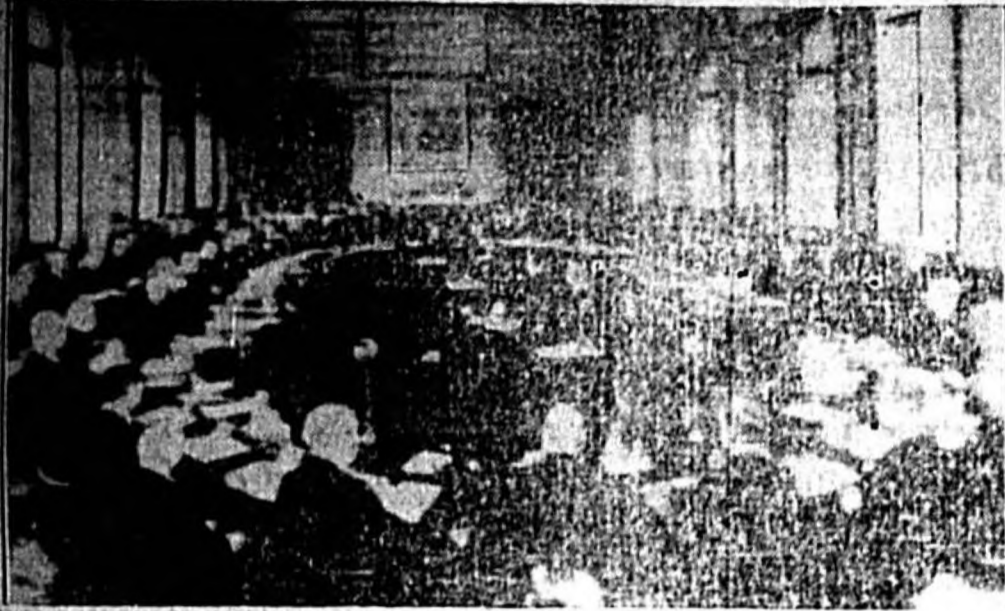
"Simultaneously with the battle news came a report from Paris that well-informed sources indicated France is considering dropping its veto in the League of Nations plan to force the Franco-British plan for peace. It was suggested members of the League might drop their sanctions against Italy should Ethiopia turn down the peace plan.

TWO SLAIN, SCORES HURT IN MEXICAN RIOT



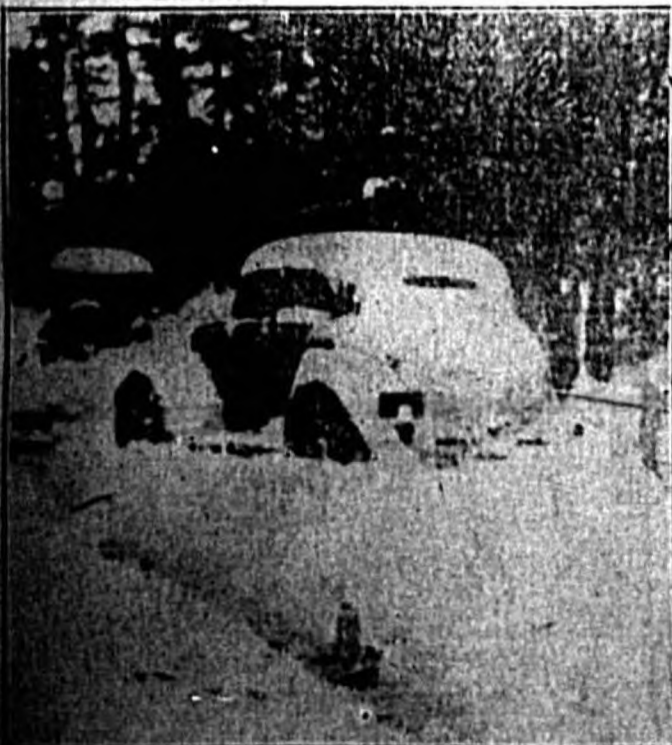

Panel Of Six Jurors Drawn To Try Brady

Morning Session Was Taken Up In Questioning Dozen Men Called For Service

Legislator Held For Embezzlement

Negro Sentenced To 2 Years For Murder Of His Wife

The state rested its case against E. K. Brady about 3 o'clock this afternoon. The defendant was on the stand at press time.

E. E. Brady, member of the State Legislature from Seminole County, went on trial in Circuit Court today on an indictment by the Grand Jury charging him with embezzlement.

Nearly all the morning was spent in examining jurors, and a panel of six men was finally chosen shortly before the noon recess. Testimony was to be introduced at the afternoon session.

The defendant is represented by Attorney E. F. Housholder, assisted by Attorney Geo. A. DeCotto, while the state is represented by Assistant State Attorney L. F. Boyle.

These jurors were finally chosen to try the action: Chris S. Thompson of Sanford, W. G. Weltman of Oviedo, T. L. Shrawsbury of Gardonia Farms; E. H. Geiger of Geneva, J. A. Brown of Sanford, and L. E. Stevens of Lake Monroe.

C. L. Flowers was excused by the court, the juror stating he had formed an opinion. The state accused J. C. Muse on his own statement that he would rather not serve, having at one time been employed by the defendant.

The defense accused C. L. Allen, A. M. Stewart and B. H. Smith, Attorney Housholder stating that he excused them on the request of his client.

The first juror selected, Mr. Thompson, replied to questioning by defense counsel Housholder said he did not take the Sanford Herald and had not therefore read of the Brady case, and the attorney stated that he, too, does not take the Herald. All of these examined for jury service were asked as to whether they had read of the case.

United States Debt Is Now \$30,555,000,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The national debt reached \$30,555,000,000 today, passing the thirty billion mark for the first time in history. The new high was added by the mid-December financing operations which added \$25,000,000 to the debt. The debt was near the figure estimated by President Roosevelt for the end of the fiscal year next June—\$30,722,000,000.
