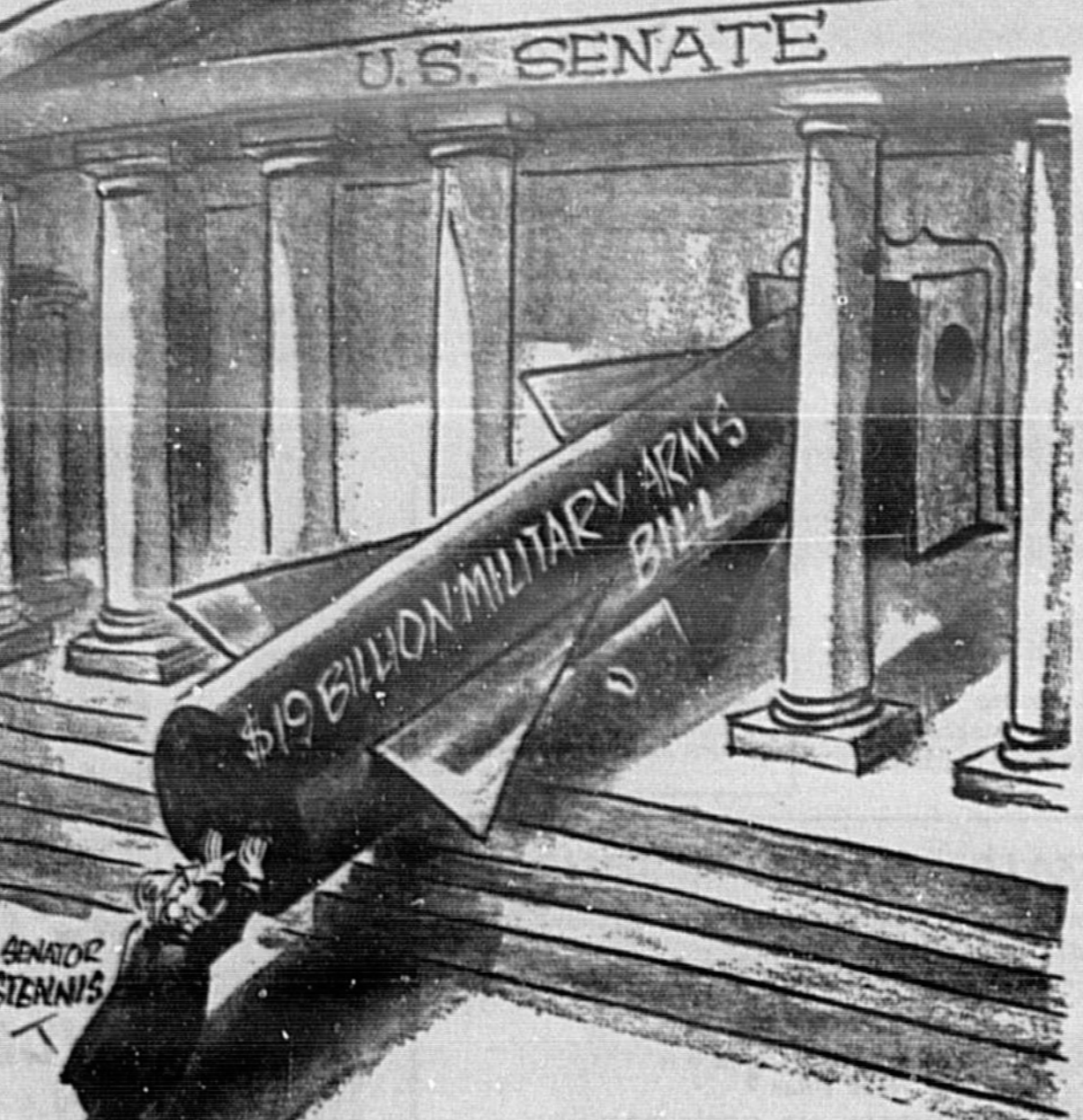
Two questions and answers were especially illuminating for those of the Fourth Estate seeking guides to the present thinking of Mr. Nixon when the "press" is concerned.

Open Space Approach

Pod Teaching; Now In Seminole

The "Open Space" and team teaching approach to elementary education appears to be moving into its own in Seminole County. "Pods," which house three or four traditional classrooms within one enormous room have been constructed in Seminole County's three new elementary schools.

This new trend in education is supplementing the more traditional, smaller individual classroom approach.

Basically, "open space" teaching means that a space larger than a single classroom is used. More than one group of children and more than one teacher occupy the room. Many schools across the nation supplement the program with a non-grading system, but this is not necessary, nor is that the case in any of the Seminole County schools.

Each approach is different, stresses Mrs. Mary Croone, curriculum coordinator for the Seminole County District School Board. The program is designed around the personalities, desires and abilities of the students and teachers.

Floyd Richards, who is preparing a thesis for his Ph. D. in education, taught fifth grade at Lake Mary Elementary School during the past year. He said his wife, Roberta, have a rather unique approach to team teaching. The two highly trained and experienced teachers in an auditorium as a classroom for their more than 60 fifth grade students. They utilize the open space concept, and provide an excellent example of team teaching in an open space classroom at work in this county.

Normally, an "open space" classroom will hold three to five "classes of teachers" and children. That is, 30 to 40 children and three to five teachers. The "pod," as this enormous classroom is called, may have visual barriers set down on the distraction of other students, and carpeting and acoustical techniques cut down substantially the noise level in the pods in the county's newer schools.

ONE LARGE CLASS

The students are treated as one class, divided into different groups during the day for their instruction in the various subject matter.

Thus the student may be with one group for reading, another for arithmetic, and still another for science, health and social studies. The group Johnny joins will be determined by his ability in that subject. He may be with one group for reading and several of the students from the reading group may join another group for arithmetic, and Johnny may join still another group of students for social studies.

Johnny's teacher for reading is quite likely to be different than his teacher for arithmetic or science," said Richards.

He explained: "This is not done because teacher A teaches only reading, while Teacher B teaches only arithmetic. The entire team (all the children and teachers in the pod) has reading at the same time, arithmetic at the same time, and so forth.

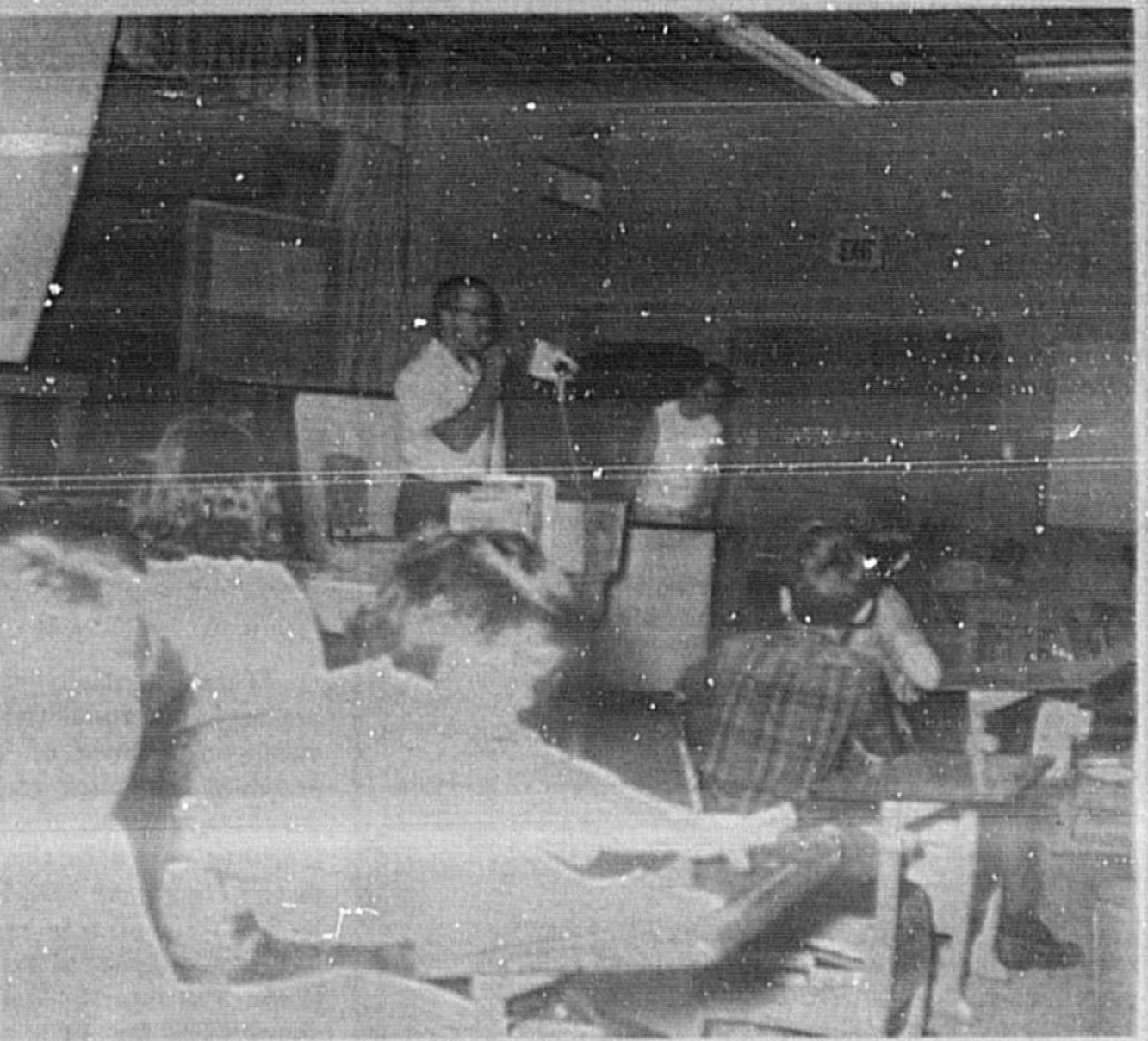
"Johnny is good at reading he needs to work with more complex skill development than does his friend, Ray, who likes to work with his hands but has trouble expressing himself verbally.

"Johnny may later work with a group of children who are not the best arithmetic students in the team because he has not yet developed a good number awareness."

APPROACHES VARY

The approaches to team teaching and open space are as varied as the number of teachers and number of students employed in the programs. One of the advantages of the system is the adaptability of the concept to the teachers and students involved.

In Longwood Elementary, for example, many different techniques are employed. Each grade level has its own unique approach to team teaching and open space.

At Longwood, as well as in other schools moving towards the "Open Space" classrooms, team planning served as a key. The attitude of the teacher—her willingness to move out of a self-contained classroom, and her ability to work well with other teachers—is vital, says Mrs. Arletta Coberly, the new principal of Longwood.

The teachers at each grade level determine how the plan will be put into effect at their grade level. They tailor the program at a specific grade level according to the chronological and mental ages of the students, the I. Q. and the achievement of those students.

Longwood has been a part of a pilot program for the past three years.

LEVEL SYSTEM, TOO

Longwood also incorporated the use of the level system. It works hand in hand with the team teaching and open space concepts.

The purpose of the level system is to free the child of anxiety, tension and fear in his school environment.

"In the level system the child is given a block of time in which to prepare for fourth grade work," explains a book, which is the same that is covered in grades 1-3, for example, three years, although some may take longer.

During this time the child will complete levels 1-9 which replace Grades 1, 2 and 3. When this block has been successfully completed the child will move to the fourth grade.

The individual attention to the open space and team teaching concepts enable the teacher to give to the child, gives the student the very best opportunity to complete these levels as quickly as he is able.

"Public reaction has been terrific," said Mrs. Coberly. "All involved, especially the parents, realize that the child can complete the program in the first two years in the program, the teachers now in the program are heartily in favor of it. It is difficult for many of the teachers in the inception of the program to adjust themselves to a team teaching, pod situation.

"But for next year we have only one opening on our staff," said Mrs. Coberly with a smile.

CHILDREN TESTED

The children are tested at the start and finish of each year. Thus they can continue each year where they left off the previous year. A student will continue his progress in September where he left off in June. He will not fall nor will he be held back.

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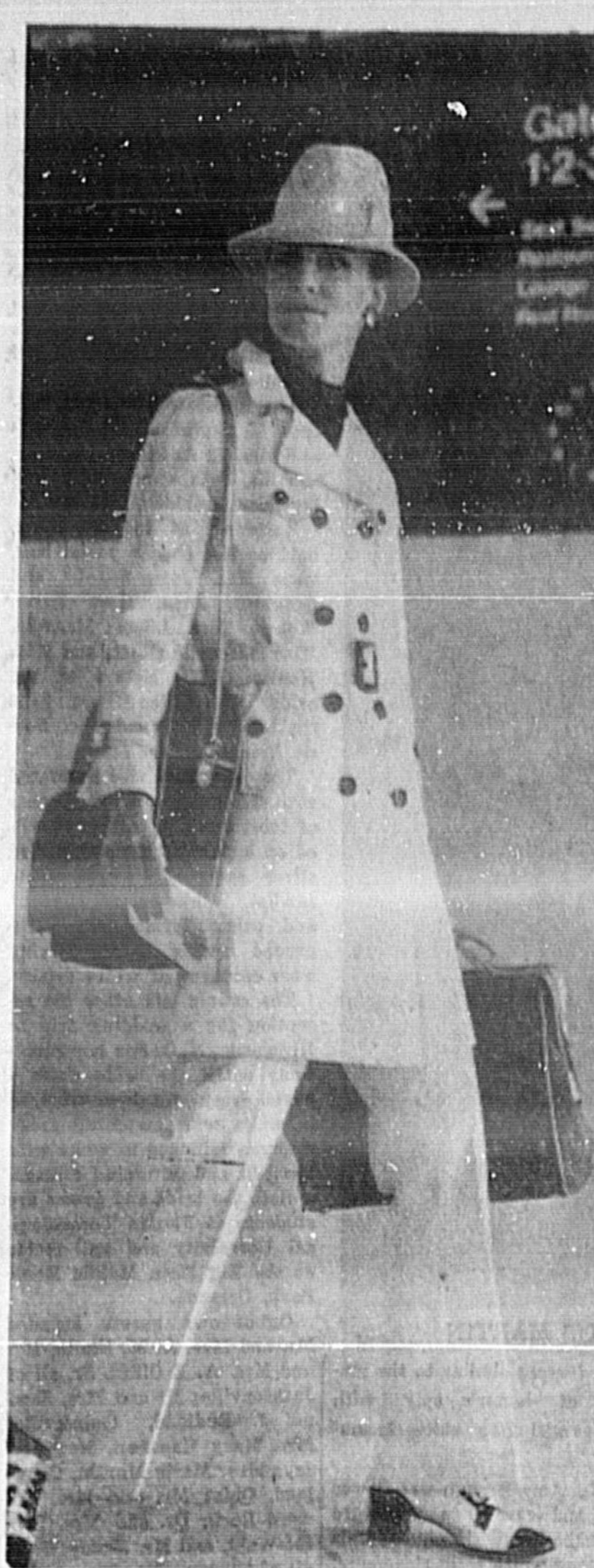

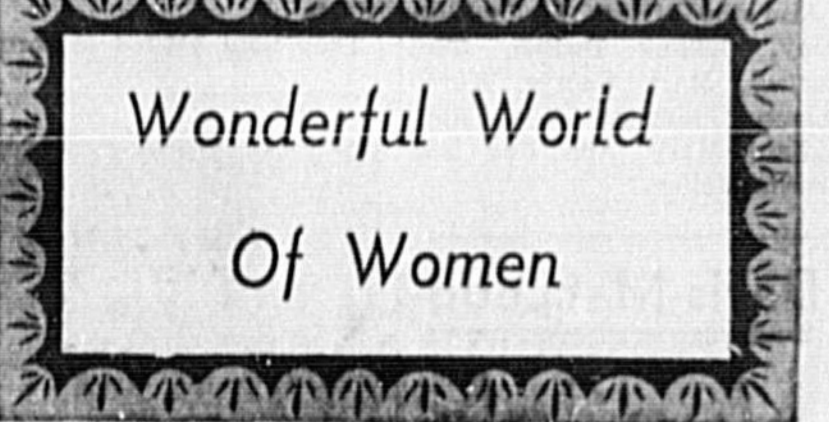
### Live Wire

NEW YORK (AP) — Former presidential aide Kennedy said today that he would not choose Lyndon B. Johnson as his running mate in 1968 because he felt that if elected he would be unable to "live with Johnson as Senate majority leader."

## Political Amnesty Seen In Uruguay

The government refused comment after the Tupamaros guerrillas Sunday demanded the release of all political prisoners. Pacheco Areco said earlier he would never "negotiate with an amnesty over the heads of a statement from Vice President Alberto Abdala that "this is the hour of peace, of reconciliation, of understanding and even of amnesty."

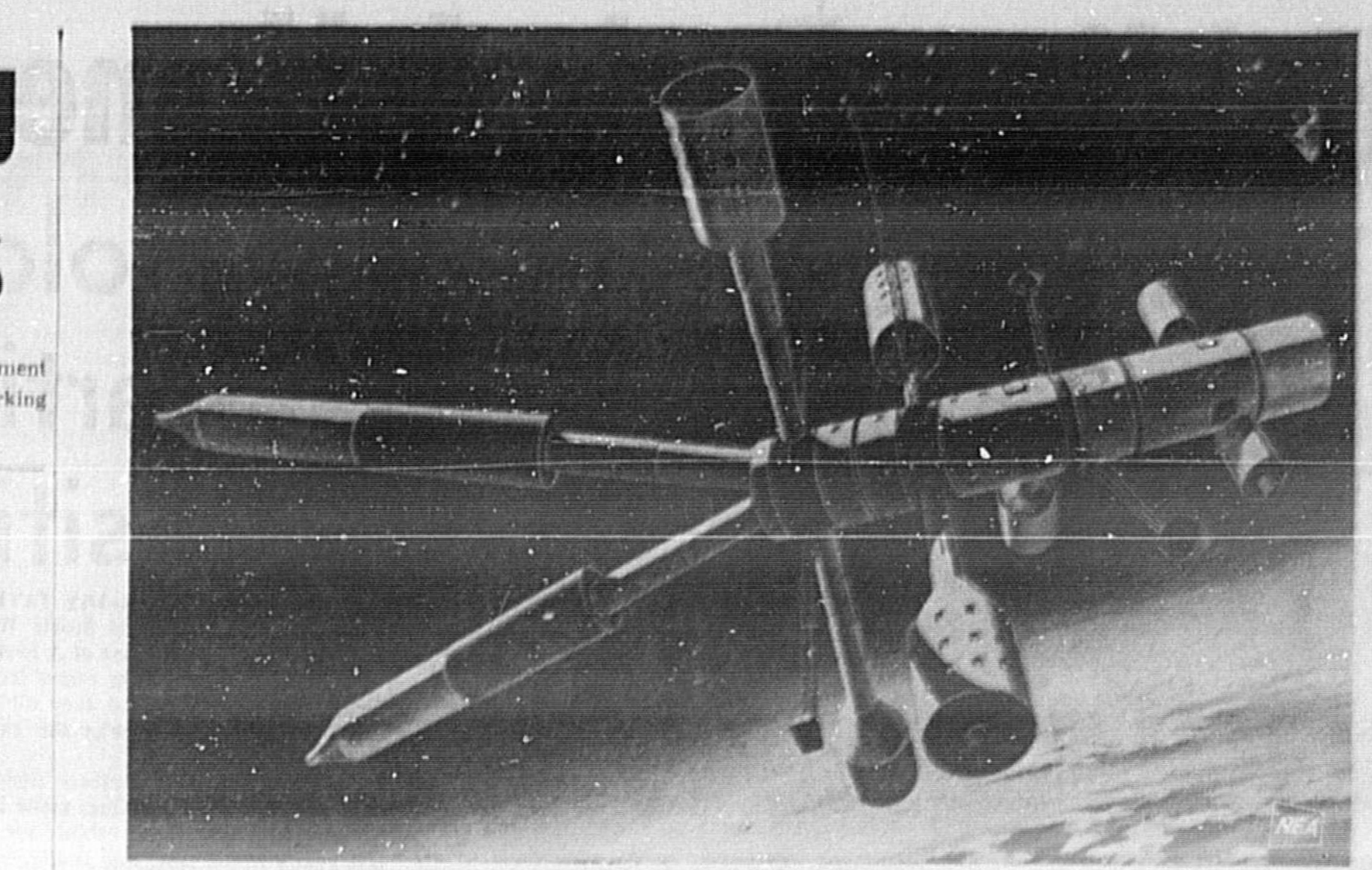

# 1970; Coffee, Tea With A Very Discernable Knee

NEW YORK (AP) — Airline stewardesses, centered by some of the nation's top designers, are turning thumbs down on the mid-line, promising at least one more year of coffee, tea and discernable knee.

Of 331 stewardesses, 100 said they would prefer to wear the knee-length jumps in the face of designers' when their new fashion line is revealed in mid-August. A permanent addition to the line is expected to be pants ensembles, used on a trial basis by TWA and popular with both stewardesses and customers, a spokesman said.

United Airlines, with 100 stewardesses, will wear their jumpers at two to three inches above the knee—exactly the length of their current uniforms.

Pan American Airways is offering hostesses a choice of two uniforms. One is a pair of slacks and a short-sleeved blouse. The other is a pair of slacks and a long-sleeved blouse. The slacks are to be made of a material that is easy to clean and will not wrinkle.

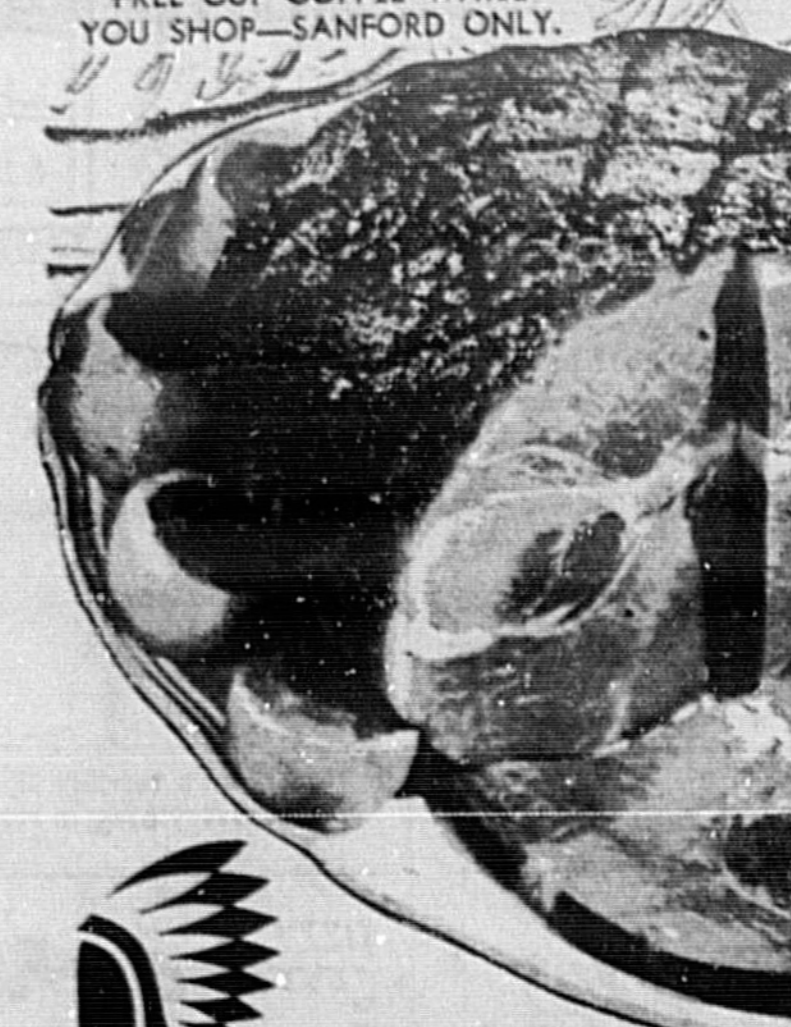

## County Reviews Parks For Future Acquisition

Acquisition of county parks was discussed at a meeting this morning of the County Commission by Fred Ganas representing the Long Range Planning Committee. Ganas showed the commission maps and transparencies of proposed sites in the county.  
Sites include the Wekiva-St. Johns area encompassing 500 acres; Island Pond-Buck Lake, 350 acres; Sand Lake (near the Orange County line) 80 acres; Lake Howell, 120 acres; Big Tree (to be used as a buffer between the county and the Eon. The former, Ganas said, was "unrealistic to acquire." However, Ganas continued, Monroe Park was not included in the initial report. Other than these three exceptions, the report closely followed the initial one by the committee, Ganas said.  
The transparencies delineated various utilization of the sites as follows: Wekiva-St. Johns... camping, swimming, picnicking, skiing, boating, horseback riding, nature trails, nature, hunting and fishing. Sand Lake includes the same with the exception of the deletion of skiing.  
Lake Howell has no horse back riding or hunting, but includes the water recharge area and deleting hunting. The park will have two entrance roads, which will be landscaped, street lights, and the trailers will have permanent skirts.  
The park will have its own shopping center with convenience stores. A 15 mile speed limit will be in effect and security guards will police the park. The development will be built in two phases; one section will be provided for adults, and the other for families.  
An area will be set aside for parking of boats, and there will be no air drying of clothing except in a designated area.

and the Justice Department, came just five days after Judge Scott shifted the jurisdiction in the case to Orlando and Judge Young.  
Judge Young in his decision stated, "I have carefully considered the proposed plan and this court cannot say that the proposed decree does not meet the requirements of the law."  
He continued, "Therefore the agreement between the parties to this suit concludes the controversy without the necessity of a hearing."  
The decision by Judge Young caught all concerned with the situation by surprise and the telephones at the administrative offices were kept ringing this morning by inquisitive parents.  
The pairing and zoning of schools will in Sanford cause a court decision affected their children.  
A board meeting has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on tonight and a large contingent of parents are expected to attend the school office with questions, but Andrew Bracken, administrative aide, has stressed that it will be Monday before the staff is able to arrive at a final boundary line affecting the school assignments.
