This Finnish War

With the battle on the Summa front in the Karelian Isthmus entering its fourteenth day, the Finns are still holding out in their defense against the Russian hordes after nearly three months of intensive warfare. Though the Russians claim some successes during the last few days, the Finns insist only outposts have been captured and that the main defenses of the Mannerheim Line are holding fast.

While the casualties on the Soviet side are running about ten times as high as the Finns are suffering, it seems almost a foregone conclusion that they cannot maintain their desperate resistance indefinitely. They are overwhelmingly outnumbered, without reserves, while supplies and ammunition are running low. The Russians are constantly throwing fresh troops into the battle while the tired Finns must keep up the fight day after day.

For the past two weeks the Finnish army in the Man-

nerheim Line has been under constant shell fire. It is reliably estimated by American correspondents at the front that the Russians are raining a constant stream of heavy artillery shells on the Finnish positions at the rate of over 300,000 a day. Even though such shelling should accomplish no material damage, the loss of sleep among the men alone would prove disastrous if continued much longer.

It is encouraging to note evidences of help for the Finns belatedly being organized in many neutral but vitally interested countries. Volunteers from the Swedish BLE VERSE FOR TODAY been granted to recruit volunteers for Finnish defense. The French general staff is said to be considering military aid to Finland. And even in this country sentiment is rapidly growing in favor of substantial loans to Finland.
