ONE RECRUIT ENOUGH

Iron Nerve Required to Stick Training Trip Out-Scouting Was Then Unknown.

In commenting on the large number of players that accompany a team on the training trip nowadays, Jim Mc-Guire, former Yankee catcher, recently said:

"When I first broke in we only carried the men whom we thought absolutely necessary. I can remember years when only one recruit was with the party, and he had a tough time of it. There wasn't the helping hand spirit then that prevails now. Not so you could notice it. Those oldtimers made life miserable for a rookie, and it took a man with an iron nerve to stick the training trip out

"Ball clubs in those days did not carry the raft of men through the season that they do now. Fifteen was a great squad, and about all the work was done by a couple of pitchers. "Scouting was unknown: For one thing, there were not many places to scout, for the minor leagues were few and not up to the standard of today. Most of the new talent came from semiprofessional clubs. If a man made a big reputation around his home town, he might be looked over when the religious processions passes by a big league manager who could find the time.
